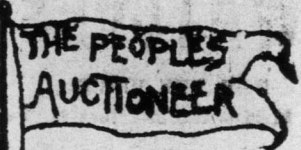

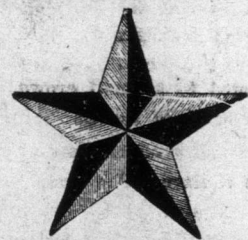

## Household Notes.

Safety matches will strike as easily on coal as on the safety box. When the eyes ache and burn, bathe them in hot water into which a dash of witch hazel has been added. A slice of potato is an excellent thing to clean white cloth which has become disfigured by hot cooking utensils.

Pots and kettles should not be scraped. Use a piece of sandpaper to remove any burned particles or discolorations. When silver has become discolored with egg, dip a damp cloth in salt water and rub the silver; the stain will disappear.

If the teapot becomes musty, put a lump of sugar in it before putting it away. It will smell sweet when you want to use it. If the stepladder slips, paste a piece of old rubber over each support; this will not only prevent a fall, but it will protect the floors.

Raw starch is not digestible, so all foods containing starch should be subjected to boiling water or dry heat and thoroughly cooked. If you are caught in a shower and your hat gets wet, take it off and turn it upside down to dry. The trimming will not be apt to sag. If you have castors put on your wooden box it will be much more convenient to sweep around and under it, or to move it from place to place. When cooking mushrooms it is safe to put a silver spoon in the pan. If the spoon turns dark, you can be sure there is a toadstool in the pan.

Finger-marks on doors can be removed easily by using a clean piece of flannel dipped in kerosene; then wipe them with a cloth wrung out of hot water. This destroys the smell of kerosene. Hot-water bottles, before being hung away, should first be dried, then inflated with air and the stopper put in securely. This prevents sticking together, which in a short time ruins the rubber.

If you can swim, that increases the probability that you will die by drowning. The ability to swim is an accomplishment, not an asset.

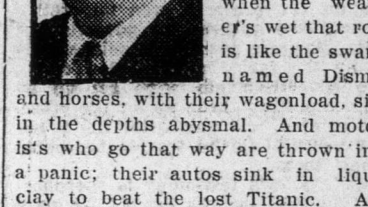

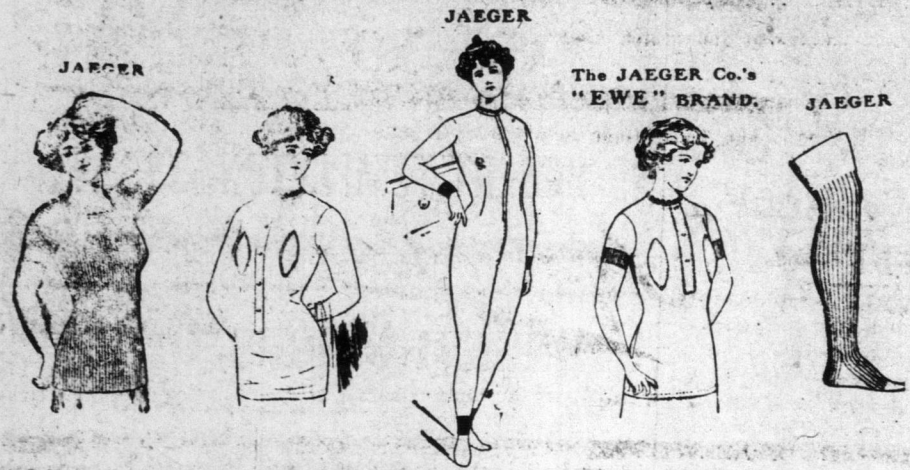

### Six Thousand People

San Eugene Tremblay Maintains His Claim on Championship Belt.

Eugene Tremblay is still the lightweight champion wrestler of the world.

The local boy demonstrated his right to this title when he defeated decisively in two straight falls the aspirant for championship honors from Manchester, N. H., John Paradis, at Sohmer Park last night.

