### FIRST BLOODSHED

Growing Out of the Miners' Strike in Pennsylvania.

A Man and a Child Were Killed and Seven Others Wounded.

Shenandoah, Pa., Sept. 22.—A sheriff's posse fired on a crowd of riotous men near yesterday, killed two persons wounding seven others. Sheriff Toole and Deputies O'Donnell and Breneman were called to Shenandoah to suppress the mob that threatened mine workers and colliery property. At quitting time the three sheriffs and a small posse whom the sheriff had summoned on the ground went to the Indian Ridge colliery of the Reading Company, to escort the working men to their homes. The colliery is located a short distance east of Shenandoah. The workmen left for home shortly after four o'clock. They walked up the middle of East Centre street and reached the Lehigh Valley Railway station. Here had gathered a large crowd of Poles, Slavs and Hungarians, men, women and children, who lined both sides of the street. A shot rang out from a saloon. This was followed by a shower of stones. Many of the crowd had picked up sticks and stones, and were acting in a threatening manner. Seeing this the sheriff, who had previously cautioned his men to keep cool and not to use their firearms, commanded them to fire. The order was obeyed with terrible results. The crowd pursued the sheriff, and his posse to the Ferguson House, where they took refuge. Sheriff Toole shortly afterward telephoned to Harrisburg, and asked that a detachment of troops be sent here. It was learned that adjutant-general Stewart was in Philadelphia, and a telegram was sent him there.

### COL. OTTER WILL STAY

Along With 14 Officers and 300 Men in South Africa.

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—A cablegram from Col. Otter, dated Pretoria, 19th instant, reports that 14 officers including himself, and about 300 non-commissioned officers and men have elected to continue service in South Africa, and that the remainder will return at once under Major Pelletier.

### WILL CREATE A HITCH

In the Establishment of Separate Schools in Windsor.

The department of education has given an opinion relative to the right of the Windsor board of education to turn over to a separate school board or any other body any of the school buildings under its control.  
The opinion is to the effect that the public school board has no such right, but that if it should do so and not meet with objection from any one in Windsor, the department will not interfere in the way of it, of course, within the right of any Windsor ratepayer to take legal proceedings to prevent the transfer.

### STICK TO THE FARM.

Bishop McEvay's Advice to the Children—He Also Speaks on Separate Schools.

Bishop McEvay, held confirmation services at Tilbury this week and after the class of boys and girls had been confirmed, he gave them some advice on the subject of separate schools. He said:  
"Catholic schools are altogether too scarce. I am ashamed to say, and God's blessing will not rest on those who fail to establish them. The law of the church is that we must have the schools where we can teach our little ones, and have the right to erect the cross thereon, and wherever there should be such a school, there must be a priest to run it. It is not enough to establish a church. You must have your school, and I hope there is not a man in this parish mean enough to oppose it. So that when I come to rooms here again, I hope that every part of this district will have decent Catholic schools."  
The bishop said that he is opposed to children leaving their country homes. He advised them to marry and settle down at home and said that they would be the gainers both in money and happiness.

DATE OF THE ELECTIONS.

Speaking about the date of the coming elections the Ottawa correspondent of the Globe says: The date of the election before the lists, election forms and poll books are ready is something which even the Premier would have some difficulty in determining.

THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.

Although no official announcement has been made, the report that Sept. 25 has been set as the day for the dissolution of parliament is generally credited throughout Great Britain.

The present Salisbury ministry came into power in 1895, parliament having been dissolved July 8. Lord Salisbury had already been requested by the Queen to form a new ministry.

While the conduct of the war in South Africa has not been altogether satisfactory to the British people, and ominous threats of vengeance have been uttered from time to time, Mr. Chamberlain, who is now the most aggressive member of the cabinet, is confident that the "khaki" issue, as it is called, will prove irresistible.

A proposal has been made in Quebec to give a testimonial to Rev. Fr. O'Leary. No man is more deserving of being honored by the Canadian people than is the brave priest.

