LECTURE BY ENGINEER COM-MANDER HOWLEY.

At the C.L.B. Armoury last night Engineer Commander Howley, R.N. lectured to the Battalion on some of his experiences in the navy. The lecturer was introduced by Major Williams, who referred to Com-mander Howley's splendid record in the war. The lecturer, after a few pleasant remarks, in which he laid stress upon the meaning of the term stress upon the meaning of the term Britisher, told of some of his ex-periences during the Messina Earth-quake of which he formed one of the relief party, and he also gave a vivid description of the Naval attack in the Dardanelles, during which action his ship was sunk, and he him-self was wounded with Shrapnel. Commander Howley, when in Hos-pital, had one hundred and one pieces (101) of Shrapnel taken from pieces (101) of Shrapnel take from his body. Before concluding, the lecturer congratulated the Brigade on their new Lieut-Col., and said he was sure the C.L.B. would make steady progress under their new O.C. The Brigade showed their apprecia-tion of Commander Howley's inter-esting lecture by giving three hearty cheers. Several pieces of Shrapnel, which had been taken from Com-mander Howley's body, and a pair of spectacles which he had had in his pocket and which seved his life by preventing another piece of Shrapnil from entering his body were exhibit-ed. It is hoped that it will not be long before Commander Howley will relate further of his experiences to te further of his experien he Brigade.
