BURTON WIDOW ASKS DOWER OF

Sues for One-sixth of Equity in \$10,000,000 Lord & Taylor Property — Cut Off in Husband's Will.

New York, May 29—Another legal move in the contest over the estate of Frank V. Burton, millionaire merchant and real estate owner, has been started here by his second wife, who claims a dower interest in the property occupied by the Lord & Taylor department store in Fifth avenue, between Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth streets. She states in her complaint that the property is worth about \$10,000,000, and that her share, one-sixth of the equity, is \$10,000,000. She asks that sufficient of the property be sold to satisfy this claim, and that the proceeds either be invested or turned over to her in a lump sum.

The basis of her claim is the allega-

The basis of her claim is the allegation that about six months after their marriage in 1919, her husband, without her consent or knowledge, executed a marriage in 1919, her husband, without her consent or knowledge, executed a deed transferring his half-interest in the Lord & Taylor property to his children by a former marriage, who are named as defendants in the action. According to her complaint, this deed was executed on March 23, 1920, but was not recorded until Oct. 10, 1921. She says that she did not learn of the transfer until after the death of her husband last March. Mrs. Clara Louise Burton has another suit pending in the Surrogate's Court in Orange County, in which she contests the will leaving an estate of about \$1,300,000 to the five children by Mr. Burton's first, marriage. The second Mrs. Burton was cut off in the will without a cent.

Rev. Dr. J. G. Shearer, of Toronto, general secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada, delivered two striking sermons in the city churches yesterday. He spoke in the morning at the Germain street Baptist church and in the evening at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church. The text of his evening sermon was Matthew 6-10: "Thy kingdom come." He spoke of the social significance of the model prayer and said that the Master did not ask His people to pray for the impossible and if the coming of God's kingdom on earth were possible, prayer could only be sincere if the petitioner did all in his power to accomplish what he prayed for. He then mentioned some of the things the coming of God's kingdom on earth implied. In the social world it implied no profit-cering, no bantering on the vices of others and the giving of the child its right place. In the political world it implied an abandonment of the belief that politics were the greatest game on earth science of social welfare. He said women were in politics now and they counted. Women and children would have a new opportunity. In the industrial world the coming of God's kingdom implied the making of love and service the basis of all dealings. 



EMINENT WRITER WELCOMED HERE

Rev. Dr. C. W. Gordon, Moderator of Presbyterian General Assembly, Preaches in Local Churches.

The city is extending a hearty welsome to Rev. Charles W. Gordon, moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada and widely known as "Ralph Connor," the aminent writer. And for the leadership, the ministers were men of God, courageous and gifted with organizing and preaching ability to a marked degree. He had met with

In his closing appeal Dr. Gordon spoke of conditions in the homes where young girls were growing up, of conditions in the lives, the business and the sport of men which influenced boys. There was a job, he said, for the church to see that the girls did not grow up amid thorns but were as the myrtle tree, and that the boys were not caught in the briars but grew up straight and tall for Canada like the clear strong pines. "Who wouldn't be a preacher of the gospel," he asked with pride. "We have a great faith and a wonderful God."





MINIMUM WAGES SET FOR ONTARIO

List of Varying Scales is Proposed for Textile Indus-

Toronto, May 29—Following is a summary of proposed orders respecting female workers in textile factories, as announced by the Minimum Wage Board of which Dr. J. W. Macmillan is chairman. These orders, the board states, are the same as those now in force for a number of other factory trades:

Toronto—Experienced adults over eighteen years of age, \$12.50 per week; inexperienced adults, over eighteen, six months at \$10 and six months at \$11; young girls, under eighteen, six months at \$8, six months at \$9 and six months at \$10.

Other cities over 30,000 population—

other cities over 30,000 population— Experienced adults, over eighteen, \$11.50 inexperienced adults, over eighteen, six months at \$9.50 and six months at \$10.50 young girls, under eighteen, six months at \$8; six months at \$9, and six months

at \$10.

Cities and towns between 5,000 and 80,000 population — Experienced adults over eighteen, \$11; inexperienced adults over eighteen, six months at \$9 and six months at \$10; young girls, under eighteen, six months at \$10.

