At the conference of conservatives yesterday it is said Lord Randolph Churchill made it a condition of his acceptance of office that Sir Stafford Northcote should be made leader of the conservatives in the house of commons. Sir Henry Drummond Wolff, member of parliament for Portsmouth will have a position in the cabinet. The conference of conservative leaders to-day lasted one hour. It is said that the result of the conference is that all obstacles to the formation of a cabinet have been surmounted. All who attended the conference are, however, pledged to secrecy. At the close of the conference Lerd Randolph Churchill remained in private conference with the Marquis of Salisbury. The conservative leaders will have another meeting before a decision is finally taken upon the constitution of the new cabinet.

Hon. Wm. Heary Smish, secretary for war; Col. Frederick Stanley, secretary for the colonies; the Earl of Carnaryon or Viscount Cranbrook, lord-lieutenant of Ireland, and Sir Stafford Northopte, lord president of the council.

Death of Baron Von Manteuffel.

CARLSEAD, June 17.—Field Marshay Von Manteuffel, the distinguished German commander and governor of Alsace-Lorraine, died suddenly here this morning of pulmonary congestion. The Emperor William was completely prostrated when he heard of the death of Baron Von Manteuffel, and said in a smournful way:

"All my friends are dying."

Baron Von Manteuffel was born at Madgeburg Feb. 24, 1809, and was consequently 76 years old. He was in command of the first army corps in the France-Prussian war and was governor of Alsace-Lorraine when he died.

Negotiations are now going on between the several governments interested with a view to secure arrangements for the final settlement of the fisheries question, which has agitated from time to time the people of Canada and the United States. The governorgeneral has the matter in hand and Sir John Nacdonald will bring the correspondence on the subject to parliament before the close of the session. It is understood that the proposition of the United States government is that the president will undertake to bring the whole question of the fisheries before congress at its becomber sittings and will recommend the appointment of a joint commission, charged with the settlement upon a just and equitable basis of the entire question of the fishing rights. In the meantime, the proposition from the United States is that there shall be no enforcement of our fishery laws and regulations from the list of July to the close of the present fishing season.

This is important, in the sense that it is an authorized confirmation, from Ottawa, of what appeared in the Montreal Gazette the day before (Tuesday).
