Germany's Reply Unacceptable.

Another Document to be Submitted--Paris Regards Communist Uprising as Faked--Declaration of War by English Miners--Numerous Deaths in Hamburg.

BERMAN REPLY UNACCEPTABLE.
 PARIS, March 25. The delegation here to-day delivered to the Allied Reparation Commission the German reply to the note sent by the Commission yesterday, giving Germany warning of the infliction of penalties under the treaty unless she paid before May first twelve billions of gold marks, the balance of the twenty billion marks payment due under treaty. The Commission decided that the reply was unacceptable in its present form and refused to accept it from the German delegates. The Germans agreed to draft another reply which, however, will not be ready before next week.

THE COMMUNIST OUTLOOK.
 BERLIN, March 25. Advice received to-night from disturbed industrial areas in middle Germany state that the police captured Eisleben and Höttingen from the Communists after violent fighting. The Communists have taken possession of large nitrogen works in Lohna, near Halle, where they are reported to have formed a Red army of 6,000.

REGARD COMMUNIST UPRISING SPURIOUS.
 PARIS, March 25. Official circles here regard the Communist uprising in Germany spurious, basing judgment on despatches received in this city. Latest reports reaching official quarters are to the effect that a large number of Russian Bolsheviks succeeded in entering Hamburg, bringing with them large supplies of money for propaganda purposes. The uprising there is attributed for the most part to their influence.

ORDER RESTORED IN HAMBURG.
 BERLIN, March 25. Order has been restored in Hamburg and the Communists have been ejected from the shipyards which they had occupied. President Ebert, in agreement with the government of Prussia, has issued an edict establishing measures to restore public order in the regions disturbed by the Communist uprising. The condition established by the Presidential announcement, is a "non military state of siege." In compliance with the President's move, the head of the government of Saxony has appointed a civilian commissary to act in emergency. It had been decided earlier by the Cabinet of the Empire and by the Prussian Cabinet, according to the Vossische Zeitung, that a proclamation of martial law was not necessary in view of the general attitude of the workers.

FURTHER TROUBLE WITH MINERS.
 LONDON, March 25. National delegates to the conference of miners have rejected the proposals made by coal mine owners for districts to pay. The miners decided to adhere to their demands for a settlement of the controversy on a national basis. The action of the miners is regarded by newspapers as a "declaration of war" and as likely to result in complete cessation of mining on April first. National settlement with wages fixed on unit basis is declared by mine owners to be entirely impracticable.

GEDDES WILL DISCUSS NEW ASSOCIATION OF NATIONS.
 NEW YORK, March 25. A special to the Tribune from Washington says the British government has empowered Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador here, to act as its commissioner in discussing with President Harding plans for the new association of nations, it was

Music is of many moods. Just as joy, sorrow, suffering, contempt, merriment, amazement and many kindred feelings find ready expression by instrumental and vocal music, so Easter music is the embodiment of Easter hope, Easter gladness, Easter thanksgiving and Easter triumph. The solemn dirge of the sealed sepulchre is lost in the mighty psalm of the risen tomb. Life has triumphed over death, the spiritual over the material, and the heavenly over the earthly. "Dead Marches" and "Hallelujah Choruses" have little in common.

"O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" Thanks be to God, that giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Such expressions simply must be sung. They halt when confined to ordinary modes of expression. "Life up your heads, O ye gates, and be ye lift up, ye everlasting doors, and the King of Glory shall come in." How could a company of people read or recite such words and utter such thought without bursting into song? Easter and song are synonymous. The trilling bird, the springing flower, the budding leaf, the verdant earth. They all speak high hope and wondrous fulfillment to the weary, the depressed, the sorrowing and sinful.

SOME EASTER HYMNS.
 How better could the Easter Sunday morning be ushered in than by the use of Hymn 136, "Christ the Lord is Risen To-day"? This lyric is one great triumph-song. Climax is piled on climax, till the hymn becomes indeed a great psalm of victory. Christ the Lord is risen to-day. Alleluia! Alleluia! Songs of men, and angels say Alleluia!

