Chancellor in His Address to German Reichstag Yesterday, Urged DET Confidence in Undersea Warfare, Accomplishing More Than Expected---America a Negligible Quantity in War

Copenhagen, July 20.---Chancellor Michaelis in his address before the Reichstag yesterday said Germany would not continue the war a day longer if it could obtain an honorable peace. The United States intervention was not regarded with serious concern. The German fleet, particularly the submarine would master the situation; he said.

Dr. Michaelis in the course of his address said:

"Bitter criticism has been directed against a highly deserving man who occupied this post before me. This criticism has been oft inspired by enmity and hate. I think it would have been better if enmity and hate paused behind closed doors. (Cheers). When the history of this war lies open before us we shall all alike completely appreciate what Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg's chancellorship meant for the enemy. (cheers). Appointed chancellor by the Emperor I have the honor for the first time to communicate with your high house. A great weight has been laid on my shoulders in a most grave time. Trusting God and German might, I ventured to undertake it and shall now serve the cause to the utmost of my power. I beg from you your trusty co-operation in the spirit which has been splendidly maintained in this body during the

GROUND STREWN WITH FOE DEAD

Terrible Losses Inflicted by French on German Attaking Parties Last Night; General Attack on Aisne Front Netted no Gains for Foe

By Courier Leased Wire,

Paris, July 20.—The Germans made a general attack last might on the whole sector of the Aisne front between Groonne and Vauclerc, using large bodies of troops. The War Office announces that the French withstood their furious assaults and maintained their positions everywhere. The ground before the positions was strewn with German dead.

The announcement follows:
"In the region of Hurtebise and Craonne the artillery fighting continued with great violence. The Germans renewed their attacks until a late hour in the wight. At about 6 200 in their attacks until a late hour in the night. At about 8.30 o'-clock, after a powerful bombard-ment with concentrated artil-lery, the enemy undertook a new general assault, with important forces, on the line along the plateaux before Craonne and Vauelaro.

"Hand-to-hand fighting occurred on the whole extent of this front, which our troops defended with magnificent valor. Their tenacious resistance broke

up the furious asaults of the enemy. Everywhere our positions were maintained completely. In spite of the heavy sacrifices made by the enemy, he was not able to gain a footing on the California plateau or the Case-Californa plateau or the Case-tions further west. The ground in front of our lines, covered with the dead, bears witness to the violence of the battle and the sanguinary defeat of the enemy.

Between the Califorie plateau and the Casemates plateau the efforts of the Germans to increase the advantage obtained yesterday were equally fruitless, An energetic counter-attack enabled us to regain a position which the enemy had penetrated. We hold the crest of the plateau entirely. The enemy still holds a position about 600 meters long, near the northern edge of the plateau, where one of our first line positions was destroyed by the bombardment. We took a score of prisoners of the guard,

By Courier Leased Wire. London, July 20.—Summarizing the military events of the past week Major General Frederick B. Maurice chief director of military operations

"The British front has been note-worthy only for the fact that it has seen the liveliest air fighting in the history of the war, with the losses everest on the German side and the results generally favorable to the British. On land there was only British. minor fighting without material

"On the French front the Germans still are carrying on their policy of using picked troops for local operations aimed at exhausting and harassing the French. The result has been nil and the policy is a con-fession that the Germans are incapable of attempting any really great effort.

"On the Russian front bad weather and floods have necessitated the drawing back of some advanced posts Supplementing his talk on the militaray operations, General Maur-

ice remarked "I am told that in the United States the ordinary man has got a general impression that when any really stiff fighting job is to be done the Englishman calls on Australian, Canadian or Scotsman to take the van. This idea is being carefully fostered by the Germans with the foolish idea of spreading some dis-sension or dissatisfaction between the branches of the Anglo-Saxon race and they soon will be trying the same propaganda to push a





Michaelis' Speech Holdout, Bluff

Chancellor's Inaugural Address Criticized By The French Press

French Comment
Paris, July 20.—Most newspapers reserve considered judgment Chancellor's Michaelis' ma speech until the full text arrives, but all print prominently the summary and use verbatim such portions of the report as were received up to the time of going to press. The Matin says the program of the Prussian militarism set forth by the chancellor may be summarized in two words, "holdout and bluff." The most striking example of bluff being the disdain wherewith he affects to

treat American intervention.

The Matin further points out that the occasion marked by innovation is likely to have great enect in the future — parliament considered it impossible merely to accept the government's declarations, and itself formulated its own views on peace and war. Besides sacred unity which evidently no longer exists in the German parliament; is no longer a homeogenous force. It is, the paper says, divided on the essential question into a minority, which approves the crown's representative and a majority which maintains its own point of view without, however daring as yet to impose it.

The Journal finds the difference

The Journal finds the difference between von Bethmann-Hollweg and Michaelis is that the former has for the past year been leaning more towards the left and making certain concessions to Conservatives so as to keep his seat among them. The unlimited submarine warfare of Herr Michaelis on the contrary has been put in place by the militarists with rders to react against weakness and to galvanize energies. He is thus obliged to risk a little bluster, trust-ing by a few tentative formulae to appease discontented parties

The Figaro finds that the speech shows a comprehensible embarrass-ment in the face of a difficult and confused situation in German politics. It is attempt to please all par-ties and will no doubt end as might be expected by satisfying none. It is also plain, says The Figaro, that Germany does not intend to state plainly her war objects. She does not offer peace and if she declares she does not desire conquest the situation remains as equivocal as ever.

These are but instances of the striking episodes in the air-fighting of the past few days. The official statements convey but vaguely an idea of the work now done by the airmen. Bombing raids over the enemy country are carried out in ever-increasing numbers and damage which in the aggregate is tremendous is being done to objectives which are never mentioned to the outside world . Only the official photos at aviation headquarters tell the story of the important phase of the war carried out in addition to the patrol work, the direction of artillery fire,