The bout, which was at the catch-as-catch-can style of wrestling, was the fastest and cleverest exhibition ever seen on a local mat and the six thousand people present showed their appreciation of the work of both men by bursts of applause which might have been heard throughout the length and breadth of the eastern section of the city.

The men weighed in in the afternoon below the 135-pound mark, Tremblay having one and one-half pounds the better of his opponent.

Early in the evening, the crowd started to rush into the big enclosure of the Park. They hustled and hustled one another in a mad endeavor to secure seats of vantage, and it looked at one time as though the scene enacted at the Tremblay-Paradis contest some years ago would be re-enacted, and the building damaged. However, wise action

on the part of the officials of the Canadian Athletic Club who threw open the side doors of the main building, averted any trouble and the big auditorium was quickly filled, in fact long before the first preliminary was started.

Stage seats were not to be had for love or money, and the patrons of the game who usually occupy these seats of vantage were compelled to take the orchestra chairs.

After several preliminaries Paradis entered the ring at about 9.50, and he received an encouraging welcome from the crowd. Tremblay immediately after jumped over the ropes and the big crowd gave him a tremendous reception. He looked in perfect condition and beyond compare with his physical condition when last he faced the Manchester boy. They tried hard for a period of ten minutes for a leg hold. Tremblay finally getting his man to the mat, but it was only a momentary advantage, for Paradis squirmed free. They worked with an energy that was surprising and pulled and tugged at one another for nearly an hour, Paradis trying generally for a toe hold. Tremblay also did little else than try for a similar hold, but for the first time in his life he could not work it. Try as he might the Manchester boy had a perfect defence against this hold, and there was nothing doing. Half Nelson, full

Nelsons, and body holds, were tried time after time by both men with first one having the advantage and then the other. After Tremblay secured a waist and crotch hold, and lifting his man high in the air let him drop with tremendous force to the mat. This move proved the undoing of Paradis, who was knocked senseless and Tremblay falling upon the helpless boy, gained the first fall. Paradis, when he arose, attacked the referee, believing the latter to be Tremblay. This bout took exactly fifty-five minutes.

Paradis gamely decided to continue the battle, and it took Tremblay just seventeen minutes to gain the second and deciding fall in a manner similar to that which won the first bout.—Montreal Star, Oct. 10.

The Porte ignores the Greek ultimatum regarding the Greek vessels which have been seized, and basis the recall of the Turkish Minister at Athens on the admission by Greece of Cretan deputies to the Greek parliament. The Government announces it has released the seized Greek vessels which have foreign cargoes on board.

**CHICAGO, To-day.**  
His surgeons insist that Roosevelt must not see or speak to anyone for several days. The wound is described as serious and not a mere flesh wound. The patient slept well at intervals during the night, ate ravenously, and read lengthy extracts from Macaulay. He hinted he would not object to a ride in the fresh air. Finally learning that the correspondents accompanying him on his speaking tour, who had left him after the assault to file articles, had rejoined his entourage at the hospital, he had them in for a talk.

**PODGORITZA, To-day.**  
The last fortress between Tushi and Scutari surrendered yesterday to the Montenegrins. Among the Turkish prisoners-already captured are 620 officers, including the colonel in command at Tushi. Addressing war correspondents at a reception, King Nicholas said he regretted the bloodshed, but it would result in a new and better era of freedom and civilization.

Special Evening Telegram.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
Turkey's refusal to reply to note of the Balkan States will in all probability compel these States to address an actual ultimatum to the Porte to-day before commencing hostilities. The Ministers of Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece are still waiting at Constantinople, although diplomatic relations are virtually ended because of the recall of the Turkish Minister from Sofia, Belgrade and Athens. The conclusion of peace between Italy and Turkey removes much uneasiness in Europe as to the Balkan war. The German Foreign Secretary referring to this at Berlin said it would facilitate the localizing of the war and the matters upon which the Powers had had ample time to arrive at an agreement. Premier Menzies in the Greek Chamber announced that the Greek fleet was equipped for war lasting a year.

