THE EIGHTH SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened The Conference prayer-meeting, on Thursday, June 4th, at 2 p.m. conducted by the President, Rev. Wm. Burns, from two to three o'clock, was a season of rich blessing, marked by the presence of God.

At 3 o'clock the President announced the 387th hymn; the Scripture lesson, the 103rd Psalm, was read by the Secretary, Rev. W. R. Young, B.A., and the Rev. E. I. BADGLEY, LL.D., led in prayer.

The Conference roll was called, and 151 ministers and 85 laymen answered to their names.

The Rev. OSBORNE R. LAMBLY, M.A., was elected President.

The Rev. Charles W. Watch was elected Secretary.

On motion, the hours of sessions were fixed—9 to 12 noon; 2 to 5.30 p.m.

OBITUARIES.

REV. WILLIAM YOUNG.

William Young was born in the township of Murray, Province of Ontario, in the year 1808. He belonged to one of the early families who immigrated to this country when the greater part of it was an unexplored wilderness; where the early Methodist preacher, on his long pioneer journeys, always found a cordial welcome and a comfortable home, though none of the family were at this time professing Christians. He was soundly converted to God at the age of eighteen in a watch-night meeting at Carryingplace, and identified himself with the Methodist Church, commencing at once to work for the salvation of souls, and in a short time had the joy of seeing nearly all the members of his father's large family converted to God. He entered the ministry in 1835, and labored faithfully and successfully until, through toil and exposure, his health gave way, and he was compelled to retire from the work he loved so well in the year 1859. Wm. Young, during the years of his ministry, never spared himself. In his prime his voice was one of great range and power. There was a pathos about it that at once arrested attention, and brought home to the heart and conscience of the sinner, under the Spirit's influence, the solemn truths uttered with a wondrous force, that at times was almost irresistible. Especially at the old-fashioned camp-meetings, which he loved so well, was Wm. Young a master preacher. Since 1859 until his death he lived in Trenton, surrounded by several members of his large and loving family, three of whom are ministers—two in the Methodist Church in Canada, and one in the Congregational Church in the United States. His retirement from active service did not lessen his interest in the salvation of men, or the prosperity of the Church of his choice, always manifesting a disposition to be present at all the services when health permitted, and rendering assistance to the full extent of his ability. He was a great reader, and seemed to those who knew him best like a great encyclopædia ever kept written up to date. For some months before his death his health gradually gave way, and he would sometimes remark, "That God, in His great kindness toward him, was so gently taking down the tabernacle that he did not experience an ache or a pain." For him, death had no sting, and the grave no gloom; he calmly and trustfully fell asleep in Jesus on the 2nd of July, 1890, and after an impressive funeral service, in which Revs. Dr. Dewart, William Buchanan, F. B. Stratton, D. F. Gee and others took part, we laid his remains to rest in Trenton cemetery to await the resurrection of the just. "He, being dead, yet speaketh."

REV. WILLIAM G. NORMAN.

Rev. Wm. G. Norman was born January 12th, 1794, in the State of New York, of English or Welsh parents, and orphaned in early childhood. During the war of 1812 he entered the American army, and served till peace was proclaimed, after which he came to Canada and settled at Kingston, where he married a noble widow, Mrs. Babcock, who shared with him the toils of life for fifty years. They together united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Brother Norman soon received a local preacher's license, in which capacity he manifested great adaptability for the work of the ministry. In revival services he was a power for good, taking an active part in many, but especially in one held at Elizabethtown, in which about one thousand souls were converted. He was taken on probation at the Methodist Episcopal Conference, in 1836, in Belleville, and became the colleague of the late Benson Smith. He was given elder's orders in 1840, and labored faithfully and successfully until 1863, when the failing health of his beloved and useful companion made it necessary for him to superannuate in his seventieth year. He entered Methodism in Canada when it was a unit with but a small membership, saw it grow to vast proportions, dividing into numerous organizations under different forms of government, and was spared to see the happy reunion of all those societies Father Norman was a devout, earnest Christian, an able minister, "holding the mystery of the faith in a pure conscience." His great success in soulsavin whom physi forces He fi

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saving proved his call divine. Many of his converts entered the ministry, among whom are Rev. Dr. Gardiner and Rev. Dr. Stone. He retained much of his physical force, and seemingly all his mental powers until the end, preaching a forceful and logical sermon in Grace Church, Trenton, on his ninety-fifth birthday. He finished his course, after a short illness, in his ninety-seventh year, having preached sixty-five years, fifty-five of which were spent in the active work. He was laid to rest in Trenton cemetery, and a memorial service was held in King Street Methodist Church, in which Revs. Dr. Gardiner, Dr. Carman, Wm. Buchanan, F. B. Stratton, J. R. Philps, H. Williams, and D. F. Gee took part. "The memory of the just is blessed."

REV. GEORGE-CARR.

George Carr was born in York, England, in July, 1817. He came to Canada with his widowed mother and some brothers and sisters in 1836, and settled near Colborne. At the age of twenty, through the agency of the Methodist ministry, he was wondrously saved; God's Spirit unmistakably witnessing to the fact of his sonship with God, which witness he never lost to the day of his death. Soon after his conversion he began to manifest a deep interest in all the departments of church work, and after spending a few years as an exhorter and local preacher, he was called into the active work of the ministry in the year 1840. Through excessive labors his health gave way, so that at the close of the year he had to return home to suffer a long and painful illness. In 1842, his health being restored, he again entered the active work and labored successfully and well for a period of thirty-one years, when, on account of failing health, he accepted a superannuated relation and settled near Colborne, where he remained until the close of his life. In Bro. Carr were found the noblest characteristics of true manhood, which manifested themselves in all the relationships of life. The Gospel, which he so faithfully preached to others, was found abundantly sufficient to support him during a lingering and painful illness, which terminated in a triumphant death March 23rd, 1891.

