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

The Bank fishery for the past season was the largest on record. The 102 vessels engaged landed 170,390 qtls., as against 124,057 for 105 ves-

The seal fishery of 1915 was the smallest on record; only 47,000 seals were brought home by the thirteen steamers engaged in this fishery.

The Council has been endeavoring to collect information from foreign countries as to the management of Fishery Schools; a great deal of information has been collected, which will be forwarded to the Government Inspectors of Schools for the Colony, with a view to enable them to formulate some plan, which with a grant from the Government, should facilitate the introduction of a system to provide a scientific knowledge of the fisheries.

Science and the Fishery.



Board of Trade has taken up the question of Tech-nical education in New-foundland, as it affects the staple industry of the country, and that the Board has collected considerable information relating to Fishery Schools abroad. We are also pleased to find that the Board is interesting itself in scientific investigation as to our fisheries. It is indeed remarkable that a country which has been almost entirely dependent on the fisheries in the past has done so little in either direction. When the Fisheries Department was organized nearly twenty years ago, an opportunity was afforded to create machinery to investigate what were the actual fishery resources of Newfoundland and Labrador, and particularly what were the values and locations of the banks off the coast of There should be a com petent staff of scientists attached to that department and when information had been collected and collated in the way the Imperial Institute collates information, a basis would be formed for getting out of these resources more than is done to-day by their better exploitation. There must be an extra-ordinary large amount of information also in the possession of our fisher-men, particularly those who have spent a life time at the fishery. This of course has been so for generations, but the unfortunate part of it is that t mostly disappears with the death of the fishermen, as their exists no public means of collecting this information and keeping a public record of it, and the only part which remains is such information as is handed down from generation to generation, from father to son, and exists in the memory of these still alive. 
