

RIFFS HOLD UP PEACE PLANS IN MOROCCO PARLEY

Ban 7 Kilometre Advance As Safety Measure

GET THREE DAYS

Native Envoys Allowed To Return To Talk Terms With Chiefs

ODJIDA, Morocco, April 19.—Whether there shall be peace or a continuation of the warfare in Morocco will be decided within the next three days. The first meeting of the Franco-Spanish and Rifian delegates in preliminary negotiations to settle upon the terms for an armistice was held yesterday at Camp Bertozos, but ended in complete disagreement. The three members of the Rifian delegation—all standing well above six feet, dressed in white flowing robes and wearing white turbans—declined to permit the French and Spanish troops to advance seven kilometres along the front as a military guarantee of good faith, and also objected to the Franco-Spanish proposal for the exchange of prisoners.

GIVEN THREE DAYS.

After a long discussion under a temperature of 80 degrees in the shade, the Rifians were given three days in which they might definitely accept or reject the terms offered. They were permitted to return to the Rif region by aeroplane to consult with their respective leaders. Meanwhile the proposed conference which was to have opened here today has been postponed without date. The optimism of the believers that the moment is temporary, the pessimists already hear the crack of rifles along the Lower Atlas Range and in the Ouergata Valley. Abd-el-Krim, whom both France and Spain refused formally to recognize as a belligerent or peace negotiator, holds the fate of Morocco in his hand. Upon his decision to accept or reject the terms of the French and Spanish taken to him by his delegates hinges war or peace. In addition to the refusal of the delegates to accept the military guarantees, entailing an advance of French troops into Rif territory and some formalities concerning the exchange of prisoners, it is learned from authoritative sources that there was still another fundamental point objected to. This was Spain's alleged demand that Abd-el-Krim not alone be forced to depart from the Rif but that he be not permitted to reside in any Moslem country. French official sources neither confirm nor deny this. All they admit is that the negotiations have been broken off for three days.

Bandits Get \$12,000 In Portland Holdup

PORTLAND, Ore., April 18.—Five desperadoes armed with rifles and automatic pistols, held up the Portland Electric Power Company's money transfer truck here yesterday, and escaped with more than six hundred pounds of cash and currency to a total value of \$12,000. Scores of citizens witnessed the hold-up, and the disarming of the guard and driver of the truck, but all were cowed by the armed bandits, and none offered to interfere.

FAMILY DROWNED IN ALBERTA FLOOD

Man, Wife and Four Children Caught as Ice Dam Breaks

WHITE COURT, Alta., April 19.—With the breaking of the huge ice dam and the rapid lowering of the Athabasca River flood waters here on Saturday, Alberta provincial police and other searchers came upon the bodies of Chris Brestlin, his wife and four children. The bodies were found about 800 yards from the Brestlin home and within a few yards of the spot where they were last seen alive when their wagon capsized in the raging Athabasca River flood torrent about seven miles east of here. The bodies were but a short distance apart. The parents evidently made a desperate effort to hold the family together in the last struggle when the wagon box floated off the running gears, and upset on a wire fence. The oldest child was nine years of age.

Leger, of Humphrey's Mills, was held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the church of St. Louis, Lewisville, where service was conducted by Rev. Father D. P. Leger. Following the service the cortege proceeded to the Roman Catholic cemetery, Shediac road, where interment was made. The late Mrs. Leger passed away at her home Friday evening after an illness of about ten days. She was 71 years of age and is survived by her husband, four sons—Charles, Rufus and John Marshall all of Boston, and a sister, Mrs. Al Woodard, Redville, Mass.

\$3,400,000 In Silks Travel Across Land

SARNIA, Ont., April 19.—Silks valued at \$3,400,000 were contained in a silk train which left here Saturday for New York and other Eastern States points. A record run to the border at Bridgeburg was made in four hours and 13 minutes. The silks are from the Orient and came via United States Pacific ports. The train was the fourth to come through Sarnia in two months.

SUBSIDIES REDUCED

The birds were pretty well lit most of the time for the past few weeks, boys having found some lying on the ground completely paralyzed from their hooch imbibing.