REV. WM. MONTGOMERY PATTYSON

was the son of Rev. William and Jane Pattyson. His father was a zealous and distinguished minister of what was called the Clonites, or Primitive Methodists, in the North of Ireland. William M. was born in Newtown, county Fermanagh, on November 20th, 1822. He emigrated to Canada in 1840, landing in Montreal, where he, and a young man who accompanied him, engaged in the publication of a newspaper in the interests of Protestantism against the encroachments of Roman Catholocism. This project not proving successful in a monetary point of view, he abandoned it, and determined to make his future home somewhere in the lumbering districts of the Upper Ottawa, which was then almost a dense wilderness. While proceeding on this foolish journey, he was met by the father of Revs. D. C. and H. McDowell, who was then a devoted Christian, and having known young Pattyson's Christian father in the Old Country, he dreaded to have him bury himself away from all religious privileges, as he then purposed doing; and, by strong persuasion, he induced the young man to go home with him. The great revival of 1844 in Clarendon, under the labors of Rev. William Morton, was then in full progress. Young Pattyson had wandered far away from his early training, so that he made a mock of religion. But the power of God was so wondrously manifested in that glorious revival, from which not less than twenty ministers went out to call sinners to repentance, that under a sermon preached by the Rev. W. Morton, from the words, "They came to Jesus, and saw him that was possessed with devils sitting clothed and in his right mind, even him that had the legion, and they were afraid," young Pattyson was arrested and brought under deep conviction for his sins, and on the following Sabbath, during a six hours' meeting, he was enabled to rejoice in the blessed consciousness of sins forgiven. Now he who had been recognized as the leader in wickedness begins to lead men and women to Christ. At the first meeting this zealous young convert held, only a week after his conversion, eight souls were led into the light of salvation.

In 1846 W. M. Pattyson entered the probationary ranks of the Methodist ministry, and was appointed to Pembroke under the superintendency of the Rev.

Henry Shaler. During the four years of his probation he was a most powerful and successful laborer in the vinevard of the Lord.

In 1850 he was ordained to the full work of the ministry and stationed on the Clarendon Circuit, where, six years before, he was led to a saving knowledge of the truth. Here he married Miss Sarah McDowell, sister of Revs. D. C. and H. McDowell, who proved a true helpmeet to him in the work of the ministry. To them were born two sons and a daughter. One of the sons is a minister of some years' standing in the Toronto Conference.

Brother Pattyson was stationed successively on Osgoode, Newboro', Winchester, Moulinette, Spencerville, North Gower, Osgoode, Norwood, Thornbury. Here, through affliction, he was obliged to take a superannuated relation for six years, after which he resumed his place in the effective ranks, where he continued until the close of life.

Brother Pattyson had suffered for many years under severe affliction, but he faithfully performed his work. He had just moved to Hall's Bridge, on the Peterboro' District, and fairly commenced his work with great hopefulness, both on sown part and also of his people, that he would have a successful term on that field of labor, when suddenly he was stricken down with alarming symptoms. On Saturday, August 2nd, he met his Quarterly Official Board, and conducted the business of his first Quarterly Meeting, lying on what proved to be his death-bed. And on Sabbath, about noon, he passed away, peacefully and joyfully trusting in that Saviour who said, "I will be with you, even unto the end." Among his last expressions on earth were these, "All is well! 1"

"'Not a cloud doth arise to darken my skies,
Or hide for a moment the Lord from my eves."

Brother Pattyson was, when in his full vigor, a "son of thunder," and multitudes were brought to Christ through his labors.

On August 5th, we laid all that is mortal of our dear brother in the Lakefield cemetery, in sure and certain hope of a glorious resurrection unto eternal life. Bro. Pattyson's second marriage was to Miss Sarah J. Fulton, who, with six daughters, now mourns her loss. May they so live as to be an unbroken family in heaven.

REV. ROBERT HURLEY.

Robert Hurley was born in the parish of Pelton, Somersetshire, England, in the year 1811, and died at Port Hope on the 2nd day of February, 1891. He was converted to God at the age of eighteen, through the instrumentality of the Bible Christian Church, with which he united, and entered its ministry in 1834. After spending nine years in the active work in England, he came, by order of the Church to America as a missionary, laboring first in the United States and then in Canada, completing altogether forty years of successful active ministerial work. Bro. Hurley, though making no preteasions to scholarly attainments, was a ready and impressive speaker, and pre-eminently gifted in prayer, where thought, expression and unction told upon every listener. The secret of his power was a fully consecrated life. He was twice married, first to Mary Ann Clemence, of Port Hope, in 1847, and, after her death, in 1889 to the widow of Rev. Joseph Hodge, of Hampton, both of whom proved suitable companions. When death came it had no terror, and those who visited him in his last illness had the pleasure of seeing in Bro. Hurley an illustration of the truth of Holy Writ: "Mark the perfect man and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace." His funeral service was held in the church at Welcome, where a number of ministers—Revs. Messrs. Hull, Green, Bartlet, Tonkin, with the pastor of the church—testified to his sterling qualities, and with loving hands laid his remains to rest in Welcome cemetery.

REV. THOMAS FOSTER.

Thomas Foster was born in the village of Kerby Moorside, in the county of York, England, on the 25th of November, 1811. When quite young he was brought to the knowledge of the truth, and became the happy partaker of conscious salvation through the ministry of the Primitive Methodist Church. He at once

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identified himself with that active and progressive denomination, and as was the custom in those days he was soon engaged in active labors for the good of others. Giving evidence that he possessed abilities that might be employed in the ministry of the Church he passed quickly from exhorter to local preacher, and then to the full consecration of himself, with all his powers, to the work of the Christian ministry. After laboring on several circuits in England, he, in compliance with urgent calls from Canada for additional missionaries, offered himself to the Conference, and was accepted and sent to this Province in 1850. He entered on his work with characteristic devotion, and although never a great preacher, he was a faithful expounder of the Word of God, and a most dilligent worker and pastor. He labored principally on mission fields and was generally successful in his work, beloved for his piety, and honored for his zeal. For some years prior to his death he held the relation first of a supernumerary and then of a superannuated minister. but his changed relations to the Church never abated his love to God or interest in the progress of his cause. The attendance on all the means of grace and liberality in sustaining all the funds of the Church, honored his head and his heart. He watched with deep interest the widening operations of our Missionary Society, and on one occasion when I thanked him for a very liberal contribution to its funds, he remarked: "Do you know, I am afraid sometimes I do not give as much as I should to so great and so good a cause." But as his gifts each year equalled, and some-times exceeded, his allowance from the Superannuation Fund, we feel no disposition to question his fidelity as a steward of the Lord.

