DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

The Committee appointed to consider the subject of Domestic Missions, have attended to the duty assigned them, and beg cleave to report :-

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That while we have great occasion for gratitude of heart to the Giver of all Good, for the measure of success which has already attended our labors in the Home Missionary field, it becomes our especial duty to make renewed efforts in aid of this important enterprize; and as tending to this end, Your Committee begleave to suggest to the various churches belonging to this Association, the propriety of organizing an auxiliary Missionary Society, in connection with each church, which Society shall hold membership with the N. B. B. H. M. Society, and make quarterly contributions into its treasury of all funds that may be collected for this object.

Your Committee beg leave also, to remind the Churches of the solemn obligations under which we all rest, to " pray the Lord of the harvest," to send more labourers into his harvest. In view

of which, we submit the following Resolutions :-

1st. Resolved, That we recommend to each Church, the immediate organization of a Missionary Society, as an auxiliary to the N. B. B. H. M. Society; electing its own proper officers, and taking such local measures for raising subscriptions and donations, as in their judgement may be deemed the most expedient; each auxiliary representing itself by delegation, at each annual meeting of the Parent Society.

2nd. That we recommend that the first Monday evening in each month be observed as a season of special prayer in behalf of the missionary cause, both at home and abroad, believing that the God of missions will vouchsafe his blessing in answer to ear-

1st, That the present Proprietor and Editor, the Rev. I. E. Bill, is anxious to transfer the paper into other hands, in order to relieve himself from the embarrassments and cares which it imposes upon him, and in order also, to be able to devote himself entirely to the work of the pastoral office.

2d, He proposes first, to make said transfer to any person or persons belonging to the Baptist denomination in this Province, having the confidence of the body, on condition that the party or parties purchasing, pay to him the sum of one thousand pounds,—parties purchasing, pay to him the sum of one thousand pounds,—parties per cent on the whole amount due the paper, which amount

EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education beg leave to report.:—

That they have received with satisfaction the report of the Committee of management during the past year, when the Seminary was under the direction of their esteemed Brethren Wallace and

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Day; the successful manner in which they conducted the affairs of the Institution reflects much credit on themselves, and the number in attendance especially during the winter months was most encouraging. The Committee confidently anticipate that now the Principal has returned to resume his duties, a fresh impetus will be given to the cause of education in connection with their Institution in this Province.

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Soon after the opening of the present Session it was thought advisable to admit females, twolve years old and upwards, to the instruction imparted in the seminary. They are glad to learn that the experiment has proved successful as far as it has hitherto been tried, and they hope that it will prove highly beneficial in the future when it has come more fully into operation.

The report of Acadia College made to the convention, gives an encouraging statement of the members in attendance; the literary and theological departments evince the able superintendance of the present Professors, and although the financial difficulties surrounding the College are of a serious character, yet they trust that the measures adopted by the Governors, and the labours of the agents now in the field will eventually relieve the College from its embarrasments.

This Association is und er the painful necessity of placing upon its Minutes the following melancholy record respecting certain individuals, who are representing themselves to the people of N. B. as ministers of the gospel in connexion with the Baptist Deno-

1st. Joshua B. Coggswell was charged in the County of Digby, mination. Neva-Scotia, with gross immerality of conduct, for which he was tried by the laws of his country and found guilty; he was also on this account excluded from the church with which he stood connected and consequently deposed from his mi-This Association is informed that subsequently he was partially restored, upon confession to one of the isterial office. churches; but as he has never been restored to his ministerial office by the Nova-Scotia brethren, and has no standing in their Associations as a christian minister, this Association regard his attempts to preach in this Province as disorderly and calculated to disturb the peace of the churches and injure the cause of religion, and therefore cannot hold fellowship with him as a religious teacher.

2. A man by the name of Farnham, has a wife and family living in the State of Maine; but notwithstanding this, in violation of all law, -human and divine-has married a young woman in this Province. Under such circumstances the Baptist Churches of New-Brunswick can in no way countenance him as a minister

3. A young man by the name of Alfred Parker has been traveling through different parts of New Brunswick representing himself as a licensed preacher of the Baptist Church at Nictaux, N.S. It has been ascertained from undoubted authority that he was never licensed to preach by the Nictaux Church, and consequently he is an imposter. His conduct in other respects is spoken of as altogether inconsistent with the requirements of Christianity. This Association therefore advise the churches it represents to hold no communion with the said Parker as a religious guide.

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. Resolved: That the members of this Association most hearth, and unanimously t-nder their thanks to the onurch, Pastor and friends generally, who have so kindly and suply entertained the ministers, delegates and others who have attended our present session. And we desire to express our most earnest and affectionate wishes in their behalf, that God may sanctify the pleasant interviews enjoyed together during the few days past to the spiritual and eternal good of all concerned.

To the Churches embraced in the New Brunswick Baptist Association in 1858.

DEAR BRETHREN :- Among the many important subjects claiming our attention as Baptists, and some of which should be embraced in our annual CIRCULAR LETTER, allow me briefly to ask your consideration.

