Pernambuco, Jan. 30.—Passengers on the British steamer Amazon, which has arrived here from Europe, reported that the ship was attacked by a submarine in the neighborhood of Vigo, Spain. The submarine fired a torpedo which passed close under the ship's bow.

According to the passengers, several shots were fired at the submarine by both the Amazon and a French steamer which was in the neighborhod. The submarine disappeared, and it was not learned whether she had been hit or not.

NUMBER OF MEN JUMPS TO 12,000

Disabled Soldiers To Come 3.000 to 4.000 Per Month.

Soldiers' Aid Up Against Big Problem in Handling Unusually Large Parties.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 30-Within the next few months 12,000 disabled or medically unfit soldiers will return to the Province of Ontario alone, and the Soldiers' Aid Commission of Ontario is face to face with the heavy problem in regard to their disposition. It is expected that they will come at the rate of between 3,000 and 4,000 per month. The number of monthly arrivals to date has been about 700.

British Shell German Headquarters at Lens, Says
London Statement.

Parls, Jan. 30.—The Germans last night made another offensive movement in the region of Hill 304, northwest of Verdun, attacking a French trench. The attack, says-today's war office announcement, was stopped by gunfire with considerable losses to the Germans. A German raid on French trenches north of Badonvillers was attempted, but failed, adds the statement, which also reports an intermittent cannonade on the remainder of the front. Three German airplanes were brought down.

The announcement follows:

"On the left bank of the Meuse an attack with hand-grenades against one of our trenches in the region of Hill 304 was repulsed by our fire without any result other than losses for the enemy. North of Badonvillers a German attack was repulsed by cur fire without any result other than losses for the enemy. North of Badonvillers a German attack was repulsed. We took prisoners, "In Upper Alsace our batteries were active in the region of Seppois. There was intermittent cannonading along the remainder of the front.

"Three enemy airplanes were brought down in aerial combats yesterday, one by Sergt. Hauss, who up to the present time has destroyed five German airplanes. It is confirmed that Adjt, Jailier has brought down six enemy machines thus far, five airplanes and one balloon."

SUNDAY CLOSING LAW OF QUEBEC INVOLVED

Merchant Wants It Declared Ultra Vires and Illegal.

Quebec, Jan. 30.—The court of King's bench, sitting in appeals here this week, will have to decide a rural case that has an important bearing on the closing of all stores and places in rural towns and villages, throughout the entire province. The case is brought up by Louis Rodrique of St. Prosper. Dorchester County, and he wants quashed by the appeals court a municipal bylaw of St. Prosper that enacts the closing of all stores and places of business or amusement on Sundays. He claims this Sunday store closing law is ultra vires and illegal. For the last few years, a number of rural municipalities have been enacting laws to close stores and other places of business on Sundays, to the great inconvenience of out-of-theway farmers, who only come to the village once a week for religious services, but notwithstanding this inconvenience, the closing of stores on Sunday has been kept up.

Russo-Rumanians Hold Fixed Line on Trotus-Sereth Front, and Defy Efforts of Enemy to Dislodge It-1,000 German Prisoners Taken by Slavs in the Jacobeni Battle Last Saturday.

London, Jan. 30-(N. Y. Times Cable) .- The Times correspondent with the Rumanian army, telegraphing January 24, says: 'The general situation on this front is a stalemate for the present, All enemy efforts during the last two weeks have been checked with great losses by the Russo-Rumanian armies, which are holding a fixed front on the line of the Trotus and Sereth. The line is at present so strong that the enemy seems unable to strike another blow. The enemy realizes that this is the case and appears to have decided to withdraw part of his forces from this front, where only four or five German divisions remain. The rest of the German forces have been relieved by Turkish and Austrian troops. "On the front south of Galatz and in the Trotus Valley no Bulgarian unit is left except some artillery.