The call of the Master came to Bro. Foster in the sanctuary, and he left it one Sabbath evening and went home to die. While living he was not much troubled with doubts, and when death came it found him in the possession of full salvation, and ready to depart and enter his eternal rest. He sweetly fell asleep in Jesus during the sessions of our District Meeting, the members of which carried him to his grave. Those who knew him best bearing testimony in the memorial service to his Christian character and useful life.

REV. JOHN BREDIN, D.D.,

was born August 7th, 1819, in Enniskillen, Fermanagh, Ireland, where he lived till eleven years of age, when he was taken to Liverpool, England, where he spent the next ten years of his life, and where he was converted to God in March, 1838, under the ministry of the late Rev. Robert Young, who was once President of the English

Young Bredin was made a local preacher in 1840, and came to Canada in 1841. He was sent to London, Canada, by Dr. Richey, in August, 1842, as assistant to Dr. Evans ; and his second year was at Goderich, where he travelled four thousand five hundred miles through seven townships, preaching twice on each week-day and three times on every Sabbath. He had to endure many of the hardships of that period, inseparable from ministerial labor in new settlements, often carrying his horse's oats in his cutter, and tying the faithful animal in the most sheltered place near the shanty, whilst he himself partook of the simple hospitality within, frequently dining on potatoes, salt and tea. But many souls were converted, and he was happy in his work, while his talents as a preacher soon called him from the comparative seclusion of these years, and we find him year after year filling such pulpits as those of Hamilton, Toronto, Cobourg, Brockville, Barrie, etc., everywhere winning the admiration of his hearers by his pulpit ability and genius; also we find him for many years Chairman of District, Chairman of Committee for Examination of young preachers, President of the Bay of Quinte Conference, and many other honors were his as years rolled on. He also received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from the Wesleyan University of the State of Illinois.

After forty-five years of continuous and active work, feeling the infirmities of age, he obtained a superannuated relation, continuing to reside in Colborne. But this, instead of limiting, expanded his work, his services being eagerly sought; and he, willing to meet the demands, often went beyond what prudence and care for his health would dictate; in fact, only three days before the attack of his last illness, he preached what was deemed one of his greatest sermons in Colborne Church. Other talents also were his from youth, as, when in Liverpool, his skill as reporter was such that when any great meeting was held, and those interested were desirous of a full and faithful report of speeches, etc., it was usual to say, "We must get young Bredin to do the work." Nor did his skill in this art desert him in Canada, for he was the first one to report fully for the newly established dailies the proceedings of Conference, while as Journal Secretary he had no peer in the beauty of his permanshin. But if we are to attempt description of his powers of pulpit oratory penmanship. But if we are to attempt description of his powers of pulpit oratory much thought is required, for his style and manner were unique, and his delivery peculiar in its steady, deliberate power. His diction was forcible and elegant, and to the purest Saxon language he united a keen, clear and concise mode of thought, and, though no idea was left undeveloped, yet no unnecessary word was used. His texts were never mere mottoes, which might be used "to point a moral or adorn a tale." but were always some fundamental truth of religion, affecting man's welfare in time and in eternity. His eloquence—for he was most eloquent—was of a clear, brilliant order, and grew to lightning vividness, but never scorched, for he was not emotional in his discourses. He appealed to the heart and conscience through the reason, and drove home the truths he spoke with unerring skill. Few orators have his power of interesting an audience, even when the subject might be trivial. He possessed, in an eminent degree, the gift of making common-place things and ideas seem delightful, for his imagination was of the finest and purest order, and out of it grew imagery that entranced, and thoughts that thrilled the soul with their grandeur. But while his descriptive eloquence was great, yet it was in direct appeal to the understanding and in absolute power of reason that his strongest nature shone. His whole soul poured out its treasure of experience, and the lofty intellect gave its full measure of wisdom, in thoughts that convinced and ideas that compelled belief. To listen to Dr. Bredin was always to be enlightened, and his words carried to his hearers conviction of his own belief and faith, and helped weak or wavering souls to regain strength and stability.

Personally, the Doctor was a man slightly above medium height, spare in habit, with a fair, florid complexion, shrewd, yet kindly blue eyes, over which the fine perceptive faculties were emphasized by well arohed brows, which, with his hair and whiskers, were silvery white, giving him a most reverend appearance; and combining with simple dignity of carriage, suave, courteous manners, and exceptional neatness in dress, made a citizen whom all respected, and many regarded with

strong affection.

His conversation was always most interesting, invariably inclined to philosophic habits of thought and expression. Slightly didactic, yet he was willing to receive a suggestion if reason pointed to it, and ever and always careful and deliberate in speech or action. Dr. Bredin was not only strong mentally, but physically was blessed with continuous good health and bodily strength tip to the winter of 1890, when he was seized with la grippe, from which he never entirely recovered. Yet he was able to do more or less pulpit work till five or six weeks before his death, when erysipelas attacked him, from the effects of which he finally succumbed, and his labors and experience on earth were ended. He suffered little pain and met the last foe calmly, courageously, fully assured of victory through Him who loved, him. And yet it was a singular departure, no transport of joy—as in his life, so in death—the emotional contracted by the mental, yet, when speechless, though fully conscious, when the writer quoted, "The Lord of hosts is with you, and the God of Jacob your refuge!" he moved his head twice in assent; and so it was when asked, "Is Christ precious to you?" the same token of assent was given. In him there was no shrinking from the cold hand of death. He had the victory without its shout, the conquest without its song. "Sure the last end of the good man is peace."

"Summer dews fall not more gently to the ground, Nor weary, worn-out winds expire more soft."

He died on the 30th of May, and his remains were borne to Baltimore cemetery, near Cobourg, and interred beside those of wife and children who preceded him. Dr. Bredin-was twice married. His first wife was a Miss Storm, of Toronto, whom the writer did not know, and who was the mother of nine children, five of whom lie with their parents in Baltimore cemetery. His second wife, who survives him, was the widow of Dr. Landon, of Farmersville, a devoted wife and mother, and an estimable Christian lady, whose life and character are beyond praise, whose gentle, kindly nature and simple goodness of heart have endeared her to all who know her and see her blameless life. She has one son. She was Dr. Bredin's faithful wife for nearly thirty years.

