TRIAL OF MR. O'DONOHUE.

After a jury had been sworn and the formalities adopted as in the other cases, the Attorney General briefly stated the case. Towards the conclusion of his speech he observed that there being no evidence of any declaration by the prisoner of his motives and intentions in joining the rebels, it might be argued by his counsel that his object was not revolutionary. He (the Attorney General) contended that he, having joined the ranks of the rebel army, was equally guilty with the leaders, and must be supposed to have had the same objects in view, and to have adopted their plans.

Prisoner.—It is right, my lord, to say that I don't wish to escape upon the poor miserable pretext which the Attorney-General would put into my mouth.

Chief Justice Blackburn.—You had better leave your case in the hands of your counsel.

Mr. Meagher.—It is right to say, my lord, that it was not intended to put the defence of my client upon that ground.

Prisoner.—I will not escape upon such a miserable pretext.

Chief Justice.—You have very able counsel, and I would advise you to leave your case with them.

Prisoner.—I say I will not be made the miserable creature of, described by the Attorney General, the better to give him an opportunity of swagging.

Attorney General.—My lord—

Chief Justice.—You had better not mind the prisoner.

Mr. Meagher advised his client to remain silent.

The court then adjourned.

Fatal Accident within sight of the Queen.

On the 9th instant, the Fairy, royal yacht, had arrived near the Spit buoy, from Osborne, on her course to Portsmouth, having on board the Queen, Prince Albert, and the royal children, when her Majesty's trip was rendered peculiarly painful from a very deplorable accident which happened in sight of the royal yacht. A shore boat, with seven persons on board, had, in a sudden squall, unfortunately upset, when five women and two men were engulfed in a rough sea, with every prospect of certain death. The Gypsy, custom house cutter, however, observed the accident, and a boat put off to the spot; and, after much beating about, on account of heavy sea and wind, picked up Locke, a waterman, and saved his life. The accident having been perceived on board the royal yacht, she was, by her Majesty's command, instantly stopped, her barge lowered and promptly steered to the scene of the disaster. Two individuals were taken on board, and immediately conveyed to Portsmouth, where medical assistance was afforded and one woman named Moore recovered, but the other could not be resuscitated. Out of the seven therefore, only three were brought ashore. A steamer was instantly ordered to assist in recovering the remainder. A messenger from her Majesty called at the house where the parties lay, to ascertain if any of them had been restored to life; and soon afterwards the lieutenant-governor and his staff rode down to the same house, and made particular inquiries at the request of her Majesty. Her Majesty remained on the pier in the Clarence Victualling yard until the return of Lord Adolphus Fitzclarence with the melancholy account, when her Majesty proceeded to Windsor Castle.

The late George Stephenson.—The Liverpool board of the London and North Western Railway, on the 6th ult., officially recorded, in reference to the lamented death of this great man, the strong sentiments which they entertained of admiration for his talents and esteem for his character. His death they regarded as a national loss; and when, two years ago, the directors entrusted to Mr. Gibson the duty and privilege of producing a statue that might do honor to their friend,

then living amongst them, they did not anticipate that on the completion of that work of art the great original would be no more; that they should be constrained to accept the marble effigy of the engineer in lieu of the living presence of the man. The earnest sympathy of the directors was expressed towards the son of the deceased.

General Narvaez and the American Minister.

