"But all this work cannot be carried on without MONEY, and while many of New Brunswick's sons are on the firing line serving their country and willing if called upon to give their lives, we at home must not be less ready to do our part in giving generously of our time and money to the cause of the Red Cross.

"As this is the beginning of the latter half of the year 1917, it has seemed advisable to our reports to review what has been done by New Brunswick during the last six months from January to June.

"Financially we have received in the way of contributions the sum of \$3,835.60. Adding to this amount our balance in the Bank and Cash on hand January 1st, 1917, and all other sources of income we have a total of \$12,063.20.

"Expenditures have amounted to \$8,737.26, of which \$5,775.15 was sent to Headquarters Toronto, for the general and various special funds: \$965.15 to Mrs Rivers Bulkeley, for The Prisoners of War; \$83.39 was spent for supplies for the \$2. James street Military Hospital, and \$51.01 for the Pitt street Annex. The Kings county grant, which with interest amounted to \$1,004.85, was divided as requested between the nine chartered branches in the county, each receiving an equal amount, \$55.00 came as a gift from one of our branches for a special purpose and was rowarded as such, and the sum of \$902.71 was used in the general running expenses of the Branch in all departments of its work. This leaves a belance on hand at present of \$3,325.94, and of this amount a considerable portion is to be sent at once to Toronto for the purposes specified by the contributors.

"The months from January to June see a transition from winter to summer, and a consequent change in the life of many people, who leave their city homes and winter activities for those which the country provides, but the war still goes on, and one thing which we must all take wherever we go is our Red Cross work. Those of us who were fortunate enough to hear Dr. J. W. Robertson (president of the Ottawa Branch) while he was in St. John, realized from what he told us of conditions in France, how necessary it was that all work should be kept up 'to the greatest possible degree, in order that the Canadian Red Cross might be able to continue sending those supplies to over 1,800 French Hospitals so sadly in need of them, as well as to the many Canadian Hospitals in England and on the continent.

"During the past six months the Province of New Brunswick has been able to send overseas 585 boxes, containing:

"18,531 Prs. Socks and other knitted Articles.

"13,422 Garments for Hospital Wear.

"7,285 Articles of Linen and Bedding.

"636 Comfort Bags.

"500 Assorted Bdgs.

"1,022 Personal Property Bags.

"456 Hot Water Bottle Covers.

"422 Articles in connection with operation and Hospital work.

"1,864 Abdominal Binders.

"975 bis. Maple Sugar.

"During the winter when several battalions were quartered in St. John and the returned soldiers also came to our city, we were able to supply both Military Hospitals with many things which were needed for the comfort of the patients. About 2.250 articles were sent to the St. James street Hospital, and 1,000 to the Pitt street Annex, and some supplies were also sent to the Parks Convalescent Home. The Rothesay Branch forwarded 6 Quilts to the Santiarium at Kentville.

"Since the first of the year 114 new names have been added to the list of Life members in thee Province.

"This is a condensed account of what has been done in New Brunswick during the first half of this year of 1917, and our thanks are due to every individual who has in any way contributed toward this work. As the men in the trenches stick to their task of fighting for us, so must we stick to the gentler task of caring for them when sick and wounded, always remembering that through the medium of the Red Cross Society, every effort brings its result.

"I have much pleasure in submitting this report."

"In addition to this, from January 1st to June 1st, the sum of \$1,820.00 was forwarded by some contributors direct to head office.

"I had a message to bring home to all the workers in the Province from the Central Council at Toronto, and it was this: "That they are much pleased with the organization of the Branches and the work being done in New Brunswick, and wished to convey through me, an appreciation of the interest taken by the people in this Province in the work of the Red Cross."

The Executive feel that they need hardly say how great the needs are, and are quite sure that if a properly organized campaign is conducted a very generous response will be given by the people of Canada as a whole.

The experience in the past, so far as the larger centres are concerned, is that a "Tag" or "Flag" Day has been very successful, and will doubtlees prove so on this occasion. Of course you will understand that this campaign is to be completed on the day of the 14th of July, it not being the intention that any protracted efforts shall be made.

The Executive feel assured that they can depend upon yourself and your Committee doing all in your power to make the campaign a success.

CHANCE VS. SELECTION.

One of the greatest advantages of the system of selective draft as a tans of providing soldiers for the Canadian armies is that it leaves nothing to chance; the men selected for military service are those who can best be spared from our industrial and commercial life.

The bill involves no new principle for the Canadian Government has always had authority to call upon the man-power of the country for military service for the country's defence, either in Canada or overseas. The first Canadian Militia Act, in the drawing of which Sir George Cartier was much concerned, conferred this authority upon the Federal administration. This act was amended during the tenure of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, but the changes (made in it were but of minor importance, the principle giving the Government authority to mobilize the manhood of the nation for defence remained as in the original.

Under the Militia Act the names of eligible men were secured and drawn for by lot. There was no thorough provision for exemption. Any man of imilitary age, drawn in such haphazard fashion, was bound to serve under the colors, no matter what local condition might deter him from military service, or what amount of embarrassment would be caused by his removal from

The Military Service Bill, now before Parliament, marks a change in its most important particular. Under it the value of a man's service to the state will determine whether he shall don khaki or continue in civil life. The advantage of such a wise measure is readily evident, but let us illus-

The same measure of exemption is provided in the case of such essential industries as mining, shipbuilding, munition manufacture and any other occupation which it is in the interest of the country to develop and maintain at the highest point of efficiency.

In other words conscription by selective draft will put into uniform only the men whose places in civil life can easily be filled. It will also take that account the social condition of the man. Thus, married men with dependents will not be drafted until the supply of unmarried men without de-

ndents has been exhausted.