British Railwaymen's Secretary Advises Against Talk of Early Strike

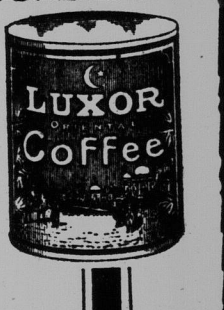
LONDON, April 19.—Speaking at Newport about the present dispute between the miners and the mine owners over wages and hours of work, A. J. Cook, general secretary of the Miners' Federation, said that war had been declared against the miners who never yet had had the opportunity of hearing from their employers the terms of peace. He warned the government that there was a new mentality in the police, army, navy and air force. J. H. Thomas, M. P., general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, speaking in Monmouthshire, said that to talk at this stage as if in a few days all the workers in the country would be called out on strike, was not only letting loose passions that might be difficult to control, but was not rendering the best service that was inevitable, everyone should concentrate on finding an honorable and satisfactory solution.

But the important thing for her is to marry the right man, and not to make a mistake in her choice of a husband. This is a difficult thing to do, because our idiotic conventions do not permit a woman to seek her mate openly, and to pick out frankly the man she wants. She has only a veto power in courtship, and this is often forced to take the man who is her opportunity instead of the one who is her preference.

Such being the case, a girl is perforce bound to take more matrimonial risk than a man does. It is, therefore, of the utmost moment that she should put on her far-seeing spectacles, and get a firm grasp on her rabbit's foot when she gives the once-over to the men who lie before her as she sits on the anxious seat.

AND as, unfortunately, a maiden generally has to make her choice of a husband while she is so young and unsophisticated that she cannot distinguish between a wolf in tailor-made sheep's clothing and a perfect lamb, I venture to warn her against some of the dangerous men she is pretty sure to encounter.

Perhaps the most Dangerous Man a girl ever meets is her first sweetheart. He is generally a youth as innocent and artless as she is, but he is a far greater menace to her well-being than any double-dyed villain that she runs across in later years.

FOR at 16 or 17, when the first beau generally appears, a young girl is just dishing over with romance, and ready to pull it over anything in trousers that comes her way. She is dying to love and be loved, and to exercise that mysterious fascination which novels and movies have taught her that women have over men.

She has had no experience with the opposite sex. So she mistakes gratified vanity for a deathless passion when a boy pays attention to her, and childish pique when he doesn't, for the heroic thrills and chills of the Grand Passion. And, unless her Guardian Angel performs a miracle and saves her, she is apt to marry her first sweetheart and be miserable ever after.

FOR ninety-nine women in a hundred outgrow their first sweethearts just as they do their liking for goosy candy and over-sweet chocolate sodas, and there are no more miserable wives in the world than those who look across the table at their husbands who bore them to tears, and wonder what on earth they ever saw in them that made them think they wanted him.

Next in the list of dangerous men I place married men. EVERY girl is a lineal descendant of Mother Eve, and inherited her yearning for forbidden fruit. The mere fact that a man is married, that he belongs to another woman, that he ought to be unattainable and taboo to her, casts a halo of romance about him, and makes him far more desirable to many women than he would be if he were single. Also, the fact that she jeopardizes her reputation and her own chances of happiness in having an affair with him presents an attraction to her that many women cannot resist.

Yet the girl who dandles with the married serpent finds that history repeats itself, and that she shares the fate of her greatest grandmother, and has to pay the price of her apple-eating. If she induces the man to divorce his wife and marry her, she knows every pang of futile jealousy that can wring a human heart, and the dreary, hopeless waiting that wears out body and soul.

THE married man is an especially dangerous man to working girls, and when one finds herself beginning to notice what her boss has on, and whether he has had his hair cut or not, and to get a thrill and a kick out of the sound of his buzzer as he summons her to his desk, the time has come for her to pack up her notebook and her pencil and flee, and get a job with a boy-windowed, bald-headed gentleman with the manners of a sore-headed bear.

Third among dangerous men I should place the lame ducks. GOODNESS knows why, for it seems that any girl who has sense enough to be let out without a keeper, should be safe from these, but, alas, such is not the case. God in His wisdom saw fit to give women more heart than head, and to supply them with a greater amount of sympathy than judgment. Also he endowed them with an unquenchable spirit for reforming things.

