**NOTICE.**  
CUSTOM-HOUSE, SAINT JOHN, N.B.  
18th November, 1840.

WHEREAS Vessels trading between the Ports in the British Provinces and Islands in North America, have repeatedly arrived at some other of such Ports and Places without a clearance for the Goods on board, the Masters having neglected to obtain the same from the proper Officer of Customs at the Port of landing as required by Law; and

WHEREAS the Carriage brought in such Vessels are, in such cases, in consequence of such neglect, liable to be deemed of Foreign Production and charged with duty accordingly; and

WHEREAS such practice is calculated to inflict serious injury on the Revenue of the Colonies generally;—

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to the directions of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs, that in all cases after the expiration of six months from the date hereof, where any vessel is imported into any of the British Possessions in North America, without a clearance or other proper document for the same, such Goods shall be deemed of Foreign Production, and charged with duty accordingly.

**THE MECHANICS' INSTITUTE.**—We are informed that the new building of the institute will be opened on Monday, 7th December, and that the Directors have invited Dr. Gesner to deliver the opening Address, which we have no doubt will be well worthy of the gratifying occasion.—*Courier.*

**THE BOUNDARY.**—We learn that the Boundary Commissioners have finished their labours for the present season, having completed the survey of the due North line from the River to the Beaver Stream, on the Meis. From thence, the Commissioners proceeded on the St. Lawrence to River Ouelle, with the intention of proceeding up that River and examining the highlands at its sources. They started the last week in October for that purpose, but heavy and continued snow storms drove them back, and they were forced to relinquish their operations. Snow fell on the level to the depth of eight inches, but on the tops of the hills it was much deeper. From River Ouelle, the Commissioners proceeded to Quebec; from thence, Lieut. Broughton, R. E. one of the Commissioners, proceeded to New-York on his way to England. Mr. Featherstonhaugh, the younger, remains at Quebec for the present, making up the returns and completing the plans. It is said to be his intention during the winter to examine the highlands about the heads of the Chaudiere and the Connecticut, with a view to settling the best mode of commencing a survey of them next year.

**BARRETT AT WOODSTOCK.**—The Woodstock Times says that they hear nothing of the proposed Barrecks at that place, as there has been no offer of some information. The estimates were duly prepared last season by the Officers of Engineers, and sent to England, but unfortunately they were not forwarded to the Board for the year had been voted, and could not be altered. Lord John Russell, the Colonial Secretary, highly approved the estimates, and sent to England, and he has stated his intention of adding the required sum for their completion to the estimate for next year. The vote will not doubt pass at the next session of Parliament, and in the year 1841, our friends at the flourishing village of Woodstock, may expect some very handsome public buildings to spring up among them.

**MURPHY AT SEA.**—An inquest was held on Tuesday at Cork, on the body of a seaman named Murphy, a native of that city, who was shot to death by the captain of the barque *Tromador*, from St. John, on the 16th ult. just as the vessel made the land. The crew had been for some time previously in a state of insubordination, and the captain, arming himself with a brace of pistols, called upon the decked and others to take their places and do their duty. Deceased refused, and with menacing language advanced towards the captain, who immediately shot him in the shoulder, the ball glancing from the side into his breast, and striking the spot. The verdict was "Justifiable homicide."

Five of the crew of the *Tromador* are in custody in the brig of *Coxe*, and await the sitting of the bench of magistrates, to be tried on a charge of mutiny on board that vessel.—*Cork Constitution.*

**LATE GALE.**—We learn with sorrow that the gale of Tuesday, 13th inst., has done a great destruction of the fisheries property along the western seaboard. Between this port and Ketch Harbor the loss that has been suffered is estimated at £700 or £800. From the following memoranda of part of the losses we have been able to ascertain, it may be easily formed: at Ketch Harbour 50 nets, with a number of Stages and stage heads have been blown away; *Herring Cove* has lost 40 nets, *Wiggin's Cove* 25 nets, and *Portuguese Cove* 25 nets, and all the stages and stage heads; at *Wiggin's Cove* were lost 100 tons, on the south point of this cove, was washed from its bed, where it had lain for ages, and shattered into fragments.—*Halifax Recorder.*

**MIRAMICHI, Nov. 17.**—Many square-rigged vessels and small craft have been detained in the river by the weather, but the wind having veered stiff breeze from the westward, it is now blowing round during the night, and it is now blowing from the westward, and our wharves are quite deserted.—*Cleaner.*

French, 20 ships of the line, 10 frigates, and 90 light vessels; English, 16 ships, 4 frigates, and 20 other vessels; Russian, 10 ships, and 11 frigates, corvettes, and brigs; Austrian, 2 frigates and 6 other vessels; Egyptian, 17 ships and 40 other vessels; Turkish, 3 ships and 10 frigates, corvettes, and brigs; American, 1 ship, 1 frigate, and 1 corvette.—*Journal de Commerce.*

A gentleman of London is said to have made a contract for the exclusive navigation by steamers of the Amazon for 45 years, and is negotiating for a communication, by steam, between England and Brazil.

**INDIA RUBBER.**—This most remarkable article, which only a few years ago was sent to this country as ballast, now sells, in a fine state, as high as 10s. to 11s. per pound, when spun into thread. One firm spins as much India rubber thread every week, as would reach from London to Canton, the country it is imported from. There are twelve patents for this article, and these patents have cost more to defend in law than the amount paid for India rubber since the article has been known to us as of any value. Experiments are now making in England and France to apply this article to the cure of consumption.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDER.  
Much difficulty and inconvenience has been experienced by the Staff Adjutant in obtaining sufficient number of Arms for the purpose of Drill, from some of the militia battalions which were waiting for him during the present year, notwithstanding they had previously been supplied with the requisite quantity for that purpose.—The Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that Commanding Officers of every Battalion of Militia in the Province do, without delay, transmit to the Quarter Master General of the Militia Force, correct Returns of the number, state and condition of all the Arms in possession of their respective Corps, when, and from whom received, and also report, if any, and what measures may be adopted by them for their care and safety.

And as frequent applications are made to the expense of cleaning and taking charge of Arms, though it appears upon reference to the Inspection Returns that ample provision has been made for that purpose, but also for providing suitable places of deposit and security for the same, might legally be acquired in each Battalion, by collecting the Arms arising from willful absentees and Aliens;—

His Excellency has therefore directed me to impress upon Commanding Officers the importance and necessity of causing the collections of Arms from all Detachments to be reported in full, and might be applied to their legitimate object; and unless it be satisfactorily shown to His Excellency that these Arms have been ordered, he will not feel himself at liberty to authorize the issue of any further sum of money from the Provincial Fund for such services.
