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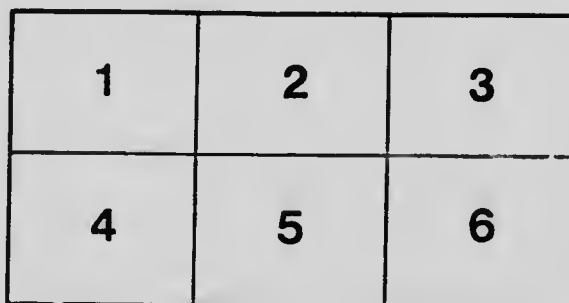
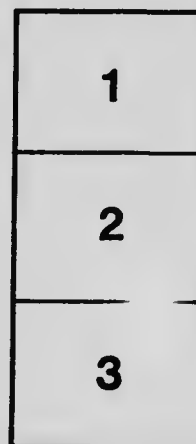
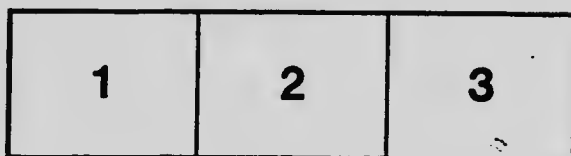

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## Summer Series of Meetings

### ANNOUNCEMENT OF SUPERINTENDENT, 1920

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This circular contains announcement of the summer series of Women's Institute meetings, together with list of speakers and their subjects. In order to lessen the expense in connection with the summer series of meetings, and also that one Branch may become better acquainted with an adjoining Branch, two, and in some cases, three Branches are uniting to hold one meeting. The list includes a number of Branches that have not taken advantage of the summer speaker during the war. Many places, too, where girls and women were drawn together for patriotic work, are to be visited with a view to organize, and in some places to re-organize, as the Institute work had been practically dropped for patriotic work.

Although it was generally acknowledged that the Institutes, as well as other organizations, felt the reaction which quite naturally followed the strenuous war work, it must be admitted that no organization grasped the seriousness of the problems of re-construction facing us in the home, the community, and the state more quickly than the Women's Institutes.

It was extremely gratifying to learn from the reports given at the Conventions held in the fall of 1919 of the various lines of work undertaken and accomplished by the Institutes. Memorial Halls and Memorial Parks were established and supported; equipment whereby the hot lunch might be served, individual drinking cups, wash basins, towels, equipment for playgrounds, libraries, musical instruments, etc., have been placed in many schools. The 1919 Conventions were considered among the best yet held, and the enthusiasm and earnestness of the representative women in attendance proved that aggressive work would be undertaken during the coming months.

Realizing that all Branches were anxiously awaiting the reports presented and the addresses delivered, to assist them in planning their work for the future, a summarized report of the three Conventions was published (Circular 25) and a copy mailed to each officer, in addition to the copy sent each delegate present.

A conference of the delegates who are to attend the summer series of meetings and the members of the Provincial Board of Directors was held on April 6th, 7th and 8th, for the purpose of discussing fully Institute work for the coming year. Considerable time was given to the following topics:

Each of the delegates will be prepared to take part in discussion upon the above subjects, and it would be well for the officers and members to give some little thought to these subjects beforehand and be prepared to ask for any information which they desire at the summer meeting.

It is a source of great satisfaction to the Institutes that the medical inspection, which was introduced and encouraged by them, has now become fully established, and a complete health survey of the public school children throughout the Province is to be made, through the co-operation of the Women's Institute Branch and the Department of Education. What the Institutes are especially concerning themselves about now is the follow-up work after the inspection. They realize that the holding of clinics and the securing of permanent school nurses are very essential if the important work begun is to be of permanent value. The nurses will pick up the home and school. The ideal aimed at is the normal child, with a healthy body and sound mind. It is believed that a nurse can manage about 30 schools altogether, having the town for a centre and reaching out to the rural schools and homes. A capable nurse can be secured for about \$1,200 per year. The Women's Institutes should co-operate with the School Boards and the Councils when engaging a nurse, and set down in the agreement the particular part of the work each organization is prepared to do.

A great interest has been taken in the Demonstration-Lecture Courses this year. While the epidemic during the winter interfered with the courses to a considerable extent, over 4,000 girls and women took advantage of the 130 courses held since August, 1919. Applications from many Branches are still on file and will receive first consideration at the conclusion of the summer series of meetings. The Home Nursing Course has not only forearmed all those who have taken advantage of it with definite knowledge of value in handling emergency cases, preventing illness, etc., but has also paved the way for rural school nurse work throughout the Province.



The Sewing Course has enabled those who have taken advantage of it to draft their own patterns, make and remake their own clothes, and has also impressed upon the young girls the importance of dress from moral and physical standpoints. The Domestic Science Course is impressing upon the people the importance of food in its relation to health, food values, proper diet for the growing child, etc. It is admitted by all Institutes throughout the Province that no service which the Department has to offer is doing more for its members by way of imparting knowledge of practical value, by bringing together all classes in the communities, and establishing a better understanding between them, and by developing a community spirit, than the Demonstration-Lecture Courses.