1. That they met the probationers and candidates within the bounds of this Conference, in Omemee, on the 21st, 22nd and 23rd April ult., for examination in the prescribed course of study. All the members were present except Rev. J. Young, who was absent on account of the illness of his father. Four candidates and nineteen probationers were present.

2. That this Examining Board would express its deep sense of the loss sustained by the Church in the recent death of the Rev. Dr. Bredin. As a ripe and accurate scholar, as a most faithful and painstaking member of the Examining Boards of the Methodist Church for twenty-nine years, as a genial and beloved brother, and as a man of God, we record our loving appreciation of his eminent services and of his many superior gifts; and we pray that the divine consolations may be richly vouchsafed to his sorrowing widow and family.

Concerning degrees and titles, we would recommend:-

That all degrees and titles now or hereafter in the possession of the members or probationers of this Conference shall be subject to the following rules:—

1. Degrees or titles obtained from any Canadian University, after having been reported to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners, shall be

recognized in our official Church records.

2. Degrees or titles from any foreign University shall be recognized, proof having been furnished to the Board of Examiners that such degrees or titles have been obtained from a regular teaching college of good reputation.

3. In the case of all degrees obtained from foreign Universities and recognized, the name of the University in question shall be designated in

all our official Church records.

4. Honorary degrees from foreign Universities shall not be recognized except by a two-thirds vote of the members present, at any meeting of which sufficent notice has been given.

Your Committee on General Education have pleasure in submitting the following report:—

1. We rejoice at the continued prosperity and spirit of advancement in our various connexional institutions of learning, which are proving so mighty in the diffusing of the knowledge and culture of to-day. We are especially pleased that the general work and teachings of our institutions are so strongly permeated with Christian truth. Our power as a Church to lift the masses nearer to God is greatly increased.

2. We strongly recommend that our Financial District Meetings take such action as shall ensure more marked success at the annual educational meetings held on Circuits. We believe that the active sympathies of the people should be more fully enlisted in the great problem of education. It is imperative to take such action, in order to keep our educational work fully abreast of the times.

3. We desire to emphasize the fact that it is the duty of all our people to stand loyally by all our colleges, whether—ladies' or otherwise—in the matter of sending their young people to our own centres of learning, that they may be saved to Methodism.

4. We regret to learn that in many instances our ministers are not embracing the opportunities which our school system of Ontario affords them of visiting our public and high schools. We believe such visitation would tend to the closer union of secular and religious instruction.

5. We would recommend that Rev. E. N. Baker, M.A., B.D., be representative to Alma College, and Revs. S. J. Shorey and T. W. Jolliffe be representatives to Albert College from this Conference.

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SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The General Conference Treasurer's Annual Report and Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1890, as passed by the Board.

The estimates for the year just closed were made on the most economical scale, and were barely sufficient to meet the current expenses of the year. The various Circuits in the Connexion raised \$49,461.92, or \$1,254.48 more than last year; and the ministerial subscriptions were also a little in advance. There were, however, small deficiencies in the amounts expected from both these sources of income.

There was a falling off in the Interest Account, arising from our inability to get several comparatively large sums of interest which, though due and considered perfectly reliable, we could not realize before the close of the year; and also, because in one of our large investments a reduction of one per cent had to be made.

I am happy to say that the Book Room has increased the annual grant to the Fund up to \$6,300, an advance of \$300.

Notwithstanding the increased expenditure incurred by the removal to our new premises, the expenses of the Fund have been reduced some \$68.

The additional amount required to pay claimants was \$2,398.69, and all have been paid in full and all expenses met; but the circumstances above referred to have left the Annual Account deficient \$1,010.56. Of this amount, however, more than \$800 are in the hands of reliable parties, who are expected to pay up in a very short time.

After writing off the amounts recommended by the Board, and without embracing the munificent legacy of William Gooderham, Esq., not yet received, the investments of the Fund now amount to \$176,503.76.

In accordance with the instructions of the Board, a competent committee of laymen have examined all the securities held on behalf of the Fund, and reported to the Board that they found the securities in a very satisfactory condition.

N.B.—The amount fixed by the Finance Committee of the General Conference, as required from the Bay of Quinte Conference, in order to meet the claims against this Fund for the Quadrennium, was \$3,500, or \$875 per annum. (See Journal, page 245.)

INTERIM REPORT OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

In presenting the report of work done since the last General Conference, the Treasurer begs to say that the Committee met soon after the rising of the General Conference, and after careful consideration of each case, decided to carry out the recommendations of the General Conference, and made the appropriations accordingly.

Many members of the Committee expressed great regret that no effort was to be made to raise any sum to reduce the obligations of the Fund through the meetings to be held in March, to celebrate the one hundredth year of Methodism in Canada.

Your Treasurer also regrets to report that remittances have come in unusually slow, not so much from lack of loyalty to the Fund, as from neglect to take up and forward the collections on time. This necessitates the borrowing of money at high rates in order to keep faith with claimants.

It is of the greatest importance that the ministers look after the interests of this Fund; promptly take up the collections as required by the Discipline—in October—and forward at once to the Treasurer. There are not, probably, one hundred circuits in the whole Dominion where this cannot be done.

The amount paid in to the Treasurer, and to the Rev. James Gray, who has acted in his absence, was \$604.54, to the 15th May, 1891.

The foregoing is respectfully and loyally submitted, with the hope that the future may be brighter and the collections larger.

That a Conference Statistician be appointed under whose direction the Secretaries of the Districts shall act as the Committee on Statistics.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee are profoundly impressed with the fact that the most subtle and seductive foe with which we have to contend is the deeply rooted and influential liquor traffic. As tenacious of its own life as it is destructive of the life of others, without conscience and without credentials, we may expect the resistance to be desperate, but it cannot be long, if Christians but stand united in purpose and effort for its utter destruction.

We rejoice that our people responded so heartily to the Church's call in petitioning the House of Commons and Senate of Canada for the prohibition of this gigantic legal wrong; but regret that there has been serious neglect in some places, in not circulating these petitions.

In view of the present position of this question before the country, we earnestly hope that our Church, both clergy and laity, will support no man for parliamentary honors who will not, in every honorable way, support and further the prohibition movement Your Committee would respectfully call your attention to the provision made in our Discipline for Sabbath-school Temperance work. (See paragraphs 294, 295 and 296.)

