

The Local Wheat Market Continues to Advance.

THE OUTLOOK FOR WHEAT.

Macy & Pendleton, New York, writ ing on Friday, says: Beerbohm estimates Great Britain will want 180,000, 000 bushels, France 48,000,000, Germany, Belgium and Holland 88,000,000, Italy, 27,000,000, Spain and other smaller countries, 36,000,000, making a total 380,000,000 bushels. The extra amount needed by Germany and France appears about 50,000,000 bushels, and are the only significant items in the report. It indicates an additional call upon American granaries at a time when public stores are practically empty. Thus far the farmers do not sell freely and speculation continues to grow. It looks as though dollar wheat Current says winter wheat condition indications fully maintained; while on the other hand, Mr. Pillsbury, of Minneapolis, reports that threshings reveal ess yield and poorer condition than has been expected. Price Current says corn has had some relief, but its general position is hardly maintained. May sold at 91 cents in Chicago today, thus verifying our letters. We have now made a suggestion of dollar wheat, which really looks to be no higher than 50 cents did last month.

CANADIAN POULTRY EXPORT. A London letter of Aug. 7 says: It may be within recollection that when the first cargo of turkeys, geese and chickens came into Liverpool after the McKinley tariff and did so well, I suggested an all-the-year trade. If prices paid then and since gave profit to the shippers, there is a mine of wealth for Canada untapped in this trade. Our Imports mostly come in at Christmas. The rest of the year the people—the masses—do not eat poultry. Not be-cause they don't like it, but because it is too dear. Yesterday I paid 3s retail for a fowl weighing under 2 lbs. Only those with money can afford to treat poultry as anything but a luxury. 

put a heaping tablespoonful of snow on each side. Dainty and delicious these hot mornings. Buttered Toast-Cut thin slices of white bread. Toast to a golden brown on both sides, spread with sweet, fresh butter and send to the table piping hot

## The Fastest Trains.

Stand High. Over 69 Miles an Hour Run by a Philadelphia Express.

Sixty-Eight Very Fast Runs Made Daily in Great Britain.

The distinction of running "the fastest train in the world" now belongs to the Atlantic City Railroad, which has recently inaugurated a summer schedule which includes a one-hour train between Philadelphia and Atlantic City. The palm for fast running which was held for so many years by the Empire State Express has latterly been claimed by the Caledonian Railroad, Scotland, which was running a regular passenger train on a schedule of about 60 miles an hour. This, which was considerably higher than the booked speed

The train was made up of one com The total weight of engine and was thus about 273½ tons. It will be seen that the locomotive is a very powerful machine, its weight being about two-thirds that of the train and the distance is short compared with that covered by the Empire State Express. On the other hand, the Atlantic City train was longer by one more car than the New York centra train, and its booked speed is about 11 miles per hour faster.

The handling of such a delicate instrument requires a great deal of care, and sometimes coniderable skill and ingenuity must be employed in making the needed attachments. By its use, many stumbling-blocks will be removed, while the calculations and geometrical work which the engineer will be impelled to make in connection with it will lead to the acquisition of a good, general knowledge of the whole subject. Careful consideration of the diagrams from different engines, under varied conditions, cannot fail to lead to thought and investigation. A general knowledge of the law of gases (especially Mariotte's

law) is needed, and a study of physics, mensuration and mechanics is most beneficial.

In order to determine the most economical plan of operating a steam plant, many tests are made. Such tests if properly conducted are valuable, and are much to be appreciated by steam plant owners, who will find it to their nterest to give every encouragen and assistance to the engineer along this line. The diagrams traced by the indicator pencil will vary widely, and depend on the condition of the different igines from which they are taken, and

it therefore becomes necessary to know how to interpret these variations cor-rectly. This information the engineer can only acquire through the processes of reasoning and hard study. In attaching the indicator considerable skill is sometimes needed, and circumances must determine what plan can has been established at St. Louis, and best be employed. The reducing me tion must be such that it will give to the paper barrel in its reduced scale exact reproduction of the move-

Examine your indicator, and see that every part of it is moving freely, has no lost motion, and is well oiled. A cord that will stretch is to be avoided. Good judgment is required in put-ting the proper tension on the paper arrel spring for differently speeded agines. The indicator springs should be tested occasionally to see if they agree with a standard steam guage of known accuracy. Do not use too light a spring for the pressure. If the intrument is a reliable one, and the ecessary precautions have been taken in every particular, the diagram will then show you the pressure acting on the piston on both sides, and at any part of the stroke during one revolution of the engine, and that is all it will do. Knowing the scale of the spring, it is an easy matter to determine the pres-sure at any point of the stroke. African explorers of the Caucasian race agree that one part of the elephant's carcass, when properly cook is a succulent dish that will re gale the most delicate taste. part, very strangely, is the first joint of the leg below the knee, which one would suppose to be the toughest portion of the animal. To prepare the joint a hole, three feet deep, is dug hundreds of thousands of dollars in earth, and the sides of it are baked hard by means of large live coals. 
