## The Evening Chit-Chat

Why should a man be proud of disliking most of his fellowmen? And yet every one who likes but few people seems to be proud of the fact. Why should a man be proud that he can see little good in human nature, because he has discovered the remarkable truth that most men are bad and most women are false?

And yet did you ever meet a cynic who wasn't proud of that title?

I suppose the reason for this pride is that the people who discover so many faults and find so few people worthy of their friendship, regard it as a sign of their superior wisdom that they are capable of discovering the faults, and a sign of their superior discrimination that they are so hard to please.

Wonder if it ever occurs to these people that just as great a wisdom and discrimination to find virtues as faults.

It isn't a sign of superior wisdom to call an apple rotten because it has one bad spot, is it?

The man who sees the little flower growing by the roadside has just as sharp eyes as he who sees only the ugly earthworm, hasn't he?

I once knew a dear little girl who liked everybody. With everyone she met she was pleased. Everyone was good, or pretty, or clever, or attractive, or in some way likeable according to this young person.

And then she got in with a crowd of girls older than herself, and acquired better (?) judgment.

She learned to see the faults in and make fun of everyone she met.

She learned to make her circle of friends a very exclusive one and even in this select circle to find many imperfections. It was a case of "all the world's queer except thee and me, and sometimes I think that there is a little queer."

And I know she thought that she had improved and looked back with derision on the blind little girl she had once been.

While really she is just as blind as she ever was. She used to see one-half the picture and now she sees the other half. And the half she sees now isn't near so pretty, and looking at it doesn't make her nearly so nice a girl as looking at the other half did.

For it is one of the greatest truths in this world that the more you can love people and the more good you can find in them the more loveable and worthy you yourself will become.

The man who sees all the hidden faults in people and sees nothing else is not a good judge of human nature any more than the man who can cleverly pick a book to pieces is thereby a good critic.

Good criticism, in its right sense doesn't mean merely finding faults; it also means appreciating good qualities.

Don't be proud of yourself because you can see faults. It isn't a thing to be proud of. You are more an object for pity than pride.

## HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Turnips should always be cut into small pieces before cooking.

When packing, every delicate garment should be wrapped separately.

Never hurry to your bath when you are exhausted; rest a bit first.

Water in which potatoes have been boiled is good to wash tarnished brass.

A small amount of chopped figs will greatly improve a nut and apple salad.

To freshen blue serge, sponge it in blue water and hang it in the air to dry.

Clothes can be made extra white by a little kerosene added to the wash water.

Blotting paper saturated with turpentine is a sure preventative against moths.

The older a woman gets the more water she should drink and the more fruit she should eat.

Pencil marks may often be removed from white paint by rubbing them gently with bread crumbs.

When haggard from fatigue, try a hot bath in which a little vinegar and cologne have been added.

A few chopped almonds added to the top of sweetened biscuit are very good and make a pleasant change.

Washing the eyes morning and night with water as hot as can be borne is an excellent tonic for them.

Never take a hot-bath in the morning, unless it is followed by a cold sponge, or you will catch cold.

If shoes have been mildewed, rub them well with vaseline. This will usually remove all traces of the green.

Boiled or roasted meat which is to be used cold should be put away in a wet cloth to keep it moist and tender.

When ivory becomes discolored,

paint it with spirits of turpentine and lay in the sun for two or three hours.

A lump of charcoal kept in the drawer with the silver will absorb any chance moisture and keep the silvery bright.

Ham soaked with milk over night will be found exceedingly tender and sweet when used for breakfast next morning.

For spring suppers sliced orange and shredded cocoanut, put into a dish in alternate layers, are very appetizing.

To remove cakes readily from the pans, place them on a wet towel or cloth immediately after taking them from the oven.

## Terrible Fight on Train.

Drink-Crazed Passenger Kills Conductor and Porter and Then Dies Police.

Wilmington, Delaware, March 24.—Three men were killed on a north-bound Baltimore and Ohio Railroad train in a fight which began at Newark, Del., and ended in a desperate battle between the police, aided by the firemen and citizens, and a murderer at the Delaware Avenue Station here, following the arrival of the train.