We also point out the need of uniformity in method in making the returns to this Conference, of the number of pledged abstainers in our Sunday-schools. Some giving the total number of persons pledged, and others only those pledged during the year.

We wish also to record our appreciation of the work of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in getting placed in our common schools an authorized text-book on Temperance; also of Miss Frances E. Willard, in obtaining a fuller recognition of Temperance work in the International Series of Sunday-school Lessons. Your Committee are also glad to know that unfermented wine is used for sacramental purposes in a large number of our congregations, but regret that it is not universally used.

Your Committee recommend that this Conference send four delegates to the Annual Meeting of the Dominion Alliance, to be held in the city

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of Toronto, on Thursday and Friday, September the 10th and 11th, and that Revs. C. W. Watch and T. S. McKee, and R. Moment, Esq., and J. B. Aylesworth, Esq., constitute our delegation.

We also recommend that a Conference Temperance Secretary be appointed, to specially look after the interests of this work, and suggest the name of Rev. James McFarlane to this office. And we further recommend that the following resolution be placed in the hands of the Secretary of Temperance, to be forwarded to the House of Commons at a suitable time:—

Whereas, petitions to the Senate and House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada, praying for the total prohibition of the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, for beverage purposes, have been numerously signed and presented;

We, the members of the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church, composed of ministers and laymen in equal numbers, representing a membership of 36,591, and a constituency of over 170,000, express our hearty approval of the aforesaid petitions, and earnestly join in the prayer of the same, sincerely hoping that the honorable members of the Senate and House of Commons may see it to be in harmony with their duties, as representatives of the people, and in the interest of social and moral reform, to grant the prayer of said petitioners.

REPORT OF SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The Annual Conference Sabbath-school Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

Number of schools, 481; increase, 88. Officers and teachers, 4,413; increase, 931. Scholars, 34,767; increase, 7,573. Conversions in schools, 1,556; increase, 230. Members of Church, 8,160; increase, 3,215. Learning catechism, 3,539; increase, 473. Pledged to total abstinence, 7,124; increase, 2,546. Volumes in library, 36,135; increase, 8,610. Moneys raised for missions, \$1,867.38; increase, \$155.58. For school purposes, \$16,975.98; increase, \$4,859.49. Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund, \$360.75; increase, \$76. Teachers' meetings held, 65; increase, 16. Schools kept open for whole year, 270; increase, 64.

As a result of the fact that the Conference boundaries have been enlarged, and the statistics thereby increased by the addition of the Bowmanville and Uxbridge Districts, we submit the following items as showing the state of the work in the former existing territory:—Increase in number of schools, 19. Increase in officers and teachers, 146. Increase in scholars, 620. Decrease in number of conversions, 59. Increase in number of Church members, 784. Increase in number learning catechism, 113. Decrease in number taking total abstinence pledge, 401. Decrease in amount raised for missions, \$26.18. Increase in amount raised for schools, \$1,459.34. Increase in amount raised for Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund, \$14.34. Decrease in number of teachers' meetings held, 7. Increase in number of schools kept open whole year 16.

As a result of the fact that the periodicals issued by our Book Room have undergone a very general rearrangement during the year, we are unable to give a comparative report on this department, but we are pleased to note a very gratifying increase in the amount and quality of Sunday-school literature taken.

We would draw attention to the fact that but about fifty-six per cent. of our schools are kept open during the whole year, and in but fourteen per cent. are regular teachers' meetings held, and would earnestly urge the attention of all our Sunday-school workers to these matters, and suggest that, as far as practicable, each school be kept open during the whole year, and regular teachers' meetings be held.

We are pleased to note the increased spiritual power of our schools, as evidenced by the fact that the number of Church members is increased so largely; and would hope that with increased activity our schools be made not only a means of disseminating truth, but also of leading the children into the fold of the Church.

We would urge upon our ministers the importance of attention to the requirements of Discipline in regard to the management and work of our schools, and that they impress upon parents the fact that the Sabbathschool is no substitute attendance upon public worship, nor for careful and prayerful home instruction.

The finances are in a gratifying condition, and show increased liberality in support of our schools; but we have reason to advise that if the collection in aid of the Sunday-school Extention Fund be more carefully arranged for and generally observed the revenue would be greatly increased, and the means to supply the needy applications in this benevolent department considerably augmented.

The Rev. W. Jolliffe having resigned his position as Secretary-Treasurer of this Committee, we recommend that the Conference hereby tender their heartiest thanks for seven years' faithful and efficient service in that capacity.

We recommend that Rev. J. J. Rae be appointed Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year, and that he be appointed as delegate from this Conference to the Provincial Sunday-school Association.

We recommend that all schedules be presented at opening of Conference, so that the report of next year may be presented on the second day of Conference, and that an order of business be reserved for that day for this purpose.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee, in reviewing the closing year, have cause to give glory to God for the degree of success with which we have been favored. We are grateful for the peace, prosperity and national blessings with which we have been endowed; and in looking at our beloved Zion, our hearts rejoice at the ingathering of precious souls, giving us an increase of over 1,000 in our membership. The Missionary Fund, while we regret to report a small deficiency in the ordinary income, is more than made up by the large increase in the income of that excellent organization, the Woman's Missionary Auxiliary, giving us altogether an increase of some thousands of dollars. We are grateful for the very flourishing condition of our educational institutions, and we recommend increased liberality in that direction. The present is the day of missionary enterprise. We need no longer pray, Lord, open the door, for it stands wide open, and the men are ready to go forth.

Oh, for a larger spirit of liberality on the part of our people, so that the Gospel ship may go forth fully equipped, and that the consecrated men going forth may have no lack of the temporal comforts, which, in too many instances, are very limited in the case of some faithful, zealous brethren

The Sabbath-school, which is the seed-bed of the Church, is doing a glorious work, and is growing rapidly in its influence and power, but there is still room for greater advancement in this direction; and we recommend, that from every pulpit it be urged upon young and old the importance of taking part in this department of Christian work.

We recommend the better observance of the Sabbath, by abstaining from pleasure, driving and visiting on that day, and urge a deeper spiritual life, evinced by universal attention to family prayer, which, in too many instances, is neglected by even professedly Christian families; and also a better attendance on the social means of grace, the class and prayer-meeting, and that Epworth League or Christian Endeavor be established wherever practicable, etc.

