plained the truths of the church. He captivated and soothed their wild and stormy natures as the teachings of the Druids never had. Ireland's first trouble came with the nvasion of the Danes in the ninth century, who came to conquer the country and overthrow their religion. The people met this invasion by rising in their might and driving back

In 1541 Ireland came under the will of the invader and then followed troubled years for the country. To break the spirit of Ireland the invaders determined not only to destroy their nationality but to take away their religion of their fathers. The priests were dispersed and hunted and in these times the place of meeting was a hedge row and the church bell a whisper. In spite of all this the people did not lose their faith which now stands as a symbol of the beauty of that



GERMANS TO EXPLOIT

CANADIAN MINES WILL KEEP THREE

Syndicate Formed for Purpose, and Project a Most Remarkable One.

BERLIN, Mar. 16.—German capitalists are preparing to exploit Canada or a large scale.

Rich deposits of silver and coal in the eastern part of the Dominion are to be mined extensively, and if the plans of the controlling syndicate are carried out the development of that part of Canada, which includes the best coal found in America, will be in the hands of the Germans.

This remarkable condition is forecast by the well-informed Boersen Courier, which makes an authoritative statement regarding the aims and objects of the syndicate, which was formed for the exploiting of Canada.

The Boersen Courier states:

"Former attempts on the part of Germans to participate in the economic development of Canada met with little or no success, but the enterprise, which was recently launched appears to realize the rich expectations entertained in connection with it. The German Canadian syndicate, which includes representatives of the leading financial and industrial circles in Berlin, equipped an expedition in 1906 to explore Canada on scientific principles, with a view to discover mineral treasures.

"This expedition succeeded in finding new important silver mines in East Canada, near existing silver mines at Cobalt, Subsequently large coal fields were discovered, which, according to the opinion of geologists, contain the best coal for nd anywhere on the American continent. It is estimated that these coal fields contain 9,000,000,000,000 tons of coal.

PREACHING SEDITION IN THE HEART OF LONDON

East Indian Cult Strenuously Propagates the Doctrine of Freedom from the Rule of Great Britain

LONDON, March 16—A grave Indian danger has arisen here in a rapidly growing colony of young Indian anarchists who are financed and led by agitators in Paris.

About 600 Indians of the student type are now settled in this city, and many of them are known to be extremists who are openly working to undermine British prestige in India. The attention of the government and the police has been called to recent attempts to glorify political murder and to provoke sedition.

An alarming tendency on the part of a few members of the colony to follow up words by acts, has led the special branch of Scotland Yard to take precautions. High Indian officials here have been guarded at their own request since the two recent assaults in the West End on Sir William Lee Warner, a venerable member of the India Council.

The official organ of the extremists is the Indian Sociologist, printed in London and distributed from Paris by the editor, Shyamaji Krishnavarma, M. A., (Oxon). A new Indian paper called Svaradj (self-government) is to be issued in this city in a few days. The editor is Shrijit Bipin Chandra Pal, who formerly edited New Indian Calcutta, and came to England after imprisonment in India for contempt of court.

Shyamaji Krishnavarma edits the Indian Sociologist from a fiat in the Avenue Ingres, Paris, but he has a London residence—India House, in Cromwell avenue, Highgate—where a number of his Indian friends and pupils live.

Four scholarships have recently been awarded to four "deserving Indians" as a memorial to the four Indian "martyrs" who were hanged last year by the British government for the murder of two defenseless Englishwomen and a native.

The gentle Krishnavarma also proposed to erect a memorial in India. House, Highgate, to the four murderers to commemorate their "deeds of daring and self-devotion."

The four "martyrs" that the Indian anarchists have thus honored are: Prafulla Chaki, Khudiram Bose, Kanailal Dutt, Satyendra Nath Bose.

These murderers were executed after due trial for the bomb outrage at Muzafferpur im May last, which resulted in the death of Mrs. and Miss Kenedy, and the murder of the informer Gosain in the Alipur jail at the end of August.
