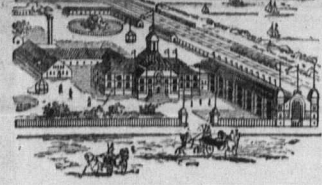

THE ACADIAN Canard News. Mrs Dr W.S. Woodworth has been seriously ill but is now slightly improved. Mr A.S. Harris has entered a fine herd of Durhams for the Provincial Exhibition at Halifax, and unless the exhibitor is better this year than formerly he will undoubtedly take a prize with them. Mr Leander Eaton has also entered a number of fine cattle. Kipps county has always been in the front in capturing prizes on good stock, and it is to be hoped that this year we can at least maintain our standing in that respect. The oats have all been harvested from the dikes and now all along the Canard river cattle can be seen grazing on the after feed. The feed is much better than was expected, being slightly in advance of last year. It was in good demand and sold at high figures—from \$5.00 to \$5.50 per cow's feed. Many of the farmers are now at work digging their early potatoes, and putting them in barrels so as to have them ready for the steamer that is to load about the middle of this month. It is said that the steamer will hold nearly 8,000 barrels. She will take her load to the Havana market. The farmers were quite frightened over the interpretation put upon the "most favored nation" clause by some of our newspapers. A meeting of the proprietors of the Canard dike has been called for Saturday, the 12th, to discuss the advisability of securing a competent engineer to make an estimate of the cost, and give plans and specifications for the construction of a new dike and abutment. The old abutment has been considered not very safe, for some time, and in case it became worse it would be necessary to make extensive repairs or else the new dike would have to be built. The new abutment would be at or near the Middle Ground nearly one half mile below the Wellington Dike, and would enclose about 200 acres of good land. Considering the enormous expense it would incur to build this new dike it is not likely that the proprietors will agree to tax themselves so heavily unless the old abutment cannot be permanently fixed. This is a year of violent storms. We had on Monday night one of the heaviest wind and rain storms that has ever been known in this county. All along this Street the effect of the wind was keenly felt. A large part of the fruit was blown from the trees and in most every orchard trees were split to the ground or torn up by the roots. The result has been a great loss to the farmers. While all have suffered some loss there are a few orchards that can be noticed more than others. Mr Fred Dickie had some fine trees almost ruined. Mr Freeman Eaton's loss was heavy, trees being broken, twisted and uprooted. Mr Ross Chipman, of Chipman's Corner, was particularly unfortunate. The wind about his orchard must have been like a cyclone judging from the destruction it made. E. Spencer, of the Parrboro Sash and Door Factory, has completed the engine house for the W. & A. Railway, at Annapolis. He has also contracted with the W. & A. Railway to build a station, freight shed, and dining rooms at the same place. Another contract is to build a residence for Mr F. Dixon, at Wolfville.—Parrboro Leader. Mr C. F. A. Patterson, of Horton Landing, has recently procured an excellent bred Jersey bull. He is sired from the Hartz stock at Baddeck, C. B., the service of which costs \$100. Anyone wishing the services of this fine animal should communicate with Mr Patterson. The St John Sea of Wednesday says, "Hundreds of people assembled at the Corporation pier yesterday morning to see the big ship Canada take her departure for Liverpool. She takes 1,500,000 feet of deals and battens, 31,154 feet of scantling, 104,122 feet of ends and 165,701 feet of boards. The value of her cargo is in the vicinity of \$144,109. The tug Storm King towed the ship down as far as Musquash. Don't forget the grand Exhibition in College Hall, on Wednesday evening next. "The Y. M. C. A. Hall was crowded last evening to the very doors, and in the gallery, with a highly delighted audience to witness Mr Strutsler's splendid collection of views of the principal events in the Life of our Saviour. An entertainment of rare artistic merit. —Turo News. It is fully believed by many farmers and business men that the crop of wheat is so good in Prince Edward Island that scarcely any flour will be required to be imported this autumn.

Kentville News Mrs Dr Archibald left Kentville for her home on Wednesday last. Dr F. W. Borden and wife were in town on Tuesday. Miss Eaton, daughter of C. F. Eaton, Esq., has returned to Wolfville to resume her studies at Acadia Seminary. Kenneth Chipman, son of F. W. Chipman, left last Monday to seek his fortune in the West. He was offered, and accepted, a position under Mr Simon Brett, who was recently married at Kentville, in an office in Chicago. We are sorry to lose you "Ken" and we hope that Nova Scotia, or at least Canada, may be your future home. Mr Harry Hedden, leader of the Kentville Brass Band, has lately imported from Boston a handsome cornet for use in the band. It is magnificently engraved and is a perfect instrument. It bears the stamp of H. Durant, Paris, and cost eighty dollars. The trial of the Queen vs. Conner, under the "Speedy Trials Act," came off at the Court House on Wednesday morning. Conner had been accused of an old man named Chisholm. Judge Chipman gave a verdict for two years in the penitentiary. The prisoner did not seem at all sorry for his sentence. The "Second Association Prize," won by the Kings County Rifle Association is on exhibition in the window of W. E. Webster's shop. It is a handsome gold lined cup, the bowl being in the shape of a large cartridge resting on three rifles, surrounded by a wreath. The bowl and the rifles are oxidized silver, and the base is silver-plated. The Association is to be congratulated on its trophy. Mr Webster also has a silver badge won by himself, for the highest aggregate. An exhibition of swimming was given at the Kentville bridge on Saturday by Mrs Street and her son. A large number of people witnessed the sport and seemed to enjoy it immensely. The storm of last Monday night was quite disastrous to some parts of Kentville. The heavy rain of that night broke three dams on the Mill Brook, namely Ward's, Mennie's and Margeson's, and the water came down and covered "the flat." People along the brook had to get out of their houses, for fear they would be washed away in the rushing stream, and wade through two feet of water to a safer place. The gardens in this vicinity are almost all destroyed, and near the railroad can be seen the timber and other material that floated down. The railroad was slightly damaged but the trains were not delayed long.

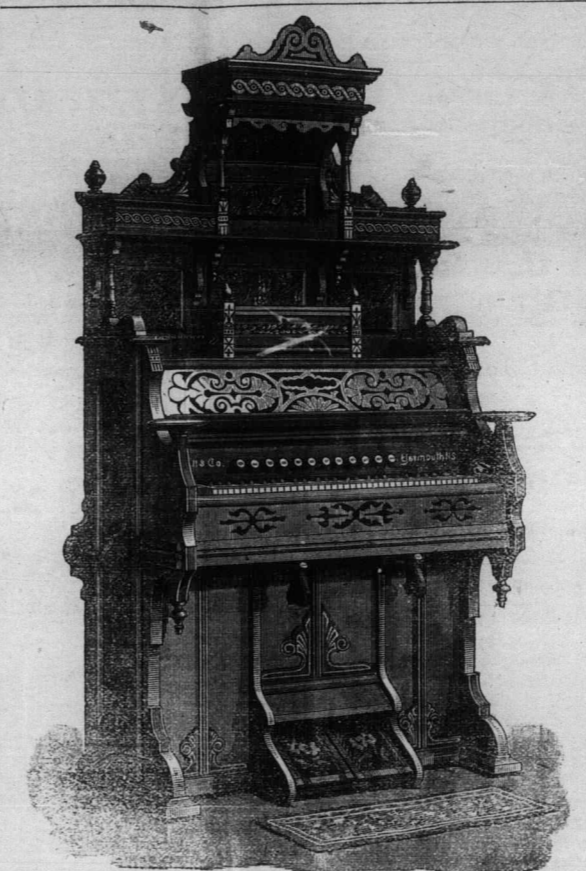
