Executive of Ontario Branch of Dominion Alliance and Methodist Committee on Temperance Join Hands and Declare for a Constitutional Majority.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance was held last evening in the office of Ald. F. S. Spence, Confederation Life Building, Dr. J. J. MacLaren presiding. Those present were Ald. F. S. Spence, Rev. Dr. Carman, G. F. Marter, M. L. A. L. C. Penke, Rev. L. H. Wagner, M. A. Anger, Dr. J. J. MacLaren, Rev. Dr. Brotherton, J. T. Indignation was manifested in all the speeches at the referendum proposition, the members of the committee holding that it is necessary to ask a vote of the electorate no more than a bare majority should be required. A "loaded" referendum was characterized as unjust and unequal for, and was not what the temperance people expected when the promise of a prohibitory measure was given by the government.

The action of Premier Roblin in Manitoba in suggesting that the question be again submitted to vote, after a prohibitory measure had actually been passed and a bare majority was characterized as an outrage.

Strong Resolution Passed. The following resolution was passed: Whereas the government and legislature have directed by legislation that the electors of the Province of Ontario to declare whether or not they approve of legislation prohibiting the liquor traffic, and whereas the electors of the said province have on two occasions voted very large majorities in favor of such legislation, and whereas the government has repeatedly promised deputations representing the organized prohibitionists of Ontario to introduce a bill to prohibit the liquor traffic to the limit of the jurisdiction of the legislature as soon as the extent of such jurisdiction should be ascertained, and whereas a decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council has affirmed that a province has power to prohibit the manufacture and intoxicating liquors within the province, and whereas a number of persons have publicly suggested that the coming into force of a prohibitory law for the Province of Ontario ought to be made conditional upon the ratification thereof by a three-fourths majority of the voting electorate, and whereas this Executive Committee, to which the said promises were given, and representing the prohibitionists of every part of the province, is firmly convinced that the resulting law, if introduced, would be unjust and unequal, and would not be an honorable carrying out of the government's pledges, and therefore resolved that, without admitting that any further

NAVAL BATTLE FOUGHT GENERAL ALBAN KILLED Vessels of Colombian Government Attacked by Those of the Revolutionary Party—One Sunk.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Only meagre details of the fighting between the vessels of the Colombian government and those of the insurgents in Panama Bay were received in official circles today. They consisted of a despatch from Consul-General Guder, at Panama, and another from Captain Mead, the commander of the cruiser Philadelphia, which is lying in Panama Bay. At the Colombian legation great regret is expressed by the city officials at the death of Gen. Alban, the governor of Panama. He was about 50 years of age and a man of brilliant attainments. Formerly he had been Attorney-General of Colombia.

HAS ONE MORE MINISTER THAN SHE IS ENTITLED TO

Belief Current in Ottawa That Hon. Mr. Sutherland's Present Position is Only Temporary.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—A good deal of the newspaper speculation upon cabinet changes likely to follow the appointment of Hon. David Mills to the bench of the Supreme Court, in succession to the late Judge Gwynne, leaves out of consideration the important fact that his retirement will not create a vacancy in Ontario's representation in the cabinet. Ontario has at present one more cabinet minister than she is entitled to, nor, unless one of the Quebec ministers should resign, could the portfolio of Justice be given to a representative from that province.

When cabinet reconstruction comes it will, therefore, be found to involve more than the appointment of a successor to Mr. Mills. That Mr. Sutherland's tenure of the Marine portfolio was intended to be more than a tentative nobody believes. It was to forestall the possibility of Mr. Sutherland's resignation, and the Marine Department that Mr. Sutherland was sworn in the very day after the former's election for Queen's, P.E.I. Mr. Sutherland is merely keeping this cabinet seat warm until it shall please Mr. Wilfrid Laurier to redeem his long-standing promise to give British Columbia representation in the ministry.

Four Candidates Placed in Nomination Yesterday. Montreal, Jan. 20.—There were, as expected, four candidates nominated today for the civic chair, viz.: Mayor P. Fontaine, M.P., ex-Mayor R. Willson-Smith, Dr. E. P. Lachapelle and Mr. James Cochrane, M.L.A. for St. Lawrence.