The dead are: O. E. Wellman, aged 40 years, of Philadelphia, conductor of the train; Samuel Williams, aged 50 years, colored, Pullman porter, whose home is said to have been in Jersey City; J. H. Bethea, aged 40 years, of Dillon, S. C.

The injured are: John O. Wiley, aged 40 years, a park guard, of Wilmington, Del., shot in the hand and leg; Matthew Haley, a citizen of Wilmington, shot in the leg.

The triple tragedy was the result of an altercation between Bethea, who was a passenger, and Williams, porter on the Pullman. The car was bound from Washington to Jersey City. Bethea, who had been drinking heavily, shot the porter through the heart, killing him instantly. When Conductor Wellman saw the porter and ran up, Bethea fired a second shot into the colored man's body. Then, without a word, he shot Wellman through the heart. The conductor fell dead.

The double murderer barricaded himself in the toilet room, and threatened to kill the first person who approached. Meanwhile, the train reached Wilmington. A hurry call was sent to the police station.

The police called upon Bethea to surrender. As an answer he opened the door of the toilet room a short distance and opened fire from an automatic revolver. Bethea is believed to have had at least one hundred rounds of ammunition, for he succeeded in holding the posse at bay and also held up the train from 5.17 until 6.35. During this time many shots were fired on both sides. Travel over the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad was also tied up.


A call was sent to a local fire company nearby. The firemen responded with their engines. Attaching a high pressure hose to a fire plug the firemen, barricaded behind trucks and boards, played a stream upon the windows of the toilet room.

The desperado fired a number of shots at the firemen, but they were not injured. Subsequently, Bethea, drenched with water, staggered to the platform, and the police once more called upon him to surrender. His reply was several shots.

Several of the policemen had armed themselves with shotguns, and just as Bethea fired the last shot, Police Captain Evans fired a load of shot into his face.

Notwithstanding this injury he kept on firing. Patrolman Boughman opened fire with a revolver and struck Bethea in the right arm. The desperado tried to fire again, but Sergeant Kelleher opened fire, and also managed to spring upon Bethea. When the police took hold of him he fell dead.



## The Veto Resolutions.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 29.

Premier Asquith in his address yesterday in support of the Government's Veto resolution said that he did not favour a referendum as a means of settling the dead-lock of the two houses. He would like a joint session provided both chambers had a democratic basis but he did not think that a joint session was applicable to Great Britain's existing constitution. Therefore the only means for overcoming the present difficulties was the limitation of the Lord's Veto coupled with a shortening of the duration of Parliament which he thought would insure that the popular will would not be frustrated. The Royal Veto was as dead as Queen Anne, he added, and the absolute Veto of the Lords must follow before the road could be cleared for advent of a full grown and unfettered democracy. A. J. Balfour, the leader of the Opposition followed the Prime Minister whose proposed resolutions he characterized as the most absurd experiment in constitution making upon which any Government embarked. It would be madness he said to adopt the changes which would remove all safe-guards from the affairs of finance. He could not conceive a more insidious moment for the suggestion that the Lords had exceeded their power in rejecting the Money Bill than now, when everybody knew that if the House of Commons voted on the merits of the Budget without regard to the issue like Home Rule the financial measure would be rejected. Mr. Balfour contended that the existence of the House of Lords was more necessary than ever now when modern radicalism has revolutionary ideals and aims, upon which the people should be consulted, before their final adoption. Mr. Balfour intimated that if this really grotesque proposal ever became a law the Conservatives would promptly remove it from the statute book when they returned to power. John E. Redmond leader of the Nationalists congratulated Mr. Asquith upon the substance of his resolutions which he said would be supported heartily by himself and his friends. He was glad that all reference to a reform of the House of Lords had been dropped for if the Government had proposed any plan to reform the Nationalists could not have supported it.