All of which we respectfully submit.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to submit the following report:

We regard the Sabbath as "made for man," as a day of rest from toil, for devotion in the worship of God, as well as a memorial of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is a test of man's acknowledgment of God's government in the earth. Ezek. xx. 20: "Hallow My Sabbaths: and they shall be a sign between Me and you, that ye may know that I am the Lord your God." We rejoice in every sign of firm purpose to thus regard the Lord's Day throughout our land, and deplore all encroachments, either by corporation or individuals, having in effect the transgression of God's holy law. (See Ex. xx, the Fourth Commandment.) Also in effect the prevention of thousands of employees from the observance of the Sabbath by rest from common toil, and from attendance, if so inclined, upon the privileges of the house of God. Also in the running of trains on the Lord's Day, and steamboats, keeping open canals, as on a week day, and also many other ways of Sabbath desecration, subversive of the political, social and religious well-being of the people. vendors in our cities, towns or villages, as on a week day, pushing their trade for gain of gold.

And this Conference enjoin, and urge on all the members of the body, both ministerial and lay, and upon all the membership of our Church within the bounds of this Conference, to abstain from and avoid the use of railway trains and other public conveyances on the Lord's Day. Also, the custom with many of keeping open their stores and public places of business very late hours on Saturday nights, and of the people in making their purchases at late hours on such evenings. These, with many other things.

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in relation to this question of Sabbath desecration, ought to be, and might be, to our great advantage, brought to an end. The Jews regarded the day preceding the Sabbath as a time of preparation for Sabbath observance. So ought all opportunity be given, wherever possible, to the employees of the land for preparation for Lord's Day observance. Many are so employed that the Lord's Day is to them as all other days, a day of secular work, with no Sabbath and no sanctuary privileges. Capitalists or employers might wisely make Fridays or Mondays of each week their pay-days, and so lessen the occasion of late hour sales on Saturday nights.

Your Committee recommend that this Conference heartily endorse every part of Mr. Charlton's bill, entitled "An Act for the Better Observance of the Lord's Day," especially as it supplies a want that, for the best interests of the youth of our country, has been too long neglected.

Having had reported to us a society known as the Christian Stewards' League, in which the principle of the tenth as the minimum amount of contribution is adopted by the members signing a pledge to that effect, we recommend this society to the favorable consideration of this Conference; we also recommend the circulation of literature on this subject more extensively than hitherto; we also recommend that an earnest effort be made to induce the young people of our Church to adopt this system.

- 1. That Cannington Circuit be divided as follows: Cannington and Derryville to form Cannington Circuit; Wilfrid and Zion to form the Wilfrid Circuit, and North Brock appointment to be added to Beaverton Mission.
- 2. That Tweed Circuit be divided as follows: Tweed and Lodgeroom to form the Tweed Circuit; Bethel appointment to be added to Thomasburg.
- 3. That Moira appointment be detached from Thomasburg Circuit. and added to West Huntingdon.
- 4. That Colebridge Mission be dropped, the Chairman of Bracebridge District having agreed to assume the work.
 - That South Cavan be made a Circuit.
- 6. That Argues and Union Creek appointments of the Kinmount Mission, the Rosedale appointment of the Coboconk Mission, and the Beech Lake appointment of the Norland Mission, be dropped; that the Retties' appointment of the Kinmount Mission be added to Coboconk; Kinmount appointment be added to the Norland Mission, and that the Mission be known as the Kinmount and Norland Mission, and attached to the Lindsay District.
- 7. That we recommend the Conference to appoint Revs. Arthur Browning and Martin J. Bates Conference Evangelists.
- 8. That we recommend the Conference to appoint Rev. John C. Ash agent of Albert College.

The report was received and adopted. W. R. Young, Secretary.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE FOXBORO MEMORIAL.

Your Committee appointed to consider the memorial of the members and congregation of Foxboro', beg leave to report that, having considered the evidence and documents produced before us, we find:—

That the finding of the Property Committee of the Belleville District, dated 3rd March, 1886, was in excess of the jurisdiction of said Committee in this, that it attached among others, the following conditions, upon which the South church should be retained for the use of the Methodist Church in Foxboro', viz.: That certain names should be added to the respective trustee boards of the two churches, and that it fix an upset price at which the North church should be sold.

In our opinion the Committee had no authority or jurisdiction to impose these conditions, we think that these conditions vitiate the finding of said Committee and that it was never binding upon the congregations concerned. We recommend that no action be taken upon the said memorial.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Resolved,—That the memorials from the Uxbridge and Bowmanville Districts be referred to the Commission on Conference Boundaries, and that if, in the opinion of the said Commission, these two Districts should be removed to the Toronto Conference, in the opinion of this Conference no opposition should be made to such return.

It was also moved by Rev. J. S. Clarke, seconded by Wm. Johnston, Esq., that in view of the unsettled feeling about the boundaries of this Conference, it is an instruction from this Conference to the members of the Commission, from this Conference, on Conference Boundaries, that they use their best efforts to secure the division of the Toronto Conference by Yonge Street, Toronto, and that the eastern part of the said Conference and the Bay of Quinte Conference be united.

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REPORTS OF COLLEGE WORK AND RESOLUTIONS THEREUPON.

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

In the absence of the Rev. Chancellor Burwash, S.T.D., the Revs. Professors Reynar, LLD., and F. H. Wallace, M.A., addressed the Conference in the interest of Victoria University, and reported the work done during the past year. Whereupon it was moved by Rev. T. M. Campbell, and seconded by Rev. E. Roberts, and

Resolved,—That we have heard with satisfaction the addresses of Rev. Dr. Reynar and Professor Wallace in reporting the work of Victoria University for the past year. We beg to assure Chancellor Burwash and the other members of the Faculty of our unabated interest in the work of the College and continued sympathy with them in their very responsible

ALBERT COLLEGE. *

The Rev. Principal Dyer, M.A., presented a most encouraging report of the work of Albert College during the year. Over 200 students have been enrolled, giving an increase of twenty per cent. in the attendance, being the largest in the history of the College. Thirty-one were preparing for junior and nine for senior matriculation. No other college in Canada was preparing so large a class of matriculants. Twenty-nine wrote in the Conference Examinations. Almost every Conference and Province was represented, from Montreal to British Columbia. The College has a Commercial department, a class in Elocution, a Music and Fine Art department, also Young Men's Christian Association and Young Women's Christian Association, and Missionary Societies The report was favorably received by the Conference, whereupon, it was moved by Rev. J. J. Rice, seconded by Rev. Prof. Wallace, and

Resolved,—That the Annual statement of Albert College, by Principal Dyer has been listened to with deep interest, and the great importance of that institution in relation to higher education, subject to religious influence and supervision, is fully recognized. We hereby place on record our high appreciation of the valuable work being done by Principal Dyer and his efficient staff, and we are still prepared to afford all legitimate encouragement and aid to the institution under their

management and control.