Narvaez, has it seems, managed to get into a quarrel with General Saunders, the American minister. On the 30th September the Minister's lady and two daughters had just seated themselves in their carriage, which was standing before the embassy door, when a party of civic guards approached, and prevented the coachman from starting. Their leader then inquired which of the embassy servants was Fernando. The individual in question, who was no other than the footman then putting up the step, on hearing his own name from the mouth of a policeman, who stood with a warrant in his hand, made a precipitate retreat within the portal of the embassy. Meantime the ladies in considerable alarm, alighted. The general was not at home; but it was soon explained to his family that, about two years back, Fernando had been drawn to serve in the army, but had then procured a substitute; which substitute having just been shot in Catalonia, Fernando became liable to serve in his place. The civic guard remained baulked of his prey in the portal of the embassy, till the general came in. Meanwhile the ladies proceeded on foot through a shower of taillie place of their engagement. When the general entered, he observed with considerable surprise a large crowd of common people about his door, with the three cornered hats of the tall gendarmes in the midst. The chief policeman attempted to explain his mission, and show his warrant, whereupon the general observed that he was not in the habit of receiving messages from the Government in that form, refused to look at his warrant, and expressed his intention of extending the fullest protection which the American flag could afford to his servant, and upon intimation of the part of the policeman that the latter would be put to the disagreeable necessity of entering the house, in order to seize the servant, admonished him of the responsibility which he, his employers, and the Spanish Government would incur by violating the domicile of the Minister of the United States. General Saunders has addressed a most energetic note to the Spanish Government, demanding immediate satisfaction for this gross outrage, and unless he re-

ceives it, and also the execution of Fernando from military service, he will immediately retire from Madrid. This escapade of the police may possibly cost Spain the island of Cuba.

Halifax, Oct. 24.

An attempt was made on Sunday morning to break open the bank of Nova Scotia; but after having succeeded in cutting a large square in the door, and otherwise damaging it, the burglars gave up the undertaking in despair. No discovery has yet been made; but it is hoped that the reward offered in our paper this morning, will be the means of leading to the detection of some of the miscreants.—[Colonist.]

ATTEMPT TO MURDER.—On Sabbath evening last, a man named George McLaughlin stabbed another of the name of George Young, of the schtr. Water-itch, laying at Connor's Wharf, with a knife in the breast, and severely wounded him, but it is thought will not prove fatal. McLaughlin was taken up and placed in the Lock-up-house, where, on Monday morning it was found that during the night he had broken up the brick floor and largely in the ground underneath, with the intention, it is thought, of escaping by one of the sewers. He was then taken to the common jail for safe keeping, and further investigation.—[Ib.]

The Hero of a Hundred Statues.—Another statue of the Duke of Wellington is to be put up in the Tower, and in fact, London is becoming a sort of livery-stable, where the Hero of Waterloo and his horse are being constantly put up. The Duke's head will soon be as familiar an object in the metropolis as the top of the Monument or the dome of St. Paul's. The plume of his helmet has already begun to take its place among the established London weathercocks; and, as to his nose, there is scarcely a bridge on this side of Westminster that is half so conspicuous. There is hardly a street where the Duke of Wellington may not be seen looking in at the top windows, or inhaling the smoke from the chimneys, or preparing to take a gentle trot over the tiles.

SUMMARY OF NEWS

CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

Papers have been received from this colony to the 5th August, which announce that Pretorius had completely cut off and surrounded Major Warden at Bloemfontein, on the 17th July. Pretorius had offered him terms of capitulation, which as he had only a force of 57 men, and was encumbered with about 200 women and children, against about 1200 Boers, Major Warden deemed it prudent to accept. The terms were to respect life and property, and to supply Major Warden with wagons, &c., to transport himself and forces to the Cape Colony. The military movements of the Government were progressing with promptitude. The progress of this Excellency towards the seat of the disturbances is said to be marked by manifestations of the most satisfactory character. In reply to an address presented to him, he assured the colonists that he was determined to make an example of all whom he found in arms against her Majesty, and that he would certainly hang every man whom he found exciting the people to revolt from their allegiance.

DENMARK AND THE DUCHES.

To have been so lately the theatre of war, the intelligence received during the week is gratifying.

