British, Belgian and French Troops Occupy Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhr—President Ebert Warned Inhabitants of All Places Affected by Move to Avoid Any Hostile Demonstrations—British Press Commends Lloyd George for His Determined Stand at Conference.

French Headquarters, Mayence, March 8.—Occupation of the additional greater territory which the Allies had announced they would take possession of as one of the penalties for Germany's failure to meet the Allied reparations demands was carried out today.

DUESSELDORF QUICKLY ENTERED. Dusseldorf, March 8.—Dusseldorf, largest of the German cities to be taken over by the Allies in their advance into additional German territory, was quietly entered by Allied troops early today.

Mayence, March 8.—British, Belgian and French troops entered Dusseldorf this morning.

French and Belgian troops occupied Duisburg at noon.

The Belgians entered Dusseldorf by the bridge over the Rhine, while the Anglo-French forces advanced by way of the Cologne bridgehead, marching to the right bank of the Rhine and entering Dusseldorf from the south and east.

"Service at Cost" Solution of Gas Problem if Ratification by Legislature Is Secured

J. F. Thomson Refused An Audience by City Council—Ald. Bridge Makes Ironical Comments—Ald. J. C. Wilson Says Ponzi Had Nothing On H. B. Ashplant in Handling Figures.

A maximum rate of \$1.25 per 1,000 cubic feet for gas under a "service-at-cost" plan similar to that on which the Consumers' Gas Company of Toronto operates was agreed upon by the city council and representatives of the company last night. The proposal will be submitted to the Legislature for ratification within a few days.

The plan was recommended by the special committee on gas after a two-hour conference with the company in the afternoon. There was another lengthy and warm discussion at the council meeting, in which H. B. Ashplant, joined by representative of the Citizens' Committee.

Under the proposed settlement the city will accept the company's capitalization at \$400,000. Of this \$350,000 is paid-up and \$150,000 is to be transferred from profits and loss account. The company is to have the right to examine the company's books through its own auditors or other experts it may choose.

No further stock is to be issued except for plant and main extensions and any stock issued is to be sold publicly. A reserve fund representing five per cent of the company's assets is to be created to which all repairs and renewals will be charged. The reserve fund from the sale of bonds is to accrue to this account as well as any operating surplus.

The council went into committee of the whole to consider the proposition which was outlined by Ald. Wilson, chairman of the special committee on gas. He pointed out that the three basic items of the agreement were the amount of capitalization to be allowed, the return on it, and the rate.

Several aldermen voiced their objection to this, and Mayor Little said he would not sit and listen to such statements. He withdrew from the council chamber until Mr. Ashplant finished his address. Mr. Ashplant argued that there would be nothing wrong in the possibility he had suggested.

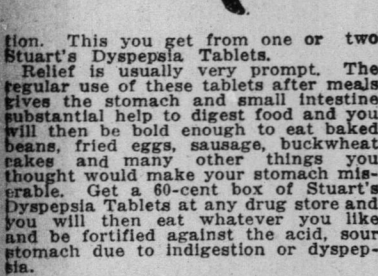

BILL WILL BAR ALDERMEN FROM COMMISSIONS

London's Experience Basis of Measure Now Before Legislature. [Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 7.—In an effort to catch up with work on hand, the Ontario Legislature will resort to night sessions all this week.

he is in favor of some "association" of nations, though not of the league. Once a teacher asked the class in literature what is Rome, as the place occurred in the reading lesson? No one answered. This is geography, said the teacher; then every hand went up. When you call the league an association, Mr. Harding's feelings may not be hurt.

Clearly, the United States, outside the League of Nations, is not tending towards reduction of armaments. Building an overwhelming navy is not obviously consistent with talk of negotiating disarmament. The fact is that financially and economically the United States is more involved than ever before in the war in old world affairs, whether she likes to be or not, and cannot avoid being drawn into any future struggle of large proportions.

BOSTON STUDIES PROHIBITION. An instructive study of the effects of prohibition in Boston and Massachusetts is disclosed in the report for 1920 of the police department of that city, and also in the findings of an exhaustive examination by the Boston League for Preventive Work.

Probably one of the most notable features of the debate just completed at Ottawa was the little support which the premier, in his first emergency, received from his ministry. Of all those who spoke against the no-confidence motion of Mr. King, only three ministers took the trouble to advance extensive arguments as to why the Government should not be voted out.

There is, therefore, a growing feeling among the rank and file that the new prime minister is not securing the wholehearted support and co-operation from his present colleagues to which he is entitled. Attention is called to the fact that the best backing he secured was from such men as Stevens of Vancouver, Manion of Fort William, Scott of South Waterloo, and other young men whose names have frequently been mentioned as cabinet possibilities.