Master Kenneth Parsons, son of Mr. Edward Parsons, who is attending college at St. John's, is spending his Easter holidays with his parents and friends here.

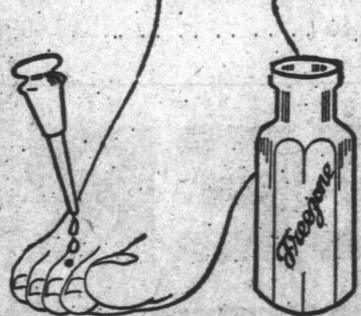
The Ladies Aid of the Methodist Church will serve meat teas in Congregational Hall on Easter Tuesday, March 29th inst.—COR.

Beached on Miquelon.

LOSS OF S.S. STADIUM.
We learn the following particulars of the loss of the tug Stadium from one of the members of the ship's company. The Stadium, which was purchased by F. H. Ellis & Co., at St. John, N.B., left Louisburg at midnight March 14th, for this port and on the 18th ran into a heavy S.E. gale, which threatened the little steamer and it was decided to run into the ice for shelter. The next day the wind veered to N.W. which opened the ice and about 8 a.m. the Stadium got into open water, and at 2.30 p.m. reached Ramas where she remained until the storm abated. At 6 a.m. on the 18th she left for St. Pierre taking her course from Cape LaFune. As soon as Miquelon Head was sighted, a S.E. storm came on almost suddenly. An attempt was made to reach St. Pierre, but the weather became so thick and after steaming some time towards St. Pierre, decided to retreat and anchor at Miquelon. At 2.30 p.m. two anchors were put out and with the engine going at full speed, the Stadium rode out the storm until midnight when the starboard chain parted and shortly afterwards the port chain snapped. Captain Pike then decided to beach the steamer, though he was not sure of his position, and succeeded in wedging her into a small cove near Cape Blanc, but neither the Cape nor light was visible. The crew were unable to leave her and held the decks for seven hours. While the tide was high the vessel was beached, the crew making a landing at low tide by means of planks. After a tramp of two hours along the beach they reached Miquelon settlement where they were accorded excellent treatment, and on Sunday they were taken on the S.S. Pierre from Miquelon to St. Pierre. Later they transferred to the schooner Harry and Verna, owned by Hollett Bros., and were taken to Burin where they joined the Fortis for here.

JOHN P. CURTIN.

This morning he passed quietly and peacefully his soul passed out to his God, from whom we feel confident he received the loving welcome—"Well done, good and faithful servant." Hundreds knew John Curtin and respected him for his sterling qualities of mind and heart; he had many friends and no enemies and today many will mourn his early death. But it was only his family who knew him thoroughly and so could appreciate his greatness of character. Always a loving, devoted husband, brother and father, he was missed by all. His morning heart's crushed with grief because he is gone, but which at the same time are peaceful and resigned, because they feel that he is happy, they believe that he will spend his Easter in heaven; then his funeral anthem should be a glad evangel, mingling not unseemly with the "Alleluia" of the Resurrection. The deceased was one of the oldest members of the Benevolent Irish Society, also a Charter Member of the Elks; his name was identified with all charitable and religious undertakings. Left to mourn him are his wife, (formerly Miss Redmond of this city) one sister, Miss Mary A. Curtin, four daughters, Sister M. Patricia of the presentation Convent, Cathedral Square, Mrs. Michael P. Tobin, Barnes Rd., and Misses Mary (Nurse) and Helen, and one son, Mr. Jack Curtin, at home. To all of them our sincere sympathy goes out on this day of sorrow for them. The funeral will take place from the family residence, No. 47 Hayward Avenue, on Monday afternoon at 2.30 p.m. Interment will take place at Belvidere. R.I.P.

