The recent reference to the lively times on the ocean, on this side of the Atlantic, one hundred years ago, opens up a little circumstance, of some pecu iar features, that was recorded in the shipping news of those old war days. There arrived at the port of Liverpool on the 15th of July, the brig Madera, captain Roberts, 38 days from Bonivest, with 600 hogsheads of salt. The Ma-deira left Bonivest on the 3rd of June. On the 7th she was boarded and cap-tured by the letter-of-marque Rambler. of and from Boston for Canton, captain Sam. B. Edes, of 10 guns and 40 men, who took from the brig all the wine on board, equal to about 25 pipes of Madeira, and all the cabin stores of the same, and every article of small ores and cabin furniture.

Not satisfied with this portion of the eargo, the Rambler took \$300 in cash, the best bower cable, stern boat, forethe fest bower cable, stern boat, foretop gallant sail, main and main-topmast, stayasiis, jib, 3 studding sails,

The Pillory was a frame of wood prected on posts, with moveable coards and holes, through which were put the head and hands of a criminal. It was generally built where the Custom House now is, and there the victims were exposed. We read under date of April 21, 1821: date of April 22, 1821:

"On Tuesday last the Supreme Court finished its session in this town, when the following criminal was brought up and received sentence: John Lowe, convicted of forgery, Pillory one hour, to have one of his ears cut off, and suffer imprisonment for the space of one year, without bail."

This may be taken as an index of the age. While standing in the Pillory the prisoners were liable to be

lory the prisoners were liable to be pelted by mud or rotten eggs, etc., and filth generally, this being the usual custom. A petty naval officer was being "pelted" for a criminal assault in the market square, against whom indignation ran high. A large number of soldiers were present anxious to have a "shy" at him, and matters threatened to go hard with the fellow. When about being placed in the "machine" he took off his blue jacket and raising his voice said, loud enough to be heard: "At all events I will not disgrace the jacket." The tars who were "eager for the fray," were considerably mollified at this indication of a becoming spirit, and the fellow escaped with a much less severe drubbing than he had any right to expect.

As will be seen, cutting off ears wa so much so that one-eared individual were frequently to be met with through the province, although in the majority of cases after the expiration of their terms of imprisonment, the mutilated criminals would speedily leave the scene of their shame.

Duelling is now happily out of vogu in this country, and is a thing almost unheard of. The last regular "meeting" took place in July, 1819, near the North Farm, about two miles from this city, between two gentlemen holding high positions in this community.

But the construction of new streets, the naming of unoccupied areas, the careful and exact dividing of these areas into building lots, and the advertising of the same for sale at three times the price of one year ago, will not bring the thousands of new citizens hither.

more it has been perfectly well known to all that there was ample space on this old Chebucto peninsula for the building of thousands of dwellings, without danger of congestion. It requires more than 4 knowledge that there are new streets and vacant lots to attract hither a great augmentation of population. This talking in hundreds of thou sands and millions, this planning and suggesting of vast expenditures on the part of the city may all be very attrac-tive in sound, but caution should be the keynote for a time. The financial stringency" is emphatically with us nd there should be a movement for retrenchment. Our civic expenditures are high and still rising. Our taxation is heavy and in nearly all cases the assessments are right up to the top. is heavy and in nearly all cases the assessments are right up to the top. Under such circumstances, there should be a pause and a careful and prayerful reconsideration. The city of Brandon, Manitoba, is a very flourishing western town with the price of building lots as high as Haman's gallows, and moved by a spirit of wild and woolly expenditure and "go-or-bust" expansion. Yet the other day, Brandon had to close down all municipal work and dismiss 300 employees. All heads of civic departments have been called upon to prepare reports to the best method of reducing expenses without impairing efficiency. We do not wish that Halifax may come to this, but a general stock-taking and the adoption for a time of the motto feating lent, hasten slowly, is certainly advised.

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
