SIDE TALKS.

THE COMMONEST LOVE TRIANGLE.

What a lot of fact it does take for a man and his wife and his mother to live happily in one house! We are always hearing of a triangle of love these days, but common as that situation generally is, I think the commonest triangle of love is that in which a man in the middle and the two women he loves most in the world—his wife and his mother—a the two ends.

A Letter Friend has written me recently about such a situation. "There are times," she writes, "when I think my husband cares more for his mother than he does for me, for whenever he criticizes her he always defends her, and finds justification for her. He will never admit that anything she does to me is wrong."

He Probably Defends The Absent.

I wonder if that proves anything. Except perhaps that he is that rather decent kind of man whose instinct is to defend the person who is absent and cannot defend himself of herself. I shouldn't be a bit surprised if he could see listen in when his mother criticizes her, that wife would hear her husband defending her in just the same way he defends his mother when she attacks her.

It seems to me that in a case like this, the greatest strength lies with the party who does the least attacking.

In the first place a man looks for peace in his home and he can't help feeling antagonism against the person who appears to be the aggressor in disturbances that affect that peace. Then, again, the attacker generally shows herself in an ungracious and unbecoming light, and even if she has had considerable provocation that does not modify the light if the provocation has not been open or anything that was personally annoying to the husband.

A Pyrrhic Victory.

Also a man generally sympathizes with a woman whose feelings have been hurt (that is, unless he hurt them himself) and if a wife flames up and says sharp things to her mother-in-law and the mother retires into hurt silence, the real winner in that battle is not the one left in possession of the field.

I once knew a woman who had a very competent but very domineering mother-in-law living with her, one of those women who have competently ordered their own homes and are keen to do the same with their sons'. At first the wife used to protest vigorously to her husband against the mother's domineering ways, but she soon saw that she was losing his sympathy by her constant complaints. So she adopted a new tack, she made up her mind to so manoeuvre things that his mother's bossiness interfered

plaints and attacks. That's not the way to strengthen your position. Let the other person do the unkind and ungracious things, if it's love and tenderness you're after, and not merely your own way.

During the whole period after their loss was discovered organized parties were searching in the old workings. The fathers of two of the boys were in the workings all night, and their mothers waited outside.

