San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 18.—L. W.
Owens, a merchant of Manilla, who arrived here yesterday, says: "A terrible massacre occurred on Aug. 10 in the town of Ponape in the Caroline Islands. The Slave Trade.

CAPE Town, Sept. 18.—Great excitement has been caused here by the arrival of a Portugese steamer loaded with kidnapped natives from Mozambique en route to the west coast. The Tribunal here decided that it was unable to interfere with the steamer, but fourteen natives, in escaping, were deciared free and the Tribunal refused to assist in recapturing them. The Government referred the matter to the Government at London. In the meantime the steamer proceeded.

Berlin, Sept. 18.—The Reichsanzeiger says the principal German official at Zanzibar denies that a proclamation sanctioning slave dealing has been published at Bagamoyo. The false report, he says, was probably circulated by the Arabs. Herr Vosen, for several years German consul at Zanzibar, declares it is impossible that the German East African Company issued the alleged slavery proclamation, because the martial law only allows the Imperial Commission to act in any case.

The Civil and Religious Liberty Committee spent the morning discussing Mr. Dowdney's letter to the Protestant Indians of Oka, upon which strong action may be expected. The Temperance Committee will recommend the Conference to send a strong deputation to the leaders of both the Conservative and Liberal parties and press for national prohibition.

A RECIPROCITY LEAGUE.

Canada and the United States is only beginning to be realized, now that the Mc-Kinley Tariff Bill has passed through the

We in Canada had our own tariff bill of last session, when the duties on many goods which we import from the United States were largely increased. There were many Canadians who thought that the conduct of our Government in framing that measure was exceedingly foolish, as they believed its effect would be to provoke a retaliatory measure at Washington. This view of the situation was forcibly presented to the Government in and out of Parliament, and a moderate course was advised. It was known at that time that a revision of the United States tariff was contemplated, and among all who are friendly to the mainnce of commercial intercourse between the two countries it was felt that nothing should be done by the Canadian Parlia ment to give the Congress of the United States an excuse to make the protective policy of that country more formidable than it then was.

But our rulers at Ottawa were deaf to every protest, and with few exceptions their followers in the House of Commons voted steadily for the increased duties which the Foster Bill proposed. And now we see that what was feared by members of the Liberal party has come to pass.

McKinley has followed the example set by Foster, and improved upon it. The provisions of his bill in so far as relates to gricultural products are bound to be severely felt by the Canadian farmer, especially in such articles as barley, oats, pease, beans, hay, potatoes, horses, cattle, sheep and eggs, almost all of which are well nigh prohibitory. It is no doubt true that in the case of some of those articles a portion at least of the duties will be paid by the conumers; but the natural effect of the tariff will be to restrict trade, and very largely to cut down its volume. Instead of sending 10,000,000 bushels of barley to the United States under a toll of 10 cents per bushel, it is almost certain that we not send 1,000,000 bushels under a toll of 30 cents. And so with everything else which has heretofore found a market in that country; the tariff wall will shut out a very large proportion of what under the old rates found a natural market there, and it does not appear that openings are readily to

be found elsewhere.

The two countries have been led by natural jealousies to believe that they can grow in strength and vigor by the childish grow in strength and vigor by the childisn and foolish resort of thumping heads, and like foolish boys they will be provoked to keep on thumping heads until both are badly hurt unless the counsels of wise and sober men can influence them to adopt a aner policy. One of the best of these suggestions has come from Mr. John Hallam, of Toronto, a gentleman who until ecently viewed with disfavor such a schemof reciprocity as has been proposed by Sir Richard Cartwright in the Canadian Parliament. Mr. Hallam sees clearly the gravity league for the express purpose of educating the citizens of both countries into the acceptance of free trade between m. 

Strauss in Toronto.

The Globe says: "The miscellaneous selections played were very well rendered, particularly as to precision and crispness of ensemble, and as to gradations of tone power, some splendid crescendos and, more difficult still, some really wonderful diminuendos being produced. The effects in this respect were frequently electric in their force; in fact Strauss is nothing if not a believer in contrasts. But it was in the dance music that both conductor and orchestra shone in their brightest. There was in this a dash and spirit and yet an elasticity of expression that clearly showed the grounds for the fame and popularity of this world-renowned band. Shading of tone, extreme in its contrasts yet elegantly and artificially graduated when called for, combined with a tender and ravishing caprice of speed, made the waltzes veritable poems."

The Mail remarks: "The general verdict of the audience of yesterday as to the merits of the performances was a highly favorable one, and Mr. Strauss found his hearers were pleased with his music and delighted with his orchestra. The lightest numbers were the most enthusiastically received, and encores were numerous at both concerts. In the rendering of the dance music the orchestra showed to the best advantage."

The Empire says: "The visit of Strauss and his orchestra has been heralded for weeks past, and musical circles have been on the tiptoe of expectation. A thoroughly critical audience visited the Pavilion yesterday afternoon to hear the first concert, and it is safe to say that a better satisfied assemblage never congregated there. The selection from Carmen and the Moszkowski screnade showed the orchestra to be perfectly at home in other than dance music, and the serenade in particular was a charming variation in the programme."







SCIENTIFIC LONDON.

This City the Center of an Important Institution.

ety of Ontario—A Visit to Their Apartments—The Handsome Library and Collec

The majority of the people in the city are ignorant of the fact that London is the headquarters of one of the most important scientific institutions in Canada, embracing the whole Province in its operation, and the only society in the country having for its object the study and encouragement of that branch of natural science to which it is devoted. The Provincial Entomological Society—foresuch is its name—has been incorporated for over twenty years. Ontario is divided into several sections, from each of which a representative is selected, and also amember from the Montreal division, which is affiliated with the Provincial society. Although independent in its affairs, it is to a certain extent under the patronage of the Provincial Legislature, from whom it receives an annual grant, and to whom a yearly report is made. The society was originated in connection with the Provincial Exhibition and the annual meeting had to be held wherever that Fair happened to be; but since that restriction has been done away with, London has been chosen as the permanent center, where every year the representatives meet for the transaction of business and to discuss matters of scientific interest, with the mutual advantages to be derived from an interchange of ideas.

Fat the last annual meeting, Mr. J. Alston Moffat, of Hamilton, a gentleman thoroughly versed in the departments of natural science, was appointed resident curator and librarian, and has therefore taken up his permanent abode in the city.

Prompted by curiosity an Advertiser reporter paid a visit to the rooms of the society in Victoria Hall yesterday afternoon, and was courteously received by Mr. Moffat, who expressed himself as pleased to give his visitor any information. The apartment is well suited for the purpose and calculated to gratify the senses and delight the eye of the lover of natural science, with its extensive library and magnificent collection — the only one, by the way, of any importance in Canada. On one side is to be found the only collection for nati

Although a person of a scientific turn of mind would be more at home with the collection, yet it cannot fail to be of interest to the uninitiated who can there realize the vast field for study which nature affords, and one can spend many a pleasant hour inspecting the various tribes of insects with their truly beautiful blending of colors.

These rooms are open to the general public, and the obliging curator, Mr. Moffat, is always glad to show visitors the collection and converse on the subject of which he is se fond.
