## OWN FLESH, CALMLY **GRAFTS IT ON WIFE**

Chicago Surgeon Performed Unusual Operation Without Anaesthetic.

CHICAGO, July 9.-With a hand as steady as though he were performing in the raiment of a white man. He is in the neighborhood of from 20 to 27 years of age, and has been noticeably falling since he left his native snows. Charged With Murder.

The Eskimo is charged with having murdered a brother native in order to obtain the latter's wife whom he wanted for his own. Several other cases of murder have been reported to the mounted police from the region around Chesterfield linlet, and Ouangwak is going back to stand trial in his own country as a reminder to his brother natives that the law of the white man must be respected even in those remote regions.

He will be the first native who has ever been tried in his own country. Next year the department of justice will send a judge on the long journey to Chesterfield, and a court will be the first time that a judge has ever penetrated into that part of the Northwest Territories. Another murder case has been reported to the police from the same region. This will be investigated by Sergt. Douglas during the coming winter, and if possible the perpetrator of the second crime will stand trial with the Eskimo who is now in Ottawa.

Montreal, July 10.—The Canadian Railway Association, representing all the lines in the Dominion, announced this morning league decision. that an application will be made to the railway commission at Ottawa for a 30 per cent increase in freight rates.

In speaking of the league issue his campaign managers pointed out that in a recent speech Governor Cox declared.

"Certainly a rate increase is a serious thing," declared one very high rallway executive, "and it is not lu any spirit of mere idle desire that our application is made. The proposed in-







In fact, it is preferable to being reared with a silver spoon in the mouth. But sowing wild oats or contact with what is crooked, vicious or vile is quite another case. Normal winds tossing stalk and leaf promote vigor and growth of the corn plant, but no benefits accrue from the cruel hacking of hail or blistering drought. So with the moral nature. Some tender vegetables transplanted under the blazing sun wilt to their death, whereas, if given a few days preliminary shade, will become rooted and sufficiently renewed in vitality to bear up against heat and roughage. 

Interesting Point May Tested At Blenheim Shortly.

DOES GAS FRANCHISE

HOLD COMPANY TO

HIGHER RATES DEMANDED

May Be Jumped From 27 to 52 and 77 Cents.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Blenheim, July 9.—A number of Blenheim ratepayers and the town council heard a deputation from the Union Natural Gas Company last evening at some length as to why they are demanding that the gas rates on August 1 are to be raised from 27 to 52 cents for the winter and 77 cents for the summer months, the discount in each case 2 cents for prompt payment. The deputation consisted of President Steel, Manager James, Solicitor J. G. Kerr and Mr. McGee. Messrs. James and Kerr claimed that Blenheim had been given good service since the franchise was taken in 1909. The company now was losing money, and must have the prices asked or quit business, as the directors refused to put more money in to carry on in a losing game. They claimed that \$1 today gives only about 40 cents in value, compared with before the war, and Blenheim is paying only about 10 cents for gas on this basis. Blenheim, July 9 .- A number of

Made a Comparison. They maintained also that 20,000 feet of gas equals in fuel value a ton of Iney maintained also that 20,000 feet of gas equals in fuel value a ton of coal, and the new prices equal coal at \$11 a ton, while coal sells at \$15. The gas supply, they said, is depleting, and costs much more to get and deliver than when the franchise was taken. They held that the outlook for Blenheim for next winter's fuel was poor if the gas was discontinued, as coal was hard to get. They had offers for their gas at the wells at 50 cents, and an offer for gas for commercial prices to the amount used by Blenheim and Ridgetown at \$1.

They held that the franchise did not hold them at the old prices for the full fifteen years, notwithstanding that the town solicitor and Blenheim council held that it does, for, although the franchise is for fifteen years, in the clause fixing the prices it does not state especially these prices shall bind for fifteen years, nor that the company shall deliver gas to Blenheim for fifteen years.

It was stated that all towns are being asked the same rate as Blenheim, except Windsor, which is asked \$1. They stated the townships will also be approached although some of them have special claims owing to mains running through them. The capital paid-up stock of the company is \$5,224,000, representing an investment of \$18,000,000, and the stockholders, they said, got only 3½ per cent dividend last year, and 2 per cent of this was taken from the earnings of previous years, and nothing was

cent of this was taken from the earnings of previous years, and nothing was allowed for depreciation.

Solicitor Kerr said he had sold out all his stock some years ago, expecting a depreciation in value was coming, and that one of the heaviest stockholders had recently offered his stock at 55 cents on the dollar. The prices now asked for gas, taking everything into consideration, represents only about a price of 22 cents, compared with the price of gas when the franchise was taken.

The company offers to pay the cost of submitting a bylaw to the ratepayers, and asks that one be submitted as soon as possible.

Mayor Clunis told the deputation that the council would consider what they had presented, and let them know the council's decision shortly.
