In even a less critical time than the present, when the war in the east may lead to such tremendous consequences, the illness and death of a Russian Czar is an event of incalculable moment. No other living man wields such tremendous power. He is the sole legislator, judge and executive for over 87,000,000 of human beings. For that number of people he "makes laws, levies taxes, expends the revenue and condemns to exile or death according to his own will, without let or hindrance." The struggles of the Russian people for a constitutional government, and the sternly repressive system adopted by the Czar to crush out all liberal and progressive ideas, are of course well known. Political Indications.

Montreal Herald: Every move that is being made now on the political chess board is more or less with the contingency of a general election in view. Ralifax School for the Blind.

We have received the twenty-third Annual Report of the Board of Managers of the Halifax School for the blind. During the past year 54 blind persons have been under instruction, 38 males, 16 females; 6 of these have graduated or left the school, and one has been removed by death, making the total attendance, on December 31st, 1893, 47. Of these 24 are from Nova Scoti-1 afform Brunswick, 2 from P. E. Island, and 7 from Newfoundland. The different departments are managed with great care; the staff of teachers look after the physical, intellectual, social and moral welfare of the pupils; these pupils are taught useful occupations-that will prove a source of profit to them in after years. The school does a grand work in looking after those who unfortunately are deprived of the sense of sight, and it is cheering to learn from this report that the labors of the managers and teachers are so far crowned with success.

In his speech the emperor expressed regret that through the obstinacy of China the neace of the east has been disturbed, addin. "But the war having commenced, we cannot cease operations until our object shall have been gained." He also said he expected the members of parliament to willingly agree to the governments proposals in hope that thereby the Japanese army would be victorious throughout and peace and happiness restored, with additional lastre to the country. In the bill submitted providing increased expenditure for the army and navy, the war expenses are estimated at \$615,000,000 (?) of which amount \$26,000,000 is to be taken from the government reserve fund.
