GALLANT SERB ARMY ADVANCES AND TAKES BULGARIAN TRENCHES

Germans and Their Allies Fail to Hold Soldiers of King Peter in Check-British Troops Raid Hun Trenches Northeast of Macedonian Border

Saloniki, Oct. 24, via London, 1.53 p.m.—The Serbian first army fighting in Southern Serbia has made an advance and has captured the first Bulgarian trenches, according to a Serbian official statement made public here today. The text reads:

"On October 9, Russian calendar, (October 21), German and Bulgarian troops fiercely attacked the Serbian Vardar division without any success the whole day. On the other hand our first army advanced on its whole length and took the first Bulgarian trenches and a trench mortar,

"On the night of October 3, 10, (October 21:22) severe fighting took place between our Vardar division and Bulgarians north of Velyeselo willage which ended in our favor.

Dr. Menard, who has lost a finger from each hand, has accomplished admirable results in the location of projectiles in the bodies of wounded coldiers. The loss of his finger did not deter Dr. Menard from following up his research work in the radiographic room. Tissue cells exposed frequently to the X-ray are liable to mainutrition.

Through Dr. Menard's experiments at the Cochin Hospital a surgeon there was able a few days ago to locate and extract in ten minutes a shrapnel bullet lodged under the heart of a wounded soldler.



"The German people, freed from the iron yoke which has bound them to untold sorrow and destruction, will bend their energies to paying the heavy penalties and repdiring the heavy penalties and destruction, will thus released, rebuild their nation under the rule of peace. During the years that this is being accomplished, animostites will die out. There will be no economic warfare under these conditions—that is, no bitter, commercial warfare waged by one nation against another.

"But such conditions of lasting peace for the world can be brought about only, it must be apparent, by the complete extermination of German military power."