All of this causes the derelict to make an irresistible appeal to the feminine sex. The mere fact that a man is a weakling who cannot stand alone makes a woman want to mother him, and take care of him and pet him and fuss over him, and the less of a man a man is, the more sure she is to tie herself to some lady's apron strings.

OF COURSE, when Mary marries John, who is a ne'er-do-well, it is not only because she is sorry for him, but because she deludes herself into believing that all he needs is her influence to turn him into a go-getter. When Kate fishes Tom out of the gutter, and hikes with him to the altar she is convinced that she is an infallible cure for drunkenness. And when Sally takes a wild and profligate son for a husband, she is sure that he will settle down with her and go to work, and never look at another woman again.

But, unfortunately, there is no magic in the words that a priest or a preacher mumbles over a couple which changes the character of a man. The lay and the shiftless remain lay and shiftless, and let their wives support them. The drunkard continues to drink, and drags his wife down with him. The pleasure-loving man still follows his desires. For if a man will not act a man's part in the world for the sake of his own manhood, he will not do it for any woman.

UNDOUBTEDLY, the lame ducks are often very attractive. They are often beautiful and have winning ways, and they appeal to all that is best and noblest in a woman's nature. Just because they are so helpless, she wants to take them in her arms and protect and care for them, but they make the sort of household pets that enslave a woman and break her heart, and wear her down to skin and bones.

And so when she sees one of these attractive creatures come limping up, or dragging a half-broken wing to her doorstep, if she is wise she will shoo the bird away, and go in and bar the door and pull down the blinds.

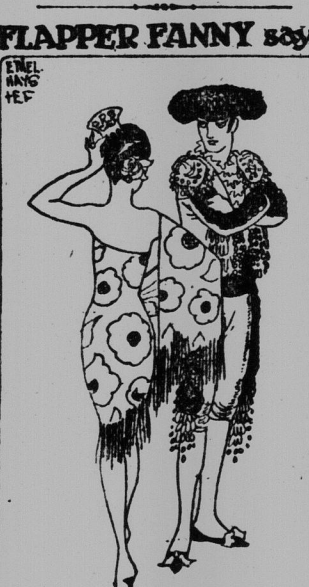

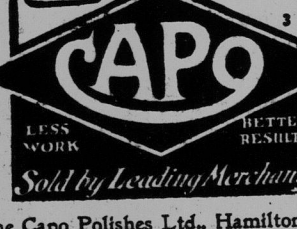

NEWARK WOMAN THINKS KILLING WAS ACCIDENTAL

Asks New Jersey Governor To Send Life Prisoner To Her
TRAGEDY TOOK PLACE OVER 8 YEARS AGO
Believes Killer Has Suffered Enough; Case Is To Be Considered

NEW YORK, April 16—Portia's famous dictate—"the quality of mercy is not strained"—was never heard by Mrs. Sophie Niemiec, of 122 Springfield Avenue, Newark, for she is a poor immigrant and a widow of little education. Perhaps, back in her native Poland, a priest may have repeated to her that much older precept, "Blessed are the merciful," but that also is uncertain.

However that may be, Mrs. Sophie Niemiec is living what Portia spoke. She petitioned Governor A. Harry Moore to release from life imprisonment the convicted murderer of her only son and offered, if he so desired, to take him into her home in place of the boy he killed.

Boleslaw Dumbeck, 24 years old, is the man whom the courts convicted of murdering 15-year-old John Niemiec while hunting on the New Jersey meadows more than eight years ago.

WAS SON'S PAL

Now Mrs. Niemiec, a widow and alone in the world since the only child's death, has written to the governor pleading for clemency for the slayer of her son. "He was my son's pal and I think he has suffered enough the last seven years," the petition reads. It has been sent to the Court of Pardons, as well as to Governor Moore. POTATO SHIPMENTS HAVE FALLEN OFF IN AROOSTOOK CO.