There are minor political reasons, too, for the hurried decision to dissolve parliament. The date allows the shortest possible time for nomination and elections. No nomination can be made after the last day of September, and the Liberals have not made up their list of candidates.

TO PACK EGGS FOR LONG KEEPING

The yolk of the eggs spoils much quicker than the white. For this reason it is important that the yolk should be surrounded with a layer of white. If the egg is placed on the side or large end the heavy yolk will settle to the bottom and come in contact with the shell, which admits the air. If it is placed on the small end it will always have a layer of white between it and the shell. Eggs absorb odors easily, therefore only odorless materials should be used when packing them.—Ladies' Home Journal.

## AT CAMP MEETING

A Reminder of the Gatherings of Fifty Years Ago.

A Thousand Voices Joined in Singing Old-time Hymns.

Rev. Chancellor Burwash of Victoria University, in an interview with the Toronto Star, gave some interesting particulars of the great Indian camp meeting held on Christian Island, Cape Croker, from which Dr. Burwash has just returned. This was the first encampment of the kind the doctor has attended, and therefore was to him especially interesting. "The camp," he said, "was a distinctly Indian camp. There were full contingents from six Indian bands among them—namely of Christian Island, Cape Croker, Parry Island, Rama and Georgina Islands. Altogether there were from 800 to 1,000 Indians present. "The camp was conducted in the good old-fashioned way, which brought back to one's mind memories of the early days. There was the early morning prayer meeting, then three services each day, Bible reading in the morning, and on the Sabbath morning there was early Methodist class meetings throughout the encampment, and a great love feast and sacramental service in the afternoon. The meetings were characterized by great religious fervor, there being many conversions, attended with manifestations of peculiar physical phenomena which was a feature of former great revivals, notably the Ulster revival of 1860. There must have been at least 20 cases of men being carried out in a complete state of exhaustion, brought on by their enthusiasm. But they all came out of this state seemingly perfectly happy. Such scenes are seldom seen now. "The services closed with the old-fashioned march around the grounds, and with a general hand-shaking all round. "There were two notable features of the meeting, with which I was greatly pleased. The first was the remarkable ability shown by the Indian lay preachers. An address would be delivered by a white minister, and this would be followed by a sermon by one of the Indian preachers. In the delivery of these sermons the Indian lay preachers took part, their eloquence and the natural gracefulness of their gestures were most remarkable. There was none of the wild sawing of the air with their arms, nor none of that jerky movements sometimes seen in other places. Every movement was graceful and natural. "Then their singing was magnificent. Many of the tunes I had not heard for 40 years. Sometimes over a thousand voices would take part, and the effect was something ever to be remembered. It gave me the greatest pleasure. "A series of these camp meetings has been arranged extending over five years, which, from a moral and social point of view, I consider will be of the greatest importance as bearing upon the well-being of the Indians. The bringing of them together under such influences cannot help but have the most beneficial effect. "The only annoyance we had was from some liquor dealers who tried to introduce liquor on the grounds. Several cases of whiskey were seized by the constables. I saw no evidences, however, that the liquor men succeeded in their efforts. "These meetings commenced as far back as 1824, when a small party of Indians from Cape Island strolled in to a prayer-meeting, and were converted. About the same time the famous Peter Jones and John Sunday were converted. These men possessed great ability, and their influence was extensive. "I have a report of the meeting of 1861, which shows that at that time the Methodist church had nine mission stations, attended by 2,000 Indians, and 11 schools, attended by 400 children. The present gathering is the result of work commenced 75 years ago. As a result of this work, the Indians on many of the reserves, for the purity and simplicity of their lives will compare favorably with many other Christian communities. They are as honest as the day, scrupulously so. "The houses on Christian Island are built with logs, and those that I entered were clean and comfortable, in some cases being tastefully furnished. They do not live on their farms, but live together in villages, after their old tribal fashion. They have farms of 50 acres and more in extent outside their villages. "The pagan village on Christian Island, I am told, is now entirely deserted, the old medicine man, the last one to stand out against the Christian belief, having taken up his abode on a deserted island, where he lives all alone.

