NEW BANK NOTES.

The People's Bank is putting into circulation, says the Gleaner, the first of its new issue of bank notes. The bank managers recently procured a new and distinctive design for a bank note, and have had face value of \$200,000 printed from the new plates. The new paper is known as the Jubilee issue. The notes are in two denominations, tens and fives. The ten dollar note, which is being paid out by the teller to-day, has a well executed photograph of Hon. A. E. Randolph, the president of the bank, in the centre of the right side of the face of the bill. At the upper left hand corner is a very true likeness of the Frederickton Parliament buildings, while the lower corner contains a photo of Her Majesty the Queen of 1887. The issue is dated June 23rd, 1897. The five dollar note is similar in appearance, except that the positions of the photos of the Queen and Parliament buildings are transposed. The bank's old issues of bills of the above denominations will be withdrawn from circulation, and the notes of the Jubilee issue substituted therefor.

THE IMPERIAL IDEA.

A BRITISH POLITICAL BOSS.

The difference between politics in Great Britain and politics in the United States is illustrated by the retirement of Lord Londonderry from the Presidency of the Union of Conservative Clubs on account of the "subordination of Conservative principles to the dominating will of Joe Chamberlain." This merely means that Chamberlain has made himself the boss of the Conservative party, and Lord Londonderry does not propose to stand it. And yet, compared to our bosses, Joe Chamberlain is as mild-mannered a boss as ever scuttled a party.—New York World.

A TERRIBLE ADVENTURE.

Sir W. McGregor, Lieutenant Governor of British New Guinea, says in his annual report to the Colonial Office: "One of the most striking events of the year was the arrival in the colony of the remains of an expedition fitted out in Kaiser-Wilhelmsland, and led by the well-known traveller, Herr Otto Ehlers, who was accompanied by Herr Piering, officer of police at Friedrich-Wilhelmsland. They had, on setting out, forty-three colored carriers and a Creole servant. It was calculated that they carried with them provisions for thirty days. They were furnished with eight rifles and two shotguns, but were not provided with instruments for geographical determination, nor with materials for making collections in natural history, but they carried some trade goods. Rainy weather set in even before they reached the inland village, and there the first death occurred. They met with no native track beyond that place, but were constantly exposed to rain and damp fogs while cutting their way through dense forests, and down steep mountains, and across precipitous ravines, swimming rivers, devoured by myriads

LORD MAYOR'S SHOW.

The Lord Mayor's show is not as picturesque a function in these days as it was of old. When Sir John Lemon of the Fishmonger Company was Mayor of London in 1616, the first pageant was a fishing boat, with fishermen seriously at labor, drawing up their nets, laden with living fish, and bestowing them bountifully upon the people. Next came a crowned dolphin, "and because it is a fish inclined much by nature to music. Arion, a famous musician and poet, rode on his back. A lion tamer richly laden with fruit and flowers was intended as a pun on the Lord Mayor's name. The last part of the procession represented 'London's great day of deliverance, when Wat Tyler was slain: on the top sat a victorious angel, and King Richard was represented beneath, surrounded by impersonations of royal and kingly virtues.' The Lord Mayor's show suffered an eclipse during the Protectorate, but with the restoration the old splendor was renewed, and in 1830 the Royal Oak was awarded the place of honor.