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Rev. Principal Austin, M.A., B.D., presented the report, and stated there had been 181 students who were enrolled as to departments as follows: - Preparatory, 28; Academic, 33; Collegiate, 47; the Music School has enrolled for Piano Course, 120; for Voice Training, 31; for Harmony, 25; in the Fine Art School there were 50 pupils; in School of Elecution, 31; and in the Commercial School, 25.

The College is affiliated to the Victoria University, giving the students University standing. The Music School was never more efficient, and the Fine Art School is affiliated with the Educational Department of Ontario, the students having received 500 departmental certificates and

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several medals during the past seven years. The Revs. T. M. Campbell and E. N. Baker, M.A., B.D., also addressed the Conference in the interests of the College, whereupon, it was moved by Rev. E. N. Baker, M.A., B.D., and seconded by Rev. T. M. Campbell, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has heard with much pleasure, the most excellent report given by Principal Austin concerning the large attendance and the work done at Alma College, and we pledge ourselves to do what we can to sustain an institution so worthy of the Church, and we pray that the College may be greatly prospered in the coming year.

WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

The Secretary of the Conference read the report which had been forwarded. The report stated that the College was splendidly equipped, the teachers experienced and cultivated, the College having University affiliation, and the work being taken pro tanto by the University students may complete their Sophomore work in the College, and enter the University in the third year. The College in its history has had over 300 graduates. Special reference was made to the Biblical Course of study, which each student must take before graduation, which familiarizes the pupil with Biblical interpretations, manuscript versions, chronology, authorship, canonicity, etc. Whereupon, it was moved by Rev. T. J. Edmison, B.A., B.D., and seconded by Rev. J. Anderson, and

Resolved,—That we rec-ive with pleasure the report of the Wesleyan Ladies' College. We are especially pleased with the part of the report which says that, "no lady can graduate from our College without pursuing a course in Biblical Study." We are glad to learn of the continued prosperity of this institution, and assuring Rev. Dr. Burns, the Principal, of our hearty sympathy, commend this, the oldest Ladies' College in Canada, to the liberal patronage of our people.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Rev. Principal Hare, M.A., Ph.D., addressed the Conference in the interest of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, reporting a larger attendance, and marked success in the various branches of study, whereupon, moved by Rev. N. A. McDiarmid, seconded by Rev. James Anderson, and

Resolved,—That, having heard the annual report of Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., Principal of Ontario Ladies' College, we, the members of this Conference, desire to express our hearty appreciation of the character and work of that institution, and pledge ourselves to advance, as far as possible, is interests; and we desire further to call the attention of our people to the facilities afforded young ladies to pursue the studies prescribed by the Government for public school teachers' certificates; and that this resolution be printed in the Conference Minutes.

STANSTEAD COLLEGE.

The Rev. Principal McAmmond, B.A., addressed the Conference in the interest of Stanstead College, whereupon, moved by Judge Dean, seconded by J. C. Ash, and

Resolved, —That this Conference has heard, with much pleasure, the address of Rev. Foster McAmmond, B.A., of Stanstead College, and we feel

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that this institution, from its location and surroundings, is entitled to the special sympathy of the Church in these Western Provinces, and we wish it every success in its efforts to impart a liberal education to the youth of Quebec.

DEMILL LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Rev. President Demill addressed the Conference, whereupon moved by Rev. J. W. Totten, seconded by Rev. S. A. Duprau, and

Resolved,—That having heard from Rev. A.B. Demill, as to his work in Oshawa and Toronto in behalf of young ladies and little girls, we express our gratification at his success, and pray that he may long live to continue the work so auspiciously begun, and we heartily commend his work to our people.

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THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

Dearly Beloved Brethren,—Your ministers and representatives, assembled in Annual Conference, desire to enlist afresh your interest and sympathy in the work of God in which we are all engaged, and seek your co-operation in every good word and work.

And first, before devotion to any forms or agencies, we would that you continue to cherish with us the true spirit and life of Christianity, without which the fairest Church organization can be at best only a body without a soul, and may be at worst a living body possessed of evil spirits. It is not enough that in revival and conversion the unclean spirit should go out of a man. The heart and life must be filled with love and service according to the words of the Master, who said, "If a man love Me he will keep My word, and My Father will love Him, and we will come unto him and make our abode with him." But if we merely aim at ceasing to do evil and go not on to do well, then the unclean spirit will return into the house found empty, swept and garnished, bringing with him seven other spirits more wicked than himself, and the last state is worse than the first. Therefore, we pray you to join us in taking heed to the exhortation of the apostle, "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith, prove your own selves, know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you except ye be reprobate."

By chenishing this inner spiritual life we not only make our own calling and election sure, but even when we may be least conscious of it, we exert the strongest influence in spreading true religion, for, as a famous Christian teacher has said, "Nothing is more powerful in spreading holy affections than having in our hearts the fountain of holy affections." No arguments of the unbeliever tell against the faith with such disastrous force as the life of a professing Christian who is devoted to pleasure or to gain, or who is inflamed with envy and hate; but, on the other hand, no argument for the truth of Christianity is so convincing as a true Christian life, marked by the beauty and strength of love and good works.

In looking out over the various duties to which we are called, we give our first attention to the care of the young and the duty of bringing them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. This is the nearest to us in the order of nature, and all experience and history prove that it brings the richest rewards. We commend to you, therefore, the continuance of your good work in the Sunday-schools. Let the best be done that circumstances will allow—1st, in securing teachers well qualified in mind and heart for the work; 2nd, in careful, yet generous provision of papers and books, eliminating whatever would not tend to the development of a broad and pure Christian life; and 3rd, in the provision of such school-rooms as will compare favorably with our homes in comfort and beauty, and tend to foster a spirit of admiration and reverence.

