say, that a trap is being laid. Over twelve thousand Belgians refurned to Antwerp today, and probably half that number came back from Holland. The only trains running from Antwerp are to Roosendaal, Holland. Hourly service is being maintained both ways during daylight, and all trains are crowded. All the Holland border towns are filled with frantic Belgians, who move about anxiously seeking relatives, and are afraid to return to Belgium. Virtually all the highways in the north of Belgium and in the south of Holland are filled with refugee pedestrians and dog and horse carts loaded with furniture and clothing. Barns, farmhouses, haystacks and cars on side tracks furnish shelter for these travelling families. Holland is harvesting its sugar-beet crop, and some of the refugees are employed in this work.

Country Desolate. The country about Antwerp is desolate, as the Belgians levelled many forests to give the forts a better chance at the approaching enemy. It is estimated that about three hundred buildings were destroyed in Antwerp by bombs, most of these structures being residences. The Hotel de l'Europe and the Tavern Royale, on La Place le Verte were among twenty-five large buildings destroyed by fire caused by Le Verte and other leading business streets were untouched, but all the large business houses are still closed despite the efforts of the Germans to restore normal conditions. Washington, Oct. 24.—The following dispatches were received today at the French embassy: "In the region of Sauterre certain partial successes and in the region of Verdun and Pontamoussan.

ANOTHER U. S. PROTEST

Tank Steamer Brindilla Is Said To Be Similarly Owned.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 .- The United States today protested to Great Britain against the recent seizure of the Platurla, a tank steamer, owned by the Standard Oil Company, now detained at Lewis Island, Scotland.

This protest is identical to the one filed in the case of the Brindilla, held of the sea, which has so far enabled at Halifax, N.S., and requests the immediate release of the ship. Inasmuch as the Admiralty court at Halifax already has begun proceedings to determine whether the Brindilla is a prize, the British Government is expected formally to decline to release the vessel until a decision is rendered. A prize court it is believed will simflarly determine the status of the

Sir 'Cecil Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador, called on Secretary Lansing today to learn the relation between the German company, which formerly owned the Brindilla, and the Standard Oil Company.

WIII Settle Question According to a report of the commissioner of corporations, in 1907, the German company in question was a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, and completely controlled by the latter. If this fact is proven to the satisfaction of the prize court, all doubt as to the bonafide nature of the trans-American registry, will be removed, as Great Britain informally has advised

the American Government that she will accept as prima facie evidence of legitimate transfer all vessels whose ownership is continuously American. The Platuria was similarly owned by a German subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company. Doubt as to the validity of the change of registry would not be a sufficient cause for seizure, however, and British officials pointed out today that reports of unneutral inten tions on the part of each vessel probably would be considered by the prize

Rockefeller's Status Fixed. In the release yesterday of the John D. Rockefeller, bound from one neutral country to another, the principle was tacitly admitted that even, though she carried illuminating oil, now declared conditional contraband, her cargo would not be seized because the country to which she was destined had declared an embargo on the export of the product to belligerent countries.
