

MMERCIAL EFFECTS OF THE REBELLION ON ENGLAND.
The London Mark Lane Express contains article on the effect of the rebellion in a United States on England. It says: ast year we drew from the United States are the content of 2 620 000

Last year we drew from the United States grain and meal to the extent of 2,620,000 qrs., and on the average of the five previous years, 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 qrs. Our grain wants, whatever that may be, for the present year are not likely to be further supplied to any extent from North America; but we have already paid upwards of £6,000,000 for them this year. Increased population, troops and emigrants, with demands from neighboring States on the great lakes, are likely to leave little surplus for shipment in Canada. ment in Cana

Whether North America furnishes Great Britain grain to any extent, for the ensuing portion of the year, will depend upon the price. If the price is low, a very large proportion of the wants of the United Kingdom plied from the United States and Canada; if high, only a small proportion. The wants of Great Britain, aside from what she produces, are equal to any annual average including wheat and flour, and something over 5,000 quarters.

There is now every prospect of our having nearly as large a surplus as we had last year, and from various sources we learn that nearly, one quarter of the last year's crop wheat is still in the hands of the producers. The breadth of land sown this year is said to be one quarter larger than last year. 
