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

ANAPOLIS, S.S. IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL, Semi-Annual Session, 1903.

Council met in the Temperance Hall at Annapolis on Tuesday the 21st day of April, 1903, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Present: Warden Pickup, Councillors, Outhit, Elliott, Whitman, Fitch, Gerner, Porter, Clarke, Purdy, Thomas, Moore, Healy, Oakes, Buckler and Grimm.

Minutes read and approved.

Upon reading the petition of F. E. Miller and others, freeholders of the County of Annapolis, asking for the opening of a new road from the Granville highway to the Beaufort road along the west line of lands of Mrs. Shaw, Edmund Clarke and James H. Rogers, the report of the Commission, namely, Gordon L. Dodge, Albert P. Nally and Francis W. Harris, and it appearing that notice had been posted as required by statute, it was ordered that the confirmation of proceedings hereunder be indefinitely postponed.

Ordered: That Councillors Porter, Elliott, Fitch, Healy, Thomas, Outhit, Clarke, Whitman and Moore be a committee to divide the Road and Bridge Grant.

Ordered: That the Road Grant be extended by commission.

Upon reading the report of the committee to settle with the town of Annapolis the same was on motion received and adopted.

The following is the report: To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of the County of Annapolis.

Your committee to settle with the town of Annapolis has to submit this report with statement of amount received by the Municipality and the different items of the year 1902, the amount being \$1000.27.

GRANVILLE BANK ROBBERS NOW SUSPECTED OF MURDER.

A St. John despatch of the 24th inst says: Some weeks ago the dead body of an old woman named Margaret Neal, was found murdered on the road leading from Fairville to her home on the shore.

Photographs of the criminals were recognized by the keeper of the Catherine Shaker and by Mr. Bond, who held up outside Fairville and asked for money about the time and place where the murder took place.

The evidence in detail which leads to the conclusion that Mrs. Neal was murdered and that the murderers are as follows: Miss Madel Dunn said, on the 13th of last March, she was driving with Frank O'Reilly, of Carleton, on the way back to her home.

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ROME'S ROYAL WELCOME TO BRITAIN'S SOVEREIGN.

The Shanghai Times says the Peking legation pennants are now being pulled by armed patrol in the night time, because of the revival of Boxerism in districts near the city.
