SIR JAMES REPLIES TO ELECTRIC RING

In Letter to Economist, Says Government is Interested in Hydro-Electric Scheme Only as Agent of Municipalities in Securing Cheap Power.

WATERED STOCK EXPERTS AND GAMBLERS OPPOSED

Sir James Whitney has written the following letter to The London Economist, which appears in to-day's issue of that journal, in which he has previously agreed to answer the criticisms of his financial critics in The Statist on the power question.

The letter is introduced by The Economist in the following terms: "Respecting the electric power legislation of the Ontario Government, which has been criticized in certain quarters in England, the first minister of that province, has been good enough to furnish the subjoined statement for publication in The Economist. It is not intended as a reply to his critics—that will doubtless come later on—so much as a protest against what is regarded as their sensational and unfair methods."

SIR JAMES' LETTER.

"Interested persons have for some time been making attacks on the government of the Province of Ontario with a view to first, undermining the first minister, and second, destroying what is known as the power scheme of the government.

"As a matter of fact the government is not interested in the power scheme beyond being the agent for certain municipalities—a sort of trustee by which cheap electrical power is to be conveyed to them at their expense. The attack was made ostensibly in the interest of the Electrical Development Company, a company in which the bonds of which it was alleged had been lowered by the power scheme, but Mr. Wm. Mackenzie, who guaranteed the bonds of the Electrical Development Company, removing that cause of complaint, if cause there was. It may be well to state here that the power scheme is in emphatic language all connection with and responsibility for the attacks made upon the government in this matter.

"The attack has been directed against an act passed at the last session (1909) of our legislature, and which was re-enacted by a resolution in an act of the previous session (1908) passed at the request of fifteen municipalities and dealing with the same subject. Application has been made for the dissolution of the act.

Quotes From Indictment.

"For reasons which I shall give later on I do not propose to enter into explanations in detail, but in order to show the methods of these gentlemen I will refer to just one point in illustration, and quote from the indictment against Sir James Whitney, which I have mentioned. Their statement in The Statist says:

"It is also declared, in the case of one of the municipalities, that the municipality had refused to sign the amended contract, the contract should have as full force as if it were signed. Let us see what the indictment says in regard to this. We are making a travesty of what actually occurred, we reproduce herewith the clauses of the contract, as amended, as so varied as aforesaid, shall be treated and conclusively deemed to be executed by the said corporation of the Town of Galt."

The Facts.

Now, the facts are, and the truth is, that when the legislative assembly passed the act of 1908, as it did unanimously, it was understood by the members and made as clear as specific declarations in debate could make it, that its provisions did not require the submission to a vote of the ratepayers of the contracts entered into by such municipalities with the hydro-electric commission where bylaws authorizing such contracts had already been passed by the vote of the ratepayers of such municipalities. In other words, fifteen municipalities acted upon the original legislation, bylaws in each case were approved by voters of the ratepayers, the contracts in thirteen cases were approved and entered into by the municipalities, with the exception that the mayor of the Town of Galt refused to sign the contract after it had been passed by the municipal council of the town. Then a mandamus to compel him to sign the contract was applied for, but a judge held that under the act such contracts should be again submitted to a vote of the ratepayers. The twelve municipalities at once petitioned the government and the legislature to remedy the defect by legislation. Their request was complied with, and there was nothing strange, or unusual, or improper in the amending legislation, as all English financiers who deal in municipal securities know very well. These are the facts. Surely the SUPPRESSION OF THE TRUTH IS A FALSE and in the extract I have given from the attack made by The Statist are not necessary to a good case.

"I regret being compelled to say that the carefully drawn statements appearing in several English journals and containing the charges against me, and the material facts and figures, are misleading. I do not complain of this. Such conduct always brings its punishment. We shall put in our reply to the application for dissolution in due course, and in the meantime we regard the situation here with equanimity.