The Provisional Government of Schleswig-Holstein (Besler, Reventlow, Schmidt, and Bremer) have taken up their official abode in Schleswig, "important state reason" having compelled them, reluctantly, to quit the fortress of Rendsburg. Nothing certain is known as yet respecting the future members of the new Government, but it is understood the all but final arrangements with regard to the modifications of the conditions of the truce are concluded between the Danish commissioner (Von Reedtz) and the representative of the central executive in Frankfurt, Herr Stedtmann and Herr Pratzke. The latter has left Kiel for the above free city.

According to the Kiel journals, the new Government *ad interim* (the one which will replace the Provisional Government of the anti-Danish Schleswig-Holsteiners, and the 'direct commission' of the Danes) will be composed of the following individuals:—Preussner, Boysen, Von Heinze, and Reventlow, their fifth colleague and president to be selected by them from a list of names drawn up by the Kings of Denmark and Prussia.

Indian Corn has now become so popular in Ireland, as food that the potato deficiency will not be felt as in 1836. The revenue returns show favourably; and all reflecting men, if they will only exercise their reasoning powers, will perceive there is no foundation for the excessive despondency which exists.

DEATH OF MRS. ARMITAGE.—This lady, pronounced by the Duke of Cambridge to be the most magnificent woman in her Majesty's dominions, died very suddenly on the 6th instant, at Birmingham. She had been suffering from a slight disposition for about a fortnight, and it is supposed that disease of the heart was the cause of death. She belonged to Norwich, and was 36 years of age. She weighed 31 st. 11 lb., measured 4 ft. round the waist, 6 ft. round the bust, 7 feet 1 in. round the hips, and 22 in. round the upper part of the arm.

THE EUROPEAN CLUB.—It is with much pleasure that we announce the establishment of a club house at the west end of London for the banking, mercantile, and manufacturing classes, both of the metropolis and the provinces. Such a place of reunion for those classes has long been wanted, and will prove a source of great advantage and gratification to them. That it will be most effectively supported we have not the slightest doubt, though this conviction would not dispense with an early opportunity of pointing out to our banking and mercantile readers in the city the great service it will render to them.

The *Times* states that the British Government cannot attack Austria, if that power insists on retaining the Lombard Venetian kingdom. What good comes, then, of frequent interference in foreign affairs, which can never be followed out?

EMIGRATION.—The Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners have appointed six

vessels to sail with emigrants during the ensuing month of November for Sydney and South Australia. During the present month the following vessels will leave Plymouth, each carrying from two to three hundred men, women, and children:—namely, the *Candahar*, and *Trafalgar*, for South Australia, the *Thomas Morris*, *Walter Arbuthnot*, and *Harbinger*, for Sydney, and the *Duchess of Northumberland* and *Phetis*, for Port Phillip. The New Zealand Company will also despatch a vessel on the 1st proximo, with emigrants, to Otago, Wellington, and New Zealand.

A beautiful gold teapot, which once belonged to the late Duke of Sussex, was forwarded to the Swedish Nightingale while in Newcastle-on-Tyne, by one of her captured admirers.

During the last four years, ending January, the amount of Government stocks standing in the books of the Bank of Ireland has been increased by five millions sterling, and this increase of funded property was greatest in the year of famine—the ever memorable 1847.

Public Meeting.—Dissolution of the House of Assembly.—It is contemplated to call a public meeting in this City, for the purpose of determining the propriety of addressing His Excellency upon the subject of dissolving the present House of Assembly. To this proposition we are inclined to the opinion, that there will not be a disinterested opposing voice. The present coalition executive is not what the people bargained for. Its formation of such discordant materials surprises and disgusts the country. Let the British principle of responsibility be carried out in all its integrity. The Crown has proclaimed it in New Brunswick, and the only opposition it meets with, is on the part of those who are still anxious to perpetuate that loathsome corruption, which has too long bowed down the best energies, and disgraced the character—political and social—of this injured Colony. Until the Executive here has the initiation of money grants, and exercises all the functions, which legitimately belong to it, the Lower House will continue to be justly suspected of time-serving, jobbing and pandering to a false and fleeting popularity.