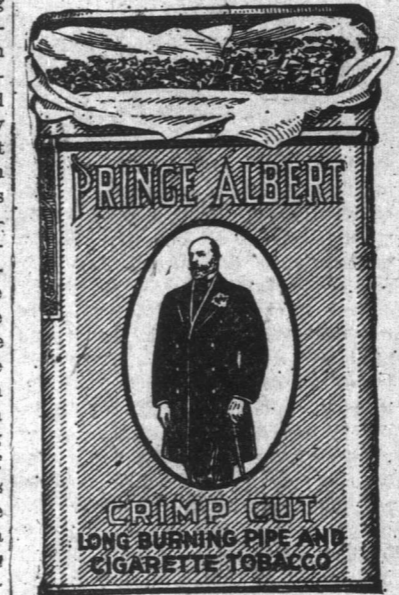



Forty-Two Years in the Public Service--- The Evening Telegram.

TRINITY.

Some sixty years ago there was a parson in Trinity Bay who had charge of an extensive mission. His aids served in the several outlying churches at regular intervals, but he was always in the church at headquarters on the great Festivals of Christmas, Easter, Whitsunday and Trinity Sunday.

The people of one of his congregations, in a little place called "Sally's Cove," made frequent visits to Trinity, which they rightly regarded as the capital of the Bay. To the young people especially, a visit to Trinity was an event to which they looked forward once or twice a year, with the greatest interest. Upon their return to "Sally's Cove" they always had much to tell others of the wonderful things they had seen, and they brought back many other wonderful things to show them.

There were two old people, however, who, largely because they could not take advantage of the trip, and because they were thoroughly loyal to "Sally's Cove," never tired of despising Trinity, and sneering at those who thought so much of it. The old lady, in particular, would say to them, "Trinity, Trinity, that's all you think about. Better for you to stay home and do something for the place you was born in."

One year, during the week before Trinity Sunday, the parson had begun to do some work to the interior of the church at headquarters, and owing to some unforeseen delay, the parson found that the church could not be used for service on the following Sunday. This being so, he decided to go to "Sally's Cove" for morning service on that day. In the preparation of his sermon for that service, he realized how deep, and how difficult to explain, was the subject of the Holy Trinity. Still he felt it was his bounden duty to make it the subject of his sermon, so he took special pains to simplify his language, in order (if possible) to make the subject plain to his people. The result was he used the word Trinity quite often, and judging from the attention the people gave to him, he decided that he had succeeded in making himself understood by everybody, and that he had taught them some valuable truths about a fundamental verity.

When he went to the house of the two old people, where he was (as usual) to get his dinner, to his great surprise he found them cool in manner, and strangely silent in speech. He could not understand it, as they had always been so bright, so kind, and so talkative. He made the usual remarks about the weather, but they brought forth only a curt "yes" or "no," and the dinner went on in almost unbearable silence.

At last the parson ventured a question on another subject. He asked, "How did you like the sermon this morning, Mrs. Smith?" This question produced a sudden change in the old lady's attitude, and she replied, with a ring of scorn in her voice, "Sermon, hey! I didn't like it." "At all, Goodness knows, you said 'enough about Trinity; you never said a word about 'Sally's Cove.'"

"Speaks the young gadabouts was 'pleased with it; but Garge and I didn't think much of it.'"

The old saying, however, "A willful waste makes a woeful want" is as true today, as it was when the truth it contains, was first expressed in these words.

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As the North Sees It.

(Twilight Sun)
THE SUGAR SITUATION.

Regarding sugar it seems that a number of firms in St. John's are at present not willing to handle Government sugar. A business man here offering sugar received a reply from two wholesalers that they were not dealing in sugar until free importation was allowed.

Sugar consumption is very slow at present, and it is fully expected that the Government sugar will last until September.

St. John's dealers have now reduced the retail price of molasses to \$1 a gallon, and a large increase in the use of this is taking place with a corresponding decrease in the use of sugar.

If this be correct the people of this country are condemned to a further hardship to the sugar Government unless they break the shackles themselves.

TO BE SOLD ON GOVERNMENT ACCOUNT.