## A REMARKABLE PLANT.

The dwarf plant of the oster tribe (Siphium laciniatum, which grows wild in Texas, serves the purpose of a compass. The leaves of this remarkable plant point due north and south, and are in consequence utilized by belated prairie hunters as substitutes for the magnetic needle. The plant is perennial, and attains a maximum height of three to six inches. The peculiar propensity of its foliage is attributed to the fact that both surfaces of its leaves display an equal receptivity for light. All the other known varieties characterized by the presence on the lower surface of their leaves of from twice to three as many respiratory

vessels as are contained on the upper surface, which is therefore the more sensitive of the two to the influence of light. But both surfaces of the laciniatum variety are clothed alike with an epidermis exceptionally receptive of light, and the same instinct of its leaves that prompts them to require an equal distribution of light upon each surface causes them to assume a vertical position, and to point due north and south, one flap of each leaf thus facing the east and the other the west.

## PELL TO HIS DEATH.

Ballooning's Fall at St. Joseph Witnessed by 5,000 People.

St. Joseph, Mich., Sept. 22.—L. J. Kohler, the balloonist who has been making daily ascensions during the carnival here, was hurled from his parachute and dashed head first on to a cement sidewalk 20 feet below. He was removed to a neighboring hotel, where doctors examined him and discovered a crack in the skull, running from the left ear a distance of several inches. His death is only a matter of a few hours. The accident was caused by the balloon catching in the electric street car wires as it was ascending. Five thousand people witnessed the awful accident.

## HER HEART'S HARD.

Mrs. Jim Corbett Rejects Overtures of Reconciliation From Prize Fighter.

New York, Sept. 22.—New and unexpected complications appeared yesterday in the matrimonial difficulties besetting Jim Corbett and his wife, who are at present separated by the Atlantic. It came in the shape of a telegram from London addressed to Mrs. Corbett, as follows: Stories about woman false. Come over here quick, darling. Will prove it. Love you only. Answer. JIM. Hotel Cecil, Sept. 18. Despite this appeal, Mrs. Corbett is unrelenting. "His cable message is absurd," she said. "I have not answered it, and will not condescend to enter into any further parley with him. I will press my suit."

## TRANSVAAL PLOT.

Roberts Has Made a Lengthy Report Concerning It.

London, Sept. 22.—The war office has issued a lengthy report from Roberts regarding the Johannesburg plot to overthrow the British garrison and murder the officers. "Consuls of America, Germany, France and Sweden, subjects of which nations were arrested," he says, "met and fully discussed the case with the British officials. The interview was most satisfactory. The consuls entirely concurred with the British action, and promised every assistance. Roberts adds that he forthwith ordered the deportation of all foreigners arrested in connection with the plot for whose behavior their respective consuls could not vouch. Otherwise, very few foreigners were deported, except employees of the Netherlands railway, who refused to work for the war. The Netherlands government will demand compensation for their expulsion. AN IRISH JUDGE. Lord Morris, always a wit and now a distinguished judge, comes from Galway, and has never lost the mellifluous brogue of West of Ireland folk. This characteristic made the groundwork of a story which the London Telegraph tells of him. One day Lord Morris was sitting at the Four Courts as Lord Chief Justice of Ireland, when a young barrister from the north rose nervously to make his first speech. The judge had declared that no one listening to himself would ever take him for anything but an Irish man, which was perfectly correct. But Galway could not understand Antrim. The local chief justice leaned over to ask the associate where the barrister hailed from. "Conny Antrim," was the response. Then asked his lordship of the officials: "Did ye ever come across such a frightful accident in the course of yer life?" At another time it fell to his lot to hear a case at Coleraine, in which damages were claimed from a veterinary surgeon for having poisoned a valuable horse. The issue depended upon whether a certain number of grains of a particular drug could be safely administered to the animal. The dispensary doctor proved that he had given eight grains to a man, from which it was to be inferred that twelve for a horse was not excessive. "Never mind yer eight grains, doctor," said the judge. "We all know that some poisons are cumulative in effect, and ye may get the edge of yer life. But let me tell this: The twelve grains—wouldn't they kill the devil himself if ne swallowed them?" The doctor was annoyed and pompously replied: "I don't know, my lord; I never had him for a patient." From the bench came the answer: "Ah, no, doctor, ye never had, more's the pity: The old boy's still alive."