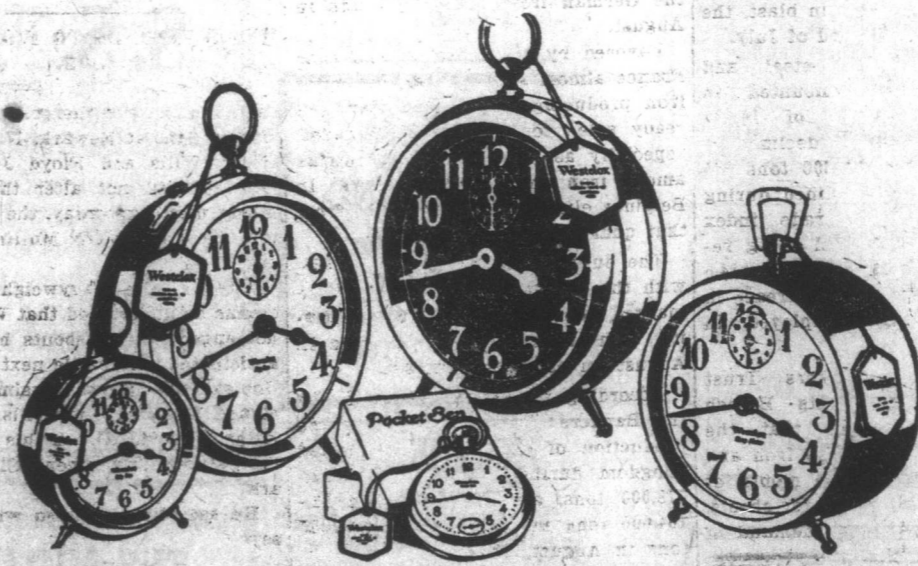

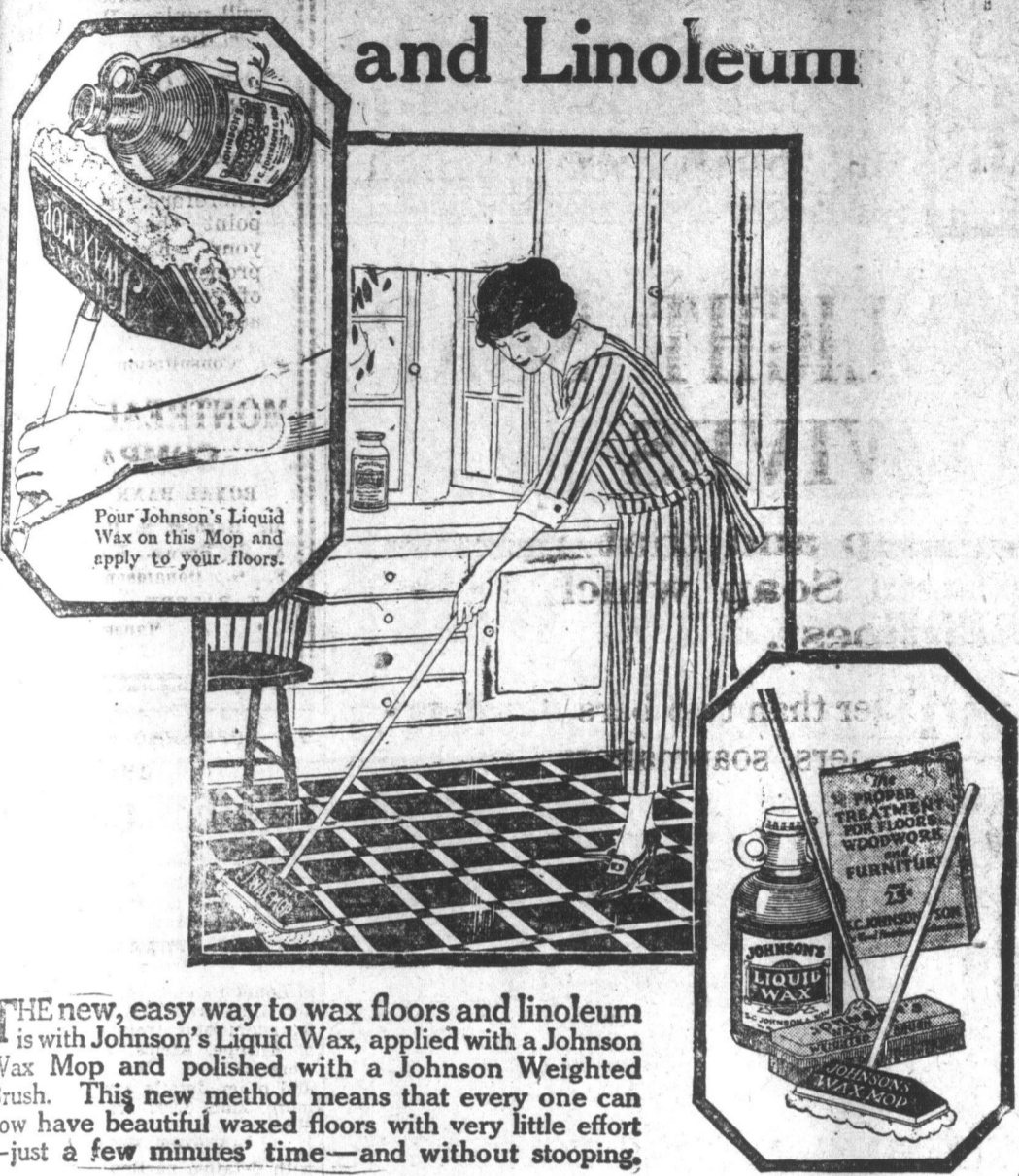

British Iron and Steel Trade

The production of pig iron and steel in Great Britain in August fell to 444,600 tons, compared with 492,700 in July, and 588,900 tons in August, 1924. This is the lowest monthly total recorded since September, 1922. There were 138 furnaces in blast, the same number as at the end of July.

Imports of iron and steel and manufactures thereof amounted to 232,900 tons, an increase of 10,800 over July, while exports declined to 287,600 tons against 308,600 tons in July. Prices further declined during August, the Board of Trade index number for iron and steel being reduced to 123.2, compared with 124.5 in July. There was some progress in the number of people employed in the iron industry.

According to the Bankers' Trust Company of New York, its British Information Service finds that the general trend of the British iron and steel trade throughout the month of August was listless, except for sheets, which met with an active demand in

many foreign markets, especially the Far East. In all other products foreign competition proved increasingly severe, but toward the end of the month a note of increased hopefulness became observable.

The continued shortage of available capital and credit, and severe French and Belgian competition combined to hinder the return of prosperity to the German iron and steel trade in August.

Favored by the rates of exchange France almost alone of the European iron producing countries found a ready sale for her manufactures, especially as the continued strike among iron and steel workers in Belgium eliminated competition from that quarter.

The dullness in the foreign trade, with the exception noted, was in marked contrast to the brisk activity in both production and sales in August in our own country.

According to advices received by the Bankers' Trust Company, the production of coal in the United Kingdom during August, was 17,278,000 tons, as compared with 21,164,000 tons in July, and 20,761,000 tons in August, 1924.

The market value of the stock certificates of coal, pig iron and steel companies in Great Britain was 66.5 p.c. of par, as compared with 66.5 p.c. at the end of July and 73.7 p.c. in the middle of September, 1924.

Yesterday's Late Cables

FOUR ARE WOMEN CANDIDATES IN FEDERAL ELECTIONS.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22. Candidates were nominated to-day to contest every one of the 241 electoral divisions in the Dominion of Canada, at the polls on Thursday next, when the people will select a new Federal Government. Not a single acclamation was recorded. Most of the constituencies will furnish straight party fights. Four of the constituencies may send two candidates each, bringing the total number to be elected to 245. The three party leaders, Premier King, Hon. Arthur Meighen and Robert Forke, Liberal, Conservative and Progressive respectively, will have straight party fights in their respective constituencies. Four women were nominated.

GREEKS INVADE BULGARIA.

SOFIA, Oct. 22. It is officially reported that Greek troops have invaded Bulgarian territory. No declaration of war however has been received from the Athens Government.

WEST INDIES READY TO AGREE.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Oct. 22. The Council have to-day ratified the trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies.

TERMS OF ULTIMATUM ACCEPTED.

LONDON, Oct. 22. It is understood here that Bulgaria has accepted the terms of the Greek ultimatum, but new trouble, now raging on the Macedonian frontier, where Greek and Bulgarian soldiers are in conflict is expected to complicate the situation.

BRIGHT OUTLOOK IN COAL TRADE.

GLACE BAY, Oct. 22. The Dominion Coal Company officials said to-day that the outlook for the coal trade was good for the next four months, providing a fifty thousand ton monthly order expected from the United States materializes.

FISHING SCHOONER CUT DOWN.

WELLFLEET, Mass., Oct. 22. The Gloucester fishing schooner Nirvana was rained and sunk by an unidentified collier eight miles off here early this morning. The fishermen's crew of twelve rowed to the shore in two dories.

THE MIRACLE OF LOCARNO.

COLCHESTER, England, Oct. 22. "The miracle of Locarno is that a will for peace has been created for the first time since the world war," declared Premier Baldwin in a speech here to-day.

London a Health Resort

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 16.—(Canadian Press Despatch)—When so much is said about the declining birth-rate of France it is interesting to find that so exalted an authority as the Lord Mayor of London asserts there is really no problem at all about the matter. Sir Alfred Bower, who is about to relinquish the Lord Mayoralty, is an enthusiastic admirer of everything connected with the City of which he has been Chief Citizen for the last 12 months. He declares no place in the world can equal London in the matter of sanitation.

