After the great Chicago fire insurance rates were universally advanced and the rate on the Philadelphia lumber yards was made three per cent. To this trade objected, and combined stock and mutual company, which was named the Lumbermen's Insurance Company, was formed and the rates were reduced to two and afterward to rate was continued until 1892, when the tariff combination ordered an advance. The Lembermen's Insurance Company is still in existence and is doing a prosperous business, but it is no longer the champion of the lumber dealers. The mutual plan at first adopted was abandoned, and now it mium stock company. Although a numgeneral advance in rates. The offices. mit that lumber has been a very profitable line, but claim that advanced rates on other lines cannot be secured if lumber rates are left unchanged.

Menzie, Turner & Co., of Toronto. have secured the good will, plant and stock in trade of the Machriance Shade Co. (14d.), which purchase places them as one of the heaviest manufacturers of such goods on the continent.

"The Grosvenor" a big Temperance Hotel in Hull, (England), the cost of building which was \$15,000,000 has been making a loss of \$3,000 per year on its working The directors have moved for and obtained a license under rigid restrictions to remedy this. One of the odd things about prohibitionists is that they never can manage hotels, and more, they do not pat-romze temperance hotels when travelling.

The Glasgow " Herald " points out how British coal is found no longer necessary at a number of coaling stations. Australia and Chili are sending fuel to points on the Pacific coast. Japan mines are furnishing large supplies for that part or the east, and even India is now turning out a large amount of coal, which is supplying Bombay, Madras, Burmah, etc. Siberia as a coal shipper also is coming into the market by a new railway. A vein of coal 9 feet thick has been opened at Sydney, New South Wales. The effect they mean not only a loss to shipping and mining interests, but a development of manufacturing in countries where hitherto England had a monopoly.

A recent decision of the Supreme Court Rhode Island will be of some interest to associations who are listing wholesalers. The National Association of Macter Plumbers has a branch in Rhode Island. It recently sent circulars to the wholesale dealers plumbers' supplies, warning them not to sell supplies to plumbers who were not members of the association. These circulars were aimed at McCauley Brothers, of Providence. This firm undertook to purchase supplies in the open market, but in some instances failed, being thus put to some inconvenience. The brothers applied to the Supreme Court for an injunction to restrain the association from interterring with their business. The statement of exports for the month of October shows that the export of goods, the produce of Canada, is still keeping up. and although the produce of other countries continues to show a material falling off from last year, still the total exports for October were \$899,663 mere than the corresponding month last year. The total was \$14,603,666 as compared with \$13,706,003 last year. This shows an increase for the month of \$1,640,882 in goods the produce of Canada, but a decrease of \$743,219 in produce of other countries. For the four months of the fiscal year the total exports have been 4,9,155,137, as compared with \$52,741,554 for same period last year. This decrease is wholly in the produce of other countries, and is accounted for either on the ground that the Western states have less surplus wheat to export at the low rates or it is not reachexport at the low rates or it is not reaching theseaboard by way of the St. Lawrence. For the first four months of the last fiscal year the export of agircultural products not the produce of Canada was \$5,479,684, while this year it only amounts to \$1,639,468, coin also shows a decline of \$300,000,

Mr. C. M. Higginson, an expert Chicago engineer, in a paper on the abatement of the smoke nuisance, gave the following of 923. rules as essential to good combustion.

Mr. Higginson says the grate bars should have air spaces equal to 50 per cent. of the grate, and that unrestricted space of 20 feet is needed for the flame. With an 18 foot boiler this can be secured. For locomotive boilers and tugboat boilers a combustion chamber should be placed a compaction charmoer should be placed midway between the tubes. In no case should the draught for the flame be direct from the fire-box through the tubes, for the temperature in the tubes rarely rose above 320 degrees, and 1,500 degrees was requisite for the combustion of the volatile gases, which was the abovious labor. tile gases, which was the chemical character of smoke.—Ex.

A Washington despatch says the revenue of the postoflice department for the year ended June 30, 1894 shows a falling off while the expenditures have increased. The deficiency for the fiscal year, 1893, was \$5,066,763, while the deliciency for 1894, is \$9,243,935. The decrease of receipts was \$816 454 and the increase of expenditures \$3,250,309. Following the example of the Ontario government that of Quebec proposes to devote 1,619,640 acres, comprising large parts of the counties of Montmorenci, Quebec and Charlevoix, to form a public park. The object of the park is described to be the preservation of the primieval forest, the lish and game, the maintenance of an even water supply and the study and cul-ture of forest trees. It is declared that such forest reserves have been beneficial in the United States and elsewhere and the territory above described "is well adapted for the purpose, being largely unfit for settlement, not under license to cut timber, well provided with fish and game, com-prising the head waters of several large rivers and with easy access from the cen-tres of population. Inc park is some 6 miles from St. John rhilway from which a open line will undoubtedly be built. The government should take steps to have a large hotel built in the park.