According to message received yesterday from Italy the schooner President Coaker, which has on board 7,500 quintals of Labrador fish, has been ordered on to Genoa, the cargo being placed in the hands of an Italian broker to be sold on Government account. It is evident that this cargo is part of the 40,000 quintals purchased by the Government following the demand made upon Mr. Coaker by the northern fishermen in November last. At the time it was reported that the Government had given a guarantee for the purchase of this fish, but is generally understood today that the Government advanced the money for the fish, that it was purchased on Government account, and that in addition to the amount expended in its purchase, an additional sum of sixty cents per quintal was paid for storage and handling. In all the cost to the Government so far is said to be about \$350,000, most of which can be wiped off as a loss, for from present indications the amount that will be realized from the sale of this fish will little more than pay the freight, brokerage, demurrage and other expenses incidental to the disposal of the fish. This fish deal by the Government is another bungle, that must cost the country another huge sum of money. Where it is all coming from in view of the diminishing revenues, is a matter that is causing great concern, if not to the Government, at least to an anxious public.

TAMMANY HALL METHODS.

More than usual interest will attach to the statement of our city Correspondent last Saturday that the Newfoundland Government was being "let in" to "let out" certain few favored firms over last fall's fish buying.

To get the matter clearly it is necessary to go back to last fall's happenings, and the Fishermen's Meeting in St. John's, when speakers demanded that Mr. Coaker make good his promise and pay \$8 for fish.

Stricken to a panic by that demand, it looks now from the evidence that Mr. Coaker used the funds of the colony to protect the Export Company and one or two other favored firms who were particular friends of Mr. Coaker's. This is apparently pretty certain from the announcement that the cargo of the schooner President Coaker is being discharged at the account of the Newfoundland Government.

There are said to be about 20,000 quintals covered with this guarantee, which will mean that the taxpayers of that country, in addition to the other bills coming due will have to find about \$120,000 to save Mr. Coaker and three of his business friends from losing their profits on this transaction.

Now, with the ethics of any Government guaranteeing its main industry against loss, we do not propose to deal. That is debatable, since what one industry demands all may logically demand. But with the question of making a "ring" of the few friends of a politician, and guaranteeing them not only against loss, but also, more likely, against loss of profit as well, there can hardly be two opinions.

Mr. Coaker has smashed many idols, but in all his career he never gave such a stunning blow to legitimate business as this. He has set up a precedent that puts Tammany Hall into the Sunday school class, and absolutely degraded—if it needed more degradation—the name "politician."

Singular Easter Custom.

A very singular custom formerly prevailed at Lostwithiel, Cornwall, on Easter Sunday—whenever this year falls on March 27. The freeholders of the town and manor having assembled to-

gether, either in person or by their deputies, one among them—each in his turn—gaily attired and gallantly mounted, with a sceptre in his hand, a crown on his head, and a sword borne before him, and respectfully attended by all the rest on horseback, rode through the principal street in solemn state to the church. At the churchyard stile the curate or other ministers, approached to meet him in reverential pomp, and then conducted him to church to hear divine service. On leaving the church he repaired, with the same pomp and retinue, to a house previously prepared for his reception. Here a feast—suited to his dignity he had assumed—awaited him and his suite, and being placed at the head of the table, he was served, kneeling, with all the rites and ceremonies that a real prince might expect. The ceremony ended with a dinner, the prince being voluntarily disrobed, and descending from his

NOT GUILTY OF MURDER.

Jury Brings in Verdict of Manslaughter.

Four Days Trial Comes to an End.

VERDICT OF JURY. "We find the prisoner at the bar not guilty of murder but guilty of manslaughter and we recommend him to the clemency of the Court." With these words spoken by Mr. S. J. Tucker, foreman of the jury, the famous Nolan murder trial which for the first four days of the present week had been occupying the attention of a full bench and a special jury and in which the whole country has taken the keenest interest, came to an end. Their lordships through the Chief Justice intimated that the court would take time to consider what sentence would be passed. At 2:30 p.m. Thursday, J. G. Higgins, B.A., counsel for the defence rose to address the jury and delivered a most eloquent and impassioned plea on behalf of the accused which lasted for over three hours. Although he had had little time to prepare his defence, and few grounds to base it on, Mr. Higgins delivered an oration of which he may forever feel proud and it undoubtedly had no small effect upon the jury. The address of the Attorney General also lasted about three hours but was more a statement of facts than anything else; but it too was a most eloquent address. The summing up of his Lordship the Chief Justice lasted for an hour and at 10:55 p.m. the jury retired and returned to Court at 11:25 p.m. to give the decision which appears at the head of this column.

