Government Merchant Marine, tied up in idleness in the vicinity of Montreal, rapidly deteriorating, the only explanation offered as far as I know is that their large, heavy engines, boilers and machinery are placed in the centre of the vessels, which with necessary fuel accommodation leaves little or no room

the vessels, which with necessary fuel accommodation leaves little or no room for cargo.

Irrespective of what may be the correct reason for this idleness, I suggest turning them into coal barges (however degrading that might seem); that their boilers, engines and machinery be removed, which would lighten their draft from four to six feet, and the non-requirement of power fuel would lighten their draft a couple of feet more, so they would carry a 2,000-ton cargo of coal from Nova Scotia to Hamilton and all other Ontario and Quebec ports; and a steamer flagship would tow half a dozen of these, and transport this coal for \$1.50 per ton at most, and I believe eventually for \$1.

Whether the Government convert the idle marine or not, it certainly seems to me their duty, in the interests of Canada, to immediately inaugurate a lake-carrying fleet of coal barges for Nova Scotia and Alberta coal now that the Nova Scotia coal has proven so excellent for coking, and I believe Alberta coal is just as good.





Commissioner Frink asked the Mayor if he would communicate with the Attorney-General and ask if it was the intention to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada from the finding of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in the C. P. R. bridge case matter, as he wanted to make some arrangements for the completion of Douglas avenue if no appeal was intended.

His Worship said he would take the matter up.

On motion of Commissioner Frink, he was given authority to call for tenders for 350 tons of asphalt for use in the public works department.

In answer to the Mayor, the commissioner said it was proposed to pave St. James street, from Reed's Point to Wentworth street; Paradise Row, Winter street, and King street, West, from Market Place to Union street, these to be paid for by bond issue; and from appropriation, Princess street to Wentworth street, and Duke street from Sydney to Carmarthen street.

On motion of Commissioner Thornton the leases for stalls and stands in the city market were renewed to the present tenants for the same rentals, for one year from May 1.