A BRUTAL ASSAULT. The World yesterday refrained from any mention of a most dastardly outrage that was committed on Saturday night, in this city, on the public streets, in connection with the so-called strike of the newsboys. It was to enable the police to get up to date what happened was this: A young man who carried a route of the Star on Friday left this office shortly after 11 o'clock Saturday night to go to his rounds. He delivered a parcel at the Rossin House as he passed. When he left the Rossin House, he went south and turned into Wellington-street. As he was going along Wellington-street, a mob of from twelve to fifteen ragged boys and other rowdies attacked him, downed him, beat him with sticks and their fists, and left him half dead on the street. It was all done in a moment. Not another person was on the street, and the young man crawled home, and all Sunday and yesterday he was in the care of a doctor, and is still confined to his bed. He was married about a year ago, and his wife is the point of confinement. When he will be able to get out is not yet known. The entire detective force is at the present moment engaged in ferreting out the ruffians who committed this assault. They are very near to them now, and it is expected they will be locked up to-night, and, after that, the magistrate and judges will have an opportunity of vindicating the law in regard to such conduct.

NO OVERTURES FOR PEACE HAVE BEEN MADE BY BOERS

Mr. Chamberlain Informs the Burghers They Are Mistaken if They Think They Can Get a Repetition of Kitchener's Terms Whenever They Please.

London, Jan. 20.—The Colonial Secretary, Mr. Chamberlain, in the House of Commons this afternoon said there was no foundation for the reports that overtures for peace in South Africa had been made by the Boer envoys. The first important debate of the session began in the House of Commons to-night on an amendment to the address moved by Frederick Cavley (Liberal), in reply to the Speech from the Throne. The debate was called out by Mr. Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, who vigorously took the line in defence of the war. He made the significant statement that if, as Lord Rosebery's speech intimated, the Boers believed they could at any time repeat the deed of Lord Kitchener's terms, he wished to inform them that they were mistaken.

King's Head on His New Coins AND "KING OF ALL THE BRITISH" Artistic Portrait Seen on Gold Pieces Just Received Here.

THIS is the head of King Edward VII. on the new coins of his realm, just issued, a few of which have just come to this side of the Atlantic. The change in title is noteworthy. The old one was "Victoria, D. G. Brit. Ind. Empress, etc." The new one is "Edward VII. by the grace of God, of all the British King, Defender of the Faith, of India Emperor."

HIGHEST OF THE CONTINENT LOCKED UP KAISER'S SON. Dismissed by His College Corps at Father's Instigation. Berlin, Jan. 20.—The Crown Prince is not enjoying student life in Bonn at all. He dislikes the restrictions and commands of the corps and the usages and ritual of the students' society to which he belongs.

BRACKENMAN RUN OVER AT ST. THOMAS AND FEARFULLY MANGLED. St. Thomas, Jan. 20.—James Porter, brakeman, met with a terrible accident at Hawtry early this morning. He was attending to hot journal when an engine, which had been taking water, shunted against the cars, and he was run over by the wheels of the engine. He was brought here to the hospital, where over both of his legs the wheels of the engine were crushed. It is thought he will recover. He is 45 years of age, and accompanied by Mrs. Porter. He intended to quit railroading in the spring and engage in business in London.

ONE CONVICTION. There was one conviction for assault in connection with the so-called newsboys' strike yesterday. John Carey, aged 13, who assaulted John Murray, an engineer in the World press room, was fined \$3 and costs or 10 days in the shelter. There will be another one tried to-day and others will follow. A dozen different charges will be laid before the week is out.

TO PETITION LEGISLATURE. Ottawa Council Wants Qualification for Aldermen Changed. Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The City Council to-day decided to petition the legislature for an amendment to the qualification Act to make the qualification for aldermen the same as for the municipal council.

STRICKEN AT HIS POST IN VESTIBULE OF A CAR

Motorman Charles E. Aldridge Let Go the Lever and Sank Into Conductor's Arms.

Death came suddenly to Charles E. Aldridge, a motorman in the employ of the Toronto Street Railway Company, shortly after 9 o'clock last night. He was in charge of a King-street car, and on reaching Munro Park, collided with the conductor of the car. The car had only proceeded a short distance on the return journey from the park when Aldridge opened the vestibule door and called to the conductor, "Hurry, and take charge of the car." As the conductor entered the vestibule Aldridge fell into his arms. The conductor put on all speed to get to the depot as fast as possible. The car was stopped at the depot by John Ross and John McMillen. The services of Miss Clute, the well-known nurse, were procured, she being with a tobogganing party in the vicinity. Dr. Brown, coroner of Carleton Avenue and Queen-street, was also soon on the scene, but despite their best efforts death resulted a few minutes later.