The Ottawa Journal—close to the Government—persists in the opinion that George Bolvin, deputy speaker, will come into the cabinet. In view of the fact that Mr. Bolvin was named in favor of the no-confidence amendment, the suggestion bears its refutation on its own face.

MR. HARDING AND THE LEAGUE. The new president of the United States says that he will have nothing to do with the League of Nations, but will be glad to co-operate with all in the reduction of armaments and promotion of world peace. This is rather like the mother telling her daughter she may go for a swim but mustn't go near the water, even after hanging her clothes on the hickory limb.

EDITORIAL NOTES. With the fatality at Wellington street bridge on Saturday morning, when a six-year-old lad lost his life in the river, comes the pertinent question, "Are the city bridge walks adequately protected?" The child essayed to walk the handrail of the Wellington street bridge, but lost his footing, just how, no one appears to actually know, and fell into the river 30 feet below. NO RESISTANCE TO ALLIED OCCUPATION IS ANTICIPATED

Paris, March 8.—Gen. DeGoutte, commander-in-chief of French forces along the Rhine, received orders from Marshal Foch at 10 o'clock last night to advance upon cities the Allies have announced they will take over as a result of Germany's refusal to accept the Paris plan for payment of indemnities. A strip of land from eight to ten miles deep on the eastern side of the Rhine will be occupied by French forces, says a telegram to the Journal from Mayence.

Dispatches from Mayence declare that the city was outwardly calm, crowds of townspeople contenting themselves by commencing upon newspaper dispatches of the news of the break in negotiations at London. No special measures were taken to evacuate the city, and no resistance to their advance has been apprehended, but it is expected that the military operations have been completed.

ROME, March 7.—Four persons were killed, a dozen wounded and two hundred arrested as the result of a clash between Communists and Fascist or extreme nationalists, in Casale Marino, a town near Rome, today.

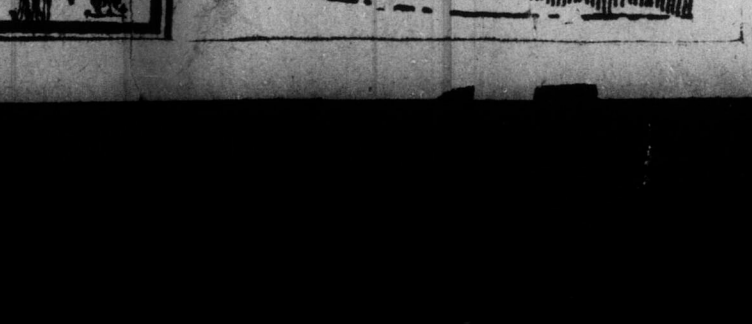

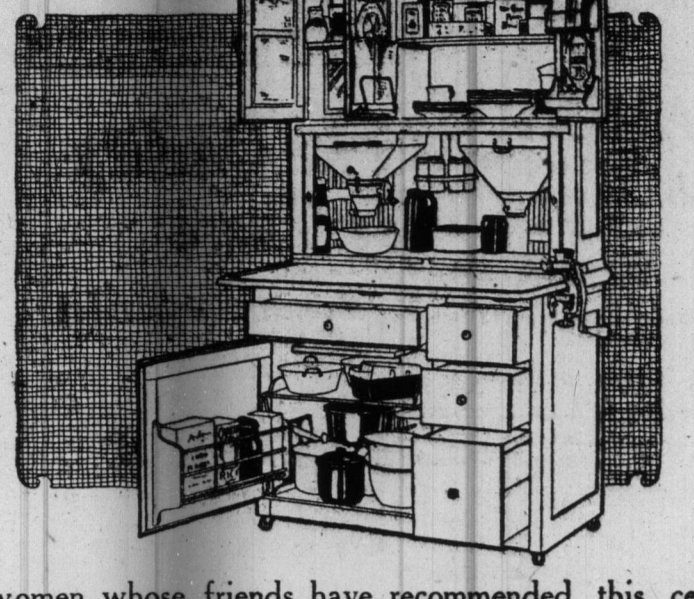

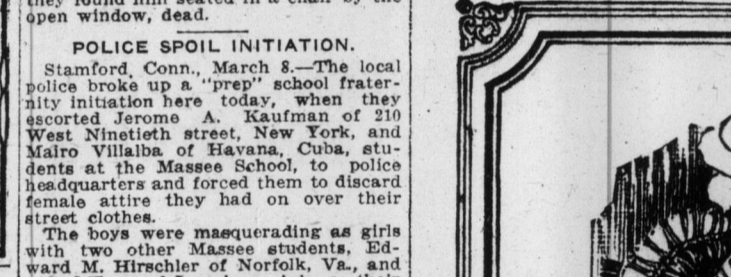