Growers Not Disturbed by Buyers' Strike or Consumers' Boycott
SEE PRICE NORMAL TO SUPPLY, DEMAND

Planters Now Concerned About 1926 Crop; Experts Say Same Acreage

BANGOR, Me., April 17—There was but little stirring in the Aroostook potato market today with a light demand and few offerings, the price to growers were from \$8.50 to \$8.60 and shipments dropped to about 75 cars. Aroostook people are not at all disturbed by reports of a "Buyers' Strike" or boycott of potatoes by the Massachusetts housewives but think any conservation is a wise move probably never before in history was there such a small supply of potatoes left in Aroostook County at this time of the year. There is estimated to be 3,000 carloads scattered all over the big county and not many in a place, or

owned by any one man or concern. Potatoes have been flowing to market since October at the rate of 150 carloads or more a day and the shipments for the past week have been around 100 carloads a day so that the supply cannot last long. This is made up of all grades including besides the high grade table stock upon which the market price is based. The small ones or No. 2 stock and the culls which include the extra large ones and bruised which bring considerably less. If the retailers mix the several grades, it is said to be the case, that is a matter for the consumer to look after. The price here is not considered excessive considering the supply and demand and the ten dollar figure was touched only for two days when the market got excited. The sales were not large at those figures. The ruling price has since been around \$8.50 to \$9.00 paid to growers at shipping points for their mountain number ones, and as low as \$7.00 to \$7.50 for lower grades.

CONSIDER 1926 CROP

The Aroostook farmer is now more concerned with the 1926 crop and is debating whether to sell part of his stock he is holding for his own seed at the prevailing good price, or to take the risk of low prices when fall. Experts on the situation believe that the aggregate acreage will be about normal.

BREAKING EVEN

Reports of the farmers of Aroostook rolling in wealth are discounted to a considerable extent. Many have not much more than recouped their losses of four bad years. Then there were some who sold their potatoes at digging time for \$1.50 or \$2.00 a barrel. The great bulk of the crop sold around \$5.50 to 6.00 a barrel for number ones.

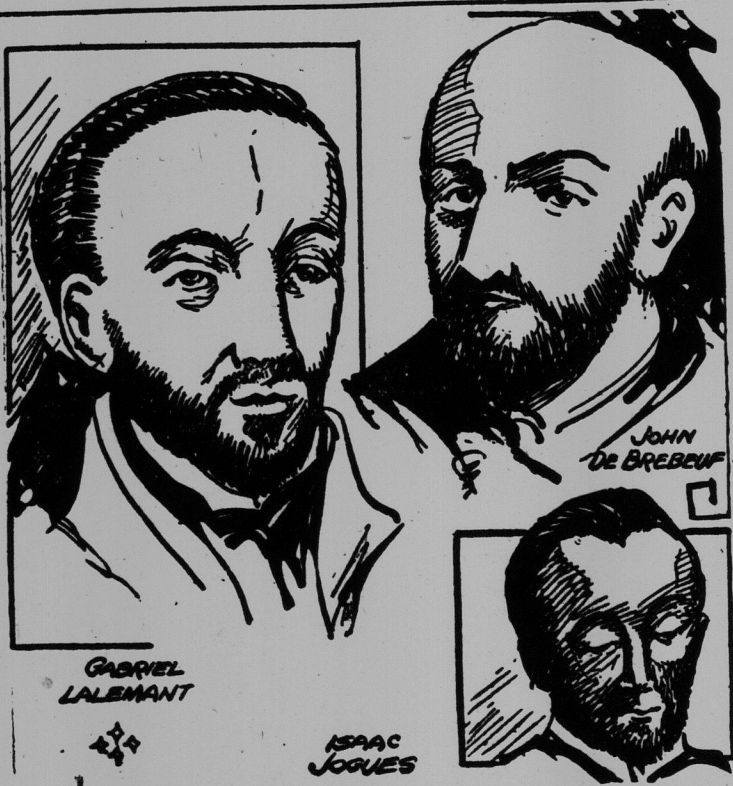
Moss Heads Party Which Will End Canadian Trip at Saint John

ARCTIC IS THROUGH WITH THE ICEFIELDS

Northwest Territories Dept. to Secure Newer and Faster Vessel

OTTAWA, April 17.—The Canadian Government steamship Arctic, famous in Canada for its annual voyages into northern waters, will not push up into the icefields again.