## Roosevelt's Address.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, March 29.

Former President Roosevelt's address before the Students at the University of Egypt yesterday has attracted considerable comment here where there is a different of opinion as to the good or evil effects of his plain talking. In denouncing the assassination of the late Premier Boutros Pasha Ghali, Col. Roosevelt did not mince his words with a view to avoiding offence to the Nationalists a great number of whom had openly sympathized with the assassin. The Radical Press to-day take exception to the American's remarks and even the moderate Westminster Gazette says editorially:—Disquisitions upon the readiness of the reverse of Egypt for self Gov. while permitted to men without great position are perhaps better hushed in the breast of the ex-President, recalling Mr. Gladstone's pronouncement in regard to the early indiscretion of the present Lord Halsbury:—Mistakes which are pardonable in a private individual become scandalous in an Ex-Solicitor General. The Westminster Gazette recognizes Mr. Roosevelt's desire to be friendly and helpful to Great Britain but says that his pronouncement is not calculated to make easier the path of the Govt. in Egypt. On the other hand the Tory Press is highly laudatory of the fearless declarations.

## Monster Python Ruled the Deck.

Boston, Mass., March 23.—When the big British freighter Indrami, came into port to-day from the Far East, one section of the vessel was in control of a monster python, which for four days had defied all efforts to capture it and had given the officers and crew the time of their lives. The python, which is over thirty feet long, was one of a shipment of six which was taken on board at Singapore. They had been stuffed with food before leaving Singapore and during their long passage they appeared to be torpid. They were not fed, but every day they were doused with a bucket of water. Four days ago the largest of the pythons suddenly became very active. It worked the cover off its box and then stretched itself full length on the deck.

## The Caplin Industry.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Please allow me space in your valuable paper to correct a few statements made by J. E. Lake in the Plaindealer, dated Feb. 10, 1910, with reference to drying and smoking caplin. Mr. J. E. Lake has been given the credit of initiating this industry. He says that notwithstanding the facts that my whole life has been spent in endeavouring to cure different kinds of fish and making them marketable by simple methods. Drying and smoking caplin was one of my efforts many years ago and I found it took well but the demand being small, I dropped it. If my friend J. E. Lake dried and smoked caplin in Fortune, it is unknown to any one in Fortune. He may have smoked one for his tea or a few for the use of house, and I have my doubts about that. He says W. P. Lake is the man now smoking and drying caplin and selling them eight cents for 25 caplin which weigh a quarter of a pound of fish. This is not correct. They are retailed in St. John's in the grocery stores for eight cents a carton of 25 caplin after freight and profits of retailers are paid. He says every fisherman could do this work even if he only smoked what was left in his bait tub after fishing all day and carrying on his fishing, and also that the school children could do it and make hundreds of dollars from it. He says an old molasses puncheon would make a smoke house. I dare say an old molasses puncheon would be a good thing to put people in who cannot mind their own business. He says that we have the right man at the head of the Fishery Department with such a Government as the present to help, the small matters will grow into mountains. I hope so and I hope they will smoke his unused bait, left in his tub, after the day's fishing. To my mind the fisherman who has to get up at 2 a.m. and gets his bait and goes to the fishing ground and fishes till 5 or 6 in the evening, returns home and dresses his fish, has not much time or energy to smoke his unused bait, left in his tub, but would rather have a smoke of his old pipe and go to rest and prepare himself for the same work next day. This is poor advice to the fisherman and worse to the schoolboy. The old bait lying in the bait tub all day is very poor stuff to put on the markets for food. It is only fit for manure for the land, and this is what my friend recommends to be smoked by the fishermen and schoolboys and thereby make hundreds of dollars. I make no wonder that our Newfoundland fish are a drug in the markets. What has damaged our herring trade only by packing in such stuff—the old bait left in the bait tub. Our herring some years ago could be sold for almost any price but owing to the bad packing they have become almost unsaleable; our lobster the same. What is wanted to-day is the good article and put on the market in good packages as I am doing with my caplin. I would like for J. E. Lake to point out to me only one industry he started in the way of curing our fish and making them marketable. He says his whole life has been spent in this work, but not one of them can be seen to-day. Why doesn't he say that he started the whale fishery and the seal fishery and the bank fishing? He had as much to do with these fisheries as the caplin industry.