We further commend to you our University and Colleges. It is not pretended that they are perfect in every respect, but they are at least unsurpassed, if not the best, in the country. They are ours, bequeathed to us by the generous gifts and faithful labors of the past; ours to use for the best moral and intellectual advantage of our sons and daughters; and ours to hand on to the next generation, improved and developed according to the utmost of our power, and the growing demands of the times. Not to do this is to prove unfaithful to the past, to the present, and to the future.

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As to our University policy, concerning which there has for a time been some uncertainty, it may now be said that the line of our advance is determined. Whatever honest preferences there may reasonably have been in favor of a different line, our progress under existing circumstances must be along the line of University Federation, as determined by the highest court in our Church. We look, therefore, in contidence to the Methodist people to meet fully all the demands for the present thorough efficiency of our University, and we leave the future to the God whose we are and whom we serve.

Further, as concerning our young people, you will not have failed to see with regret, that some of them keep too far away from our Church influence and work. Let us not give occasion of offence in this matter by ignoring the lawful and natural tastes and preferences that God has given to the young, or by striving to make them old and matured Christians before their years. It is not by driving or dragging the lambs, but by tenderly carrying them in His arms, that the Good Shepherd accomplishes His work. As valuable auxiliaries in the development of Christian life and activity amongst the young, we commend to you the Epworth League and Christian Endeavor Associations. Much success has already attended the operations of these societies. Your sympathy and help will extend their usefulness and improve their methods.

But the true nursery of the Christian Church is the Christian home. No outside agencies, however valuable in some things, can ever take its place. Having the true light and spirit of the Christ in your hearts, put away all that would hinder it from shining clearly and giving light unto all that are in the house. "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamor, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you." Love it is that begets love, and it is not ascetic gloom or bigot hate, but the beauty of holiness that wins to Christ. The Lord give to His people the grace by all the sweet and wholesome influence of Christian home culture to train our sons and daughters for God's service here and for the great home above.

The missionary work still claims the energies and treasures of the Church. It has long been near to your hearts, as should be the last commission of our ascending Lord. Remembering your past devotion to this work, we simply exhort you to patient continuance in well-doing, and remind you that it is not merely the work of the missionary, or of the Missionary Society, but of every disciple of Christ. If, like the disciples of old, we should say in our turn, "Lord, wilt Thou at this time restore again the kingdom?" again would we be answered, "Ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you, and ye shall be witnesses unto Me." Without Him, we can do nothing, but it would not seem to be His will to restore the kingdom without us.

The problem of intemperance is still pressing for a solution, and there are few people in the land who do not feel in some way the shame and hurt with which it deals. Give it your earnest, thoughtful, prayerful heed. Do not be afraid of being called enthusiasts and fanatics in a good cause, but be afraid of the reproach that would come from being the thing you would not be called. Use the best judgment and the best experience that can be had. Learn from defeat and even from the foe, but never give up the strife until the reproach is turned away and the destroyer is in chains or is himself destroyed.

In our comparatively free and simple life we have known as yet but little of social and industrial unrest. But we are approaching the period when, like other Christian peoples, we shall have to deal with large economic problems and provide for classes of comparatively poor people. It is at our peril if we allow them to become, what are sometimes called, the neglected classes. The Church is becoming alive to the new calls, and various agencies are suggested or operated with a view to meeting the growing needs. Such are the home missionary, the evangelist, the deaconess agencies. Further thought should be

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given to these matters, and further counsel taken, so that we may not be found quite unprepared when the needs become urgent and pressing. The true spirit of Methodism is not devotion to any set of agencies, but watchfulness for all means of doing good, and readiness and courage to adopt any new agency that gives promise of glory to God or good to man. The early success of Methodism did not come from a slavish quoting or following of what had been said or done by them of old time, but from devoted enterprise and loyal response whenever a new call was given to come up to the help of the Lord. The very success of an onward movement brings the necessity for new enterprise. The evangelization of large numbers of people brings, on a large scale, improved material as well as moral conditions. Godliness brings thrift and industry. Thrift and industry bring wealth and leisure. These again, in their turn, bring the opportunity and the duty for broader and deeper culture, and more extended influence in social and national life. In the place of the small economies by which the foundations of a fortune are usually laid, should come with the fortune large and wise beneficence, and conscientious Christian devotion, not only to the great moral and religious enterprises that belong peculiarly to the Church, but also to the great industrial and political problems and activities on which the well-being of humanity so largely depends. More than once or twice in years past we have rejoiced over the consecration of great wealth and talents amongst our people to the promotion of the work of God, and we have strong grounds to hope that in the years to come, and with the accumulation of wealth, we shall see more frequently such noble practical recognition of the Fatherhood and Brotherhood we all profess when we pray, "Our Father which art in heaven."

There have also appeared in our intellectual life some of the difficulties and perplexities that have hitherto been comparatively strange to us, though not unfamiliar to older communities. Questions as to the nature and use of the Sacred Scriptures have already become almost popular—questions that should lead to much serious thought and prayerful study. It sometimes happens that minds brought for the first time into such perplexities are so overcome of excitement, and even of panic, that it is not easy for them to distinguish friend from foe. But there is no true cause of haste or of fear as to the result in these things. We know whom we have believed, and we rest secure in what we know to be of God. Distinguishing between human speculations, new or old, and that divine experience of the things of God, on which as Methodists we have always emphatically insisted, we may still say, like one of old, "Whether he be a sinner or no, I know not. One thing I know: that whereas I was blind, I now see." In this faith we stand fast, and, for the rest, we are willing to accept with calmness our Christian duty to prove all things as well as to hold fast that which is good. Whilst we search the Scriptures diligently to see whether these things are so, and in meekness instruct those that oppose themselves, the words of our great Teacher come from God are surely safe for us all, "Be not ye called Rabbi: for one is your Teacher and all ye are brethren. And call no man your father on the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven. Neither be ye called masters: for one is your Master, even the Christ." (Revised Version.)

In conclusion, dearly beloved, we say to you with the Psalmist, "Trust in the Lord and do good, so shalt thou dwell in the land and verily thou shalt be fed;" and with the apostle, "Be careful for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God, and the peace of God which passeth all understanding shall keep your hearts and minds, through Christ Jesus."