All the rest of the province — Experienced adults, over eighteen, six months at \$10; inexperienced adults, over eighteen, six months at \$8 and six months at \$9; young girls, under eighteen, six months at \$6; six months at \$7.50, and six months at \$9.

These rates do not affect office workers. For piece-workers, it is sufficient if 80 per cent. receive the minimum; and the wages may be averaged over a per-At least half the workers in any fac-tory must be experienced adults, the re-

American Union.

HISTORIC DUNKIRK

Washington, May 29-(By Canadian Press)—While a great deal is being said unofficially with respect to an invitation re-to Canada to participate in the forthcoming conference of the Pan-American Union at Santiago, there are difficulties in the way of such an invitation, according to high authority here, which may preclude it. So far as the United States is concerned, there is no question it would be glad to see Canada represented at the conference, in fact, in the Pan-American Union itself.

The constitution of the organization, however, limits the membership to the republics of the New World. This has been true since the beginning of the organization. Under this constitution, the officials doubt their authority to extend invitations to countries other than republics.

Moreover if Canada is concluded there Press)—While a great deal is being said

Moreover, if Canada is concluded, there will arise the delicate question of what to do about some other countries, such as British Guinana, French Guiana and Dutch Guiana. Exactly where to stop if the policy of including republics only in the invitations is abandoned is difficult

Another phase of the matter is that there is some delicacy felt by the Pan-American Union about inviting Canada unless it is done through Great Britain. And here comes up the question as to how the British government would view the association of one of its great dominions with an organization of respective.

In past years, it is learned, the question of inclusion of Canada in the Pan-American Union has been much discussed unofficially by influential men in the organization and outside of it. Officially, however, it never got anywhere for the reasons already indicated. In view of the growing importance of Canadian trade with Latin America and with the United States, it has to be admitted that the reason for including Canada are stronger now than many years ada are stronger now than many years ago, when the union was formed. BAN RUBY LIPS FOR

Painted Cheeks and Eyebrows Barred-Moderation With Powder Puff Required -Curl-paper Legislation.

Bedford, N. Y., May 29 — A set of seventeen new rules just issued by Superintendent Amos T. Baker of the State Reformatory for Women forbids the inmates to use the rouge pot, lip stick and eyebrow pencil; calls for moderation with the powder puff, and prescribes the length of skirts, the way to wear stockings and garters and how not wear them, and imposes restrictions in gossip and the use of curl papers. The rules were approved by the board of management.

rules were approved by the board of management.

According to the girls, Rule 17 is the most devastating. It reads:—

"The practice of reddening the lips and cheeks, blackening the eyebrows and eyelashes and of using excessive quantities of powder or other white material on the face is prohibited."

Other rules are as follows:—

"4. No girl will be permitted to change the pattern of her dress in any way. * * * Waist fronts are not to be rolled back and are always to be worn in a modest manner. Dress skirts are to be worn not more than twelve inches from the ground.

"5. Khaki suits with bloomers are to be worn only when inmates are engaged to b

"5. Khaki suits with bloomers are to be worn only when inmates are engaged in specified rough work. They are not to be worn at school, during recreation time, at singing classes or at any time except as noted above.

"6. No girl is permitted to come to her meals with her hair in curl papers, or wearing a boudoir cap. Nor is any girl to leave her cottage with her hair in curl papers or wearing a boudoir cap. in curl papers or wearing a boudoir cap.

"7. Girls must not wear their stockings rolled below their knees and must ings rolled below their knees and must not display fancy or other garters. When khaki suits are worn they are to cover the knees, and stockings are always to be above the knees.

"9. At no time are girls to talk to or from cettage or school windows to the core."

On March 23 the jewelry store of Samuel Savin, 36 Bast Sixth street, Cincinnati, was held up by five men, the leader of whom, the police charge, was Haberman. While the proprietor and five clerks were held in a rear room, the robbers rifled two safes. Subsequently two men alleged to have participated in the hold-up were arrested. A reward of \$2,500 was offered for Haberman's arrest.