THE PRISONER'S BEARING. Throughout the trial the prisoner bore himself very coolly and during his examination spoke in a calm, audible tone but raised his voice occasionally to vehemently deny the charges made against him. Before, however, his cross examination was concluded he began to show signs of the strain of the trial and the several hours he had spent in the witness box. During his counsel's address he seemed much moved and continually wiped his eyes and was often seen to bow his head with his handkerchief. He followed counsel for the Crown with a keen attention and he listened closely to his Lordship's summing up. When brought in to hear the verdict of the jury Nolan seemed quite composed and as he entered the box a slight smile seemed to flit over his face. He took the jury's verdict quite calmly and with a most expressionless face.

first be found guilty of the gross outrages perpetrated on the child and if his acts were not responsible for the child's death the verdict must be not guilty.

"COULD NOLAN HAVE THOUGHT IT OUT?"

It, said counsel, you let sympathy carry you away you are damning your own souls. In case of doubt, he said, the prisoners get the benefit of the doubt. The case they had to try was cold, terrible murder and they were the sole judges. Now the question was could a man of that type kill his daughter by a slow process of refined cruelty. It would be more likely, if a man like him had wanted to kill his child, that he would have broken her head with an axe. If he had thought out the scheme he would have made some blunder and a blunder is soon found out in an outpost. If that scheme of refined cruelty were true would Nolan be sent for a good one? Would he not have tried to hide the fact of the frozen feet? She might die and none would be the wiser. If he had kept away all knowledge of his cruelty from the neighbours, didn't they think he couldn't hide the fact that her feet were frozen? It was almost incredible. If she ran away, even if afraid, it was her own act, and if every child who is afraid of punishment ran out in the snow the town would be full of homeless children.

THINK HOW HE SUFFERED.

Every witness called gave Nolan a splendid character. Did the jury think that he would supply his family with one hand and kill them with the other? Let them think of what he suffered since his wife died. He had the hardships of a father and the worries of a mother. Although the children were such a trouble to him he did not stay away when he could have but rather sent money for their upkeep. Let them think what Nolan suffered when he heard his own children perjure themselves against him. It is not alone terrible to be put to death by perjury but infinitely worse to be hung by the perjury of one's own children. Wouldn't they expect a man whose children had received such terrible characters to have a warped nature but there was no evidence to show he had anything of the grouch about him. The fact that Patsy Molloy who suffered from epilepsy, and wouldn't come to town as a witness for the Crown, took the risk to come as a witness for Nolan is a great thing in his favour. The evidence of the prosecution, said counsel, is entirely the evidence of Gregory and Mary Nolan, neither of whom has a good reputation. Suppose Nolan did beat the child. If any gentleman of the jury had come back after a hard day's work and had to bring the child in out of the snow wouldn't he feel like doing the same.

THE CASE FOR THE CROWN.

The Attorney General, Hon. W. R. Warren, K.C., then rose to address the jury. He congratulated counsel for the defence on his excellent address. The Crown, he said, stood for the community and not only that but for a little girl, 9 years of age, whose lips are sealed in death. They were compelled to take the next best evidence and try and arrive at a verdict from that. The two chief witnesses were the prisoner's own children. The main charge against Nolan, said counsel, was that he saw the child die, and he would not call in a doctor. He admitted that Mary and Gregory told lies and were in the habit of stealing, but the greatest liar on earth could not concoct such a story. If these children had concocted this story they were able to write a book. They could not make it up and stick to it in spite of cross examination. To make up the story they must have arranged to tell it and having done so they must have had it indelibly impressed on their memories to stick to it. They had had no opportunity to

you do likewise. Judge him according to his environment. Judge him rightly." Continuing he said that Mary's mind was so diseased that her vapourings should be set aside. "Are you," he asked, "going to hang that man on the words of two degenerate?" Are you going to put the mark of a felon on a man who did what he thought right? Counsel closed his address with an eloquent appeal for the life of the prisoner.