1st. To the necessity of a more thorough, systematic and joint effort in behalf of the Baptist Home Missionary cause in this

Province. The moral field in which God has called us by His grace and providence to labor, is one of promise and consequent encouragement, provided that as "good stewards" we are faithful in the improvement of the means placed within our reach for the introduction and establishment of a simple, scriptural, experimental and soul-saving faith in "the Lord our Righteousness"; which faith presents in its outward developments a cheerful obedier ce to the divine ordinances and commandments of the New Testament.

To carefully detail all the means or agencies placed within our reach for carrying the gospel to the destitute and for the organization of churches, would necessarily occupy more space and time than ought to be devoted to this letter. But though this cannot be done, we may appropriately instance a few of the agencies appointed of God to this end. And, by giving general character to the few, we may be able to comprehend the whole, as follows, viz :-

A sanctified press; a living and devoted ministry called of God to preach the gospel; the earnest, and heart felt, and united petitims of "God's elect" at a "throne of grace;" the free and voluntary moneyed contributions of the churches and congregations; the organization of a Missionary Society in connection with each Baptist Church, (which society should hold a formal and real connection as an Auxiliary to the parent or general Missionary Society of New Brunswick,) the whole to act in harmony—the one with the other -each and all relying upon, and seeking to secure the gracious influences of the Holy Spirit. These general ideas embody the whole matter, as I apprehend, relating to what is meant by means and agencies for carrying forward the Home Missionary work in the spread of the gospel among the destitute, and

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hi planting churches of the Baptistfaith. And let us not forget. that the same class of general agencies employed by God for the spread of the gospel among the destitute, is ordained by Him as most conducive to the life, and health, and growth of the churches already established; so that by leading our aid to those who are needy, and who may be locally removed far from us, we are at the same time aiding ourselves, and the cause of Christ in our own immediate localities. Thus illustrating the truth of Scripture, "It is more blessed to give than to receive. And also, "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth." But, though these truths have often been strikingly illustrated, yet more frequently have we learned to our sorrow, that "there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty." and a grant mad bob ;

As means and agencies within our reach, and which should he employed in behalf of the cause of Home Missions. I have instanced a sanctified Press, for it has given us the printed WORD of God, instructive and profitable religious books, tracts and periodicals. I have mentioned the necessity of a living and devoted ministry, called of God to preach the gospel, because it has pleased God "through the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe." I have refered to prayer, because "The effectual fervent prayers of the righteous avail much.". And to the free and voluntary moneyed contributions of our churches and congregations for without money, is is utterly impossible to sustain the institutions of religion; and to the importance of Auxiliary Societies in connection with all the churches, and to have said Societies hold a real, and not a merely nominal relation to the General Missionary Society because this course of action is not only feasible in all our different localities, but it would act as a conveyer of more direct information on the subject of missions; create a wholesome emulation among the brotherhood; awaken more of sympathy for one another in the good work; expand more uniformally the energies of the denomination; equalize more truly the burdens to be borne and the necessary expenses to be met. while such a course would tend to concentrate, our endeavours to promote, the same great object and at the same time secure a readier and a larger supply of missionary funds with which to enable the Parent Board to operate. I speak of the necessity of harmonizing throughout the entire body, for "in union there is strength;" and, of our firm and consistant reliance upon the Holy Spirit, because "Paul may plant and Apollos water," but God at ne has power "to give the increase,"

With these brief suggestions, and with a view to the introduction of another important subject for your consideration. I forbear to extend my remarks upon the subject thus, far presented,

and now come to notice.

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me may be prepared to put forth special efforts for the up-building of all the churches represented in this A sociation, "in rightebusness and true holiness," and in an extensive and general revi-

While we have occasion to look up to Heaven in gratitude of . val of the work of God. heart for the increase of numbers and graces which have characterized some of the churches in this Association during the past year, yet, considered as a whole, it is to be feared that we are not in such a condition of religious prosperity as bught to distinguish a people so highly exalted as ourselves, in point of priveleges and

opportunities for usefulness.

Thus far, ever since the day of Penticost, the Baptists have, under God, been largely indebted to Revivals of Religion for whatever of individual and associated prosperity has attended them. In every place, wherever they have hitherto obtained a standing and a name, it has been the result of the Revival of the work of God. As a people, to the praise of God be it spoken, they have ever cherished a love for and partithe spirit of Revivals. tire history of the Baptists could be fully written out, it will be a history of continuous Revivals, from about the year of our Lord 33, to the year of our Lord, 1858. True, there have been seasons of declension and heart-wanderings from God. But never, in all their history, have they been suffered to decline in any community of which we have heard, so far, as to ignore the spirit of reviva.s. No! no! When here and there, for the sins we have committed, the Almighty has "in a little wrath hid His face from us for a moment." His everlasting kindness has soon poured in upon us, and His own work has been revived in His own time and way. Many times, during the past, in different sections, has God seemed to "hide his face from us," but soon, 'with great mercies has he gathered us.' And these gathering seasons have generally,-I don't know but in truth I may say-invariably, been in the midst and by means of Revivals.

