BRITISH AVIATORS BOMB ENEMY ENCAMPMENTS

AN OPEN CONFLICT FEARED BETWEEN RUSSIAN FACTIONS

Serious Situation at Petrograd and Moscow -Prince Troubetskoi Charges That "Sacred Revolution" Has Fallen Under "Coarse Claws" of Plunderers.

Petrograd, Aug 24—Conferences preliminary to the approaching fate-ful "Extraordinary National Council" have been held at Moscow under the chairmanship of President Rodziank of the Duma.

The differences between the Government and the "Bourgeoisie" were sharply emphasized, the only exception being made for Premier Kerensky whom some of the speakers acclaim ias capable of saving the country on the condition that he liberate himself from Socialist and Council of Deputites control.

Press Excluded.

Nationalities, 10 from the Cossack Council, 15 from the Pitrograd municipality, 14 from the universities, and in addition delegates from Zemstvos, labor unions, academies of science and arts, the women's unions and the Orthodox church.

Prince Troubetskol, in a sharp speech, attacked the Government, declaring the sacred revolution had fallen under the "coarse claws" of men who think only of plundering the National riches and of their own interests.



FIVE GERMAN AIRPLANES FALL IN FRENCH LINES

Cannonading Rather Spirited in the Region of the Teten-Enemy Artillery Bombards the French Front Lines on the Verdun Front.

Paris, Aug. 24.—The following communication was issued by the war office this evening:

"In Champagne the cannonade has been rather spirited in the region of the Teten.

"On the Verdun front the enemy artillery, which was energetically counter-shelled, bombarded the front lines we captured recently, especially to the north of Hill 304 and between No infantry action took place.

"The number of prisoners captured" this morning at Hill 304 exceeds 100.

"A German aviator was brought down this morning in the Courieres Wood by our machine guns. Five more German alrelanes fell inside their lines, following fighting with our pilots.

"Army of the east August 23: There has been feeble artillery activity all along the front. We have repulsed, north of Monastir, an enemy patrol. Strike Musicors have bombed enemy encampments in the environs of Demir-Hissar."