HIS CONSCIENCE PRICKS HIM.

Why, asked counsel, should Mary have given hot water to Belle unless she was petrified through being up all night in a wet dress. If that story is concocted it is a great piece of work. When Nolan came back from the woods he made up his mind that the child's feet were frozethrown. His conscience pricked him. He started in to try and undo what he had done. He did his best. Counsel then touched on the matter of the doctor. Nolan, he said, concocted his defence under examination, when he went in the box. If he couldn't pay a doctor he should have told that the first day he went in the box. Even when the child was dying Nolan made no movement to get help. He didn't go to Mrs. Scoville to save his child's life but he did to save his own life. If he had had as much consideration for the child he might not be where he is now, "I say," said counsel, "that Nolan has convicted himself whether lying or not." "The children," he continued, "Are degenerate and William John Nolan is the biggest degenerate of all. I have nine reasons to put you to show he would neglect his children."

PROOF OF NEGLIGENCE.

The first reason, said counsel, was that if Nolan had been a good father he would have seen to the spiritual welfare of his children. 2nd—He would not have made all three sleep with him in the one bed. 3rd—He would not have allowed Mary to remain for a week in Mr. Main without troubling to find out where she was. 4th—The fact that he tied Belle's hands and kept her out of bed when she said she was going to run away. It would have been easier to put a lock on one door in the house. 5th—This man with such a good temper was so exasperated once over he hung half a gallon of water over Mary.

NOLAN RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH.

Belle ran away because she was frightened on account of her father's threat, and from the moment she left home Nolan was responsible for her. As regards the motive, the Crown would not allege that Nolan started out with the deliberate intention of killing the child, but knowing her to be what she was he thought it better to let her die. Counsel referred to the sufferings of Nolan, but he said that the jury must also remember the ten days of pain and suffering of the little girl, now beyond all pain and for whose suffering the Crown said William John Nolan was responsible.

THE SUMMING UP.

At 9:50 the Chief Justice began his charge to the jury. He said it only remained for him to sum up, and so far as he thought it necessary to give his own opinion on what he thought necessary. That opinion was subject to their own authority. They must focus their attention on the charge alleged in the indictment, and they must exclude all impressions brought into the box with them, and also the things mentioned there which were not relevant to that charge. Amongst other things his Lordship said that the jury was not concerned with what happened in the Court House at St. John's. Nor were they concerned with the fact that some clothing was taken from Mount Cashel. A witness, said his Lordship, might not be put upon his trial. The case was a very sickening one and it was sustained by the evidence of the accused's own children. It had been said that they were perjurers and that their story was pure fiction and that they were deliberately swearing away their father's life. They could picture this little girl, undersized and deformed. He was not defending her, but he did not think that a child brought up as she was should be judged too harshly. The children's upbringing wasn't their fault. The point to consider was whether they were capable of coming into Court with a made-up case. In the main they told a consistent story. In all the main, essential points that story was corroborated by other witnesses and very largely by the prisoner himself. He wished to direct attention to the charge. The charge of murder, the basic is that he intended to show there was no intention. Was this man guilty of wilful taking of life, or was he guilty of manslaughter. There were certain facts to be dealt with in both cases. First, what was the cause of death? On that point there was little dispute. Both doctors agreed that the examination of the internal organs showed nothing was wrong with the child. In the ordinary course of nature, the child would not have died but for the poison from the frozen feet. If medical attendance had been called in time, said Dr. Tait, she would have recovered. Dr. Fallon said it was highly probable that she would. The Crown's case against the accused was two-fold. First, as a father, it was his duty to have given medical care to his child, and next, that by a series of cruel acts he contributed to the child's death. On that point the doctors say that the effect of the beatings, if they occurred, would have weakened the child's resistance. But the Attorney General had said that not only was there neglect after the frostbite but that the accused was the cause of the original trouble; that Belle ran away by fear of a threat of punishment on the part of her father. The elder girl seems to be to some extent deficient, but Gregory, whatever else he is, is a bright, intelligent boy. His story must have carried conviction to their minds as a truthful tale. His Lordship then discussed some of the evidence. If, he said, the father's threat had forced Belle out into the snow, it was not her voluntary act that caused the frost bite. He must take all her consequences of his act if his threat drove her out. There is a right of a parent to correct his children, but if the correction exceeds the bounds of moderation, and death occurs, it is manslaughter. His Lordship then explained the law applicable to the case, and concluded by saying: "You must consider whether the killing here is intentional, whether it is not blameable or not; culpable, whether the accused is not blameable for the death of that girl either from his acts of cruelty or from his neglect to call a doctor. If you find that there was no intention on his part, you will consider the second charge that I have put to you; if you find there was no intention on his part, that his conduct was not blameable, then and only then would you be justified under the indictment to find him Not Guilty."