The same number of bankers will sail from Harbor Breton, and the Francis Smith, House, master, has already gone. Saturday last the Hispanola, Capt. Jno. Lewis, left to get his bait supply, and the others will shortly follow. At Rencontre a few days ago some fine hauls of herring were made, the seines of Messrs. Hartigan and Valance securing 600 barrels each.

It is the intention of the ladies also to have an "At Home" for the children on Friday, April 8th, and parents and guardians are assured that their charges will be carefully looked after and that every child will be bountifully supplied with all the good things which will be on hand.

## The Sealing News.

The "succulent flapper" is now in evidence on our streets, and seen from both the Harlaw and Viking did good work yesterday selling them at the rate of 40 cents per dozen.

The Southern Cross started to land her cargo at Harbor Grace at 9 a.m. yesterday, and the seals averaged 44 lbs. Some of them weighed out went 50 lbs.

There was a report abroad last evening that a two-masted steamer had passed Cape Bonavista, and that the Bellavente had passed Foggo, but the rumours were unfounded.

## Rebuilding Flakes and Stages.

But to return to my own first experience of this stately function. When, in due course, I received my invitation to dine with the Speaker, I confess I would have given a good deal to escape the honour. To begin with I was as unfamiliar with Court dress as a barn-door fowl with peacock's feathers, and I was, like young members, not a little in awe of the grave and stern gentleman who occupied the Speaker's chair.

But there was no escape; for the Speaker's invitation, like the King's, is a command which must be obeyed except in case of illness or sudden death—like returning a trump-lead, you know—so I screwed up my courage to the ordeal, arrayed myself in the splendour (to me) of Court uniform, and duly presented myself among my fellow-guests, two or three of whom, I was glad to find, were personal friends.

When, after what seemed an eternity of waiting, we had each received a cordial hand-shake and a genial welcome from the Speaker, who, in his new character, seemed a most amiable and kindly sort of personage, we were ushered into the state dining room, which is one of the most magnificent apartments in the Palace of Westminster.

My breath was quite taken away by the splendour of this banquetting-chamber, with its noble proportions, its graceful architecture, its rich carving, and profuse gilding. But what appealed to me still more was the stately array of portraits of past Speakers which environed us. Just opposite my seat the haughty Edward Seymour looked down condescendingly on me, close by, Sir Harbottle Grimston, of Stuart times, seemed to wink an encouraging eye at me.

Over the mantelpiece Mr. Shaw-Lefevre loomed large as life. Next to him, Henry Brand seemed to stand out of the canvas as if about to join us; and so on around the walls, one after another, the dead Speakers of the Commons, all living and breathing on canvas and shedding the lustre of their dignified presence on our banquet.

The Chaplain had long said grace before I was able to take my eyes from these pictured giants of past Parliaments and was able to turn my attention to the choice dishes and wines placed before me.

Of course, the meal was perfect—superb. The table glittered and glowed under its burden of magnificent plate, exquisite glass, and garden of flowers; and a delightful gentility and informality emanating from our host put us all in the happiest vein.

There were no speeches; politics—we never mentioned them. There was just one toast, "The Queen," proposed by the Speaker without remark; and, for the rest, there were chatter and laughter, and free and easy flow of conversation and merriment which lent a zest to appetite and made the banquet one long feast of pleasure.

When at last the Chaplain rose to return thanks I could have vowed the meal had not lasted twenty minutes. It was actually two hours since we had sat down to it.—*Tit-Bits.*

a horse in Toronto recently and the sight of one eye was destroyed. The father of the girl sued the firm who owned the horse for \$3,000, and the jury awarded the girl \$1,500. The father was given \$75 in addition for expenses to which he was put.

The Cuban sugar crop is expected to fall short of the estimates made earlier in the year. The total crop will likely only reach 1,600,000 tons, whereas it was expected to total 1,800,000. Excessive droughts and the effects of a cyclone in October last is the cause of the decrease.

The Rough Riders, of whom ex-President Roosevelt was in command during the Spanish American War, is going to New York to welcome their leader when he arrives in the States from his South African sporting trip. It is said four hundred will take part in the reception, and will wear their war outfits and parade on horseback.

