The notice, which was signed yesterday, stated that uncess a retraction was made before 6 o'clock last night, and that full publicity be given to the same, otherwise a suit for slander would be instituted.

Mr. McPherson said that he had always understood that evidence given in court and at a judicial inquiry is privileged and that any witness has a right to give it without fear of a sander suit, so long as the witness told what he knew to be a fact or believed to be a fact.



French Headquarters, Mayence, March 8.—Occupation of the additional greater territory which the Allies had announced they would take possession of as one of the penalties for Germany's failure to meet the Allied reparations demands was carried out today. No untoward incident marked the eastward move of the Allied troops, so far as reports up to a late hour showed.

DUESSELDORF QUIETLY ENTERED. 

He points out that total debenture debt of the city is now upwards of \$8.400,000, and that it takes approximately one-third of the taxes to pay the sinking fund and interest charges. He believes it would be expedient to adopt a "pay-as-you-go" principle, and to secure such a result it would be necessary to introduce the matter on a graded plan. He argues in favor of the idea.

To put the plan in operation he suggests that application be made in the city of London bill that the city shall not incur any debts, the payment of which is not provided for in the estimates of the current year, for the erection of public buildings, local improvement works, public schools, or high schools, extensions of public utilities,



## THE PROBLEM





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