make-up the story, and in any case if their father was such a kind, considerate parent, what would cause them to concoct such a tale.

WOULD SHE RUN IF NOT THREATENED.

When they stuck to such a detailed story they must be believed. His learned friend had said that the child had died of her own act. It was not natural for the child to run half a mile from home as soon as her father came out of the woods and go through all that suffering, unless she was frightened. No child would do that without good cause. Could Nolan then be believed when he said he never beat her? Counsel then showed in what ways the children's evidence had been corroborated. He also said that Nolan couldn't afford to let Belle run away and refuse to go after her, but he couldn't be the good, kind father he was said to be, if he put her down and drove her home. At this juncture recess was taken until 7:30 p.m.

IS NOLAN PREPARED TO LIE TO SAVE HIMSELF.

After recess counsel for the prosecution continued his address to the jury. He dwelt at length upon the way the prisoner had treated Belle the day she ran away. Nolan, he said, declared he didn't kick her over the scrape, yet when she snalled he hit her and he admitted kicking her after her. Was he telling the truth? Would a man who drove his child ahead of him in the condition she was refrain from kicking her down? Or, is it more probable that Nolan is once more prepared to lie to save himself? Nolan said he did not scold or beat the child, which is more likely? That the boy made up the story of the beating or that Nolan sent the child after giving him all that trouble into the house without a scolding or beating? Counsel then dwelt at length on the evidence. It was easier, he said, for the man to make up a story and stick to it than two children who had only been three days together. He said that the fact that the Molloy wouldn't let Patsy come for the defence was a proof that he and his family were prejudiced in Nolan's favour.

TO JUDGE THE "WINDSOR PATENT" EXHIBITION.

We understand that the Government Teacher of Domestic Sciences, Miss Alice E. Furneaux, will judge the big Bread Baking competition to be held at Carbonear on next Thursday week, and on her decisions the three prizes will be awarded.

According as the loaves are received the name and address will be removed and recorded, and a number allotted to all of the exhibits. We may say that the Competition is open to all parts of the country and no entrance fee is charged, the only stipulation being that the loaf must be baked from "Windsor Patent" flour.

We are informed by Messrs. Harvey & Co. Ltd. that the first loaf for the competition reached town on Thursday, having come all the way from Little Bay Mines in Notre Dame Bay. Although baked on March 18th and only ordinarily wrapped, the loaf from outside appearance looks remarkably fresh and moist, which speaks well for the keeping qualities of bread baked from "Windsor Patent" flour.

The competition will be held at Carbonear on Thursday, April 1th, and those intending to compete should address their loaves at once to Mr. Frank Howell, Carbonear, so that they may reach there in full time for the exhibit.

Civic Commission.

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held Thursday afternoon. Acting Mayor Mullaly presided. Counsellors Morris, Peet and Vincombe were present.

After the minutes of previous meetings were confirmed the following matters were dealt with:

The Colonial Secretary advised notification had been sent the Treasury Department authorizing payment to the Council of amount on hand for Fire Insurance Profits and Telephone Taxes.

The communication of Inspector General Hutchings in reference to the Palace fire which appeared in the daily papers during the past week was placed before the Board at this meeting. The stand taken by the Acting Mayor in this matter met with approval.