"At the same time we cannot suppress our astonishment that reputable financial and other journals in London should accept without question, and publish as true, allegations of the most serious character regarding the action of the legislature and of the government of a great province, and

OFFERS FOR ARENA SITE REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

Arena Company Puts in Figure in Excess of Reserve Bid of \$62,500.
Five offers to buy the Bloor-street property which has been abandoned as a site for Toronto's proposed Technical High School have now reached the board of education, and even the prospective buyers are willing to bid against each other and boost the price to the point of it being a profitable civic investment, it looks as if the school trustees are not disposed to sell.
Three offers to purchase came before the property committee yesterday, as was an amended offer from the Arena Company to pay a price considerably in advance of the reserve bid of \$62,500. Chairman Rawlinson advocated the rejection of these offers and the calling of new tenders, on account of the publicity that has been given the proposals, at the same time he announced that he had two very flattering offers in his pocket which were addressed to the board of education and therefore could not come before the committee as yet.
Mr. Pepper's offer.
Geo. Pepper's was the first communication read. He tendered for the property at the reserved bid, viz., \$62,500, on behalf of the Arena Company. Then came a letter of protest from St. H. Blake of behalf of the St. Paul's Anglican Church congregation, who purpose erecting a \$175,000 edifice just across the road, to accommodate 2000 people.
Next was a letter from Morins & Morine, representing Reuben Millichamp, who offered \$70,000 for the land with the understanding that the city or board of education might take it back within a year at the same price should they desire it for educational or playground purposes. Yet another offer came from S. H. Blake saying that St. Paul's parish would purchase the property and hold it in trust rather than see it sold to the arena people.
Another letter from the Arena Co. thru F. F. B. Johnston, K.C., offering to amend their offer by a considerable increase.
A sub-committee composed of Trustees Smith, Dineen, Simpson and Chairman Rawlinson was appointed to deal with the matter.
Bid Too Low.
A contractor who was awarded four big alteration and repair jobs on the schools wrote declining to go ahead with three of them because of errors in his figures. "This board has been too easy," declared Mr. Rawlinson when it was learned that hemlock would have been substituted for pine on the work if the building superintendent hadn't discovered the deception. "I think he should lose his deposit."
It was pointed out that the man hadn't as yet signed the contracts, so he was merely let out and new tenders will be called.
Fred Armstrong Co. was awarded the contract for steam fitting Jarvis-street Collegiate Institute at \$212. F.

SECOND RICH STRIKE

On the Foster Property Within the Last Two Weeks.

COBALT, Aug. 27.—Despatches received from Supt. MacDonnell, at Cobalt, on Thursday, announce the discovery of another rich vein on the Foster property of Argenta Mines, Limited. According to these advices the new ore body was uncovered 800 feet north of the last rich discovery, and is now being stripped. It is from two to three inches wide with native silver plainly visible.

This is the second rich strike made by Argenta Mines, Limited, on the Foster property within two weeks. The vein encountered two weeks ago runs about 6000 ounces to the ton, and has now been stripped for a distance of 100 feet, and a carload of high grade ore will be shipped to the smelter in about ten days.

As Argenta has a substantial treasury reserve, it is said to be the intention of the management to begin disbursements to stockholders in the early fall. Argenta has a moderate capitalization, and the dividend requirements even on a liberal scale are small in proportion to the majority of the Cobalt mines.

Bradstreet's Trade Review.

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say a good normal tone for this time of year continues to show forth in all lines of business there. Hot weather and holidays are keeping things a little quiet, although there has been a very satisfactory run of light sorting orders for some lines of popular summer wear. General fair goods continue to move forward, and from now until the close of navigation cargoes will be heavy. The tendency in dry goods prices generally is upward. Cottons hold very firm. THESSALON SMELTER ABOUT READY FOR ORE

Some Interesting Facts About the Rush of Prospectors Into Township of Otter.

The president of the Thessalon Board of Trade writes The World in appreciation of this journal's efforts to have a recording office located at that point and then proceeds to give the following information:

"The situation here does not show much change. During the past two weeks between one and two hundred prospectors have gone north from Thessalon into the Township of Otter, very few have yet returned and more are going in almost every day. Those who have returned have hurried to the smelter to record their claims.

"Prospectors state that the showing of calcite, galena and bloom are very prominent in several localities in the Township of Otter.

"I might say that considerable development work is going on in this section in copper properties and that one is looking very fair for copper. Possibly you are not aware that about \$50,000 has been spent in Thessalon in the erection of a plant to treat ore. The manager informs me that the ore is about ready to receive ore of a smelting quality or concentrates.

"In view of the development of the mines of mining in the locality adjacent to Thessalon, the town is now building an extensive system of sewers and cement walks.

"They have also built and own their own electric light and waterworks.

"The board of trade is obliged to you for your assistance in the matter of the recording office and the necessity for such an office in Thessalon is more marked each day."
