## EXPECTS CIVIC **WORK TO SHOW** 1921 SURPLUS

Compared With \$5,951 For Previous Year.

INTEREST SAVING MADE

Premium Also Likely On Sale of Western University Debentures.

Hurdman then took the stand and charged that Marks had made a fake report in connection with his checking up of the Spanish River Lumber Company.


