THE NEW C.P.R. SUBVENTION
Mr. A. J. CARO'S DECLARATION OF INTEREST IN THE MATTER.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—Sir Charles H. Tupper left this afternoon for Nova Scotia. He will speak next Tuesday at a Roman Catholic church at Little Bras d'Or, Cape Breton, and in all probability will make reference to the status of the Manitoba school question. Sir Charles' views in regard to the obligation of the Government in the matter of Remedial Legislation, are perhaps more pronounced than those of any other English-speaking member of the Cabinet, and it would not surprise his friends here that the Minister of Justice has been somewhat strongly upon Hon. N. C. Wallace's position, in view of his utterances on this question before the Grand Lodge in Halifax.

THE TOLLGATE FERRY
Ex-President John E. Stewart is preparing to make a bid for the Dominion Company over what he claims to be the forgery of his signature to the return of expenditure on the road for 1931. According to Stewart's story, he had a quarrel with the directors because the statement of expenditure for that year contained \$100,000 more than had actually been dispersed upon it. He refused to sign the statement and resigned. When he was in Ottawa two weeks ago he found the return for 1931, made to the Department of Railways by the company, contained this overstatement of \$100,000. Stewart swore to before an Ottawa magistrate, and signed "John E. Stewart." It was upon that return that the official report of the Department showing the expenditure on the road was based. Stewart claims the signature, purporting to be his, is a forgery. In support of that statement he has forwarded from his home in Andover, N.B., to the Minister of Railways a formal protest, in which he says "I did not at any time sign or make oath to any return of work performed, or money expended, on the Tobique Valley Railway, for the fiscal year 1931."

PROPOSED 1930 ISLAND PARK
Mr. Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine, returned today from the meeting of the Dominion Association of the Islands, N.Y. FINNISH DOUBLE MURDER

TWO WOMEN STABBED TO THE HEART OF THE STREET.

An Italian Shoemaker Buries an Eight Inch Stiletto in One Victim's Breast, and Cut Down Her Sister When She Saw Him, Remains at Mid-Day on a New York Street.

New York, Aug. 8.—A double tragedy was enacted on the sidewalk in front of No. 325 East 83rd-street, at five minutes before 12 o'clock, when an Italian stabbed two women repeatedly with a stiletto, inflicting wounds from which both will die.

FINNISH DOUBLE MURDER

The assassin is Filippo Giampata, 47 years old, a shoemaker. His victims were Kate Wells, and her sister, who were walking down East 83rd-street, on their way to their home, while Giampata stood in hiding in the vestibule of No. 325 East 83rd-street, and held a four-inch stiletto, eight inches in length, made from a piece of quarter-inch steel, sharpened at both ends, in his hand.

As the two women reached the stoop of the house Giampata sprang forward, shouting "Kill them, kill them!" and a curse, and seizing Kate by the throat plunged the stiletto into her breast, near the heart.
