## SAIIING ORDERS.

To Captatn Carelfss, of th ${ }^{-}$Ship ProFESSOR. now lying at anchor in the Bay of Moraliti:
 ROM your repeated neglect of orders, Jer. vii. 13: Isa. lxv. 12, we beg once more to caution you of the imminent danger to which you are exposed, Jonah i. 6. by continuing to lie in the Bay of Morality, Rom. iii. 20. You are, therefore, directed by the Admiral in Command, to weigh anchor, 2 Cor. v. 20, and sail for the Point of Conviction, John xvi. 8 , which lies in the latitude of Acts v. 31. And in attending to these instructions, we take leave to apprise you that the ebb tide runs strong off this Point, James i. 14, 15, into the Bay of Calms, Acts xxiv. 25 ; xxvi. 28 , where many a vessel has been lost, Prov. i. 24-31. You will, therefore. be careful to take advantage of the floodtide, Isa. lv. 1, 6, 7, get into the harbor and open the dispatch contained in Matt. xviii. 3; and until you become perfectly acquainted with your instruc tions there, you are not to proceed any farther.