The Tasmanian government together with the lumber manufacturers of that country, recently shipped 300,000 superficial feet of blocks nine inches long and three inches thick word blocks to be used in paving the streets of London. The government is paying all freight, and it is interesting to note that they expect a profit even after shipping so far, and the difference between the cost to the manufacturers, delivered at the wharf in Hobart, and the sum received by the government is to be divided as profit by the government and the manufacturers furnishing the blocks.

BANK STATEMENT FOR OCTOBER,

The bank returns for October present no features of marked interest, or in any way out of the usual course for that: month. Circulation increased \$1,161,495, the total being \$34,516,651, which is \$2,-400,000 lower than at corresponding date 1893, the increase for September being much less this year than last. The Dominion Government reduced its credit balances with the banks by \$229,082, and the Provincial Government theirs by \$722,312. Public deposits on demand, balances of current accounts, were increas ed by \$1,365,922, in equal proportions amongst the banks of Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia. notice were also increased by \$801,294. In 1893 these deposits were dimmished in October by \$447,000, a very trifling sum indeed, which probably indicates the ex-Municipal, Government and tent of disturbance caused by the Amerithe intervening period lawing been one of geneval depression, the deposits at notice in our banks have increased since October 1893 by \$8,327,624, which is not only very striking evidence of public confidence in the banks, but shows too that the people have been able to keep on laying up a surplus of earnings even in hard times. During October the balances held in the United States were increased \$1,164,170. these funds standing at \$22,604,212, against \$14,829,370 at same date 1893, an increase of \$7,774,842, but little above the amount so utilized prior to the financial disturbance of last year. The balances due from United Kingdom banks and agencies were increased \$307,505, hast year they decreased in October by about the same amount. A decrease occurred of \$531,-083 in Canadian municipal and other public securities. The decrease was the aggregate of reductions made by the Bank of Montreal, the Bank of British North America and the Quebec Bank. Railway securities were unchanged. An increase of \$747,789 took place in Call loans, which now stand over 2 millions in excess of last year's figures. Current loans decreased, \$885,445, the total now standing at \$198,888,480, which is \$5,-966,000 below the total in October 1893. The decreases were, banks of Ontario, \$1,183,828, and of Quebec, \$747,111, from which must be deducted the increase of \$1,273,94 1 which occured in the current loans of the banks of Nova Scetia. The growing accumulations of money so far beyond the demand for discount, is not a promising out look for bank profits. But, in the event of trade reviving the banks are in a position to supply all the funds that would be called for at moderate rates, and cheap money is very stimulating to enterprise, and business development.

#### PREVENTIVE FIRE LOSSES.

The following prepared from an article in the "Finance Chromele and Insurance Circular," London, England, will be found of much interest, and otherwise valuable to those interested in lire insurance on this continent. In view of the recent increase in the frequency and extent of fires at home and in other countries, it is desirable to consider whether any steps can be taken towards the mitigation of the evil. That many fires are due to preventible causes, and that many losses might be confined within narrower limits, are facts which have long been within the cognizance of all, but the means for combatting the carelessness and criminality which are responsible for the fire waste are not so evident.

GROCERIES.-Business in all lines during the week has only been moderate. In sugar, the two refineries report a good demand for granulated from local jobbers. and wholesale merchants in the Dominion at the low price at present ruling, namely 43-16c for car lo's, and 41 less in quantities. Yellows are quoted at 31 to 31c.

The movement in teas at the moment is small, and prices a shade easier than hitherto. Customers seem to have stocked up enough, and have got over the scare of high prices. London advices show only normal business, and for the most past there is little in the tex business to warrant excitement, present or future, We quote Japan low grade 12 to like, medium 14 to 15c, good 16 to 17c, China black low grad-Il to Ille, medium to good 13 to 11c. choice to choicest 15 to 25c, Indian and Ceylon southong 19 to 20c, pekoe 25 to Me. The tone of the coffee market is quiet. There is a brisker demand for spices, since the gold weather set in, but prices are easy, and stocks quite ample in all lines.

Canned goods dull, a little enquiry for tomatoes at inside prices being the only comment. We quote: tomatoes \$7 to take, corn 90 to 95c, peas 90 to 35c, cannel salmon at \$1.271.

The usual enquiry for dried fruits has not yet developed. Early in the week the demand looked seasonable enough, but it was only for small quantities, to get over Thanksgiving trade. Retailers have not yet done anything for Xmas dried fruit show, next week is likely, however, to see a change and perhaps greater firmness to the market, advices from Denia going to show that Canada has about all the raising she will get this session. The break in the week materially affected busi-ness all round, and there is no other greery icale line exhibiting any particular change.