We sincerely trust that the patriotic and public minded individuals, who are now exerting themselves to remove our present obnoxious, and bastard imitations of British rule, will not relax their endeavours in securing this desirable object. Our worthy Lieut. Governor is, we believe, not only instructed; but is anxiously desirous that the Government of the Province should be essentially British, in every phase, in which it can present itself.

The following is an abstract from the log of the R. M. Steamship *Europa*:—Left Liverpool on Saturday 14th Oct. 1848. at 12 noon, fine clear weather, Wind E.N.E. Sunday, 15th.—Running along the coast of Ireland, fine clear weather, Wind N.N.W. at noon passed Cape Clear, distance 300 miles.

Monday, 16.—Fine clear weather and smooth sea, Wind N. N. E., lat. 51 29 North, long. 17 33 W., distance 293 miles.

Tuesday, 17.—Fine clear weather and smooth sea, Wind S.S.W., lat. 51 14 North, long. 25 18, distance 293 miles.

Wednesday, 18.—Fine clear weather and rough sea, Wind S. S. W., lat. 60 59, long. 32 46, distance 252 miles.

Thursday, 19.—Fine clear weather and heavy swell from S. W., Wind N. W., lat. 49 51, long. 39 35, distance 269 miles.

Friday, 20.—Heavy weather and moderate swell, Wind N. N. E., lat. 48 51, long. 46 25, distance 284 miles.

Saturday, 21.—Foggy weather and smooth sea, Wind S., lat. 46 21, long. 52 49, distance 289 miles.

Sunday, 22.—Foggy and Rainy, smooth sea, Wind S. S. W. and S., lat. 45 5, long. 59 46, distance 302 miles; after part strong gale and heavy sea.

Monday, 23.—Arrived at Cunard's wharf at 7 A. M., having been detained 5 hours off the harbour, distance 172 miles.

SURVEY OF THE SAINT JOHN AND SHEDAC RAILWAY.—This Survey has been prosecuted very diligently, notwithstanding the extreme wetness of the season, and is now draw-

ing to a close. The whole line from Shediac to Lakefield, ten miles from this City, has been examined and levelled, and the Surveying party are now encamped near the Church at Gondola Point. A trial line has been run from the Hammond River, by the head of Forrester's Cove, and through the Lakefield Valley, to Salmon Creek on the Kennebecasis, near the residence of Sheriff Drury. Another trial line is now being examined, from Forrester's Cove, by Gondola Point. The Survey will terminate to the northward of the City line, in the valley at or near Wright's farm, where there is ample space for the terminus and depot.

So far as we can learn, no engineering difficulties or serious difficulties, have yet been discovered on the whole route; but on the contrary, very great advantages and facilities have been found to exist. It only remains for the people of this Province, and in particular those inhabitants of Counties which will be especially benefited by this railway, to set to work in earnest, and with hearty good will, to induce the Legislature and the Government to take such steps as will lead to the commencement of the work next season, and its entire completion in good time. "Wherever there is a will, there is a way"—let us, therefore, resolve to "go ahead."—[New Brunswick.]

A MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT occurred on the 13th inst. at Hamsted, about 7 miles below Gagetown. Two young men were out shooting, and while in the act of climbing a fence, the gun of one of them, named Hugh Cameron, went off, and the whole charge lodged in his neck, causing instant death. The deceased was a very young man.

TARGET PRACTICE.—On three gun detachments of the New Brunswick Regiment of Artillery, in this city, comprising in all, 32 men, proceeded for target practice to the sea shore in front of the barracks. The guns and target were placed on either side of a rocky cove on the shore, and the distance supposed about 450 yards. Considering that this was the first time the men were brought out for such a purpose, and that most of them were totally unacquainted with the method of "laying" field pieces, the practice was generally good. Four shots were placed in the target, two of which were very near the centre, and most of the remainder either struck or passed in the immediate vicinity of the target; indeed, we believe but one really wild shot was made. The firing was for a medal, presented by Major Foster, and was awarded to Sergeant Wm. Rodgers, of Capt. Stewart's company. The other three shots, in the target were placed by Sergeant John Morris, and private Wm. D. Robinson and Robt. Moore.