THREE-CORNERED FIGHT. R. L. Richardson Will Face Party Nominee in Lisgar By-Election. Winnipeg, Jan. 20.—The Telegram says: "There seems to be little doubt that the approaching by-election in Lisgar will be a three-cornered fight. R. L. Richardson, who has been elected to the constituency, is said by his friends to be certain to run, and the Liberals and the Conservatives are both making a strong effort to select a candidate. No man has been named as the Liberal nominee, but telegraphic despatches, Homestead in a special car to inform the unfortunate man's wife that he had died. He was 35 years of age, and was a trusted employee of the company, having been in their service over seven years. He rendered valuable aid to the roadmasters during rough seasons, acting as police man at the corner of Dufrain and King-streets during the Exhibition, and also at the Woodbine during the races. He was popular with all his fellow employees, and had many friends among the public. He is survived by a widow and one child. Coroner A. J. Johnson was notified, and decided to hold an inquest at 2 p.m. to-day, at the family residence, 61 Sorauer-avenue.

Brantford, Jan. 20.—Doctor Harbottle of Burford was charged at the court here to-day with shooting H. Stuart, a man of Burford, with intent to do bodily harm. The doctor pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried at once. Judge Hardy presided. There was a large number of people from Burford present anxious to hear the case.

MAN IN THE BUSH CAUGHT KILLED YOUNG GUECHER

Says Shooting, Was an Accident and Exonerates Dead Lad's Imprisoned Father.

Mattawa, Jan. 20.—There has just arrived here on a snow-plow from Kippewa the alleged murderer of young Guecher. Detective Crowe of Montreal made the capture, along with Messrs. Kelly and Laperriere of Ville Marie. The capture was made in the bush about 17 miles or so from Kippewa. He is the Frenchman named Guecher, by the father, is about 26 years of age and of delicate build. He states that all was right the morning the boy's father departed for Ville Marie, and that the shooting occurred late that evening.

COAL GAS AND PUBLIC HONOR.

The feature of yesterday in Toronto was George R. Cockburn's outburst of pious indignation. It was really grand, the grandest thing we have heard in 20 years. The effort seems to have come about spontaneously. A reporter just happened to meet Mr. Cockburn, and on questioning him about the meeting of the directors of the gas company, the vice-president gave voice to the noble sentiments that embellished his outburst. Oftentimes in the course of our career we have passed in review the intellects of Toronto, scrutinizing them closely, weighing them carefully, comparing them, to see, if possible, we might lay to the credit of our city any single individual whose nobility of thought might illumine an otherwise dull, sordid and mercenary metropolis. Imagine our surprise when we lit upon such an intellect yesterday in the board room of the Consumers' Gas Company! Here one naturally expects to find dull-witted guinea-pigs, seated in rich leather chairs, as irresponsible to noble sentiments as overfed swine. None of these sleek, cautious guinea-pigs reposed the intellect of a demigod. Mr. Cockburn, in his capacity of headmaster of Upper Canada College, leads us to use the analogy, for if ever mortal assumed the air of a demigod, it was when the Dominius recited the soul-inspiring choruses of Euripides in the original Greek. Hear boys who had the good fortune to hear him rolling off the noble sentiments of the poet, in language as noble as the sentiments themselves, will never forget the scene of his inspiring influence. But in those days the Dominius was merely an actor, a mimic poet. Yesterday he was the poet himself, he was the inspiration, he was the real thing in demigods. And they came upon him in the board room of the Consumers' Gas Company, in the company of a bunch of soulless guinea-pigs! A jewel in a swine's snout!

We think that all of us have a right to experience a sense of pride in the fact that it is a fellow-townsmen of our own who has so beautifully unfolded the gospel of sterling probity, of public honor, in language as noble as the sentiments themselves, will never forget the scene of his inspiring influence. But in those days the Dominius was merely an actor, a mimic poet. Yesterday he was the poet himself, he was the inspiration, he was the real thing in demigods. And they came upon him in the board room of the Consumers' Gas Company, in the company of a bunch of soulless guinea-pigs! A jewel in a swine's snout!

Vice-President of Gas Company

Mr. Cockburn's indignation grew to withering sarcasm, as he said: "If the city prefers law-suits to cheap gas, I suppose the city can have it. Do the citizens of Toronto prefer costly litigation to reductions in the price of gas? It is a matter of taste; they must suit themselves."

"You have a building across the street there," he said by way of illustration. "You can have a solemn agreement with me, and in the course of years other persons take the place of the original parties to the contract. Does that make the obligation less binding should the terms of the contract not be fulfilled in one case or in the other?"

MINISTERS IN CONCLAVE.