"The so-called birth-rate problem in France is really a sanitary problem," declares his Lordship. "In 1923 the birth-rate in France was 19.4 per thousand, that of England and Wales as 19.7, hardly any difference. But whereas our death-rate was 11.6, that of France was 17 per thousand, the difference being due to infant mortality. I know a good many Continental cities, and none of them can touch London for looking after the health of its population. Not long ago I visited abattoirs in Islington, and I was struck then by the supremacy of London in such matters. Certainly if France had avoided the war of 1870-2, and instead of paying Germany 200,000,000 francs had spent that on the sanitation of its towns and villages, the French people would have no more of population problems than we have. I am sure London puts ten years on everybody's life by drainage alone.

"I regularly take exercise for fresh air by walking the Embankment as often as at midnight as in the daytime; Southwark Bridge, backward and forward, from end to end, is another favourite walk of mine."

On the subject of London City's great charitable expenditure, Sir Alfred remarks that the Lord Mayor is the president of over 100 charitable institutions, and that during the ten months of his present term of office he has raised money for 42 of these.

A Yorkshire Pie

This is an easily-made delicacy which is a great favourite with many Yorkshire housewives. To 2lb. of pork allow 2 medium-sized onions, 3 cooking apples, and 3 big potatoes. All these should be cut up, the apples and onions in small pieces and the potatoes in thin slices. A teaspoonful of sage, a little salt and a sprinkling of pepper should be well mixed together and scattered over the meat, and one should have half a pint of stock, but lacking this a cube of any meat extract may be dissolved in half a pint of hot water. Grate a pie-dish with a little good dripping and put in first a layer of potatoes, then a layer of meat, which must be covered with a layer of apples and onions, and continue in this way until all the ingredients are used up, making the top layer of potatoes. Then pour in the stock and cover the dish with another much the same size and bake in a slow oven for two hours and a half. About half an hour before the pie is to be served remove the covering dish, and put a few knobs of dripping on the potatoes, to make them brown. If a pastry crust is preferred to a potato crust, the meat, potatoes, and onions should have a little previous simmering and not so much time allowed for cooking.

Orders for Britain

£1,500,000 CONTRACT FOR NEW MADERIA PORT.

A contract was signed by the Portuguese Government for the construction of a new port here involving £1,500,000 of British capital and the employment of British engineers and foremen.

The work, which is starting immediately, will occupy six years, and when it is completed Funchal will have the finest artificial modern port in these waters.

A director of Messrs. William Muirhead, MacDonald Wilson, and Co., Ltd., of Parliament-street, S.W., the firm that has secured the contract, told a Daily Mail representative recently that it includes the construction of a harbor big enough to take the largest Transatlantic liners. One part of the harbor will consist of a breakwater with 60ft. of water on the outside and a deep-water quay on the inside where passengers will be able to embark or disembark.

The contractors' plant, consisting of cranes, dredgers, light engines, etc., costing more than £50,000, will be sent from England, as will a great part of the cement to be used.

Airship Shed Contract

The Armstrong Construction Company, Limited, who are associated with Sir W. G. Armstrong-Whitworth and Co., Ltd., have been given the contract by the Air Ministry for the construction and erection at Karachi of one of the largest airship sheds in the world.

The whole of the steelwork for this great structure will be made at the company's works at Germiston, Glasgow.

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 20.—(C. P.)—Members of the Bradford Diocese and Lay Readers' Association, as they passed along the streets of the city during the recent "Shopping Week," found the bushes mourning on their cheeks all of a sudden. It was the sight of scantily clad wax figures on the other side of the great plate-glass in some of the leading stores which caused the countenances of the lay readers to assume the hue of a pickled cabbage. 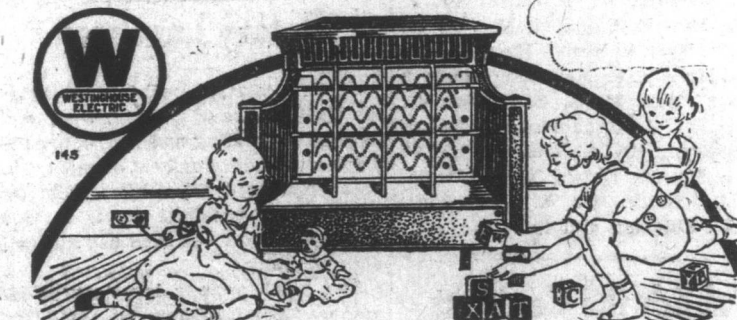

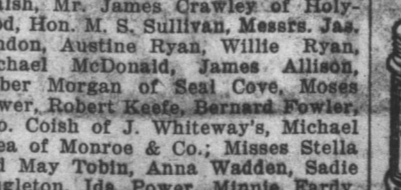

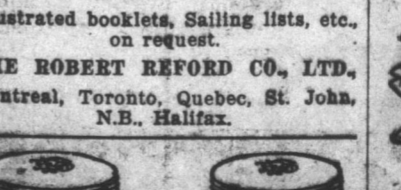

The advantages on the whole, while successful from one point of view, have not brought forth a full discussion of the matters submitted by the Council for consideration, and we again ask for frank and frank discussion at these meetings, believing as we do that the recommendations made by the Board will have more weight if it is felt that the whole body of the Board of Trade is behind us.

At our last meeting we had the pleasure of listening to an address by W. Linn, Esq., M.P., and a report of the British Parliamentary Commission. Mr. Linn if you will remember referred to the low volume of imports from England as compared with the Colony's importations from Canada and the United States, and in his suggestions from the Board as to how our trade with Great Britain might be increased. The Council took the matter in hand immediately, and appointed a committee to deal with this subject. The Report fully describes the difficulties tending to restrict trade with Great Britain, but certain recommendations have been made, the adoption of which will greatly minimize these difficulties, and the matter is now in abeyance pending a reply from Mr. Linn.