But it may not be improper to raise the question in this connection. What have been the leading and most strongly marked characteristics in these revivals of religion among the Baptists, during the past? I answer.—Deep self-abasement, heart brokenness in the sight of God and man; earnest fastings and prayers; the unshrinking presentation and application of the great doctrinal and practical truths of the gospel; relating to the sinners heart, and conscience, and life, being all sinful, and dangerous, and destructive. His utter inability to save himself; his lost and rained condition; the absolute necessity of regeneration which has its only life and manifestations by the Sovereign Spirit of the Almighty, begetting within the human soul a living faith in the atoning merits of a crucified Redeemer; making salvation, "by grace though faith;" gui ing the souls of the redeem-

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ing ass hri he r mmc t is raye elves hrou jay i louse vindo varme Sep ed into immediate obedience to the divine commands; influencing hem to cleave to the Law and the testimony with one heart, and one mind; saying to the world, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, and he that believeth not shall be damned." Shall be saved! Not he may be saved.

One sentence more upon this point, and I hasten to a close, viz:
The ordinary means of grace, the Baptists have hitherto relied
upon, under God, for their prosperity, and the potency and Sovereignty of God will continue to be manifested through them in
time to come, as in time past.

God is doubtless waiting to prove us. Not that he is, or has been unacquainted with the slightest secrets of our hearts.—For "all things are naked and open unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do." But God would prove us to ourselves. He would have us see and feel our unworthiness, our dependence and our want.

Let us not longer abuse his mercies or presume upon lis long forbearance. Souls are perishing around us and pasing on to the solemn Judgement. Shall we suffer them still to ass on, unwarned and uninvited! God forbid. Let the love of hrist, and our own pressing necessities lead us all to join in he prayer of the prophet, with all the fervency and energy of mmortal beings, O Lord revive thy work. But let us stop not here, it is well to pray but we must watch, and labor, in connection with orayer. If we pray for God to revive his work, let us hold our selves in readiness to be employed by him as instruments hrough whom his work shall be revived. Praying that God may incline our hearts to bring all our "tithes" into his "storelouse" that we may preve Him, and that He may "open the vindows of heaven" and pour us out a blessing equal to ear varmest desires.

The Brance es taught during the year are Reading, Writing, Written and Mental Arithmetic, Composition, English Grammar, Geography, Book keeping, Algebra, Plain and Solid Geometry, Navigation, Natural Philosophy, Natural, History, English and Roman History and the Latin, Greek and French Languages. From the Report of the Teachers your Committee are gratified to learn that the classes generally have made highly satisfactory progress.

4. The first half year closed with a Public Exhibition consisting of Declamations, Dialogues, and an Original Essay.-The second half year closed on the 4th of June, with a Public Examination of the classes and the delivery of several Original Essays

eliciting the highest commendation.

5. A course of these Lectures on Scientific and other subjects, were delivered by Bro. Day in the month of April for the special

benefit of the students. The public were also admitted.

6. The Theological Class studied Dr. Angus' Bible Hand Book during the greater part of the year under the direction of the Principal, besides writing sketches of sermons weekly for criticism and receiving a course of Lectures on Ministerial and practical duties.

7. Your Committee would express their high appreciation of

the services of Brethren Wallace and Day, during the past year, and as Bro. Wallace is now called by other engagements to retire from the Institution, he bears with him the best wishes of the Committee of Management, and doubtless a consciousness of having faithfully discharged his duty.

8. Your Committe learn with pleasure that the Rev. C. Spurden is expected in a few days to resume his former post in the Seminary and in conclusion they commend him and the Institution over which he has so long and efficiently presided to the

sympathies, prayers and benevolence of the Churches.

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CONSTITUTION.

OF THE WESTERN N. B. BAPTIST ASSO-CIATION.

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ARTICLE 1. This association composed only of Ministers and Delegates, who shall be members of "Churches which they represent; shall be styled "The Western N. B. Baptist Association.'

Art. 2. The Association shall meet annually, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on the second Saturday in Sept, at such place as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The Miceting shall be opened with Social Conference, after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

Art. 3. Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more; but no Church, however numerons, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

Art. 4. At each meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding year shall call for the vote of a Moderator, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator, to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk, to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the press.

Art. 5. It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Measengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminutions within the last year: and generally of whatever relates to its place and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

Art. 6. When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by letter and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order; this being done, and a tote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, in behalf of the association, give to one of their Messagers, if any be present, the light hand of fellowship.

Art. 7. When a church shall neglect to make any communicaon to the Association for three years successively, it shall be onsidered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped om the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its ontinuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing and port at the next meeting of the Association.

Art. 8. Although as an Association, we disclaim all power over he Churches, so far as respects any interferance with their indeendence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for urselves of the propriety of continuing any Church or Miniser in our connexion, which to us shall appear to be unscriptural principle or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we lay not withdraw our fellowship without sufficient reason from ny Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made y two members of this body. it shall be the duty of the Assocition to appoint a Committee to investigate the points of complaints and report the result of their inquiries to the Association, hat they may decide by the evidence produced.

Art. 9. Alterations or amendments may be made in this Consitution from time to time such as experience may dictate. by adjourn near from time to time during the section of the Assometion, shall be opened and concluded by prayen
