THE FERRY FROM CAMPBELLTON

Cross Point has been leased by the Department of Inland Revenue to Mr. Quinn, of the Quinn family, for a term of years. If Mr. Quinn gets the assistance from the Dominion Government either in the shape of a grant or an annual subsidy for mail service, he will put on a steam ferry boat next season, which will be a great accommodation to the travelling public, and one that has been required for many years. We hope the Government will grant the necessary aid, and thus put an end to the present old fashioned and slow method of crossing the river, which is sometimes too rough to cross by scow or punt, and much time is thereby lost.