## NOAH'S DELUGE.

An Ohio Professor Proposes to Prove That it Was Universal

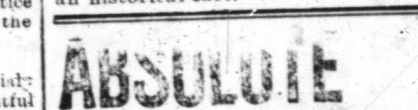
And Will Dig Some Holes in Siberia and Elsewhere to Find the Flood's Traces.

New York, Sept. 22.—Rev. Dr. R. S. Gregory, editor of the Homiletic Review, has just received a letter from Rev. Dr. George Frederick Wright, of Oberlin college, Ohio, which discloses the object of a trip which the professor has started to make through Siberia. He is considered an authority on the glacial period of the earth's geological history and refuses to accept the theory that the deluge merely submerged the regions round about Palestine. He believes that when the waters covered "the face of the earth" he meant it. Prof. Wright will go through the mountains of Siberia, far from where preachers excavations. There he will dig up the earth until, with the geologist's eye, he discovers just that stratum which should have been deposited during the period in which the deluge took place. Next he will explore the Caucasus range, pass down to ancient Ararat, where tradition says the ark landed, and emerge from his travels somewhere near Smyrna, Asia Minor. If in all the mountain regions he explores Dr. Wright finds the remains of the sea for which he looks, he will conclude that the deluge was an historical fact.

**LIKE SHARP RAZORS**

God's Judgments Are Swift and Sure, Says Dr. Talmage.

**THE BREADTH OF GOD'S LOVE**

National Sins Are Punished by Keen Instruments—No Canaanity Happens by Chance, but is Always Directed by Divine Wisdom.

Washington, Sept. 19.—Dr. Talmage, in his journey westward through Europe, has recently visited scenes of thrilling historic events. He sends this sermon, in which he shows that nations are judged in this world and that God rewards them for their virtues and punishes them for their crimes. The text is Isaiah vii, 20. "In the same day shall the Lord shave with a razor that is hired, namely, by them beyond the river, by the king of Assyria. The Bible is the noblest book ever written. There are no similitudes in Ossian or the Iliad or the Odyssey so daring. Its imagery sometimes seems on the verge of reckless, but only seems so. The fact is that God would startle and arouse and propel men and nations. A tame and limping similitude would fail to accomplish the object. While there are times when he employs in the Bible the gentle dew in the morning cloud and the dove and the dove break in the presentation of truth, we often find the iron chariot, the lightning, the earthquake, the spray, the sword and, in my text, the razor. This keen bladed instrument has advanced in usefulness with the ages. In Bible times and lands the beard remained uncut save in the seasons of mourning and humiliation, but the razor was always a suggestive symbol. David said of Doeg, his antagonist, "Thy tongue is a sharp razor working deceitfully"—that is, it pretends to clear the face, but it is really used for deadly incision.

In this striking text this weapon of the toilet appears under the following circumstances. Judaea needs to have some of its prosperities cut off, and God sends against it three Assyrian kings—first Sennacherib, then Esarhaddon and afterward Nebuchadnezzar. These three sharp invasions that cut down the glory of Judaea are compared to so many sweeps of the razor across the face of the land. And these devastations were called a hired razor because God took the kings of Assyria, with whom he had no sympathy, to do the work and punish them in palaces and spoils and relaxations. These kings were hired to execute the divine behests. And now the text, which on its first reading may have seemed trivial or inapt, is charged with momentous import. "In the same day shall the Lord shave with a razor that is hired, namely, by them beyond the river, by the king of Assyria."