Letters were received from the Minister enclosing copies of communications received from the American Vice Consul on the subject of an Exhibition to be held in Philadelphia in 1926, and inviting the participation of Newfoundland. Copies of this correspondence were forwarded to the trade asking if they were prepared to take advantage of the opportunity to display their products. One reply was received to these letters and we are accordingly advising the Prime Minister that no action can be taken in this matter. The Council was obliged to call the attention of the members to the deplorable condition of the Board's finances, and in a circular letter addressed to members of the Trade Association that the deficit for the coming year would amount to approximately \$500.00. Returns from the questionnaire which was attached to this circular unanimously approve of assessment being made of \$3.00 per member to cover the deficit referred to, but as this matter can only be dealt with at an annual meeting, it will be deferred until that time. Meanwhile individual members of the Council undertook to secure members, and you will be pleased to learn that within the past few weeks 7 additional members have been added to the Board.

It has been brought to the attention of the Council that a large volume of business formerly transacted in the South Coast is now being diverted to Halifax and other ports. It would seem to us that steps should be taken that will place St. John's shippers in a position to satisfactorily compete for this trade; it being understood that the present coastal freight rates are higher than those quoted by competing companies, and the Council would be pleased to receive suggestions from the members on this point.

Matters held in abeyance include the reduction of Fire Insurance rates, and the West Indies agreement. The former being held up awaiting advice from the Secretary of the Board of Fire Underwriters, and the latter awaiting a report from the Executive Committee.

The meeting was then addressed by Mr. Herman Archibald, Esq., on the subject of "Local Industries." This will appear in to-morrow's issue.

S.S. Caribou Arrives

New Ship Proves A Splendid Seaboat

The new steamer Caribou, built at Scheidam, Holland, to the order of the Newfoundland Government Railway, for the service between North Sydney and Port aux Basques, entered port at 12.30 this morning under command of Capt. L. Stevenson, after a tedious passage of 12 days. During the last five days the ship has been tossed about by mountainous seas and it was only by the skillful handling by Captain Stevenson and the other officers that she was safely harboured without any damage being done.

With due appreciation to the fact that she is designed for the service which connects Newfoundland and Canada, the builders have bestowed great pains upon the make up generally and special attention has been devoted to the structure at the forward end to enable her to withstand the severe conditions often met with in the Gulf during the winter season. The Caribou has proved herself a wonderful sea boat as during the severe storm met with on the Atlantic from Saturday last until Tuesday the 20th, she behaved splendidly, and nothing but praise and admiration for her seagoing qualities was expressed by the crew and the passengers on board.

After months of delay owing to the dock owners strike at Holland, the ship was not completed until the first of June. The launching took place about a week later, the christening ceremony being performed by Miss Marguerite, daughter of Hon. J. R. Bennett, Colonial Secretary. The ship's speed trials which followed on the 7th October, proved in every sense satisfactory to the builders and those who were on board during these trials from Scheidam to the North Sea were loud in their commendation of her fine features. Although the trials were carried out in a thick fog and with an adverse tide, she averaged 14 knots. Capt. Stevenson states that the test would have been far more successful if the weather had been suitable. Under ordinary conditions the ship will average 15 knots.

THE TRIP ACROSS.

The Caribou left Rotterdam on her maiden voyage for St. John's on Saturday, October 10th. After compass had been adjusted she proceeded to Maas Lightship, where a number of passengers were landed. The ship then continued on her way and made good headway at an average speed of 13 knots. From the time she left the Straits until the following Friday 1884 miles were covered with everything working well. On the 17th, a heavy gale from the N.W. sprang up with mountainous seas, which made things very unpleasant for all on board. The seas swept the ship's decks to such an extent that it was necessary to reduce her speed, and the crew were kept on the qui vive to see that everything was in order. At 2 o'clock on the same day the wind veered to N.W. with head wind and heavy seas, but the ship behaved as well as could be expected. A few hours later a sea shipped over her side, and loosened No. 6 lifeboat from the chocks, but no damage was caused. At 6 o'clock that night the wind increased to a hurricane

the supervision of Lloyds, and is classed 100 A1. She has been completed in accordance with plans supplied and approved by the owners. The builders are the Messrs. New Waterway, Shipbuilding Company, Scheidam, Holland, and the designers are Messrs. A. Goodwin, Hamilton and Adamson, Ltd., London, England, the same firm that designed the steamships Stephano, Florizel, Portia and Prospero.

The Caribou is a steel screw ship of the shelter deck type, with three complete decks, with curved cast steel stem, elliptical stern, two pole masts, cabin-de-luxe, first-class staterooms, entrance hall, ladies' saloon, smoking-room, dining saloon, in tween decks, and large deck houses. Above are the captain's room, chart, maroon and pilot house, spring bridge extension to sides. There are three cargo hatches, and three winches. The steamer has been specially strengthened for heavy ice navigation, the stem being cut away to facilitate navigating in heavy ice, whilst she has been double strengthened with heavy plate all around the load line, to contend with similar conditions.

The upper deck is taken up largely with a deck house, 120 feet long, in the fore-part of which is the Social Hall, and immediately aft a dining saloon, with seating capacity for fifty persons. Entrance to these rooms is by double vestibule doors and ample light is provided by large rectangular side-lights.

Dining Saloon.

The dining saloon is paneled in approved style, with selected and well arranged hard plywoods, panels polished, decorated and finished with mouldings. The ceiling is paneled with plywood, while the beams, pillars, etc., are cased, with neatly decorated mouldings. The tables are of polished mahogany, cast iron bronzed standards with folding guards, and approved revolving chairs and seats, all of artistic design. The other fixtures and fittings are most attractive and could hardly be improved on. Rich double tapestry curtains are also to be seen. The floor of the saloon is laid with half inch cortacene covering, Brussels' carpet runners, with mats and other furnishings to match. The sofas and chairs, settees, etc., of the saloon, are of woven cane reverses, and upholstered with the very best frizee velvet, and stuffed with hair.

Social Hall and Ladies' Saloon.