The Board of Directors of the Federated Women's Institutes of the Province have made considerable progress in their work since being elected, and are now in a position to undertake very effective work throughout the Province. At their executive meeting, held in January, standing committees, with conveners, were appointed as follows:

The conveners of these committees have now a workable programme outlined, a copy of which will be in the hands of all delegates who are addressing the meetings this summer. Programmes of work for the various committees will be placed in the hands of Institute officers before the summer series of meetings, and it would be well for the members to consider the lines in which they think it well to co-operate, and if thought desirable discuss the same at the "summer" meeting.

The Institute officers and members are required to urge as many as possible to join the Institutes for 1920-21. It is very essential that every rural woman should become a member of a live organization which serves all the people and has for its objects the betterment of the homes, school, the community, and the state. The record of the Women's Institute is a most creditable one, and the possibilities of continued service were never greater.

#### ADVICE TO DISTRICT OFFICERS.

The district officers are held responsible for the following:—

(1) To arrange and pay for transportation of the delegate while attending meetings where branches are established. The Department will bear hotel expenses at points where branches do not exist, for dates on which no meetings are announced and for over Sunday, also transportation

from points where there is no organization and when going from one riding to another. The district officers can no doubt reduce the transportation charge considerably by having the branch officers co-operate in making and carrying out arrangements.

Send copies of advertising material to the delegate and give him directions as to how to reach the first place of meeting in the riding and such other information as to transportation and entertainment as is thought necessary.

It is well for one of the district officers to accompany the delegate.

(2) Advertise all meetings. See pages 49 and 50 of Hand Book for directions.

Advertise for a definite hour, say 2.30 or 3 p.m.; and, if an evening instead of an afternoon session is desired, 8 p.m., and start the meeting at the time announced.

We strongly advocate an *afternoon meeting only*. Departmental delegates will not be available for Saturday evening meetings or more than one session at a place, except where special arrangements are made with the Department for the same.

Have a definite understanding with the officers at each point as to method and extent of advertising.

Utilize the local papers in advertising.

See that definite announcements are made in all advertisements as to hall or other place of meeting at each point.

Make your announcements for each session as full as possible, i.e., give the name of the speaker and the topic to be taken up and particulars as to local talent.

Arrangements should be made with each branch secretary for each member to receive a notice of the meetings, and special invitations to non-members should be sent either direct to the individual or announced in the local press.

When meetings are announced for places at which there is no organization, pay special attention to the matter of advertising and see that definite arrangements are made for hall, entertainment, etc.

Arrange with the branch officers for a definite programme for each point. It would be well for one of the district officers to give a short address bearing upon the work of the district at each place of meeting, with possibly a brief paper or address by some local person.

#### ADVICE TO BRANCH OFFICERS.

Give your district secretary full particulars regarding arrangements for your local meeting, including subject chosen and the musical selections, or other assistance which will be given the delegate; also let the district secretary know what advertising you are prepared to do locally. See pages 49 and 50 of the Hand Book for advice regarding advertising. Urge your

members to give personal invitations to other women in the district to attend the meeting.

The branches are responsible for the entertainment of the delegate, and it may be that they can render assistance in the transportation of the delegate also. Notify the district secretary as to what you are prepared to do in this regard.

See that the hall in which the meeting is to be held is properly cleaned, lighted and ventilated.

Write direct to delegate at least two weeks before your meeting is to be held, at her home address, or at some point in the series of meetings, notifying her of the topics chosen for our local meeting. *Notify the delegate* as to what provision has been made for her *entertainment*.

Announce only one session, preferably an afternoon meeting. The delegate will be available for two sessions only upon condition that considerable assistance is given at the evening meeting, and the consent of the Department has been secured.

Delegates are not prepared to attend Saturday evening meetings, except when special application is made to the Department for the same and permission given.

While lunches and picnics are an enjoyable feature of the summer meetings, the delegate should be given an opportunity for proper rest and regular meals.

#### GENERAL NOTES.

Ask questions at the meeting, not afterward, when all will get the benefit of the answers.

Bring notebook and pencil with you.

If the Institute has been a benefit to you, ask others to join.

Women and girls over fourteen will be made welcome at all meetings, and even may be invited if the officers so desire.

While the Departmental delegates have an important part to play in making the summer series a success, a great responsibility rests upon the local officers in thoroughly advertising the meetings and in urging the members and their friends to attend.

See that all arrangements are complete and that they are properly carried out.

The "summer" meetings may be made an occasion of real value to your members if they take advantage of the occasion to consider plans for future activities. We are anxious to see a closer co-operation among the branches of each district, and not only the district officer but the members of the Provincial Board of Directors will gladly lend assistance.