Discipline of Methodist Church Gives Rise to Warm Discussion. Rev. J. C. Speer's paper on "Methodist Discipline," which he read before the Methodist Ministerial Association yesterday dealt with various church rules, and gave rise to considerable discussion. Ministers, he held, should not have to be dependent upon a minority vote as to whether they should remain in a church a fourth year. He believed that the term of a minister's connection with a congregation should be fixed by the minister himself, and that the general superintendent should be head of the church and should be able to exercise authority as such, and that the position should be more than honorary. The subject will come up for discussion at the next fortnightly meeting. Mr. Hinks addressed the meeting on the coming convention of the "Students' volunteer movement." Prof. Ballantyne read a paper on "Church History as a Help to Ministers" at the Presbyterian ministers' meeting. Rev. Chancellor Wallace addressed the Baptist Ministerial Association on "The Three Confessions Concerning the Lord Jesus in the Gospels." A committee on prohibition was appointed to report to a special meeting to be held on Wednesday next.

TO MAKE THE ISLAND BIGGER

The New Civic Committee Entertains Numerous Suggestions for Permanent Improvements.

BETTER FERRY SERVICE WANTED

Proposal to Regulate Bicycles and Baby Carriages on Boats—Interim Appropriation Asked.

An Up-to-date Survey. A plan of survey of the island as at present and another plan, prepared jointly by the Park Commissioners, Assessment Commissioner and City Engineer, with suggestions as to proposed improvements and means of beautifying the island, was presented to a committee on the suggestion of Chairman Burns.

Light on the Island. The City Engineer was asked to consider the advisability of installing an electric light plant on the island to the later works power house, and estimate the cost of providing the additional apparatus necessary to light the whole island.

Island Finances. The revenue from the island other than the estimated \$12,000 for last year. The expenditure included: sand pump (nearly all expended), Island Park, \$10,000; Island Park electric light station, \$885; permanent improvements, \$500; waterworks, \$2,000; lights, \$375; shore (12 temporary houses), \$100; total, \$10,450.

The cost of operating the sand pump at the island caused some discussion. The Engineer asked what it had done for the \$5,000 expended on it last year. The Engineer will report the cost of operating the pump both day and night for island purposes. The island necessities would provide work for the island, and the estimate for this year's expenditure will be prepared at an early date in the public accounts. An interim appropriation of \$5,000 will be asked.

Public Bathing Houses. Chairman Burns recommended that some bathing houses for public use be erected on the beach along the island. Mr. Curry thought the houses would only be a rendezvous for rowdies.

Attention of the Ferry Company. The attention of the Ferry Company will be called to the numerous complaints received from citizens regarding the carrying of bicycles and baby carriages on the boats. Special entrance on boats for "all people" with wheelchairs, advocated by the chairman, and Ald. Curry suggested that accommodation be provided for the carrying of wheelchairs, in places where they would not be in the way of citizens.

Better Service Wanted. Another point brought up was unsatisfactory ferry service, and City Engineer was asked by the committee to amend the bylaw in order that all licenses granted to island ferry boats should exact a time service to a certain point, with an agreement to the hour boats should stop running.

Mr. Small pointed out that under existing arrangements the last boat for the island leaves the city as early as 10:30 p.m. in the summer. This, he thought, was unreasonable early and unfair to island residents.

The matter of island street cars, as well as a number of other matters, was left over until the next meeting, two weeks hence.

Assaulted Mother-in-Law. George Chausse and his wife, from Parry Sound, and three daughters, are not on the best of terms. Mrs. Chausse has been living with her mother-in-law, Mrs. Peterson, at 151 Church-street, and yesterday her husband paid her a visit. He was received rather coolly, but she did not prevent Chausse from forcing an entrance to the place, where, it is alleged, he smashed some things and assaulted his mother-in-law. Mrs. Peterson complained to the police, and Chausse was arrested by Police Constable Craig on a warrant charging him with assault.

Scarlatina is Now Epidemic. There is a scarlatina epidemic at Parry Sound, and three deaths have occurred in one family. In Little Current, Manitowish, typhoid is prevalent. Two new outbreaks of measles are reported from Sault Ste. Marie, and cases have also been discovered in Casselman, Russell County, and in Victoria mines, west of Sudbury.

Two Hurricanes Collided. New York, Jan. 20.—The British steamer Adana arrived to-day from Parry Sound, and three deaths were reported. Captain Smith says that he had two outbreaks of measles and a collision between two hurricanes.

Coming of Paderewski. London, Jan. 20.—The White Star Line steamer Oceanic, which is to sail from Liverpool Jan. 22 for New York, will have among her passengers Paderewski, the pianist, and his wife.