The Social Hall is entered from the Dining Saloon, with double curtained doorways on each side. The Hall is paneled in the same style as the dining saloon, and is furnished with hard-wood, handsomely and tastefully paneled and decorated to an approved design. It is of polished plywood floor panelling, with neatly carved mouldings over the beams. The seats are of cane and upholstered in Utrecht velvet of the best quality, and are provided with red bordered Holland covers and plated knob fastenings, and the portable cane and other chairs and furnishings are of excellent pattern and quality. Tapestry curtains cover the doors and side windows. The hall has also ample lounge space. Here one can find tables of neat design for writing, with stationary drawers and racks. The furniture also includes a piano, designed to harmonize with the surroundings. The floor is covered with Persian carpet of rich design, while the electrical fixtures consist of four electro-plated lamps. Several dining tables are also arranged to seat from 6 to 8 persons.

Staterooms.

Aft of the dining saloon and on the port side of the ship are the first class staterooms, two of which are fitted in semi-de-luxe style. The rooms are well ventilated above and below. The internal fittings are of mahogany, with fixed iron berths, 6ft. 2in. by 2ft. 2in. The stateroom settees are upholstered in best Utrecht velvet, hair-stuffed, with cretonne covers. The cabin-de-luxe is fitted up in tasteful style, each having separate bedsteads, twin toilet-stand, a wardrobe, together with other furnishings and fittings.

The Lavatories are fitted up in the very best style, with 18in. cabinet-topped wash basins, ornamented iron supports, and with the latest fittings. The baths are of cast-iron, porcelain lined. The middle portion of the deck-house, on the starboard side, is devoted to a mail room and mail officer's cabin; also galley, pantries, stores, etc., capable of catering for a large number of passengers, and fitted with ranges, presses, etc. The remainder of the first class passengers' staterooms and Ladies' Cabin are between decks, immediately under the dining saloon and social hall; entrance to these staterooms is by a wide, double-flight stairway.

The room is well heated, with all modern conveniences. All the fittings are of substantial design faced with teak, suitable grained and painted.

The meeting took place in the Casino Theatre. Mr. Eric Chafe, who was chairman, gave a brief introductory address, after which the following resolutions were read:

WHEREAS a vacancy has occurred in the representation of the District of St. John's East in the House of Assembly by reason of the appointment of Nicholas J. Vincombe, Esq., one of the sitting members for said District to a position on the Board of Liquor Control on the 2nd day of February last;

AND WHEREAS it is provided by law that the Governor, in the case of a vacancy in the representation of a District in the House of Assembly within six months shall forthwith issue a writ for the election and return of a member for any District in which such vacancy has occurred;

AND WHEREAS over two thousand electors of St. John's East have already petitioned the House of Assembly for the opening of said District;

AND WHEREAS nearly six thousand electors of said District have signed petitions requesting the immediate opening of said District;

AND WHEREAS questions of pressing public importance such as the present need of immediately reducing taxation, the encouragement of the Fisheries, the settlement of the Labrador Boundary dispute, are likely to arise and the District of St. John's is at present inadequately represented;

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, that we, the duly qualified electors of the District of St. John's East in meeting assembled hereby place on record our earnest conviction that our constitutional right to full representation has been infringed and that the conduct of those in authority in refusing us our representation has been and is subversive of all principles of good Government;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this meeting respectfully request that His Excellency the Governor do forthwith issue a writ for the election of a member for the District of St. John's East.

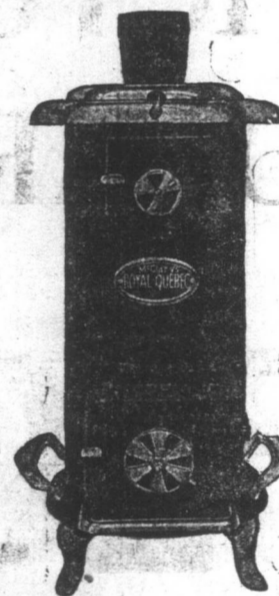

135 1/2 Miles an Hour on Motor Cycle

Remarkable motor records were established by the American Anderson over a mile course measured on the Arpaon road, a few miles south of Paris, during a meeting organized by the Motor Cycle Club de France to-day.

In the class for engines not exceeding 1,000 c.c., Anderson, piloting an Indian motor cycle, accomplished the flying mile in a fraction over 26 sec., or a mean speed of about 135 1/2 miles an hour. His next record was made in the flying kilometre for cycles of the same class, his time being just over 15 sec., or an average of 132 miles an hour.

In addition to these records the American went one better than any previous motorist for any class. Timed between two official control posts during one of his attempts, it was recorded that he was travelling at one time at the rate of 150 miles an hour. No fewer than 19 other machines in the meeting established new figures for the mile and the kilometre in their respective classes.

CYCLING 34 MILES DAILY TO WORK AT THE AGE OF 60.

To keep off the dole Leonard Dockray, aged 60, of Barby, E. Yorkshire, cycles to work at Water Fryton, 17 miles away, where he is employed as colliery blacksmith. He has done the double journey of 34 miles daily for four years.

In the morning he sets out at 3.30 a.m. to start work at 6 o'clock. He does 3 1/2 hours' work at the forge, but often does a double shift, working both on top and in the pit. If he does not work overtime he gets home about 5.30 p.m.

Before being engaged at Water Fryton he worked at York, about 11 miles from his home, cycling there and back every day. Discharged after two years on account of trade slackness, he went to the Selby Labour Exchange, and heard that a blacksmith was wanted at Water Fryton. He went for the job and was given it.

During his four years' service there he has cycled nearly 50,000 miles. Including the mile cycled during the two years he was employed at York, his total is more than 57,285 miles. He has ridden in hail, rain, sunshine, and snow five to six inches deep. If he loses time travelling to work he makes it up.

In his spare time he has, with the aid of his son, built a bungalow for his family to live in at Barby, on land which he bought.

