TORONTO, Ont., April 19-The Durant Motor Car Company of Canada will reopen its Toronto plant tomorrow for the purpose of liquidation of stock. Officials of the parent organization in the United States were here today for conference with local officials to decide the future policy of the Canadian factory. The Dodge Motor Car Company of Canada plant remained closed today and the time of its re-opening is uncertain.

At the Willys-Overland plant the manufacture of Willys cars was today discontinued, this making necessary a reduction of about 100 in the number of workmen employed:

ONLY TEMPORARY MEASURE.

Resumption or possible resumption of operation at these plants and at the General Motors plant at Osbawa is at present a temporary measure, it is announced, as it most cases company officials have not yet been able to decide on a definite and permanent policy following the reductions of duties on imported cars.