ONTARIO'S FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

AS SHOWN BY PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

According to the Government's Figures the Year's Transactions Show a Profit of Over \$427,000—\$4,004,228 is Asked for to Carry on the Business for This Year.

The public accounts for last year, and the estimates for 1902, were presented to the legislature yesterday afternoon. The House only sat for a few moments, and immediately after the presentation of petitions was the only other business transacted. According to the public accounts, the total expenditure for 1901 was \$4,038,834.49, being nearly \$35,000 more than the preceding year. The total receipts were \$4,466,032.28, thus showing a surplus on the year's business of \$427,197.79. Among the receipts were: Education Department, \$57,379.78; Secretary's Department, \$88,157.09; Fisheries Branch, \$35,887.24; Supplementary Revenue Act, \$237,506.83; succession duty, \$300,581.96; casual revenue, \$22,655.07; public institutions, \$87,735.75; Crown Lands Department, \$1,618,309.64.

Succession Duties Collected. The amount derived from the succession duties in 1901 was considerably more than for the preceding 12 months, and among the estates that helped swell the province's coffers were the following: Cockburn estate, Brant, \$19,985.14; Wainock estate, Carleton, \$13,426.56; Scaten estate, Essex, \$45,087.71; Simpson estate, Frontenac, \$10,838.73; Simpson estate, Frontenac, \$3,227.34; Garner estate, Kent, \$7,143.07; Larkin estate, Lincoln, \$10,023.20; W. A. Duffell estate, Middlesex, \$30,907.70; W. A. Duffell estate, Middlesex, \$71,430.19; Crawford estate, Middlesex, \$2,250; Crawford estate, Durham; Ferguson estate, Oxford, \$1,000; Foran estate, \$3,000; Stuart estate, Dundas, \$24,117.17; M. K. Stuart estate, Dundas, \$22,841.37; Lovell estate, Welland, \$6,000; Innes estate, Wentworth, \$3,442.50; W. E. Sanford estate, Hamilton, \$40,000; Williams estate, Hamilton, \$10,000; M. E. MacFarlane estate, Toronto, \$8,000; Murray Northrup estate, \$4,612.58; Hugh Ryan estate, Toronto, \$10,000; C. M. Strong estate, Toronto, \$8,000; Homer Dixon estate, Toronto, \$4,466.24; W. E. H. Where the Money Goes. The following are the principal items of expenditure: For civil government, \$281,135.08; for education, \$131,238.33; for administration of justice, \$10,042.82; for public institutions, \$87,735.75; for tenancy, \$83,103.97; for immigration, \$4,825.00; for agriculture, \$2,000.00; for hospitals and charities, \$12,280.65; for repairs and maintenance, \$1,681.82; for locks, dams, etc., \$13,256.25; for colonization roads, \$158,801.88; for charges Crown lands, \$20,528.94; miscellaneous, \$254,738.88.

Comparison With Previous Year. In 1901 the cost of civil government exceeded the cost for the previous year by over \$25,000, but the cost of the administration of government, \$310,000, was considerably less. For education nearly \$24,000 more was paid than in 1900, and the cost of public institutions also close on to \$40,000 more. The accounts for agriculture show an increase of nearly \$2,000 for public buildings, \$194,607.98 was spent in 1901, as compared with \$163,621.10 in 1900, an increase of nearly \$30,000. For public works in 1900 only \$25,944.48 was spent, while last year that sum was expended by \$35,000 in round numbers. The charges on Crown lands show an increase of \$14,147.58. The miscellaneous account in 1900 stood at \$231,000 in round numbers, and in 1901 it was \$254,738.88.

During the year the Treasury Board reports for overdrafts of appropriations were \$1,550.49 and \$1,400.25, respectively, amounting to \$496.83. The greater part of this latter item was for repairs and maintenance of public buildings.

Estimates for Ensuing Year. The estimates for the year ending Dec. 31, 1902, total \$4,004,228.28, as among the various departments as follows: Civil government, \$285,040.00; Legislation, \$138,100.00; Administration of Justice, \$10,042.82; Education, \$131,238.33; Public institutions, \$87,735.75; Succession duty, \$300,581.96; Casual revenue, \$22,655.07; Hospitals and charities, \$12,280.65; Maintenance and repairs, \$1,681.82; Capital account, \$201,172.78; Colonization and mining, \$146,975.00; Charges on Crown lands, \$20,528.94; Refund account, \$22,668.62; Unforeseen and unprovided, \$60,000.00. Of the total sum to be voted \$3,553,180.22 is for current expenditure, and \$447,048.06 is on capital account, and \$14,400.00 for other purposes.
