RUTHLESS CAMPAIGN BY THE SUBMARINES

German Conservative Leader Would Hit Strike Semetimes at Rate of 32 a Quickly and Regardless of Everything in Hope of Ending War by Starving Out England

New York, Aug. 17.-A cable to the "Sun," from Berne, dated yesterda

Herr Von Heydebrand, Conservative leader in the German Reichstag, in a speech at Frankfort today spoke strongly for a resumption of the unrestricted submarine campaign regardless of the United States.

Speaking of the present hot controversy on the subject, he said the whole matter depended upon whether Germany was willing to accept war with the United States. He argued that all of Germany's enemies are held together against her by England, and that the only means of ending the war was by

This, he declared, could be done easily and quickly, by a ruthless submarine campaign against all kinds of vessels. It is understood here that the Conservatives are convinced they could starve the Allies out and end the war in this way before the United States could interiere. If victorious, Germany could disregard the United States.

London, Aug. 17—Today's official British statement says:—

"As a result of fighting undertaken yesterday evening in conjunction with a French advance on Maurepas, we have pushed forward our line both west and southwest of Guillemont. West of High Wood we captured some 300 yards of a hostile trench about 300 yards in advance of our previous line. East of Moquet Farm our machine gun fire nipped in the bud a German attack.

"West of Vimy we exploded a mine and occupied the crater with only slight opposition. Both we and the enemy blew up small mines south of Loos. causing us neither casualties nor damage."

Battering Down German Barriers

Says Whole Sectors Sometimes Allies Getting Frather Through Powerful Defensive System-No Immediate Advance on Trieste - Heavy Fighting in Balkans

Paris, Aug. 16 Operations on three parts of the Somme front yesterday, resulted in the removal of some of the barriers of the powerful German defensive system. A resumption of the methodical drive of the French troops, after the disappearance of these obstacles, is expected to bring further gains in the region of Guillemont and Maurepas.

In the actions resterday, the French attained an ascendancy over their adversaries during the lighting around the Guillemont-Maurepar road. The Germans still have a hold in the northwest part of Maurepas, but the French, by reason of their success in that vicinity, have a dominating position and, besides, are menacing the German communications.

All the reviews of the two years of war in Europe have brought out nothing more diverting than the official document issued from Berlin by the German Foreign Office. In explaining the predicament in which the Kaiser today finds himself, official German has found it expedient, since August, 1914, to invent new pretexts for exalting its righteousness of conduct.

There was a time not forgotten when Prussian militarism for years swaggered and blustered on the stage of Europe and from choice played the role of world bully. Austria's assault on Serbia gave it its long awaited opportunity. It was to avert "the Slav peril," that it plunged into war. It was to rescue western civilization from barabarism that it struck at France, ravished neutral Belgium and entered upon its glorious career of conqueror and champion of culture. By Providence it had been destined to dominate and impose its ideals upon other peoples.

In less self-complacent tone the German Foreign Office today pleads that the purpose of its enemies is to destroy Germany. That is its justification for war, that is its compelling reason for uniting itself with Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria and spreading ruin throughout every corner of Europe. It even appears that neutral nations must look to it as the mighty defender of their rights and rely upon it for victory if they are not to be despoiled of their commerce and denied the freedom of the seas.

TERRIFIC DRIVE BRITISH AND FRENCH

PRESS FORWARD AGAIN Allies Now Near Combles—Gen. Ruzsky Leads Russia's North-

ern Armies London, Aug. 16-Count de Salis has been appointed to succeed Sir Henry Howard as minister of the special mis-

The French and British, striking with terrific force in three directions on the Sonime front, have stormed nearly three miles of German

trenches, driving forward at points to a depth of 300 to 500 yards. The most important gains were made by the British and French troops striking north from the point where the Allies' lines meet, Maure-

troops striking north from the point
where the Allies' lines meet, Maurepas and Clery, two of the most important points held by the Germans
in this sector, have been flanked on
both sides, according to the official
statement issued by Paris. The road
has also been reached between Maurepas and Guillemont, the latter
town being the immediate objective
of the British. This advance, if
maintained, brings the Allies directly in front of the large railway town
of Combles.

South of the Somme the French
stormed German trenches over a
length of about three-fourths of a
mile, driving forward in a southeasterly direction from Belloy-en-Santerre. Paris reports that a considerable number of prisoners were
taken in these operations.

For the first time in many days no
important action is reported from
the Russian front, and the same
dearth of news prevails in regard to
the Italian operations. The most interesting item of news regarding the
Italian advance against Trieste is
contained in a news despatch from
Milan, which says that German
troops are to be employed in the
defence of the big Austrian port. If
corroborated this means that Italy
and Germany at last enter an active state of war.

The allied forces on Aug. 10 captured the railroad station at Doiran,
according to a French war office
statement dealing with the Balkan
front. In the fighting covering the
period from Aug. 1 to Aug. 15, dealt
with in the French official statement, the allied forces also, took four
other points on this front.

Petrograd, via London, Aug. 17—General Nicholas V. Ruzsky has been appointed commander-in-chief of the northern armies of Russia.

U. S.-CANADIAN TREATY

U. S.-CANADIAN TREATY FOR PROTECTION OF SMALL BIRDS ON BORDER.

Washington, Aug. 16—A treaty between Great Britain and the United States for protection of insects-destroying birds on both sides of the Canadian border was signed at the state department today by Secretary of State Lansing and Ambassador Spring-Rice. The treaty is very broad and covers practically all kinds of bird life. Its administration will be left to local authorities. So far as is known this is the first treaty of its kind ever signed.