Finger Print Protest

Discharging three men because a woman whose purse they were alleged to have taken failed to appear, the Birmingham stipendiary magistrate gave an assurance that their finger-prints and photographs taken by the police would be destroyed.

When the case was called, Mr. Donald Hurst, defending, protested against the treatment of the men. All of them, he said, bore good characters, but when they were remanded on bail their finger-prints, measurements, and photographs were taken as if they were confirmed criminals.

Referring to the case of Major Sheppard, whose wrongful arrest in London led to an inquiry into police methods, Mr. Hurst said the Home Secretary had issued definite instructions that finger-prints should not be taken unless the person was remanded to a prison, and not even then if the prisoner objected. In the present case it was done without the men's permission being asked.

Insect Bite Deaths

GIRL GUIDE KILLED BY WASP STING.

Two more deaths from insect bites have taken place in England. Miss Ruby Durling, 17, a Girl Guide officer at Chatham, was stung by a wasp, and Mrs. Helen Melanda Green, 27, of Fleet End, Warsh, Hampshire, was stung by a gnat or mosquito on the lower lip.

At the inquest on Mrs. Green it was stated that she was bitten on September 26 and was sent to hospital at Southampton last Saturday suffering from inflammation of the lower lip. She died three days later from blood-poisoning.

A doctor said that she was also suffering from tuberculosis, and the gnat bite had hastened her death.

Miss Durling's death is the fourth attributed to wasp stings since the beginning of August.

Anti-Dazzle Lamps

50,000 CARS WITH SAFER LIGHTS.

The Ministry of Transport has every hope that time will be found when Parliament meets next month for the re-introduction of the Lights on Vehicles Bill, which deals with the problem of dazzle headlights. The Bill is based on the recommendations of an expert committee, and its principal clause provides for the:

Limitation of the height of the beams of headlights so that they fall below the line of vision of pedestrians and the drivers of approaching vehicles.

Already a big step towards the carrying out of this proposal has been made by the motor industry without the demand of an Act of Parliament, for no fewer than 50,000 motor cars now being made are fitted with lamps that throw the beam of light on to the roadway without permitting it to appear above the line of vision.

Hundreds of tests have been carried out in regard to anti-dazzle lights, and the best advice yet found is the dipping of the light.

The dipping-lamp device is in use on all the motor cars used by the Royal Family and the Metropolitan Police, and it has been adopted as standard on the Rolls-Royce, Morris-Oxford, Daimler, and other cars.

French Debt to the U. S.

PLAN NOT LIKELY TO BE ACCEPTED.

M. Caillaux, the French Finance Minister, who arrived at Havre from Washington yesterday, was present this morning at a Ministerial Council held at the Elysee at which there was a discussion on the American proposal that France should provisionally make a debt payment of \$2,000,000 a year to the United States for five years.

Though the only announcement made was that this temporary plan would be considered further, it is already known that there is only the faintest chance of its being accepted by the French Government. It is clear that M. Caillaux is not going to back it with his personal arguments, although he has expressed himself as strongly in favour of a speedy resumption of debt-funding negotiations.

In the meantime M. Caillaux proposes to ask for extra taxation to produce \$60,000,000 in next year's Budget to meet the country's financial deficit.

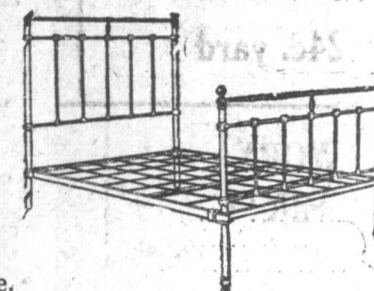

Careers at Sea

Until recent years the only occupation that a woman could find at sea was that of stewardess. With the development of ocean transport, however, other and perhaps more attractive posts have been opened up.

A matron of a ship has an interesting position which only a capable, intelligent, tactful, and broad-minded woman can occupy. There are many important and difficult duties to fulfil, and any woman who undertakes such a task must be prepared to submit herself to routine and discipline which are far more rigorous than in hospital or in office.

While there are as yet comparatively few of what might be called "higher grade" posts open to women at sea, there are many opportunities for qualified stenographers and typists. In those boats which are fitted with a swimming pool and baths of various descriptions, a swimming instructor is often included in the "ratings," and the woman hairdresser has become a familiar figure in the most up-to-date liners.

The Ship's Conductress.

All Canadian passenger ships are bound by law to carry a conductress. The Canadian Government has decreed that no unaccompanied woman going to the Dominion to enter the field of domestic service shall travel by a boat that does not carry such an official.

The duties of a conductress, as explained by one who has been in the Canadian service, are to see that every woman has her necessary papers in order, to give her any help she needs, and really to act as a welfare worker. She has no fixed hours, and work on the outward voyage may be very heavy. But she travels under excellent conditions, for she has a small office, as well as a cabin of her own, and has quite a definite position on board.

TWO IMPORTANT AUSTRALIAN CONTRACTS.

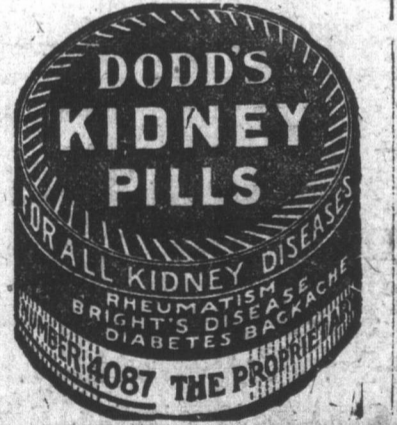

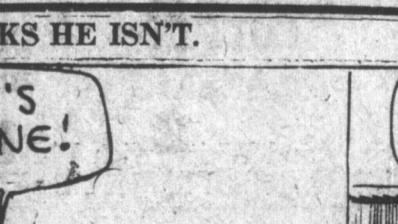

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"A Miracle"

DEVOUT CRY AS VIRGIN AND CHILD SHOW ON CHURCH WALL.

