Mr. McPherson said that he had always understood that evidence given in court and at a judicial inquiry is privileged and that any witness has a right to give it without fear of a stander suit, so long as the witness told what he knew to be a fact or believed to be a fact.



Will Examine Books.

Under the proposed settlement the city will accept the company's capitalization at \$400,000. Of this \$256,000 is paid-up and \$144,000 is to be transferred from profits and loss account. The council is to have the right to examine the company's books through its own auditors or other experts it may choose. No further slock is to be issued except for plant and main extensions, and any stock issued is to be sold publicly of the company's assets is to be reated to which all repairs and renewisk will be charged. Any premium from the sale of bonds is to accrue to this account as well as any operating surplus, Whenever the surplus in this fund is equal to a gas rate of five cents the rate is to be reduced by that amount. The company is to be allowed a ten-per cent interest on the capitalization and \$2,500 for the payment of a board of directors of which the mayor is to be one member.