Well, if God's judgments are razors, we had better be careful how we use them. In the case of the Holy Spirit, these domestic weapons are put away where no one by accident may touch them and where the hands of children may not reach them. Such instruments must be carefully handled or not handled at all. But how recklessly some people wield the judgments of God! If a man mixes with business misfortune, how many there are ready to cry out: "That is a judgment of God upon him because he was unscrupulous or arrogant or over-reaching or miserly. What a clean sweep of everything! His city house and country house gone. His stables emptied of all the fine bays and sorrels and grays that used to prance by his door. All his resources overturned and all that he prided himself on tumbled into demolition. Good for him!" Stop, my brother. Don't sling around too freely the judgments of God, for they are razors.

Some of the most wicked business men succeed, and they live and die in prosperity, and some of the most honest and conscientious are driven into bankruptcy. Perhaps the unsuccessful man's manner was unfortunate, and he was not really so proud as he looked to be. Some of those who carry their heads erect and look imperial are humble as a child, while many a man in seedy coat and slouch hat and unblacked shoes is as proud as Lucifer. You cannot tell by a man's look whether he was not unscrupulous in business, for there are two sides to every story, and everybody that accomplishes anything for himself or others gets industriously lied about. Perhaps his business misfortune was not a punishment, but the fatherly discipline to prepare him for heaven, and God may love him far more than he loves you, who can pay dollar for dollar and are put down in the commercial catalogues as A 1. Whom the Lord loveth he gives \$400,000 and lets die on embroidered pillows? No; whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth. Better keep your hand off the Lord's razors, lest they cut and wound people that do not deserve it. If you want to shave off some of the bristling pride of your own heart, do so, but be very careful how you put the sharp edge on others. "How I do dislike the behavior of those persons who when people are unfortunate say, 'I told you so—getting punished—served him right!' If those I-told-you-so's got their desert, they would long have been pitched over the battlements." The note in their neighbor's eyes, so small that it takes a microscope to find it, gives them more trouble than the beam which obscures their own optics. With air sometimes supercilious and sometimes parasitical and always blasphemous they take the razor of divine judgment and sharpen it on the bone of their own hard hearts and then go to work on men sprawled out at full length under disaster, getting mercilessly. They begin by soft expressions of sympathy and pity and half praise and lauder the

victim all over before they put on the sharp edge.

Let us be careful how we shoot at others lest we take down the wrong one, remembering the servant of King William Rufus, who shot at a deer about the arrow glanced against a tree and killed the king. Instead of going out with shafts to pierce and razors to cut we had better imitate the friend of Richard Coeur de Lion. Richard, in the war of the Crusades was captured and imprisoned, but none of his friends knew where, so his loyal friend went around the land from stronghold to stronghold and sang to each window a snatch of song that Richard Coeur de Lion had taught them in other days. And one day, coming before a jail where he suspected his king might be incarcerated, he sang two lines of song, and immediately King Richard responded from his cell with the other two lines, and so his whereabouts were discovered, and a successful movement was at once made for his liberation. So let us go up and down the world with the music of kind words and sympathetic hearts, surrounding the unfortunate and trying to get out of trouble men who had noble natures, but by unforeseen circumstances have been incarcerated, thus liberating kings. More hymmbooks and less razors.

Especially ought we to be apologetic and merciful toward those who, while they have great faults, have also great virtues. Some people are barren of virtues. No weeds verily, but no flowers. I must not too much straggle at a point along the fence if it be in a field containing 40 acres of ripe Michigan wheat. Some time ago naturalists told us there was on the sun a spot 20,000 miles long, but from the brightness and warmth I concluded it was a good deal of sun still. The sun can afford to have a very large spot upon it, though it be 20,000 miles long, and I am very apologetic for those men who have great faults, while at the same time they have magnificent virtues.

