



We have read the text of the Note sent by the United States to Germany and find that the forecast published last week is correct. The Note is signed by Secretary Bryan and was sent to the American Ambassador at Berlin on Thursday last, with a direction to call on the German Minister of Foreign Affairs and after reading the communication to him, to leave a copy with him. The document is expressed in plain and simple language and is a full and comprehensive, though comparatively short, statethe statements, we find:

It is clearly wise and desirable that the Government of the United States and the Imperial German Government should come to a clear and full understanding as to the grave

"The sinking of the British passenmarine on March 28, through which Leon C. Thrasher, an American citizen, was drowned; the attack on April 28 on the American vessel Cushing by a German aeroplane; the torpedoing on May 1 of the American marine, as a result of which two or more American citizens met their death; and, finally, the torpedoing and sinking of the steamship Lusitan ia, constitute a series of events which the Government of the United States has observed with growing concern, distress and amazement.'

In referring to the notice of submarine warfare against mercantile shipping, Secretary Bryan says:—
"This Government has already taken occasion to inform the Imperial German Government that it cannot admit the adoption of such measures, or such a warning of danger, to operate as in any degree an abbreviation of the rights of American ship-masters, or of American citizen bound on lawful errands as passengers on merchant ships of belliger-ent nationality; and that it must hold the Imperial German Government to a strict accountability for any infringement of those rights, intention