The Company of "Irish Royals" belonging to the First Light Infantry, also held their annual meeting for target practice on Thursday. The medal was awarded to Sergeant Thomas M. Gee.—[Chronicle.]

FROM MEXICO.—An express had arrived at Vera Cruz from the city of Mexico, bringing information that Tanpico had declared itself independent. The state of Tamaulipas seeks annexation to the Union States.

YUCATAN.—Battle with the Indians.—10,000 Indians attacked the garrison at Yucabca, and killed 200. Loss of the Indians not known.

EXTRAORDINARY SPEED.—Recently in England, on the Great Western Railroad, seventy-seven miles were passed over by an express train in 78 minutes 29 seconds, including stoppage of five minutes thirty-five seconds. Fifty-three miles of the journey were performed in forty-nine minutes thirteen seconds. The speed in some cases was kept up at seventy, seventy-two, and seventy-seven miles an hour. This rate of speed, was attained, it will be observed, on a broad gauge track seven feet wide, and with engines having driving wheels eight feet in diameter. How long will it be before Yankee ingenuity will rival this extraordinary speed?—[Boston paper.]

THE COURT.—The Fall term of the Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, was opened here yesterday (Tuesday) by His Honor Mr. Justice CARTER. His Honor's Charge to the Grand Jury was brief and effective. There were no criminal causes on the calendar for trial. 13 civil causes were entered for trial, one of which was tried yesterday.

The weather during the past fortnight, has been of every variety.—warm, fine, cold, with a large proportion of rain for the last four days. The ground is now saturated to the extent, as to render it unfit for ploughing.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY SHOWS IN CANADA.—The season for these valuable exhibitions is now about closing. We have been handed by a friend, a few of the published reports of these Societies for the present year, which exhibit many proofs of the advancement of agriculture in Canada, a province destined at no very remote period to rival the United States. A commendable spirit of emulation is abroad among the farmers in that Province, which is worthy of imitation in the Lower Provinces. It may not be generally known, that each County Society in Canada receives from the Legislature, three times the amount of the sum raised by the subscriptions of its members, and the District Society, (an honour which comes in rotation to the lot of each Union Society), receives £500 in a round sum. At the late show in the State of New-York, the competitors from the Canada side carried off five prizes. A Canadian took the first dairy prize.

THE QUARTERLY SESSION OF THE GRAND DIVISION, SONS OF TEMPERANCE, was commenced at St. John on Wednesday last, and continued its labours until Friday evening, when it closed. We understand that several important matters were brought before that body, which were disposed of, and that harmony prevailed, which is the strength of all societies.

INDIAN CORN.—We copy the following notice from the Windsor Sentinel of the 24th ult., it goes far to establish the fact of this Province being adapted for the successful cultivation of Indian Corn.

We have been informed that one of our ploughmen in Northampton, (Mr. Shea,) has raised this season between five and six hundred bushels of Corn, of a good quality. Also that the whole amount which has been grown on the flat or interval, which is not quite two miles long, of which Mr. Shea's field forms a part, is over fifteen hundred bushels. These sandy intervals are peculiarly adapted to Corn, as the rays of the sun are more readily absorbed than by heavier soils. It is seldom that the cultivation of this valuable grain does not more than pay expenses, on suitable ground, even in those seasons which are not considered best, but this year the returns will yield a handsome profit.

GIANT PUMPKIN.—At a recent Horticultural Exhibition at Montreal, among the wonders of the vegetable world, was an enormous pumpkin, from the garden of Mr. Allan McDonald, weighing two hundred and eighteen pounds, being twenty pounds heavier than the largest pumpkin on record on this continent.