Picture Human Hand Never Painted. Throng to Tiny Whitewashed Chapel of St. Martin's, at Central Park, L. I.

St. Martin's Roman Catholic Church in Central Park, L. I., a small, poverty-stricken, white-washed structure built only last year, has become a center of veneration for thousands. More persons visited it yesterday than live in the entire community in which it stands.

A dim but easily discernible picture of the Madonna and Child has appeared on the rough, unplastered wall of the interior of the church. Hundreds of pilgrims who visit the edifice regard the somber shadow on the wall as a manifestation of divine favor. Scores have brought ill or crippled members of their families with them to gaze at this picture, which no man painted, in the hope of a miraculous cure.

It was about five weeks ago that the apparition was called to the attention of the Rev. Daniel H. Dwyer, rector of the church. A parishioner who had been attending forty-hour devotion services pointed out to him that the figures of Mary and Her Child were visible in a transept on the right side of the church.

Whether there was a stain on the plaster before, which only recently has assumed the form it now has, is something which neither Father Dwyer nor any of his parishioners are able to say. All of them had stared at the wall, perhaps for hours in the aggregate, without noticing anything beyond its rough finish and the stained glass window depicting the Resurrection.

Then suddenly, when it was pointed out to them, they saw, just beneath the window, the brooding figure of the Mother and Her Child. Hundreds are positive that it had not been there before five weeks ago. It is inconceivable to them that it could have been there and escaped their notice. Father Dwyer is non-committal.

"My attitude is neutral," he said last night. "I like to think the best I can about it."

A member of the board of trustees of the church, who prefers to remain anonymous, is of the opinion that the shadow itself is of natural origin, but that the shape it assumed is not to be explained by human mentalities. The stain on the wall, he thinks, may date from the building of the church last year.

Before the roof was on the structure, he said, there was a severe storm and part of the south wall, just above where the picture appeared, collapsed, permitting the rain to beat down into the concrete. His theory is that the concrete had not dried thoroughly when the plaster was applied to the inside wall and the moisture, gradually oozing thru the rough plaster, formed a stain on the inside wall.

"But how it has formed itself into such an unmistakable likeness of the Madonna and the Christ Child is a mystery to me," he said.

Father Dwyer is skeptical of this explanation. It fails to satisfy him. He intimated that he would conduct an investigation, in all reverence, with a view of discovering whether any explanation of the picture was humanly possible.

The church stands in a quiet, residential part of Central Park. It has about 300 parishioners, many of them living outside the limits of the village, which has only a few hundred inhabitants. Every day for weeks hundreds of persons have visited the edifice, many of them coming long distances. At daybreak yesterday, as on the day before and on preceding days, people were waiting patiently beneath the trees for the doors to be opened that they might look upon the miracle. Two hundred motor cars stopped at the church yesterday. The sexton arises at 6 a.m. to open the doors for the visitors, but declines to remain on duty through the evening, so the apparition is to be seen only by daylight.

Situated as it is just beneath a stained-glass window, there is no possibility, it is said, that the picture is formed by light passing through one of the windows of the church. There is no tint of color in it. It is a work of shadows, yet it remains vaguely distinct from whatever angle it is viewed and no matter from what quarter the light is cut off.

Some declare that it has become more distinct since first it was observed, that halos now are apparent which were not visible before and that a cross above the head of the Child is now visible where no cross was five weeks ago—New York Herald and Tribune, Oct. 17th.

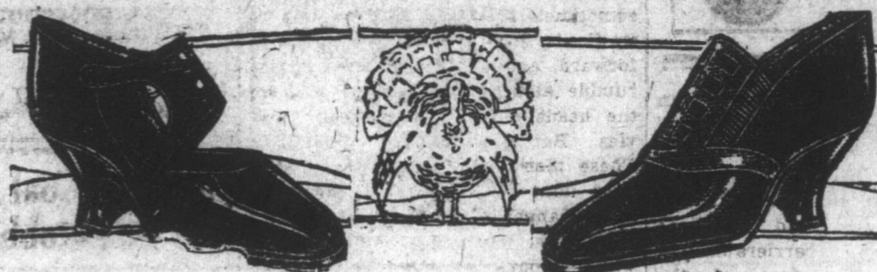

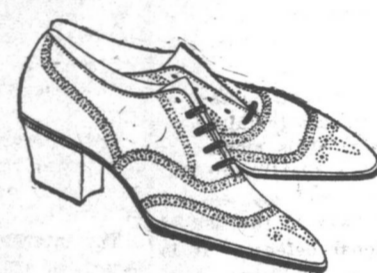

Another "Eagle's Nest" to Confute the Navy's Critics

The Monitor, which revolutionized naval warfare two generations ago, looked like a "cheese-box on a stick" the new type of naval air-ship carrier is "a rath without a cheese-box" the Navy says.

The Lexington is the first of a new class of aircraft-carrier, and is being built for the Navy at Groton, Conn. It is the largest ship ever constructed in the United States, according to the Norfolk Virginian Pilot's representative at the launching. The Lexington is 388 feet long with a breadth of 106 feet, like the twin Saratoga. She will have a speed of thirty-three knots, and will weigh 25,000 tons. Like several of our newest battle-ships, the Lexington is an oil-burner with an electric drive, so that as well as being a floating airplane field, it will also be a floating electric generating plant.

The Virginia paper remarks that if she were tided up at Boston, she could generate enough electricity to supply the needs of the whole city. Further information is given as follows:

The Lexington is being built for the United States Navy by the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation. Her most novel feature is the arrangement of her deck. On the upper structure—the eight, 8-inch gun turrets, the twelve 5-inch anti-aircraft guns, the smokestack, the navigation bridge, the wireless mast and the starboard side of the deck, giving a broad unobstructed

surface from which the planes can take off and on which they can alight. The Lexington and the Saratoga will be remembered, were originally intended for battle cruisers, but after the keels were laid they were changed to airplane carriers in accordance with the decrees of the Washington Arms Conference. Quoting further:

"The airplane carrier in the future will perform much of the same service for a fleet that the Haison and observation officers provided for their regiment. Of the seventy planes that these ships can carry, about half are heavy-duty planes—giant bombers and torpedo planes, whose aim is to destroy an enemy fleet. The rest of the planes are light observation, combat and spotting planes, equipped with the most modern radio outfit, they will be of invaluable assistance to the admiral in charge of the fleet by informing him of the approach of the enemy, the formation and size of his fleet. When the firing opens, they will flash back directions for increasing the accuracy of the gunnery. It is quite possible that in the future the airplane carrier will be the flagship of the fleet.

