IS FIGHT IMMINENT OR ACTUALLY IN PROGRESS IN THE NORTH SEA?

FRENCH AND AUSTRIANS HAVE BEEN BROKEN OFF

cause Austrian Troops Aid Germans --- Belgrade Still Under Siege---All Approaches to Brussels Strongly Guarded---Liege Still Held by Belgians

Diplomatic relations between France and Austria have been booken and the ambassadors have left the capitals. The French foreign office in a statement says the initiative was taken by France because Austrian troops were a

not known.

The Germans occupy the city of Liege, while the Belgian troops hold the forts. The Belgian official view is that the situation is quite satisfactory. Strong forces guard all the approaches to Brussels.

The Austrians before Servia are still bombarding Belgrade, while part of the Servian army is taking the offensive in Bosnia.

The North Sea is again closed to the fishing fleets, which is regarded as significant, in view of the fact that there are large British and German flegts in that water.

The German cruiser Kartsruhe, which arrived at San Juan, Porto Rico, reported an engagement Friday night off the Bahamas with four Beltis and Teansh cruiser.

All Germans and Austrians in Belgium must declare themselves All Germans and Austrians in Belgium must declare themselves within twenty-four hours, or they will be arrested as spies.

London, Aug. 11—No great battle has yet been fought on land or sea in the war of seven nations, unless the German assault on the forts at Liege eventually assums the proportions of a battle in history. Both combatants claim the victory there, with the Belgians still holding the forts and the Germans occupying the city.

The situation is a unique one. There is no confirmation of the Daily Mail's report that the French have engaged the Germans, and cut off their retreat, inflicting a loss of 8,000 men.

The Belgians claim that they have taken 8,000 prisoners on Belgian soil, but military men regard all the estimates of the belligerents as great exaggerations.

Apart from Liege the fighting of the first week, when resolved to the proper perspective, eventually, will doubtless be considered insignificant.

Initiative Taken By France Be-Official Warning Sent Out By Admiralty--Re-Austrian Cruisers Bombard Monport to Belgian Consul at New York Says Britain in Control of Sea as Far as Antwerp -- Liege Forts Still in Hands of Belgians, Official Despatch from Brussels Says--Battle on Historic Waterloo If Belgians Have to Abandon Namur.

London, Aug. 10.—British Admiralty this afternoon of-ficially notified boats to keep clear of the North Sea. This may be taken to mean that a naval engagement may be in

progress or will be fought shortly.

Pierre Mali, Belgian Consul here has been officially notified by his government today that Great Britain is in complete control of the English Channel and North Sea as far north as Antwerp. This bears out a report that the German fleet has been driven back toward Holland.

M. Mali also stated that only two of the forts about Liege remain standing out against German invasion, and that these two would soon be abandoned, the Belgians planning to retreat to Namur. If that city falls, he said, a great battle

will undoubtedly be fought upon the battle field of Waterloo.

Paris, Aug. 10.—It is admitted by the war office that a fresh cavalrly patrol was routed by German cavalry supported by infantry and artillery at Longuyon.

TWO MORE PRIZES CAPTURED.

Antwerp, Aug. 10.—Austrian steamers Zora and Prazattus seized in port by Belgian authorities this afternoon.

BELGIANS WITHDRAW FROM LIEGE.

Amsterdam, Aug. 10.—Liege has fallen and is now in the hands of the Germans, according to late advices received here. General Leman, Belgian Commander, withdrawing his troops in orderly retreat from the ring of forts.

Folkstone, Eng., Aug. 10.—Sixty Germans were arrested here this afternoon as they were waiting for a boat to carry them to Hamburg. Many were accompanied by their wives. One had over \$5,000.

AUSTRIA AND FRANCE BREAK OFF NEGOTIATIONS

Paris, Aug. 10—The Austrian ambassador, Count Szecson Von Temerin, left Paris tonight.

In announcing the breaking off of relations with Austria, the French foreign office made the following statement:

"Contrary to assurances given by Austria to the French minister of foreign affairs, that no Austrian troops were taking part in the Franco-German wan, the French government has ascertained beyond any possible doubt that certain Austrian troops are at present in Germany, outside the Austrian frontier. These troops, which have set free certain German troops destined to be employed in fighting the French, ought indubitably, de facto and de jeure, to be considered as acting against France. In these circumstances the French ambassador was ordered to leave Vienna.

SUGGESTS GERMAN RESERVISTS REPORT TO OFFICIALS.

The government suggests that all German reservists now in the Dominlon who wish to avoid summary arrests should go to the nearest magistrate, or other public officer, and file a statement that they wish to be considered as peaceful and law-abiding residents in Canada.

In regard to the report today of the destruction of a bridge north of Valcartier, presumably by some German or Austrian, it is stated that this bridge is one hundred and sixty miles north of the point of mobilization, and there is nothing to show that it was destroyed by design. At the same time Col. Hughes points out that all guards at railway bridges or other public works are instructed to shoot to kill in case orders are not obeyed by any one acting in a suspicious manner.





Brussels, Aug. 10.—The Belgium war office issued a statement saying all residents of the village of Seiron, near Pepinster, were massacred by German troops because the gardeners working in a field fired upon a detachment of 200 Germans stationed at a farmhouse where garden hands were employed. The official statement says three, gardeners were first shot down and then all in village put to sword.


