10 MILLION LBS. OF SUGAR HIDDEN

MARKED FLOUR

U. S. Secret Service Unearths Vast Cache of Sugar Disguised As "Top Crust Flour"-Amounts To 150 Carloads.

Buffalo, N. Y., Oct. 23.—Federal secret service agents today reported to Washington the discovery in a Buffalo warehouse of millions of opunds of sugar in bags and barrels labeled "Top crust flour."

Notations on the packages, it was said indicated that the sugar had been coming into the warehouse over a period of several months. A federal agent who made a survey of the contents of the building estimated the amount of sugar at 150 carloads, or about 10,000,000 pounds.

Around immense piles of sacks containing the sugar the federal agent said he found a screen of other articles, while some of the containers said he found a screen of other articles, while some of the containers marked "top crust flour" actually had flour sprinkled over the outside.

Physicians and Surgeons for Each 1,000 Men At the Front.

Chicago, ili., Oct. 23.—Enrollment of every physician and surgeon in the United States without regard to the state of his finances or dependents, for employment in some form during the war is a probability according to discussions which preceded the opening today of the eighth annual session of the Chincal Congress of Surgeons. More than 2.500 surgeons prominent in this country and in Great Britain and France are in attendance at the clinic, which is to discuss how the United States may best care for its men injured in the war.

Great hospitals are being erected in France, he said, with one bed for every five men, or 200,000 beds. THREATENS DINERS AT A CALIFORNIA BANQUET

SENT TO EARTH BY THE BRITISH Air Operations of Last Few

Days Highly Successful, Is Haig's Report.

EIGHT BRITISH ARE LOST

Naval Aerial Squadrons and Australians Doing Excellent Work.

London, Oct. 23.—Fifteen German aeroplanes were brought down by British aviators in recent fighting over the battle area in l'orthern France, says the official statement on aviation, is used by the war office. German airdromes and rallway stations were heavily bombed. Eight British machines are reported missing. The statement reads:

"Fine weather continued Saturday, and the improvement in the visibility enabled a great deal of artillery observation work and photography to be done. During the day a total of 4 tons of bombs were dropped by our airplanes on airdromes near Courtral and Roulers, on a large gun position near Douai, on billets east of Lens and on other targets in the battle area. At night nearly three tons of bombs were dropped on the Roulers and Lichterveldt rallway stations, where fires were started, and on hostile airdromes in the vicinity of Courtral and Roulers. One of our pilots arrived over a German airdrome as the enemy's night bombing machines were getting off and dropped his bomb among enemy's night bombing machines were getting off and dropped his bomb among

"Heavy fighting took place in the air, chiefly over the enemy's lines. Twelve hostile machines were brought down, and three others were driven down out of control. Another German machine was shot down by anti-aircraft gunfire. Eight of our machines are missing, one of which has not returned from night bombing. Naval squadrons attached to the army have been fighting throughout these operations and have accounted for a large share of the hostile machines downed. Australian squadrons, who have been realning up to the present, now have commenced active work, and have prowed worthy of the high opinion formed of them on their arrival."



Last Week's Examinations Added 4,500 to Total of Men Coming Up.

CITY ELIGIBLES tao(m m fwaoyw ya Nearly 4,500 were examined by the medical boards in Military District No. I last week, according to figures compiled at militia headquarters today.

Of that number, over 2,500, or roughly 55 per cent were placed in Category A, as fit for combatant service at the front, while nearly 2,000 were rated lower than Category A. In the city of London, the three medical boards examined 708 men, 438 of them being in Category A, and 266 of lower standard than A. This is considered an excellent abowing, there being roughly about 65 per cent of those examined in London in Category A. This brings the total number of men examined in Western Ontario under the military service act regulations up to 11,359, of whom 5,563 were in Category A, and 5,496 in categories lower than A.



PUSSIAN ROUBLES—A SPECULATION RATHER THAN AN INVESTMENT.

Our Canadian purchasers of Russian roubles knew when buying these ecurities that they were taking a chance for big gain if Russia righted herself quickly under the new phase of her existence. But they had no leason to expect such heavy depreciation as has occurred under the repeatedly disturbed governmental conditions. Some months ago when roubles were selling at a much higher figure they seemed very attractive to some of our people who had oney for immediate employment, and they-not a few either-bought quite freely when our Government were in need of every dollar that could be spared from active business requirements, only to find today a heavy loss, and probably long deferred recuperation. It is but natural for these investors to have an abiding faith in an investment having behind it a country of such wonder fully rich natural resources, and if they followed the old rule they would double up on their former purchases at present prices. But this takes courage, and more courage in the face of continued internal troubles and Germany's aggressive move around the Riga front than the average man can muster. Meantime it is well to reflect on the wisdom of fully investigating home opportunities for the employment of surplus money before going so far afield. This country needs, in addition to her war requirements, industries to meet conditions that are sure to come after the war, and a patriotic spirit may well be indulged in preparing for the requirements of a greatly increased population when peace is restored to Europe. Canada has made herself and her worth known to the world as never before, and millions must flow to our country in the next decade. Now is the time to prepare by developing our own industries. Sir George Foster has frequently pointed out the great opportunity that now lies at our door for expansion of trade, when the war is over, and we can only expect to be ready for this opportunity as we prepare for it now. Fields afar off look green, but as often the pastures at home are equally good. Have a pride in your own country, and a special pride and ambition in your own city. Look ar und and see if you cannot as safely invest your money in a home industry that has already become a fact, and one of the features of London's industrial life. BANKING AND FINANCE.