The Northwest Territories Department have found it necessary to secure a newer and faster vessel for the expedition this year. The sealer Beothic, of the Job Sealing Company, of St. John's, Newfoundland, has been chartered by the government for the 1926 voyage. The Beothic is a reconditioned sealing vessel of 2,600 tons, with a speed of ten knots. She has just returned from northern waters with a record catch of seal of 46,000 skins.

SECURE BEOTHIC

Officials of the Northwest Territories Department were anxious, if possible, to put their own officers and crew on the Beothic, but the only terms on which the vessel could be secured were that the present crew should be maintained. The present captain of the vessel is a former master of a Hudson's Bay Company ship and is quite satisfactory to the department. A navigating officer of the department will be included in the personnel of the ship.

This year the expedition will be commanded by George F. Mackenzie, director of exploration and development. There will be a departure from other years in that two geologists will go north and will stay in the Arctic for the winter of 1926-27. Ten mounted police officers and constables will also be on the Beothic to relieve the men who have been at northern posts for one or two years.

The party will leave this year from North Sydney, Cape Breton, instead of Quebec City. The departure will be during the first ten days of July.

FLOWERS VS. WALKER

NEW YORK, April 17.—The State Athletic Commission has refused to sanction the match between Tiger Flowers, negro holder of the middleweight boxing title, and Mickey Walker, welterweight champion, planned by Tex Rickard for the Yankee Stadium in June.

The commission based its motion on the ground that Harry Greb, former middleweight king, has prior claim to a title match with Walker going out of his class again, although the writer title holder was permitted to box Greb last summer, when the latter held the middleweight throne.

PEACE OR WAR AT BRITISH COAL MINES STILL IN BALANCE

Events of Coming Fortnight Will Decide Issue Now Deadlocked

WORKERS REFUSE TO ACCEPT PAY CUT

Strike or Lockout Appears Inevitable if Both Sides Fail to Agree

LONDON, April 18—Events in the coming fortnight will decide whether there should be peace or war in the British coal industry.

The position, although less serious, has much similarity with the position last July when another crisis was threatened and was only averted by the government providing a state subsidy to enable the mine owners to pay wages which the miners claimed were not justified by the economic condition of the industry.

This subsidy which cost the country some £20,000,000 will come to an end April 30 and the mine owners are already posting notices terminating the existing wage agreement on May 1. They are also preparing schedules of new wage scales for the men's acceptance, but there is no sign as yet of the reduction they propose. The

COMMISSION'S PROBE

When granting the subsidy last year the government appointed a royal commission to investigate the whole coal problem and endeavor to find a solution. This commission made a number of recommendations for reorganizing the industry and increasing its efficiency. The recommendations include purchase by the state of mining royalties, promotion of amalgamations of mines, the granting of powers to local authorities to engage in the retail sale of coal and many other measures. The commission also favored some reduction in wages but advocated the institution of family allowances.

recommendations into legislative effect, provided both the mine owners and miners agree to accept them. The commission's report has been accepted by the government and the owners, but the miners, although acquiescing in its main recommendations so far as proposals for a re-organization of the industry are concerned, take exception to the owners' interpretation of its wage clauses.

KILLED BY DERRICK

N. S. Man Dies When Skull is Fractured at Work on P. Q. Mill

THREE RIVERS, Que., April 19.—Sam McLean, 44, working on the new mill of the Wayamack News, Limited, of this city was instantly killed, when he was hit by a derrick on Saturday. Death was caused by a fracture of the skull and of the spine. Mr. McLean was originally from River Philip, N. S., and had come to this city early last fall. Another man was hurled about 15 feet in the air and fell heavily to the ground. He suffered from shock.

Mexican Conditions Compared With Que.

THREE RIVERS, Que., April 19.—"Persecution in Mexico is closing churches, convents, and schools and forcing away priests and nuns, although Catholics represent nine-tenths of the population. This is something to wonder at. But why should we Catholics of this province wonder? Are we not more than nine-tenths of the population and did we not allow foreigners to force upon us the obligation of working on Sundays?" said Canon Boulay, at the Cathedral of this city, yesterday, in the course of a denunciation of Sunday labor at the local pulp mills.