Special Evening Telegram.

**ROME, To-day.**  
The news of the signing of the Peace Protocol was received here with varying emotions. While people rejoiced that war is over, there is a certain regret that Turkey now has a free hand against Montenegro, the homeland of the Italian Queen.

## Fell Overboard.

While all the men were at work on the stocks at Franklin's premises this morning, a boy named Byrne fell overboard and was several minutes in the water before Jno. Connors discovered him. He jumped into a dory and rescued the lad who was almost unconscious and had to be rolled up a barrel to get the water out of him. At the same premises last evening, a man of the schooner Pointer, tripped and went overboard but was a good swimmer and was quickly fished out.

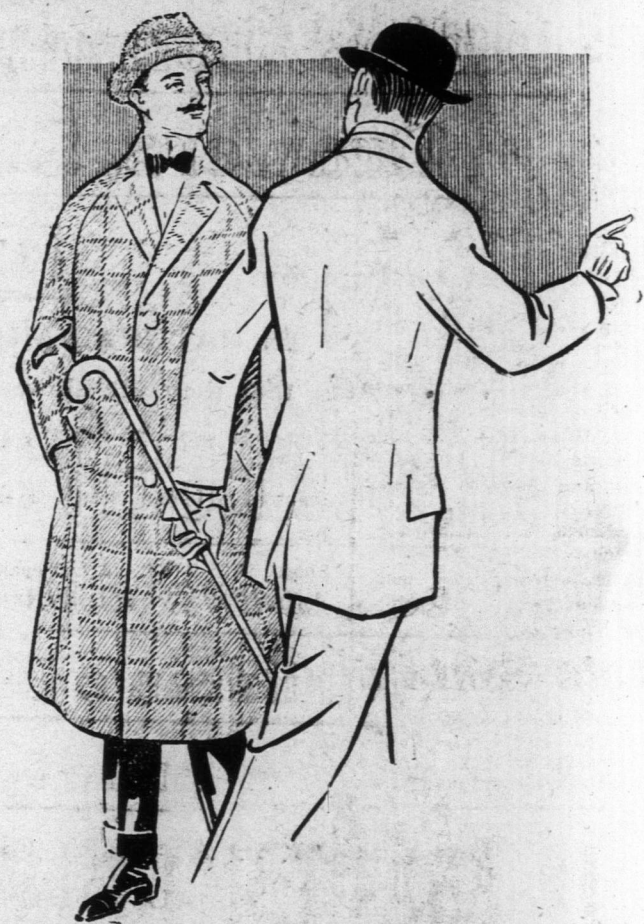

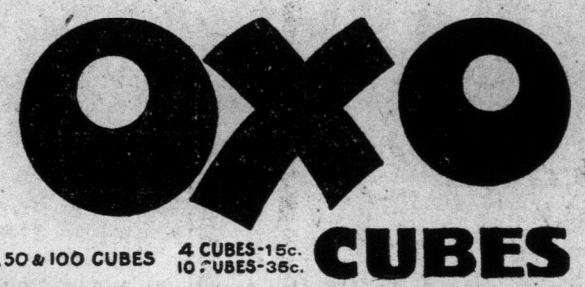

**Big Fire at Jacques.**

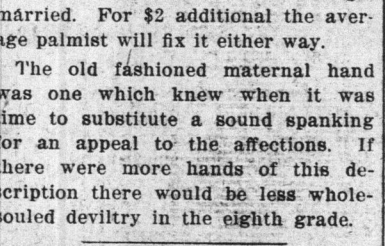
Deputy Minister of Customs LeMesurier received the accompanying message from the Sub-Collector at St. Jacques yesterday afternoon:—

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 15. Austria has issued an official communication stating that she will not interfere in the Sanjak or Novipazar, but will permit the Balkan States to annex any part of it which may lead to complications between Russia and Austria.