Again, when I read in my text that the Lord shaves with the hired razor of Assyria the land of Judaea, I think myself of the precision of God's providence. A razor swung the tenth part of an inch out of the right line means either failure of laceration, but God's dealing never slips, and they do not miss by the thousandth part of an inch the right direction. People talk as though things in this world were at loose ends. Cholera sweeps across Maryland and Mexico, and we watch anxiously. Will the epidemic sweep Europe and America? People say, "That will entirely depend on whether the inoculation is a successful experiment; that will depend on the quarantine regulations; that will depend on the early or late appearance of frost. That epidemic is pitched into the world, and it goes blundering across the continents, and it is all guess work and an appalling perhaps, I think, perhaps God should be using his sword with it and that his mercy may have in some way protected us; that he may have done as much for us as the quarantine and the health officers. It was right and a necessity. All caution should be used, but there have come enough macaroni from Italy, and enough grapes from the south of France, and enough rags from tattered demmons, and hidden in these articles of transportation—under the seats and under the seats and under the seats—there are the germs of the pestilence. I think all the doctors and quarantines, but more than all, and first of all, and last of all, and all the time, I thank God, in all the 6000 years of the world's existence there has not been a more effective "happened so." God is not an anarchist, but a King, a Father.

When little Tad, the son of President Lincoln, died, all America sympathized with "The sorrow in the White House. He used to rush into the room where the cabinet was in session and while the most eminent men of the land were discussing the questions of national existence, but the child had no care about those questions. Now, God the Father and God the Holy Spirit, the Holy Spirit are in perpetual session in regard to this world and kindred worlds. Shall you, his child, rush in to criticize or arraign or condemn the divine government? No; the cabinet of the terms. There is good and evil and will govern in the wisest and best way, and there never will be a mistake and, like razor skillfully swung, shall cut that which ought to be cut and avoid that which ought to be avoided." Precision to the very hairbreadth. Earthly timeliness may get out of order and strike wrong, saying it is 1 o'clock when it is 2, or 2 when it is 3. God's clock is always right, and when it is 1, it strikes 1, and when it is 12 it strikes 12, and the second hand is as accurate as the minute hand.

Further my text tells us that God sometimes shaves nations. "In the same day shall the Lord shave with a razor that is hired." With one sharp sweep he went across Judaea, and down went its pride and its power. In 1861 God shaved the American nation. We had allowed to grow Sabbath desecration and oppression and blasphemy and fraud and impurity and all sorts of turpitude. The south had its sins, and the north its sins, and the east its sins, and the west its sins. We had been warned again and again, and we did not heed. At length the sword of war cut from the St. Lawrence to the gulf and from Atlantic seaboard to Pacific seaboard. The pride of the land, not the cowards, out the heroes, on both sides went down. And that which we took for the sword of war was the Lord's razor. In 1862 again it went across the land; in 1863 again; in 1864 again. Then the sharp instrument was incased and put away.

Never in the history of the ages was any land more thoroughly shaved than during those four years of civil combat, and, my brethren, if we do not quit some of our individual and national sins the Lord will again take us in hand. He has other razors within reach besides war—

epidemics, droughts, deluges, plagues—grasshopper and locust—or our overtowering success may so far excite the jealousy of other lands that under some pretext the great nations may combine to put us down. Our nation, so easily approached on north and south from both oceans, might have on hand at once more hostilities than we ever arrayed against any one power. I hope no such combination against us will ever be formed, but I want to show that, as Assyria was the hired razor against Judaea, and Cyrus the hired razor against Babylon, and the Huns the hired razor against the Goths, these are now many razors that the Lord could hire if, because of our national sins, he should undertake to shave us. In 1870 Germany was the razor with which the Lord shaved France. Japan was the razor with which he shaved China and America the razor with which he shaved arrogant, oppressive and Bible hating Spain. But nations are to repent in a day. May a speedy and worldwide coming of God hinder on both sides the sea all national calamity. But do not let us as a nation either by uncharitable law or Washington or bad lives among ourselves defy the Almighty.