Will Probe Film Boycott in Quebec

MONTREAL, April 19.—Will H. Hays United States motion picture head, will shortly visit Montreal to try to arrive at an agreement with the Quebec board of censors involving a changed standard of censorship. The Motion Picture Producers of America have refused to present to make further contracts in this province, owing, they claim, to too drastic cutting of their films.

Ontario General Election Due In June

TORONTO, Ont., April 19.—The Toronto Star says: In circles close to the government, the date of the provincial general election is figured to fall on Monday, June 28, or Wednesday, June 30. Decision is expected to be made next week, though dissolution of the legislature may not be announced until the following week.

GOVERNOR SUFFERS

Baron Byng Unable to Walk on Account of Foot Infection

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., April 19.—Suffering from a slight infection in one of his feet, Baron Byng, Governor General of Canada, was unable to leave his train on arrival here today. The condition is not serious, but he is unable to walk. Baron Byng will continue his western tour, but the visit to Winnipeg has been postponed indefinitely.

CURB RUM RUNNERS

Britain Plans to Assist U. S. in Tightening Control Over Smugglers

LONDON, April 19.—The British government has a plan for assisting the United States to tighten its control over rum runners. The plan does not go as far as a new treaty, but according to official circles will take the form of permission for U. completed with the opening days of next week devoted to passage of other bills including that relating to direct taxation. About ten days is required, it is believed, to complete the business of the House and Friday, April 30, is generally looked on as the day of prorogation.

SHORT DEBATE LIKELY.

The Grand Falls procedure has been fairly well placed before the members already and the debate is not expected to be lengthy. That there will be a division on the bills seems undoubted in view of the stand taken by the Opposition leader, Hon. Dr. P. J. Veniot, and all of his followers against development by a private company. The two main speeches will be made by Premier Baxter and Hon. Dr. Veniot, and just who else will participate is not yet decided. To a man, the government members will support the government's program in this regard, believing this is the proper solution of this problem and having the utmost confidence in the Premier's direction on this important matter. It is rather a coincidence that on the exact night seven months after the Baxter government assumed power, an agreement relative to the Grand Falls development finally was reached.

HIGH SPOTS OF WEEK.

The week just ended in some respects was an important one, the highlights being the final conferences between representatives of the Provincial Government, the International Paper & Paper Co. Ltd. and Fraser, Ltd., relative to Grand Falls and the successful conclusion reached; consideration of estimates of which about half of the total has been voted; and the investigation under oath undertaken by the public accounts committee with respect to the Lancaster paving muddle.

In this latter case, while the sub-committee has not reported its findings yet, there is a pretty definite commitment by the province for the retaining wall work, a 24-foot strip throughout, and the widening, as contained in letters, although no formal contract event has entered into. The difference appears to hinge on a misunderstanding between Hon. Dr. Veniot, then Minister of Public Works, and John T. O'Brien, former chairman of the Lancaster Highway Board, with respect to the term "widening." Mr. O'Brien told the committee he understood this meant the entire cost, including paving the widened section, but Hon. Dr. Veniot says differently and that it did not include paving of the entire strip. The work has run into a cost now of \$300,000, according to evidence given.

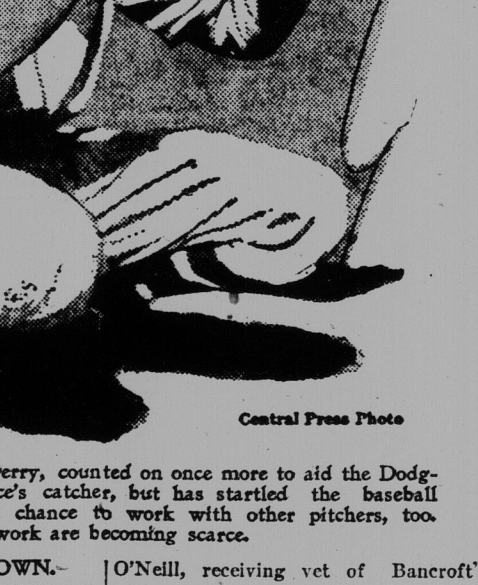