Special Evening Telegram. HEIDELBERG, Germany, Oct. 15. A great Montenegrin victory over Turkish troops was announced this morning by Prince Peter of Montenegro in a telegram to his former tutor here. The despatch is worded: "Glorious victory. Ten thousand Turks with artillery captured."

Special Evening Telegram. BERNE, Oct. 15. A flying fit tally occurred to-day at Chateau de Ponds, near Neuchatel. A Swiss airman, named Coblenz, was making a flight carrying a newspaper man, named Bippert, as a passenger, when the machine collapsed, killing them both.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 15. Turkish troops having attacked the Servians near Ribitovatz and the Bulgarians at Chukleni, the London press this morning declares that nothing can avert a general war. The post says there seems as if nothing can prevent the flames from breaking all over the Balkans. The replies of the Balkan States and of Turkey to the Powers, have disposed of the last hope for a peaceful settlement.

**"Please Don't"**

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—Magistrate Scott is out in the Sun of the 5th Inst. treating himself and Chief Justice Horwood to a little taffy.

In "summing up" at the close of the Court here the Chief Justice declared that bulls are at large in this country contrary to law, and the authorities must enforce the law and have them put in pound. We do not blame the Chief Justice, however, for if it were brought to his notice he could do no other than advise the enforcement of the law. But we do blame the long-tongued idle gossips that drew the Chief's attention to the matter.

Bulls have been at large in this community since it was first inhabited, to general profit, and not to the injury of young or old, nor to the dissolution of the moral fabric of the most straight-laced for "to the pure all things are pure," and if it should now happen that bulls have to be kept enclosed then all the fishing classes, and in fact all but a few merchants, will have to kill their cows and heifers, which will be an incalculable loss to the people of the town, and living will be made that much poorer, for many, very many, who do not keep cows find it very helpful to be able to buy milk and cream for their families. I presume over two hundred milk cows on Twillingate Islands, and I do not know of a farm, with sufficient fodder to maintain a bull, in good condition, even during the best months of summer, much less in the early spring and late autumn. There would, therefore, be less than nothing to feed any cows that may be put to the same enclosure. No, if our bulls have to be pounded it simply means they will have to be fed the whole year round, and a man will have to be paid to look after them the whole year. Even then the service would be very poor and weak, if not diseased. Further, it is said that Government officials are under paid. If that is the case, then it becomes necessary to economize in every way. So the authorities should allow our harmless young bulls to promenade as usual, and not imprison them, entailing great loss to citizens, and heavy costs to the taxpayers.

Our Magistrate, in his letter to the Sun, says "Harbor Rock" is the "Freshest" thing alive. What a pity he is out of politics, for then he might be more personal. However, it is not given to all to marry into good families, and be remembered in the bequests of a large estate, nor be privileged to draw on the public exchequer. Having had only meagre opportunities, I find it hard to advance beyond the ordinary.

What a lot it must take to run a Government, when one considers the amount of necessities, for them the delicacies required for so many picnics. I see by the papers that "His people" will soon have to bow their hard-working Premier off again to Washington. Oh, my, how annoying it must be to Sir Edward to be away from home so much! I would not blame him if he'd resign. Again who can stand Washington society? What a lot

of talent it must take to make a fluent, interesting fishery conversationalist in Washington. But they say that outsiders who go there, on international matters, "talk long after they have anything to say." Chest protectors are cheap though. It must seem very hard to our Premier to have to go to all those first class banquets and find the supper, he band, and the refreshments all paid for.

Twillingate had hoped to see Mr. Piccott along with his new dredge, as Shoel Tickle is filling up. But if the dredge is a poor digger, and has to go out often for a drink, then it can stay away from here.

How time flies. Only three short years ago the present Government candidates were around, working over-time to win the confidence of the electors. The closing chapter of the Government regime is: "How can we win the affection of those whom we have so grossly deceived, and I do not grudge them their hopeless task. Where is poor Donald? He should hand himself over to an American humorist under a contract for 50 per cent. of what can be made out of pen sketches of his political life. He may then not take a Strong hand in a timber deal, and may be able to live comfortably without a Judgeship.