The cut of capital expenditure and the unreceptiveness of the market are the two chief reasons for the smallness of the volume of municipal issues during September. For the time being the attention of investors in Canada, as well as of those in the United States who hitherto have been large purchasers of our securities, is being directed to war loans. A very general desire exists to make the impending issue of the fourth War Loan a success, and with that end in view the bankers and bond dealers are co-operating with the Finance Department in the creation of an efficient organization. Hitherto the number of subscriptions from individuals has been disappointingly low. It is hoped that by the employment of a more efficient system a wider distribution of future loans may be secured.

The August bank statement did not show any marked change. The increase in the liquid assets was evident in preparation for the movement of the crops and of the unusually large volume of other merchandise which has to be moved before the close of navigation. Deposits payable after notice continue to grow in volume, and while this is a desirable tendency, it is apt to leave on the public mind the somewhat dangerous impression that further credits can be obtained for war purposes without resorting to the public. The banks have already arranged credits to the extent of \$598,000,000 for the purchase off Canadian industrial and field products, an operation which has immobilized an unusually large proportion of their assets. This undesirable effect can be checked by the investment of new savings in government obligations, which mature after the war. In this way the Government would be enabled to liquidate part of its debt to the banks, and to extend further credit to the Imperial or Allied authorities for the purchase of our products.

The circulating notes in the hands of the public at the close of July amounted to \$164,000,000, or \$58,000,000 more than on July 31, 1914, a few days prior to the declaration of war, an increase per capita from \$13 to \$20. The existing high prices and the increase in the volume of business does not appear to warrant such a large increase of money in the pockets of the people, and the nation would be better served if a large part of this increase was 'nvested in war bonds or deposited in the banks.—Canadian Bank of Cemmerce monthly letter.

SHIPPING AND SHIPBUILDING.

An effort is being made to supply the inadequacy of our transportation facilities by building ships at several points on the lakes as rapidly as the supply of labor and material will allow, and the same is being done on the St. Lawrence and at other places on both the east and west sea coasts.

Labor troubles at Port Arthur and Fort William seriously interfered with loading of grain, and in consequence the railways were compelled to place a partial embargo on shipments. The shipments of grain from these points in the past four years are given in the table below. Any delay in loading and unloading at the present time, when transportation facilities are so inadequate, is dangerous, as stocks of coal and of other essential commodities are low.

The man was employed on Mr. Morgan's yacht. But there came a time when sailoring had lost its charm for him, and he pined for a home on the Jersey coast, there to end his days fishing. He explained his plans to Mr. Morgan, adding: "My wife and myself bought a little place down near Barnegat. After paying for everything we have \$1,000 left. What shall we do with it?"

"Buy Steel Common," Mr. Morgan replied, "and put it away."

That was back in 1903, when Steel touched 8.3-8. The fisherman bought 100 shares at 9. Since then he has been bombarded with advices from the brokerage house through which he purchased the stock, urging him to sell. Recently he wrote them:

"Please do not send me any more letters, no matter how high Steel goes. Mr. Morgan told me to hold on, no matter what happened, and that's good enough for me. I'll keep Steel until I die."—Wall Street Journal.

WALL STREET CONDITIONS.

Conservatism and caution are good qualities, but like everything else, they are best employed when used with moderation. Pessimism never built a railway, a steamship, telegraph or telephone line. It takes men of courage and daring to be the pioneers in every line of investment for the building up of our industries which employ the labor whose earnings make business. In every community there are always those whose greatest enjoyment is in the role of a "knocker," who would much rather tear down than help to build up, and Wall Street is not without her aggressive complement of these. However, the past week has developed conditions which put them on the "run" for awhile, and the bears are more in hiding now with their questionable gains. There has been some legitimate liquidation preparatory to the absorption of the War Loan, though this would have had but little effect on prices but for the aggressiveness of the bears. However, with the drop of call money from 5½ and 6 to 3½ for renewals, came a greater degree of confidence and an enhanced desire for earnings-tested securities at bargain counter prices, and the market reflects a more stable condition. 



The beginnings of the career of Gregory Rasputin are shrouded with a veil of deep mystery. He was a native of Siberia, of a small village in the government of Tobolsk, called Pokrowskoie. Some people relate that when a youth he was compromised in a crime which attracted some attention at the time—the murder of a rich merchant who was traveling from Omsk to Tobolsk to acquire from an inhabitant of Tobolsk some gold diggings, of which the latter wished to dispose. This merchant was known to carry a large sum of money, and as he never reached his destination inquiries were started. At last his body was found, with the head attered by blows, hidden in a ditch by the high road, together with that of the coachman who had driven him. The murderers were never discovered, but dark rumors concerning the participation of the youth Rasputin in the deed spread all over the village.

