OIL AND RAILRO D

Appeal to Roosevelt to Delay Rebate Report.

Special Message With Astounding Revelations Will Be Sent to Congress Tuesday.

Washington, D. C., April 30. to induce him to suppress, or at least to delay, the report on the Standard Oil inquiry concluded by the bureau of corporations under the personal direction of Commissioner Garfield.

The report hits both the Standard Oil and the railroad companies squarely between their corporate eyes. It alleges and proves that the Standard Oil Company in some instances has received rebates on freight amounting to fully 50 per cent of the tariff rates.

Practically every one of the eastern trunk lines and almost every part of every railroad system is concerned in these revelations.

The Standard Oil people have become frightened and they have enlisted the services of the railroad senaare alarmed, because they believe this report, showing as it does direct collusion between the railroad companies and the most hated trust in America, He suggested that the Government will stir up the people to such an extent that all hope of preventing radical railroad legislation will be at an

For this reason the combination of White House begging the President not to send in his message, at least not until after the railroad bill is out of the way.

President Roosevelt thus far has understood the meaning of all these suggestions. He will not suppress the Standard Oil report. It will be sent in to the House of Representatives probably on Tuesday with a special message from the President showing that the work has been done by Commissioner Garfield, under the instructions of the House, pursuant to what is known as the Campbell resolution. A more politic President, one who was in closer touch with the big financial interests, and one who was less might find it convenient to suppress the Standard Oil report, at least for the time being. Not so with President Roosevelt, however. He is fully aware of the tremendous importance of this official indictment of the methods of the Standard Oil Company.

The President has read a complete synopsis of the report, and in addition. has gone over many of the details with Commissioner Garfield, with Secretary Metcalf, and with other members of

The steadily growing prosperity of the country in 1905 had continued during the first quarter of 1906. Continuing, Mr. Asquith called atof the yield of the duties on alcoholic liquors. The change, he added, had apparently affected all classes of society

and will be hailed with pleasure by social reformers. But he doubted whether it was safe to base thereon any wide generalization as to a vast change in social habits.

Mr. Asquith estimated the expenditure for 1906-7 at \$708,930,000, and the revenue at \$724,300,000. There would be, therefore, an estimated surplus of \$15,370,000. Deducting \$2,000,000 for contingencies, they would have a disposable balance of nearly \$13,350,000.