One would think that our national symbol of the eagle might sometimes suggest another eagle—that which ancient Rome carried. In the talons of that eagle were clutched at one time Britain, France, Spain, Italy, Dalmatia, Rhaetia, Noricum, Pannonia, Moesia, Dacia, Thrace, Macedonia, Greece, Asia Minor, Syria, Phoenicia, Palestine, Egypt, all northern Africa and all the islands of the Mediterranean, indeed all the world that was worth having, a hundred and twenty millions of people under the wings of that eagle. Where is she now? Ask Gibbon, the historian in his prose poem, "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire." Ask her gigantic ruins, bemoaning their sadness through the ages, the screech owl at windows late and ask the day of judgment, when her crowned debauchees, Commodus and Pertinax and Caligula and Diocletian shall answer for their infamy. As men and as nations let us repent and have our trust in a pardoning God rather than depend on former successes for immunity! Out of 13 of the greatest battles of the world Napoleon had lost but one before Waterloo. Pride and destruction often ride in the same saddle. But notice once more, and more than all, in my text, that God is so kind and loving that when it is necessary for him to cut he has to go to others for the sharp edged weapon. "In the same day shall the Lord shave with a razor that is hired." God is love. God is pity. God is help. God is shelter. God is rescue. There are no sharp edges about him, no thrusting points, no protrusions. If you want want balm for wounds, he has that. If you want divine save for eyesight, he has that. But if there is sharp and cutting work to do, which requires a razor, that he hires, and he has nothing that he hires, save when dire necessity demands, and then he has to go clear on to some one else to get the instrument. This divine clemency will be no novelty to those who have pondered the Calvarian massacre, where God submerged himself in human tears and crimsoned himself from punctured arteries and let the terrestrial and infernal worlds maul him until the channels of his sticky had to be turned out, because the universe could not endure the outrage. Illustrious for love he must have been to take all that as our substitute, paying out his own heart the price of our admission to the gates of heaven.

King Henry II of England crowned his son as king and on the day of coronation put on a servant's garb and waited, he, the king, at the son's table; the astonishment of all the princes. But we know of a more wondrous scene—the King of heaven and earth offering to put on you, his child, the crown of life and in the form of a servant waiting on you with blessing. Extol that to all praising all sculpture, all music, all architecture, all worship! In Dresdenian gallery let Raphael hold him up as a child, and in Antwerp cathedral let Rubens hand him down from the cross as a martyr. And Handel make all his oratorio vibrate around that one chord—"He was wounded for our transgressions, bruised for our iniquities. But not until all the redeemed got home, and from the cross as a martyr, the millions of the ransomed shall be revealed the wonders of redemption, shall either man or seraph or archangel know the height and depth and length and breadth of the love of God.

At our national capital a monument to him who did more than any one to achieve our American independence was for scores of years in building, and most of us were discouraged and said it never would be completed. And how glad we all were when in the presence of the highest officials of the nation the work was done! But will the monument to him who died for the eternal liberation of the human race ever be completed? For ages the work has been going up. Evangelists and apostles and martyrs have been adding to the heavenly pile, and every one of the millions of redeemed going up from earth has made to it contribution of gladness, and weight of glory is swung at the top of other weight of glory, higher and higher as the centuries go by, higher and higher as the whole millennium roll, sapphire on the top of jasper, sardonyx on the top of chalcedony and chryso-prasus above topaz, until far beneath shall be the walls and towers and domes of our earthly capitol, a monument forever and forever rising and yet never done. "Unto him who hath loved us and washed us from our sins in his own blood and made us kings and priests forever." Alleluia, amen.