"Perhaps the best defense the airplane carrier possesses is excessive speed. There is no warship afloat that can keep up with it except the destroyer, and in a stand-up fight the airplane carrier could undoubtedly dispose of several of these small ships.

"The mammoth Lexington and her sister ship, the Saratoga, are expected to be in commission in the winter of 1926.

The international aspects of this launching are touched on by the New York Times, which points out that "while Great Britain possesses six carriers, the Furious, Eagle, Argus, Pegasus, Hermes, and Ark Royal, none will compare in size, displacement, gun-power, and speed with the Saratoga and Lexington. Neither Great Britain nor the United States has anywhere near its full tonnage allowance of airplane carriers. Says The Times:

"Under the terms of the Washington Treaty, carrier competition up to the allotted tonnage, can not be criticized. The case now stands that Great Britain has a marked advantage, but it will soon pass from her."

Gigantic Dug-Out

LONDON'S LARGEST TUBE STATION.

WHY EROS LEFT PICCADILLY CIRCUS.

("News of The World" Special)

Piccadilly Circus just now resembles a gigantic dug-out. No "funkholes" on the Western front was more cunningly devised than the excavations at present proceeding some 15 feet below the road-level of this famous centre. It is here that gangs of mud-begrimed navvies are working day and night on the preliminary stages in the construction of what will be the most wonderful tube railway-station in the world. More than £2,000,000 is being spent here, and when Piccadilly Station is completed at the end of next year it is estimated that nearly 1,000,000 passengers per week will pass through its tunnels, travelling either up or down the nine giant escalators that now flash the place of lifts at the busiest stations of London's tube railway system. Already one of the tunnels has been driven down 70 feet to the platforms, which lie 105 feet below the street level, and as one gazes down this yawning chasm and obtains fleeting glimpses of the men working steadily in the flicker of lamplight, one is filled with admiration for the courage and endurance of those who undertake this task. But the sinking of giant shafts is comparatively a simple matter. The really delicate job in this Piccadilly scheme is the excavation of the huge circulating area and subway immediately below the circus without disturbing the street traffic. An area of 15,000 square feet will be devoted to the tube-bopping hall alone, necessitating the removal of about 10,000 tons of London Clay.

This hall, surrounded with radiating subway to seven different points, in Piccadilly Circus, will be easily accessible. The station roof will be supported by 57 steel standpipes, some of which can support a load of 380 tons, so that there is not the slightest danger of subsidence. But they are not disturbed. These men know their job. They have done similar work under far more dangerous conditions in the Great War, when the roar of traffic was the sound of death-dealing shells, intended to destroy them.

Declares Coal Owners Are Robbing Public

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Charges by President John L. Lewis, of the United Mine Workers, before the American Federation of Labor, at Atlantic City, that the country's coal consumers are being robbed of more than \$18,000,000 a year, through a new scale for sizing coal brought down upon him the ire of anthracite operators to-day.

After an informal meeting here the operations said that Lewis' accusation was wholly without truth, and was a misrepresentation of what was the fairest piece of work the producers had ever agreed upon and carried out. The disputed scale for the standardization of coal sizes went into effect April 1.

Lewis made the charge yesterday in an address which won the endorsement of the Federation for the present strike of the anthracite miners.

The miners' president said that the re-sizing scale was "a deal entered into with the retailers" and permitted the operators to mix steam sizes, the finest commercial grade of coal, with domestic sizes, the result to be sold at the old domestic prices.

The operators' conference was called hurriedly, and included just those anthracite producers who happened to be in New York. A spokesman for the conference said that the April scale was in no way a deal with retailers, and that as a result of its adoption, according to figures of the United States Geological Survey, the mine operators were losing four cents a ton on the total of all anthracite mined instead of making \$18,000,000.

Saguel D. Warriner, chairman of the conference, who attended the meeting, said there had been no deception in establishing the new scale since it had been given wide publicity last March.

Warriner will go to Harrisburg, Pa., to-day, and is expected to make a formal reply to Lewis in an address before the Pennsylvania Chamber of Commerce.

While the miners and operators were hurling charges and counter-charges, a check-up of the local coal situation revealed that the city was not far from famine since most retailers have refused to take orders for anthracite.

"I've planted over a dozen cherry pits," went on the little red-vested



Gibbs & Barron to the effect that a registered communication addressed to them by Sir W. F. Coaker had been opened. The brief message from the latter shows that the charge altogether without grounds.

Dear Sir—We have been retained by Messrs. Gibbs & Barron, Barristers at Law, in the proceedings pending in the Criminal Court against John C. Crosbie. We have been obliged from time to time to communicate by telegraph and other means with your office in connection with this matter. We had reason to expect that a part of our correspondence was being intercepted. We therefore decided that in future we would send all our communications registered post.

On the 12th instant, we sent by registered post to Sir William F. Coaker, Port Union, a communication of a private character in relation to the above action. On yesterday we received from Sir William F. Coaker a letter wherein he informs us that an envelope in which was enclosed a communication to him was cut open and the contents abstracted from it. We shall be pleased to see you the envelope from which the correspondence was abstracted.

For obvious reasons, we are bringing these facts directly to your notice in the hope that you will cause all such complete investigation to be made, so that the perpetrators of this outrage and those responsible for the same may be discovered and punished. We respectfully submit that if communications between solicitor and client cannot be safely sent even by registered mail, we are confronted with a very serious situation.