Solicitor R. H. Tait asked reconsideration in the claim of truckman Reid for loss of horse. As the Council's solicitor has advised of no liability on the part of the city the Board cannot act otherwise.

Application of K. S. Trapnell to erect electric sign will be accorded to subject to the Engineer's approval.

A protest was read from Messrs. Walsh and Hoskins against permit being given Mr. Peckham, Gower St., to install electric motor on his premises. The Acting Mayor and Engineer will visit the place.

Plans were approved as follows:—New hall for Star of Sea Society, Henry Street. Alterations to building, Barter's Hill, for G. Brownrigz. Reports for City Engineer, Health Officer, etc., for week were read.

After the disposing of minor matters and the passing of pay rolls and bills the meeting adjourned.

Methodist College Easter Closing.

The Easter closing at the Methodist College was marked this year by an exhibition of the "hobby" work of the students of the upper school. The display was held in the College Hall on Wednesday afternoon and evening, and was visited by a vast number of the parents and friends of the students. There were many expressions of surprise and delight at the great variety and excellence of the work shown, the opinion being freely stated that this should be an annual event in connection with the activities of the college. It has certainly proved that many of the students find ample time for profitable and cultural occupation at home, in addition to receiving high distinctions each year in the C.H.E. Exams, for it was a significant feature of the exhibition that many of the articles which had needed most time and care in their construction, had been done by just those students who shine well in the examination results of the college.

It would be invidious to mention individual names out of the many students who contributed to the success of the occasion, for all are greatly deserving of mention. There were some capital examples of fancy work of all kinds from the girls of all grades, and some really excellent water color paintings from the Preliminary Girls' class. The boys shone in work of a distinctively masculine character, from a model of a Morris chair, a fine pen and ink sketch of British men-o-war, to working models of the Eiffel Tower and electrically driven motor car, made from the Meccano outfits, and lastly, two 'wireless' outfits. Altogether it was a fine conception on the part of the staff of the college to arrange for such a display, and we sincerely hope that what has this year been a hastily-devised, yet very successful innovation, will become permanently a feature of the college activities, ranking among its public functions, even beyond the annual prize distribution in importance.—Com.

PHILIP HICKS.

There passed peacefully away at his home at Carmanville on the 19th inst., a well known citizen in the person of Philip Hicks. Born at Bonavista in the year 1845, he saw seventy-six years of the shifting scenes of life in Newfoundland. He was one of seven brothers who were the pioneers of Carmanville and carved out homes for themselves and families there forty-five years ago. A descendant of an old Devonshire family he was a true sailor and spent the greater part of his life as a master of a vessel in carrying on the Labrador and Bank fisheries. He was a respected citizen, unselfish and generous and was a strong factor in shaping life at Carmanville in the early days. He leaves to mourn him two brothers, two sons and two daughters at Carmanville, and one son at Grand Falls, besides a large circle of relatives and friends, to whom general sympathy is extended.

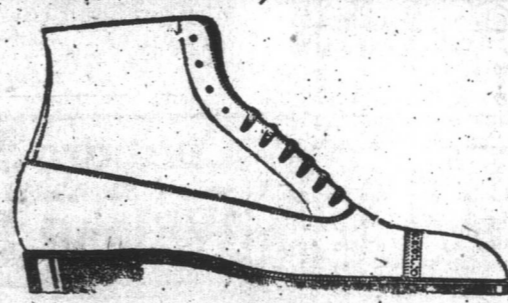

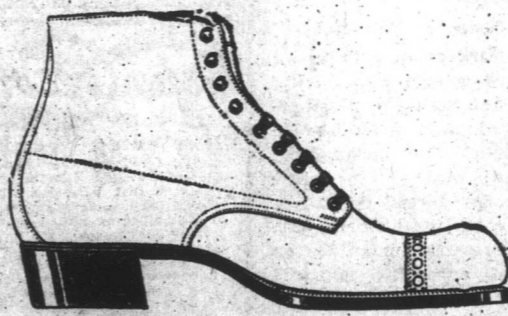

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
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