Whether it was the desire to put an end to them, or remorse for an action of which he knew himself to be guilty, it is difficult to say, but the fact subsists that suddenly Grischa, as he was called, developed mystical tendencies and took to attending some religious meetings at which a certain wandering pilgrim used to preach. The latter used to go from place to place in Siberia predicting the end of the world and the advent of the dreaded day of judgment, when Christ would once again appear, to demand from humanity an account of its various good or bad actions. For something like two years Rasputin followed him, until at last he began himself to assume the character of a lay preacher, to apply himself to the study of the Scriptures, and to try to establish a sect of his own, the principles of which he exposed to his followers

He established reception hours every day when all his followers, admirers and friends could come to speak with him about any business they liked. Hundreds of people used to attend those receptions, among them some very influential persons curious to see and speak with the modern Peter the Hermit, who declared that he had been called by God to save Holy Russia. In some mysterious manner he acquired the reputation of having great influence in high quarters, where (this must be noticed) he was at the time yet quite unknown. Governors fearing dismissal, rapacious functionaries whose exactions had become too flagrant, as well as businessmen in quest of some good "geschaft," to use the German expression employed before the war among financial circles in Russia, crowded around him, waiting sometimes hours for an opportunity to speak with him, and fully believing in his capacities for obtaining what they re-

Rasputin soon became a kind of business agent and surrounded himself with a number of secretaries of both sexes, whose occupation consisted in attending to his correspondence—he could hard. ly read or write-and in receiving the numerous offerings which were being brought to him daily. These secretaries, among whom figured a sister of the Bishop of Saratoff, Warnaws, made an immense amount of money themselves because no one was ever admitted into the presence of Rasputin without having previously paid dearly for this favor. Very soon they established a tax in regard to the audiences granted by their master.

"Spiritual Sisters" of Rasputin.

Besides this sister of Bishop Warnawa, Rasputin had another female secretary, and they both accompanied him in all his travels. calling themselves his spiritual sisters. They constituted, so to say, his bodyguard, and wherever he went, even in St. Petersburg, they never left off attending him and seeing to all his wants. They were the channel through which everything had to go, and without their consent no one was ever admitted into the presence of the "Saint," as they already had begun to call him.

Gregory Rasputin very often used to visit Tobolsk, where he was always received with great ceremony and pomp, as if he had been really the important personage he believed himself. The policeman in the streets saluted him as he passed; the carriage in which he drove was escorted or preceded by a high police functionary, and the governor asked him to dinner. The same kind of thing used to take place in other Siberian cities. In one of them the staterooms reserved at the railway station for any high authority on a visit to the place were thrown open to him. In another triumphal arches were erected in his honor, while in a third he was met by deputations in the midst of which could be seen civil functionaries and religious dignitaries.

How all this happened no one knew or could explain. In what consisted the fame of Rasputin and what he had done to deserve all these honors nobody could tell. But fame he had acquired, honors he had obtained, and where another person gifted with a smaller amount of impudence than he was possessed of would have been put into prison or sent to a madhouse, Gricha, as he was familiarly called, had it all his own way, and defied governors and judges with an equal indifference, sure that none among them would be daring enough to try to put a stop to his progress or to his avidity.

The following letter has been received by Inspector J. E. Keenleyside:

"Toronto, Oct. 22, 1917.

To Ontario License Inspectors:

"License inspectors are hereby informed of the board's intention to bring charges under the Ontario temperance act against persons dealing in medicated or invalid wines, which contain considerable alcoholic strength, with a view to establish whether such so-called medicines conform to the law's requirement that they shall be sufficiently medicated to prevent their use as alcoholic beverages. Preparatory steps are already under way to this end.

"It is the purpose as far as possible to prosecute manufacturers rather than retailers. When manufacturing is not done in Ontario, or there is no Ontario branch, it may be necessary to prosecute retailers. This must not be taken to imply

Medicated Wines Have Been Grants Permission for Men To Cross Border.

19 NEW PASSPORTS

Nineteen passports for permission to go to the United States, issued to men in Class 1, under the military service act, have been sanctioned by Deputy Registrar W. C. Wismer.

The deputy registrar requires in each case that the applicant for a passport show his receipt from the postmaster indicating that he has filed a claim for exemption or reported for service. The Dominion immigration authorities then gront the passport.

No bonds are being asked by either the military authorities or the Dominion immigration department. The intention was to require bonds of at least \$1,000 from each man who applied for a passport. Upon reconsideration the Government decided that any man who broke faith and went to the States and failed to return within the prescribed time would be dealt with under the act and subjected to its penalties.

Every man getting a passport is accordingly warned, so that should his intention be to evade military service, the penalty for such, when brought to his notice, might cause him to change his mind.


