For the present the granting of autonomy to the Territories must be first settled. The Gran1 Trunk railway bill with reference to the purchase of the Canada Atlantic will probably come before the railway committee of the commons next week. It is not anticipated that there will be any serious opposition to the measure, although it likely to provoke considerable discussion. It was rumored that Mackenzie and Mann might insist upon running rights over the road, but such action is now regarded as improbable, the Canadian Northern having no line near the C. A. R. except a few miles between Rose Point and Parry Sound.