Northern Alberta has thirty townships comprising seven hundred thousand acres ready for occupancy, which are to be thrown open for homesteading on March 27th. There is no better land in the West, the prairie counties being well supplied with water, coal and wood; but at the present time access to the country is not easy.

The United States Navy Department has decided that the battleships of that country will be closed books so far as foreigners are concerned. This step has been decided upon owing to the large amount of information supplied the department regarding the foreign ships that visited the Hudson-Fulton Celebration last year.

It is now a misdemeanor for a woman to wear long hat pins in Chicago in public places. Any woman caught wearing one longer than that allowed by the City Council bye-law is liable to arrest and a fine of \$50. The exposed point of the pin shall not protrude a half inch beyond the crown of the hat in or through which such pin is worn. Judging by the breadth of the crown of some hats now in vogue, despite the bye-laws of the Chicago City Council, there is going to be a shortage of iron or steel in the near future.

### Government Will Send Expedition Into the Far North.

Captain Sam Bartlett Will Head Search Party Seeking George Caldwell.

Ottawa, Ont., March 18.—The Government has decided that the mystery surrounding the fate of Geo. Caldwell, of Ottawa, should be cleared up, and accordingly a contract has been entered into with Captain Sam. Bartlett, one of the most skillful Newfoundland's sailing captains, a man associated with Arctic expeditions for a quarter of a century, to undertake the task of conducting a systematic search for the party.

It is now two years since word has been received of Caldwell, who started upon an expedition into the Far North, accompanied by two Eskimos. The last tidings heard of him were communicated to the Government by the North West Mounted Police, who reported that information had been received from a trading Eskimo that Mr. Caldwell and his companions were seen at Baker Lake, in the fall of 1908.

The precise object of his mission into the Arctic regions was for a long time something of a mystery, but it has developed recently, that although his expedition was accredited by the Department of Marine, his real object was to locate very rich gold deposits, the existence of which had been communicated to him by an Eskimo, who gave him samples of ore which the aborigine brought to Ottawa three years ago.

Captain Bartlett will proceed northward to Hudson Bay early in June next, in a schooner which he owns. The intention is that he shall proceed to the head of Chesterfield Inlet, as far as his vessel may be able to navigate, and from thence by steam launch or canoe, continue north and west on the route supposed to have been taken by Caldwell.

The latter's relatives in Ottawa long ago gave up hope that he survived the trip.

### Sixty Councillors Involved in the Pittsburg Graft.

Pittsburg, March 24.—The serial story of councilmanic graft promises another sensational chapter to-day—the presentation to the grand jury of Joseph C. Wasson's confession. Wasson is a former councilman who began five days ago an eighteen months sentence for bribe taking and who, eventually regarding the immunity baths which have been given to others, decided last night to follow the lead of Capt. Klein and tell the District Attorney all he knew.

The instalments of the graft story have been so spasmodic that a synopsis is here presented for those who missed the first chapters. Klein's display of \$30,000 in bills on the street, June 26, 1908, excited the suspicion of Ernest F. Rey, a harness dealer. He reported the discovery to the city auditor, the latter told Mayor Guthrie, and he passed it on to the Voters' League, to whom the citizens of Pittsburg are indebted for the prosecution that was set in motion.

A detective's bribery of councilmen in connection with a fictitious wood paving plan started the ball rolling. This led into the bank depository conspiracy and other forms of graft. The law ground slowly and is still grinding, with the following net result: In penitentiary, W. W. Ramsey, former president of the German National Bank; William Brand, former president of the Common Council; Joseph C. Wasson, former councilman, and H. M. Bolder; under sentence to the penitentiary, former Councilman John F. Klein; awaiting disposition of their cases, E. H. Jennings, president of the Columbia National Bank, and F. A. Griffen, cashier, who pleaded no contendere; under indictment, forty-one councilmen; confessors of bribe sharing, twenty councilmen, former and present, select and common; more confessors awaiting turn, ten former and present councilmen; bribes from \$5,000 down to the bargain rate of \$81.10.
