Last fall, however, his health failed him, and he went to California to recuperate. He came back in June greatly improved in health, but not strong enough to engage actively in business. Of course where it is the practice to leave the stock exposed to the weather during a part of each and every, even the coldest days, then clipping all over would be cruel and inadvisable.

Where winter dairying is practised the clipping of the cows in milk has much to recommend it. No other one thing that the dairyman can do to his cows will count half so much for "clean milk" as clip-ping the thighs and hind flanks, also the udders and a short distance up the belly of such cows as are being milked. The time required for all the clipping that should be done is quite insignificant when compared with the amount of work necessary to keep similar animals even passably clean, where clipping has not been practised. TORONTO.

Receipts of live stock at the city market were large, 144 car loads being reported by the railways, composed of 1970 cattle, 904 hogs, 2043 sheep and lambs with 66 calves.

There were, as usual, many more of the common and inferior cattle than of the medium to good, but there was a larger number of the better grades than is generally seen on this market in any

The market was overstocked with cattle, as many loads were left unsold at the close of the market; not only were the common cattle unsold, but there were several loads of fairly good quality that were not disposed of. The heavy run at the Union Stock Yards on Monday, followed by a heavier run to-day, had the effect of depressing prices.

Exporters - None were offered and none were wanted, as there is little or no shipping space available. A few bulls were on sale, but even the best of these were not bought for export purposes. Two choice bulls, 1700 lbs each, sold at \$4.50 per cwt.

Butchers-Prime picked cattle were scarce, and worth as much as export cattle, ranging from \$4.75 to \$5; but \$5 per cwt was refused for two very choice animals, good enough for Christmas or any other market. The best loads of butcher cattle sold all the way from \$4.25 to \$4.60, but there were very few brought the latter figure, as will be seen by sales given below. Medium butchers' sold from \$3.75 to \$4 per cwt; common, at \$3.25 to \$3.50; cows, \$2.25 to \$3.60; canners, \$1 to \$2 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers-Good to choice milkers met a strong market, but common light cows and late springers were not in demand. Buyers were here from Montreal, as it seems to be hard to satisfy their demands. Medium to good cows sold from \$45 to \$65 each, and extra choice quality cows brought \$70.

Veal Calves-Calues sold at \$3 to \$6. 25 per cwt. Those sold at \$3 are a disgrace to any market, and especially to the farmer that raised them. But they all find a market.

Sheep and Lambs-Receipts of sheep and lambs were large and prices easy Export ewes, \$3.25 to \$3.40; rams, \$2 to \$2.50; lambs, \$4 to \$4.50 per cwt.

Hogs-Receipts were not large only 904 from all sources. Mr. Harris quotes selects at \$6.25, fed and watered, and lights at \$6 per cwt.






